ABOUT STRIKERS.

Some sound Advice For Contentious Workmen. From the Boston Herald.

Taking all of the labor organizations together, the membership in their ranks does not exceed one-twentieth of the number of wage-earners in this country. That is to say, for every Knight of Labor or Trades Unionist of any kind there are nineteen wage-earners who are neither Knights of Labor nor Trades Unionists. We are heartily in sympathy with the desire of workmen, whether trades unionists or not, to improve their condition and to obtain a larger share in the results of production; but it is necessary to point out that no relatively small class of capitalists or workmen are justified in taking to themselves the exclusive possession of opportunities of honor, emolument or work, to the loss and detriment of the great mass of their fellow citizens.

Suppose the boss in a boot and shoe factory should ask the manufacturer for higher wages, and on receiving a refusal should decline to work. The manufacturer might then go to a laborer in his employ, a member of the order of Knights of Labor, and a person whom he knew to be a competent workman, and offer him the vacant place at the same rate of wages as he had paid to the former boss. Now, and there he would be looked upon as a scab, a man willing to work at a lower rate of pay than a position of this kind ought to command. But would the promoted Knight of Labor look upon himself as a scab? Not at all. He would commence a career of glory, and Sir Isaac Newton appeared with a key to unlock the mysteries of force, and to draft a true chart of the stupendous universe.

Now it is not probable that most of the workmen who filled the places of strikers in New York and elsewhere judge of their own actions in precisely this manner? Their wages in many cases may have been doubled by the change made, and it would be difficult to convince them by argument that, out of consideration for others, they should refrain from taking advantage of this, to them, fortunate opportunity. They would, perhaps, reply to this reasoning that the men they displaced would, under ordinary circumstances, have denied them the right to obtain this class of work, by heaving it around with society restrictions and limitations, as to whom they should employ, and this being the case, why should they, the newcomers, exhibit a consideration for the welfare of the strikers, when these organizations, exhibited not the least consideration for their, the outsiders, welfare?

It seems to us that one serious defect in the methods of the labor organization is this policy of exclusion. It certainly makes it difficult for the Knights of Labor to prevent the competition of wage-earners whenever they consider it necessary to carry their contention to the length of a strike. What is, as it seems to us, needed, is to have the principle established that the wages paid to all workers should be fairly commensurate with the services performed, and that no political economy that within certain limits the rates paid for services rendered depend upon local custom and public opinion, and not upon supply and demand. The largest bank house in this city could, no doubt, hire a bookkeeper who would keep its accounts for \$700 a year. But the firm in question would never think of making such a change on the ground of economy. It would consider it a humiliation, and the same rule holds good in most of the other branches of work.

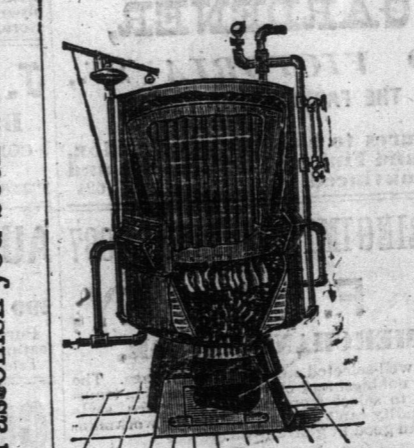

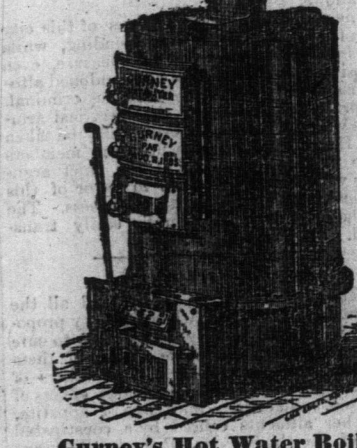
