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Power Franchises and Increase of Provincial Subsidies His New Line of Talk.

Newmarket, Feb. 3.—The Town Hall here was crowded to the doors long before the hour of 2 o'clock this afternoon, at which hour Hon. G. W. Ross, Hon. Sir William Mackenzie and Hon. E. J. Davis were announced to address the assembled convention of the Liberal Party of Ontario.

Mr. Davis, in opening the meeting, referred to the necessity of a week ago, in which Mr. Davis had made a statement reviewing the acts which had led up to the present situation. The explanation had been satisfactory to the meeting, and it had been decided that Mr. Davis should hand in his resignation as early as possible. It then became the duty of the convention to bring out a candidate, and, having asked the assembly to dispense with the rule in the constitution that they should vote by ballot, Mayor Cane moved, and Stephen Whitch seconded, the name of E. J. Davis to represent the party in the coming struggle.

Three things he did want to say, and his excuse for saying them was that for three years he had been asked to resign, and he would not do so until he was asked to do so in a public way. WHO BETRAYED THE PEOPLE? The Globe's article on Niagara power is remarkable for its complete repudiation of Ministerial responsibility. The very motto which the Globe prints over its editorial page was adopted as the watchword of a fight for responsible government, and this very day the Liberal leaders and the Globe claim credit for the establishment of that system.

It is evident that the city must make a good fight if its rights and the rights of other Ontario municipalities are to be preserved. If the city "must make a good fight" it is because the Attorney-General is not doing his duty; because the government is not doing its duty; because the first principles of Liberalism have been abandoned; and because all the election talk about responsible government and the rights of the people is cant and humbug.

LET THE OFFICE SEEK THE MAN. It is a remarkable coincidence if the best ability available for the office of manager of the Industrial Exhibition is to be found on the Exhibition Board. There may be men on the Exhibition Board competent to discharge the duties of manager. They were not placed on the board for that purpose. Their qualifications were considered wholly from the standpoint of the requirements of the board, and any deviation from that principle must tend to weaken public confidence in the administration of Canada's great industrial.

THE ALASKAN BOUNDARY. Particulars of the Alaskan boundary treaty continue to dribble out. It now seems that the eminent jurists are simply to define the meaning of certain clauses of the treaty of 1825 between Great Britain and Russia. A part of the boundary line is the Portland channel. There is doubt as to what body of water is meant, and the answers are to settle this. The answers to other questions are intended to define the length and breadth of the strip of coast separating the British possessions from the Pacific Ocean.

BREACH OF FAITH. R. R. Gamney was a traitor late in announcing that "Manitoulin is my politics." Post-election declarations of a principle are contrary to the spirit of election by the people. The people of Manitoulin Island undoubtedly elected Mr. Gamney on the assumption that he would oppose the Ross government. Mr. Gamney takes the liberty of amending the terms of his election on a beyond recognition. The government which he was elected by the people to oppose he elects himself to support. A principle if such an outrageous declaration of purpose can be called a principle—which was given no prominence, and perhaps was never mentioned in the campaign, is the pretext upon which the member for Manitoulin shifts his political allegiance.

It is to be regretted that the legislature has put itself in a position antagonistic to the municipalities, but it is a situation for which the local bodies are in no way responsible. The only thing for the municipalities to do is to bring pressure on their representatives. The legislature was wrong, but it is

impossible to fix responsibility on a body of that kind, any more than on a committee. Members may dodge votes, or explain away their votes, or show that they were with the minority. A Minister cannot shrink responsibility in that way. He is responsible for his own acts and the acts of his colleagues. The party which keeps the Ministry in power is responsible for the use of its majority. It can defeat the enemies of the people just as easily as it can defeat opposition amendments. It can compel the government to do right or resign.

THE FIGHT WILL BE IN THE MUNICIPAL COMMITTEE. It will be necessary to watch carefully not only for those who vote against the bill, but for those who help to defeat it by absenting themselves.

It is a question, in fact, if he should not have resigned his seat before violating the pledge upon which he was elected member for Manitoulin. Mr. Gamney, it appears, did not think it worth while to consult anyone but himself; and a man who is coward enough to run from the weak to the strong cannot be expected to be manly enough to resign. Until the sentiment of the constituency is tested, Ontario will be slow to believe that Manitoulin is the gully as its member. It is lamentable that Manitoulin, thru no fault of its own, should be compelled to bear the reflected odium of an act which happily has few parallels in Canada.

cession duties, and would receive dues from the liquor traffic, as before in Ontario, when the terms of confederation were settled, the province got their share, and Ontario received 80 cents per head of population. Each province went into the confederation on an equal basis. The Dominion (Ontario) and a quarter million, and millions. Ontario receives on the basis of 1901, but the Liberals say the population has increased 700,000 since that date, and provision should be made for the increased population. They submitted the case to the Dominion government, and have based our claim on the growing wants of the province, the schools and the industries poor. What we could keep house on in 1901 no criterion of what we can keep house on in 1903. At confederation the province received 50 cents per head of population, and now we only get 11 per cent. of \$20,000. The proportion the province is getting now is about on a par with what was getting when it entered confederation. In asking for that money the province is making the demand on the Dominion government. Although quite confident of fair play, I am not sure that the Dominion government could extend this money judiciously, were it given to the province. It could be so diffused as to reach more people than the Dominion government. We can get at the schools, roads, etc., in a way that the Dominion government cannot. It may be said later that this is a raid on the Dominion treasury for some sinister purpose. If the money is given all, it will be got by act of parliament.

ARCOS ON WIRELESS SYSTEMS.

German Specialist as to Maintenance of Transatlantic Communications.

Berlin, Feb. 3.—Count Arco, well known as a partner in the Slaby-Arco wireless telegraph system, has given a highly interesting interview to a correspondent of The Berliner Tageblatt.

He expressed great doubts as to transatlantic communication being satisfactorily established owing to the difficulty of keeping up a continuous and perfectly distinct series of waves, as would be necessary.

Count Arco denied that the Marconi system prevailed even upon British warships, it having been found on experiments that the Marconi system was not as reliable as the Marconi system, while there are 110 of ours.

Count Arco said that the attitude of the United States was neutral, the country being willing to test all systems.

At the coming conference on wireless telegraphy it should be insisted upon, he added, that any station called should reply. That was imperative in the matter of humanity, for instance, in case of ships in distress at sea.
