The government counsel apparently made no enquiry as to the interior methods of companies and trusted to information turning up by simply taking Fitzgerald thru the act.

A prominent insurance man said afterward: "They're all in the dark. They don't know what they want to know. They'll do better when they get into the swing of it. The commission must discover what has not been done by the superintendent.

"Only a few really searching questions were put by the junior counsel, and these were not used as thoroprobes. For example, Mr. Fitzgerald said that securities deposited with the receiver-general were accepted at 5 per cert. less than market value. If the market value were 110, they might be accepted at 105. Presently he said that was a slip. Nothing was accepted at over par.



Peterboro Asks Right to Develop Power.

The route of the new railway will be om Port Credit, thru the Townships of Toronto and Chinguacousy, Town of Brampton, Village of Huttonville, wiship of Esquesing, the Villages of orgetown, Acton, Norval, Glenwillers, Township of Eramosa, to

The railway committee approved the bill of the City of Kingston to ratify the purchase of the Kingston, Portsmouth and Cataraqui Electric Railway. The terms include the reduction of capitalization from \$200,000 to \$90,000, \$50,000 of which will be preferred.

Peterboro Power Bill.

Peterboro's bill was before the private bills committee yesterday and was further adjourned for two weeks to give the city and the Peterboro Light and Power Co. an opportunity to arrive at an agreement on the question of power contracts with new industries. The bill contains two clauses with refries. The city first sought the power to purchase the old sugar refinery and annex it, with permission to allot it at a nominal figure to new industries. Huge Waves Swept Land Out of Existence, But Loss of Life Not Large.

Auckland, N. Z., March 14.-The steamer Tavinuic, from the Samoa Islands, has arrived here, bringing additional details of the storm which swept

tional details of the storm which swept over the society, Paumotu and Cook's Islands, on Feb. 7 and 8.

The first indications of the tempest discerned at Papeete were the falling of the barometer on Feb, 6 and increasing sea on Feb. 7. The breaking of the waves on Foreshore caused the natives to evacuate their houses and move to higher ground. The morning of Feb. 8 the seas increased, many houses were shattered and trees were leveled by the tornado. At noon the worst of the storm had passed. The only white person who is known to have perished was a man named Lebolach, a caretaker, who was drowned.

The damage to the harbor at Papeete is estimated at \$600,000 and on the whole Island of Tahiti \$900,000. It is believed that three schooners were lost at sea.

The warship Zelee reports that Paumotu, a low archipelago, suffered more severely. The small Islands of Vaero and Hikuru are said to have disappeared. Heavy seas swept over many islands, natives seeking refuge by climbing cocoa palms. Six lives were lost on the Island of Tahiti, including Father Paul, a Catholic missionary, who, after having sought refuge in a tree for several hours, fell into the

Twenty-five persons were drowned on Anae Island, on which the once beau-tiful district of Tuirare, was reduced to a bare coral strand. There were six deaths on the Island of Motutonga. where native divers saved the lives of many people who had been in the water 12 hours.
