BIG FIGHT LOOTED FOR AT MOOL RIVER.

Joubert's Plan to Destroy the Bridge and Cut Off Retreat

OF BRITISH AT ESTCOURT.

Situation in Natal is Now at the Boiling Point and Both Forces are in Close Quarters.

LORD METHUEN IS MOVING NORTH.

Has Crossed the Orange River and is Advancing to Kimberley—Some Shots Exchanged.

The situation in Natal is now at the boiling point. The British relief forces and the Boers are in close quarters at Mool River, and there has been some fighting. The Boers surrounded the Mool River Station, and opened fire with their artillery, with few casualties. The British fired several shells with effect and the enemy retreated. Three Boers were wounded. The main body of the Boers came from Uliud, southwest of Estcourt. A considerable force of the enemy is within 20 or 40 miles of Pietermaritzburg, but there is no anxiety.

Gen. Joubert is evidently attempting to cut off the relieving column for Lady-smith, and at the same time to reduce Ladysmith. An attack on Mool River camp is expected at any time, the object of the Boers being to destroy the bridge at Weston.

Heavy fighting is said to have taken place outside Mafeking on Monday. The British fired on the French cannon and Boer forts. The Boers replied with good effect. This is news from Pretoria.

The aim of the Boers seems now to be to loot the farmers of Natal. One farm has been raided and 300 horses, valued at \$75,000, captured.

According to a late Pretoria despatch Gen. Joubert wired the Transvaal Capital: "I am cutting off the retreat of the Estcourt troops to Pietermaritzburg, and driving them back on the Tugela River."

A large force under Gen. Lord Methuen has crossed the Orange River, and is now advancing to the relief of Kimberley.

The official returns of the Transvaal casualties since the outbreak of the war show 90 men killed and 200 wounded, of whom a number have recovered and returned to the front.

Orders have been issued to mobilize a sixth army division at Aldershot for service in South Africa, or wherever it may be wanted.

The reason why the War Office sent such a large army to South Africa is now plain. A case in point occurred on Sunday. A thousand British troops were sent from De Aar by train to occupy Nauportus. Soon after an attempt was made by the disloyal Colonial Dutch to destroy a bridge two miles in their rear. The attempt was frustrated.

Another naval contingent from the battleship Monarch and the cruiser Doris has been sent from Simon's Bay to the front.

London, Nov. 23.—Although it is evident that the situation in Natal is again becoming sufficiently alarming, nothing can be officially asserted to allay public anxiety or the curiosity felt regarding the disposition of the reinforcements recently landed at Durban. The War Office despatches are confined to a mere recital of a few casualties at Mool River, but give no details as to how the engagements have happened. The special correspondents are only permitted to describe Major-General Buller's camp at Mool River vaguely as "large" or "ample."

Near Pietermaritzburg. One correspondent says that 2000 Boers are within 25 miles of Howick's Falls, near Pietermaritzburg, and that the inhabitants are fleeing to the east. A considerable force of the enemy is now within 30 or 40 miles of Pietermaritzburg, but it is officially announced from there that no anxiety prevails, the garrison numbering 1000 men, with six guns.

Gen. Joubert's Plan. General Joubert's plan, apparently, is a daring attempt to defeat the British relieving column from Durban in detail, while still attempting the reduction of Ladysmith. A serious attack on Mool River camp is now hourly expected, with the object of destroying the bridge at Weston. Should this be accomplished, the Boers would be free to turn their attention again to Ladysmith, while if it fails the enemy would retreat again on Uliud and join the Investing Forces around Ladysmith.

Little in the Story. The Boer report that General Hildyard's messenger, asking General White for assistance, was captured, entered some hesitations, but it is argued that if General Hildyard had not been strong enough to hold out he would some time ago have been ordered to retire on Pietermaritzburg. Therefore, small credence is given the story.

How Are the Garrison? Nothing is known regarding the food supplies of the garrison thus isolated. It is believed that Estcourt is well provided, but there is less confidence in the case of Mool River.

Outsiders Join the Boers. It is announced from Paris that Col. De Weyer, a French officer, has accepted the post of chief of staff to General Joubert, in succession to Col. Schell, the German officer who was wounded and taken prisoner at Kladslund. From the same source it is reported that two Russian officers have joined the Boers.

"FIVE JOHNS" LARGE FORTITUDES

Extraordinary Powers Got by the Promoters of the Cataract Construction Company, Which Had One "John" at the Cabinet Board.

Some Strange Facts Which Have Come to Light Because Another "John" Was a Kicker—How Do These Figures Strike You for Promoter's Profits?

The Cataract Construction Company began operations some years ago to develop electric power at Niagara Falls, N.Y. After its big stock offering it proceeded to buy in the electric railways operating in and about Buffalo and Niagara Falls, as well as other concerns which used large quantities of electricity. The Cataract Construction Company has developed into the greatest electric monopoly of the continent. What Mr. Rankin accomplished at Niagara Falls and Buffalo a Hamilton syndicate is duplicating, in a smaller way, at Hamilton. The prime movers in the Hamilton combine are John Patterson, John M. Gibson, and J. A. Kamerer. The quietest soon became famous throughout Hamilton and the Niagara peninsula. They are popularly known as the Five Johns, and their names are a hot feature in the business world of the Ambitious City.

The Promoter in Front. As the Cataract Construction Company owes its expansion to its monopoly of Niagara Falls power, on both sides of the river, the Hamilton Power Company of Hamilton base all their hopes upon their possession of a great water power at Deerpark, near St. Catharines. The company's business is one in which the promoter plays a leading role. Bylaws and agreements had to be obtained from about a dozen municipalities, and certain valuable franchises had to be obtained from the Provincial Government and Legislature, and in all these agencies and franchises was the work which the original syndicate, or the Five Johns, undertook to accomplish.

How They Worked Together. Mr. John Patterson was promoter-in-chief, and what he knew about the business of promoting and lobbying is not worth learning. While Mr. Patterson worked the company to act as the agent or manager in such cooperation in the carrying on and management of its business, the other four, to keep things straight at headquarters in Toronto. That the promoters were successful in getting valuable franchises and privileges is the general belief in Hamilton, and that belief is certainly shared by the promoters themselves.

It was always considered that which was given over to the company, and the promoters were the most valuable privilege in Ontario, worth a great deal more than three times over what the stock was.

Q. So you say it was always supposed to be worth more than the stock? A. Yes, a great deal more. The people at Niagara Falls said it would pay over a million dollars more than it built at Niagara Falls.

Afraid of Mr. Muddle. Another indication of the surface of the day, when the company purchased the franchise, was the name of the promoter, Mr. Muddle. He was a man of the name in the company. COAL GAS WAS FATAL. Thomas Conder and His Daughter Died Yesterday in Spite of All Efforts.

Thomas Conder and his daughter Tillie, who were suffocated by inhaling gas, which escaped from an open door in a stove at their home, in the rear of 408 Chestnut-street, both died in the Emergency Hospital yesterday. The girl, Tillie, was 11 years old, and worked constantly with them from the time they entered the hospital, but all efforts to save them failed. (The father died at 11:30 a.m., and the daughter passed away at 2:10 p.m., Corner W. E. Atkins, who was notified, issued a warrant for an inquest at 4 p.m. today, but afterwards withdrew it. The coroner was satisfied that their deaths were caused by the gas suffocation. It was found that the door from the stove was partly open, through which the gas escaped. The late Mr. Conder was 67 years of age, while his daughter was 37 years old. The two bodies will be taken to Oakville this morning, and interred there this afternoon.)
