BRITISH POLITICAL CRISIS.

ROSEBERY HAS NOT FORMALLY ACCEPTED THE PREMIERSHIP.

The Queen Goes to London To-day to Confer With Him—Sunday Speech Cabinet-Making—Concessions to the Radicals—Harcourt Will be Leader in the Commons.

LONDON, March 4.—Sir Henry Ponsonby, the Queen's Private Secretary, visited Lord Rosebery in London yesterday afternoon and told him of the Queen's wish that he accept the Premiership. Lord Rosebery was unwilling to give any immediate decision. He conferred at length with his colleagues in the Cabinet and decided his acceptance until evening.

The Queen will come from Windsor to London to-morrow and will leave London to be an audience in Buckingham Palace. Sir William Vernon Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Earl Spencer, First Lord of the Admiralty, and Herbert Asquith, Home Secretary, called upon Lord Rosebery to-day. Mr. Gladstone attended the Chapel Royal, St. James, this morning, and took no part in the Cabinet making.

The situation complex. Mr. Gladstone's withdrawal from the Premiership opens a most complex situation in domestic politics. What the consequences will be it is impossible to forecast, although there are indications that the situation is in every way fall of promise.

The Regrets From the Queen. The Chronicle comments bitterly upon the fact that the Queen has graciously accepted Mr. Gladstone's resignation.

"It does not express any regret," says the Chronicle, "for the departure from her councils of the mightiest living Englishman, after 30 years of services which have been the safeguard of the monarchy against unwelcome and open foes. When Lord Salisbury retired, after vainly trying to coerce Ireland, the Queen notified him that she accepted his resignation with much regret."

Rosebery's Every Qualification. The Standard says: "Every man of sense will regret the news. The simple truth is that he is the only member of the Government possessing all the requisites necessary to carry out the duties of the office."

Young was tried for murder at the fall assizes, when the jury disagreed. It being a verdict of murder and one for manslaughter. The defence was that the prisoner did not intend shooting Glover, and if he did that he did it in a fit of madness.

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BLOODY BATTLE IN BRAZIL.

FOUR HUNDRED REBELS KILLED AT SARANDI.

A Fight of Many Hours and a Complete Rout—Many Prisoners Taken—The Rebel Army and Ammunition Captured—Many Officers Taken Captive.

MONTEVIDEO, March 4.—Particulars are given of the engagement between the Government troops and insurgents near Sarandi, where the rebels were defeated. They lost 400 men in the battle.

The loyal troops commanded by General Hipolito met the rebel forces under General Gubela, Uliver and David.

After a fight lasting many hours the rebels were totally defeated and fled in disorder. The battle was, in fact, a horrible massacre. Four hundred of the rebels were left dead on the ground.

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IS THOMAS TOMLIN A SUICIDE?

LEFT A NOTE THREATENING TO DROWN HIMSELF.

Despondent and Out of Work He Expressed His Intention to End His Troubles—His Wife Is Firmly Convinced That He Has Carried Out His Threat.

Thomas Tomlin, a bootmaker, residing with his wife and five children at 573 Dundas-avenue, is believed to have committed suicide by drowning himself Saturday night.

Tomlin, who formerly was employed with Mr. Kidd of 292-4 Kingston-avenue, but who has been out of work for some time, left the house shortly after breakfast Saturday morning. He failed to return to dinner, but towards evening his wife received from the postoffice a letter from Tomlin, in which he stated that, as he had been out of work so long, with no prospect of securing his position, he intended to commit suicide by drowning. The letter was mailed at 3 p.m.

Mrs. Tomlin said that her husband had carried out his threat, and his brother stated that he was very determined and well, and seldom under took anything that he did not carry into effect.

Tomlin's wife and five small children are in destitute circumstances. He had his right hand cut off some years ago, but generally carried the stump in his pocket, and possessed his business acquaintances knew that he was a one-armed man.

Tomlin was somewhat of a musician and at one time played in the Grand Opera House. His wife says he was not addicted to intemperance to any extent, and was very kind to her and to his children, and very despondent for his lack of success and being too proud to make his poverty known.

TWO WIDOWS IN COURT. Each Claims to Be the Legal Heir to Mr. Griev's Estate.

LONDON, Pa., March 4.—Two women, both claiming to be the widow of Archibald Griev, formerly a well-known citizen of this place, are contesting in court for his estate. Attorney-General Hensel argued in favor of Mrs. No. 1 this morning and was followed by Lawyer Hollahan for widow No. 2.

The first widow is a resident of Buffalo, N.Y., the daughter of Rev. William M. Smith, a Congregational clergyman of Toronto. She claims to have been married to Griev in the Province of Ontario in 1876 and says that he deserted her nine years ago.

Widow No. 2 is a resident of this city. She says she was married to Griev in 1889 by Rev. A. H. Boyd of Philadelphia and was granted a marriage certificate to back up her claim.

There is no Congregational minister named Boyd in Toronto. The only one of the name resides in St. Catharines.
