MANIA FOR CONFESSING

One Line of Attack on Orchard Evidence by Defence-Detective's Influence Another.

BOISE, Idaho, June 10.—Into the further cross-examination of Harry Orchard today, counsel for William D. Haywood, repeatedly injected the suggestion of a great counter-conspiracy, formed and carried out by the enemies of the Western Federation of Miners, and indicated a determination to direct the main line of the defence in that field.

They carried Orchard by slow steps through the minutest details from the beginning of the Independence, Colorado, station, down to the attempt on the life of Fred Bradley, and his family in San Francisco.

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Pretty Toronto Girl Is Missing

Miss Marco Reynolds, Living at Railway, N.J., Is Not to Be Found.

NEW YORK, June 10.—(Special.)—The police of this city, Toronto and Hamilton have been notified of the mysterious disappearance since Friday last of Miss Marco Reynolds, a statuesque beauty, and telegraph operators, whose father resides in Toronto, and where she worked in a business office until a short time ago, when she went to Rahway, New Jersey, to stay with her grandmother, after a quarrel with her sweetheart in Toronto.

NEW AMENDMENT MAY KILL INSURANCE BILL

Will Allow Agents to Electorner Outside of Business Hours—Policyholders Blamed.

ALBANY, N.Y., June 10.—The senate to-night amended the most important of the insurance bills agreed upon by the joint insurance committees after conference with Governor Hughes and representatives of the various insurance interests. This amendment at this late hour in the session imperils the enactment of the bill.

PATIENT RUNS FROM HOSPITAL

Spent Twelve Hours in the Rain Clad in a Night Shirt.

FREDERICTON, N.E., June 10.—(Special.)—Warren Allen, 29 years of age, a fever patient in the Victoria Hospital, while delirious, escaped at 4 o'clock this morning. He rushed to the bathroom, which is on the ground floor, and jumped thru the window. He was seen in his night shirt only.

LORD'S DAY ACT IN WEST.

First Fines for Violation Imposed in Police Court.

WINNIPEG, June 10.—(Special.)—The first prosecutions in the city for violations of the new Lord's Day Act occurred in the police court this morning, when eighteen retail restaurants were fined \$1 each for selling on Sunday merchandise not consumed on the premises. In most instances tobacco was the article unlawfully dispensed, while a few soft drinks and candy.

BRAKEMAN KILLED.

Charles Watt, of London, Terribly Mangled in Getting Off Train.

LONDON, June 10.—(Special.)—Chas. Watt, aged 21, a G.T.R. brakeman, while trying to get on to a moving train to-night, for a "lift" to his home in the suburbs, fell beneath the wheels and was terribly mangled. His legs were cut off, and his body cut in two. His parents and nine brothers and sisters live here.

French Schooner Goes Down Off the Coast of Barbados.

BARBADOS, June 10.—The French schooner La Jalouse, from Cayenne for St. Lucia, sank off Barbados during the night of June 7.

Her commander and 21 men reached Barbados yesterday. Twenty-eight passengers, including 12 women and children, were drowned.

CHURCH UNION

Rev. Jno. Mackay Wants Assembly to Declare That Question is Still Open One.

MONTREAL, June 10.—(Special.)—Church union was before the Presbyterian general assembly this afternoon, but the hour of adjournment was reached before the debate was concluded, and it will be resumed when the business committee can find an opportunity.

The weight of the assembly is evidently with the union committee, but an insistent minority, with the plan of conscientious opinion, wishes to place a drag on the movement.

Church Union Report.

The committee on union with other churches reported that in connection with the report on doctrine a number of details would require to be added next year.

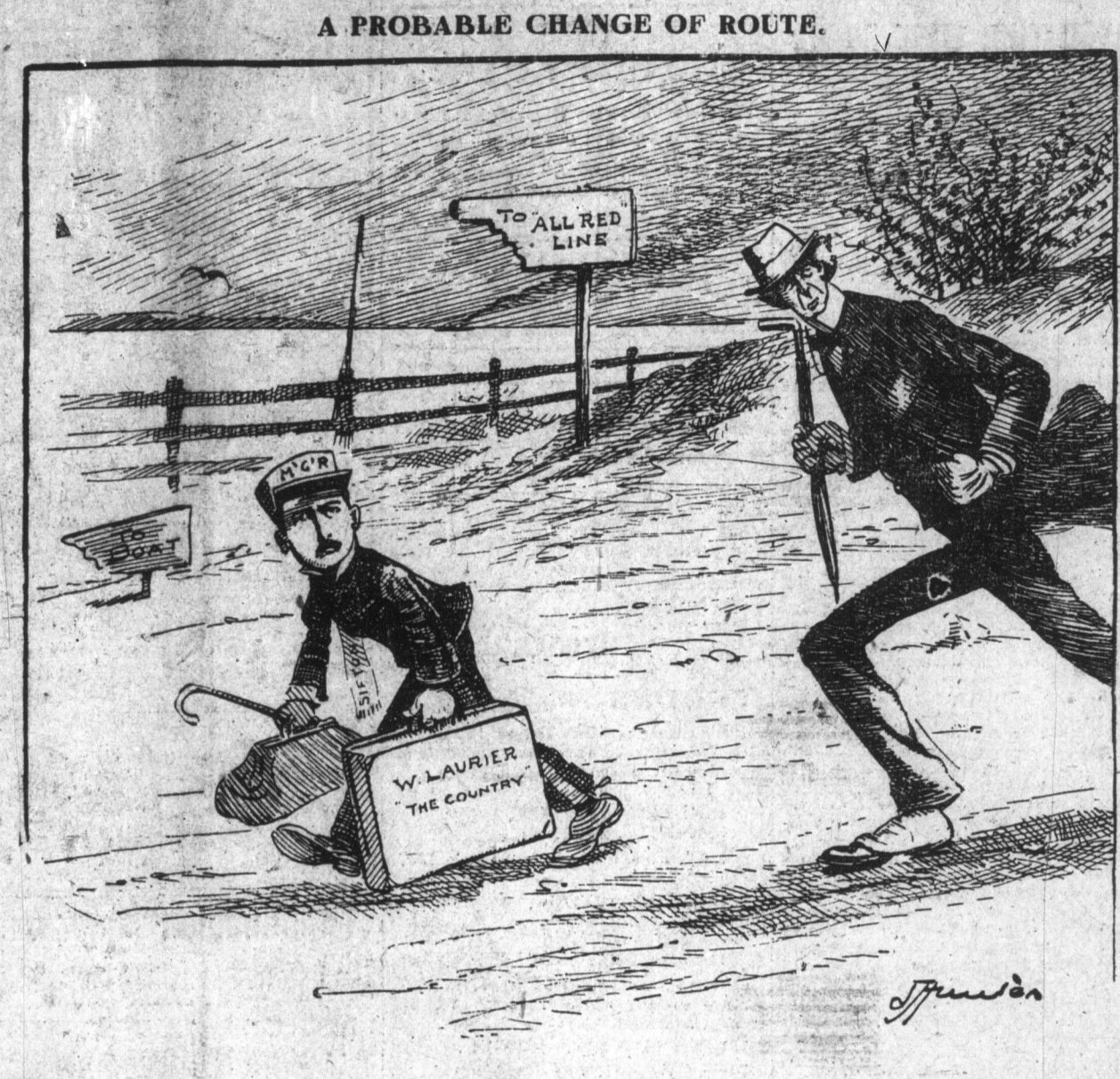

OTTAWA, June 10.—(Special.)—The announcement in The Sunday World that Hon. Charles Hyman had resigned the portfolio of public works and had insisted upon the acceptance this time of his resignation came as a complete surprise to all except one or two leading officials.

It was quite anticipated that with Sir Wilfrid Laurier's return to Canada there would be a house-cleaning and that amongst them the services of Mr. Hyman would be dispensed with, and it is surmised that this may have been the inspiration of his resignation.

All sorts of stories are floating around the capital to-day and it is freely said that the next sensation will be the resignation of Sir Frederick Borden. It is concluded that the premier has added so much lustre to his name during his stay in England that he will be able to bring about that drastic reform said to be so much demanded by Liberals all over the country.

ST. JOSEPH'S CHURCH DESTROYED BY FIRE

One of Ottawa's Most Handsome Sacred Edifices a Heap of Ruins—Loss \$155,000.

OTTAWA, June 10.—(Special.)—The Sacred Heart Church, considered the most magnificent Catholic edifice in Ottawa City, was totally destroyed by fire this evening, entailing a loss of \$155,000, with insurance of \$90,000.

TORONTO BATTERIES FOR THE BIG CAMP

"9th" and "B" Go Away This Week For the Course of Annual Spring Training.

The last parade of the Ninth Field Battery will take place this evening at 8 o'clock, preparatory to proceeding to the great artillery camp at Petawawa for the annual training.

All ranks are looking forward to this year's training, as it promises to be particularly interesting. No less than 11 batteries will be brigaded together at Petawawa during the last two weeks in June.

A team of British artillery volunteers is now under training preparatory to sailing for Canada. This has added to the interest of all ranks through the battery, who are determined to uphold the credit of the Toronto garrison in the coming day.

More complete arrangements have been made at Petawawa than have been at any camp in Canada. A system of waterworks, with wash-houses and shower baths has been installed.

The site of the camp is an ideal one, situated as it is some 900 feet above the Ottawa River, which at this point is some four miles in width and studded with well-wooded islands.

The battery will entrain on Saturday afternoon with four guns and a number of accompanying wagons. Returning June 30 the battery will fire the usual Dominion Day salute in Queen's Park the following day.

"B" Battery, who are quartered at Stanley Barracks, also leave toward the end of the week. They will trek the whole distance to camp.

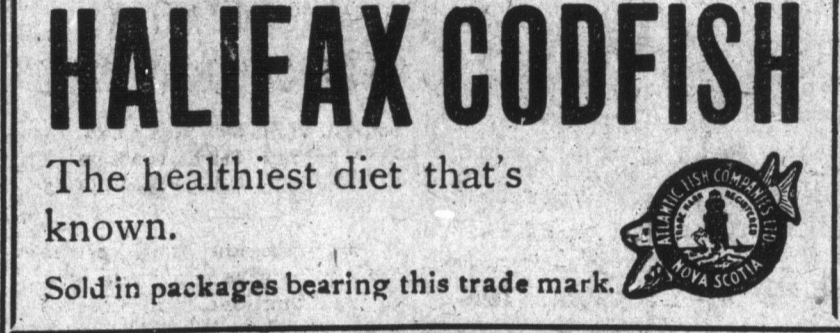

ALL EVIDENCE IS PUT IN

Train Despatcher Brady Contradicts Signalman May as to Position of Trains.

The inquest into the death of Francis Hart, who died from injuries in the Bay-street fatality on May 24, was resumed at the city hall yesterday afternoon and evening. All the evidence was put in.

Both railway superintendents, the city engineer and Chief Engineer Lamont, counsel intimidated, would appear before the jury to tell of the investigation made by the commission. The inquest will be concluded to-morrow night.

Foreman Allen would like to hear from any person who was an eye-witness to the tragedy.

Badly Injured Crossing.
Detective Newton told of the finding of the body of Fraser. The officer said that the lights were very poor that night, it was necessary to light matches to see Fraser's body. He expressed the opinion at the time that the crossing should be better lighted.

Wm. E. Jevons, 245 Shaw-street, who was with Fraser on the night of the fatality, corroborated the evidence of the inquest. Witness said that they had crossed two tracks, when extending became blank and he remembered nothing until after his arrival at the hospital. He had not seen Hart until a few days before he died.

Jevons, in reply to jurymen, stoutly could have discussed the fatality with anyone beyond the fact of the crossing.

J. G. Hind, fireman on No. 84, corroborated his engineer's story up to the arrival of the train at Bay-street. At Yonge-street crossing there were a lot of people, but at Bay-street there was not a soul on the crossing, although there were several stragglers south of the crossing. Four or five miles per hour would be about the rate of speed crossing Bay-street. The headlight of the train was lighted, because the witness had lit it himself.

Wm. McInnes examined Engine 97 of the 40 ton transfer running west from York to Mimico, but found nothing on it.

Alexander McLean, locomotive foreman, examined engine 91, which took the Montreal express over the crossing the night of the fatality. No marks were discovered.

H. Hutchins, conductor on the light engine, stated that his two brakemen were in the cupola of the van and had reported no accident to him.

Several trains were examined as to the times of the crossing of the trains at Bay-street, all of which were more or less corroborative.

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MAY BE GENERAL STRIKE OF THE METAL TRADES

Six Hundred Pattern and Boiler Makers to Join Striking Machinists.

Unless the employers come to terms with the striking machinists and engineers within the next day or two it is probable that the patternmakers, boiler-makers, brass finishers and perhaps the moulders will join those already out. The Metal Trades' Federation, which was organized some time ago, is considering the advisability of ordering a general strike of its trade. This will mean the addition of at least 600 men to the ranks of those already out, and should the moulders decide to quit the number will reach over 1000. The fact, however, that the moulders recently signed an agreement with their employers, which provides for an advance in their wages and in other ways better their condition, makes it highly doubtful whether they will quit work.

The machinists are especially anxious for the co-operation of the patternmakers. They say that if they are organized by this trade it will go a long way towards winning the fight for them, as the patternmakers are highly skilled workmen, whose places it would be nearly impossible to fill.

The boiler-makers have given their employers till Saturday to concede their demands, and if they do not receive a favorable answer then, they say they will go out. They are asking for an increase from 30 to 35 cents an hour. The principal employers concerned are the Canadian Shipbuilding Company, the Union Iron Works and the John Inglis Company, which employ these firms employing between 150 and 175 men of this trade.

It was stated that the Labor Temple last night that the discontent with present conditions was spreading beyond the metal trades, and that many other unions were about to consider the advisability of demanding shorter hours and higher pay.

Meetings of both the employers and the striking machinists were held yesterday afternoon and evening, but neither party had any information to give out, beyond a statement that no settlement had been reached. Secretary Merrick of the Employers' Association declared, however, that a large percentage of his members still at work in the shops, and furthermore, that as there was a large field to draw from, which was not under the influence of the union, there was no danger of the shops being seriously inconvenienced. In direct contradiction to this was the statement of one of the officers of the union, who said that the shops had been swept clear of men whenever they had been called out.

They were in splendid condition, he continued, to go on the fight. With 400 men at work, every one of whom had voluntarily agreed to contribute \$2 a week towards the strike fund, the non-union men who join the strikers, they could carry on the struggle indefinitely, and he had no doubt would win. Their own financial position, he stated, was supported by the International Union, so that from a financial point of view they had nothing to fear.

The annual picket was held yesterday, and, in one case, it is said, they induced fifteen men not to go to work, but to join the strikers at the Temple instead. The Aurora, and several State National Guard hit the camping ground at the shore, and several of the strikers, and they were dispersed by the police. Then if the warden arrived, which is usually doubtful, each squad, headed by a corporal, must stack arms, begin lugging canvas, driving stakes, and hoisting the flag to the mast.

WINE GROWERS REVOLT IN SOUTH OF FRANCE

Refuse to Pay Taxes and Demand Resignation of Officials - Government's Action Looked For.

PARIS, June 10.—The revolt of the wine growing population in the south of France, which goes into effect to-day, is causing apprehension in government circles. By the terms of the resolutions which half a million persons at Montpellier yesterday swore with uplifted hands to execute the departmental, city and town and communal officials must resign to-day, and the inhabitants refuse to pay taxes until parliament affords relief.

Several mayors, headed by Ferroul, mayor of Narbonne, resigned last night, and if this example is followed, a condition bordering on anarchy will prevail, and the civil government will cease to reign from the Spanish frontier to the Rhine, comprising the departments of Hérault, Aude, Haute-Garonne and Pyrenees-Orientales.

The situation is all the more grave because the inhabitants are protesting unaccompanied by disorder, furnishes the government with no pretext for the abandonment of the movement, and the leader of the movement, who until a couple of months ago was an obscure wine grower of Argeliers. Now he is becoming a "redoubtable" and essential to hold the south of France in the holiday of his hand. His orders are implicit in the abandonment of such a move as the powers of organization which he is endowed he has proved himself to be a born leader of men. It is believed among the hot-blooded people of the south that such a man might fire a formidable revolution.

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MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE AGAINST THREE TRAINMEN

Result of Wreck in Which Rochon Was Killed—Engineer Not Yet Been Found.

PARRY SOUND, Ont., June 10.—(Special.)—Conductor F. Graham, Brake-

men Locker and Lighthall, and Fireman H. Gendreau appeared before Magistrate J. H. Kniffler here today on a charge of manslaughter, the result of a collision between two Grand Trunk

trains on the morning of May 31, near here, in which brakeman Alexander Rochon was killed. Gendreau was acquitted, and the others were committed for trial, all being released on bail afterwards.

Engineer Champness did not turn up, and is believed to be in the United States.

The first witness was Dr. O'Gorman of Depot Harbor, who testified to the awful injuries suffered by Rochon.

Allan Kilpatrick, assistant magistrate, testified as to the rules of the road and the assignment of train crews and their duty.

Trainman Kerr of the eastbound train, on which Rochon was killed, was in the engine at the time, and was partially injured. He said the collision occurred at 1:50 a.m., and the night was clear and the moon shining. The westbound train was ordered to sidetrack at Beatty's siding, and wait for the eastbound. In some mysterious manner the westbound train passed the siding, although it is a matter of discernment, has semaphore lamps as well as switch lights, and there is a lumber yard and a small mill and settlement at the point, as well as a large water tank.

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
