THE Provincial board of health has completed its revision of the public health act and will lay before the government the result of its labors in this regard, with the result of its labors in this regard, with the request that the legislation necessary to make it effective be brought down at the next session of the legislature. A BUSY PLACE.

The Hastings' Wagon and Sleigh Works a Hive of Industry.

Pedestrians on Main street, passing the large two story brick factory building at the corner of Main and Hūron streets, hear the hum of machinery in passing, but have only a faint idea of what is going on in the interior until they make a visit of inspection. In company with the business manager a GUIDE-ADVOCATE representative was shown through the factory on Tuesday afternoon, and he was surprised at the importance and extent of the industry.

Entering the factory from the rear the blacksmithing department comes first. It is equipped with everything to be found in an up-to-date shop. Immediately adjoining is the large dry kiln, where large quantities of high grade lumber are thoroughly seasoned by the exhaust steam from the boiler. The motive power is furnished by a 50 h p boiler, and 30 h p Leonard engine. To the left is the National Hydraulic Tire Setting Machine. This is a marvellous piece of machinery, manufactured in Keokuk, Iowa. It can do work in a lew minutes that requires hours by the old process, and is a great time and worry saver. machinery, manufactured in Keokuk, Iowa. It can do work in a few minutes that requires hours by the old process, and is a great time and worry saver. This machine alone cost \$1,500. Other machinery on the first flat comprises a tennanting machine for spokes and shoulders; band saw for cutting all kinds of woodwork; bevelling machine for spokes; the spokes are all dipped in glue and oil before driven in to the hubs; planer, for boards and lumber; shaper, for making rims and tongues, which does the work of seven men; dimension saw, and a number of smaller machines used in connection with the business. One of the most complete pieces of mechanism in the plant is an automatic skein machine which takes the place of a drawing knife, doing the work of ten men. This machine, which is manufactured in Mansfield, Ohio, cost \$300. Up stairs is the paint shop and show rooms, and like the rest of the factory they are roomy, well lighted and up-to-date. The Hasting's Wagon has long been famous as the most substantial and easy running wagon on the market. Recent improvements make it better than ever, a patent steel hound taking the place of wood, and a dust

the market. Recent improvements make it better than ever, a patent steel hound taking the place of wood, and a dust proof band preventing sand and dust from wearing the axle, while the hub has been made larger and stronger.

The plant throughout is equipped with the most modern machinery, costing in the neighborhood of \$15,000. In additionate wagons there is every facility for the manufacture of the celebrated Hasting's sleigh, for which the demand largely exceeds the supply.

At present the factory has an order for 300 wagons to be delivered by the first of March, and one Western firm is anxious to contract for the entire output.

work count easily be given to another score. There is a proposition, under consideration to increase the capital stock and add to the capacity of the works. This is an enterprise, manufacturing a staple arcticle, for which there is a steady and increasing demand and offers a profitable opportunity for a safe investment. The factory has not asked any favors from the factory has not asked any favors from the town, standing on its merits as a business enterprise, and should it be decided to add to its stockholders little difficulty should be experienced. It is an institution that deserves and should receive every support required.

A Year of Destruction.

A notable characteristic of the pres ent year is the destruction of life and property which has been caused by the forces of nature. These forces have not been so active or disastrous in their results for many years past. The record, as compiled by the Chicago Tribune, is a formidable one. In January an earthquake killed 14 persons at Gonzano, Italy, and a tidal wave on the Columbian coast swept away 2, 500. In Februrary a hurricane visited the Society Island, a favor resort for hurricanes, and 1,000 perished. In March, a cyclone swept through Mississippi, and 21 were killed, and earthquake in Formosa destroyed 2, In April, the Vesuvius eruption killed 2,000 a second earthquake at Formosa, 109, the San Francisco earthquake 448, and a cyclone in Texas 26. In July there were two small er disasters, a cloudburst at Ocampo, Mexico, which killed 10 persons, and a waterspout at Lyons, France, which

The furies broke loose in August and 2,000 were victims of an earth-quake at Valparaiso and 12,000 of floods at Hunan, China. In Septem ber there was a long series of disasters A landslide and storm in the Cau-225 lives typhoon at Kong 10,000, a flood at Tepic, Mexico. 10, a hurricane at New Ocleans and Mobile 140, and a cyclone in Southern Spain 60. In October a hurricane off the coast of Florida,, which started from Venezuela, skirting Honduras, Nicaragua, Salvador and Cuba, left 986 dead in its path. During the present month nature has taken a little rest the lake storm of the last few days, in which 32 sailors perished being the principal disaster.

Including the losses of life by lesser disasters of this kind, the record shows already that more than 50,000 persons have perished this year by earthquake, hurricane, and other manifestations of nature's fury. It may be that December will swell the list, but even if it should not, it is not strange that prophets are already at work figuring the time when the world shall pass away as the result of some great natural cataclysm.—Advertiser.

The Small Town.

The town of moderate size is an ideal place to live in. On the one hand, the inhabitants are not subject to the isolation and monotony of a farmer's life and on the other hand, while enjoying the advantages of life in a community, they escape the evils which arise from overcrowding. In the small town every man has his own little plot of earth. He can dig and plant and beautify and watch the green growing things. He is his own master to a degree unknown to the city dweller. He can combine the advantages of both country and town. In business matters he and his employer talk as man to man and the power of organized labor is unknown. As echoes of the strife caused by strike after strike reach him, the man who is unaffected by such, conditions cannot fail to consider himself fortun.

The man in the small town is not in the merciless grasp of a money ed corporation, is not looked upon as mething mechanical to be used and thrown aside, but is regarded as a man, by the man who gives him employment. When we read of men, even in so young and free a country as Canada, who are denied their rightful rest at night, in order that the profits may accrue more rapidly, the advantages of the small town are realized. Here the individual has rights and counts large, but in the larger centres the individual seems to be lost sight of and men are dealt with in quantities. They are denied the exercise of that instinct which urges them to do work however tri-fling, with the soil, they are denied the privileges of breathing air unaden with soot and deadly gasses, they are denied the right almost, to be healthy human beings. The large city has its advantages, many of them. It has its lights and its shadows but the shadows are so deep that the lights are dimmed. The contrast between the life of a laboring man in the large city and the life of the laboring man in the small town is strongly in favor of the latter. The small town is not Eutopia, but it is a fair substitute with which men do well to be content.—Gazette.

INDIAN MYTHS.

One Accounts For the Custom of Scalping an Enemy.

Among the many myths of the North American Indian the disposition of the soul after its separation from the body and its close connection with the scalp varies according to the religion of the tribe. With some the journey to the "happy hunting grounds" begins immediately; with others the spirit remains near the grave. Again, if an Indian dies away from the lodges of his people the spirit returns at once to them, where it hovers as if reluctant to leave. Among the upper Missouri river tribes it is believed that before the spirit finally departs from those who have died from wounds received in battle it floats toward a great cliff overhanging the Missouri and carves upon the wall of rock a picture showing the manner of death.

It is believed by most of the plains tribes that the soul attaches itself to the scalp; that the soul of a person scalped does not suffer from the wounds inflicted on the body, but that the opposite is the case where the scalp is not torn off.

An Indian who kills himself in battle, accidentally or purposely, has positively no hereafter. He is irrevocably lost. Those who are struck by lightning or die by any other apparently direct operation of the Great Spirit are hurriedly buried where they fell without ceremony, and no mound or mark is erected over them. If after a battle there are found corpses not scalped or mutilated it is positive evidence that such persons came to their death by their own hand, for it is a tenet of the Indian religion not to scalp or mutilate the body of an enemy who commits suicide.

Women of Ancient Rome "We are assured by Seneca," says the historian Inge, "that there were women in ancient Rome who counted their ages not by their years, but by the husbands they had had. Juvenal tells of one woman who had married eight husbands in five years. Divorce was granted on the slightest pretext. Many separated merely from love of change, disdaining to give any reason, like Æmilius Paulus, who told his friends that 'he knew best where his shoes pinched him.' Rich wives were not much sought after by wise men. Their complete emancipation made them difficult to manage. Accordingly, since both rich and poor wives were objectionable, the large majority of men never married at all. In most cases a Roman bridegroom knew practically nothing of his wife's character until after marriage. Marriage for the Roman woman meant a transition from rigid seclusion to almost unbounded liberty. She appeared as a matter of course at her husband's table whether he had company or not. She could go where she liked, either to the temples of Isis and Serapis or to the circus and amphitheater. She had her own troops of slaves, over whom she ruled without interference."

NEW TARIFF MEASURE

The general tariff is applicable to all foreign countries and to all British colonies not entitled to the benefits of the British preferential tariff. The intermediate tariff for the present will not be applied to any country.

The work of equipping the tunnel with are work or equipping the tunner with electricity is progressing rapidly. The first two stories of the power house on Military street, Port Huron, which have been built of cement, are completed, and the brick work will be begun this week. A chimney, 170 feet high, has been begun and the cables to supply the tunnel with electricity have been run from the buildelectricity have been run from the build

ing down the shaft into the tunnel.

In the Port Huron tunnel yards 48 large iron towers have been erected, and the bridge work connecting them is now in progress. Some of these bridges will span two tracks, while others will span twelve The longest distance is 145 feet. The towers have been placed on cement found-ations and bolted down. The cement work in some instances weighs nine tons.

work in some instances weighs nine tons. The Grand Trunk railway has on the ground 1,000 tons of steel rails weighing 100 pounds to the yard. These will take the place of the rails in the tunnel depot and freight yards. It is understood that the entire cost of equipping the tunnel with electricity, purchasing electric engines, building the power house and changing the rails in the depot and tunnel yards will amount to over \$900,000.
