After a two-months' trip in Europe, G. R. R. Cockburn returned home yesterday morning. Mr. Cockburn's trip was chiefly one of pleasure, and he looks well and strong.

Mr. Cockburn said, had not said he would support free trade or protection, but that when an attack is made on any colony or part of the empire the assailant is bound to do so in preference to free trade, but there would have to be some concession of the question of free trade.

"Because this appreciation is not in our minds alone, but the minds of Canadian people generally, we felt that it would be a fitting tribute to you and an honor to the Dominion that to open this great National Exhibition, an undertaking intended to show what progress we are making in the various departments of national life, and which to some extent marks an epoch in Canadian history."

You have been closely associated with the Dominion through its trying formative period, and now in its days of splendid prosperity it is pleasant to know that you are still interested and active in promoting its industrial, agricultural and intellectual development. Thanks to the King.

Continuing, Mr. McNaught referred to the sending of the Jubilee gifts, and His Majesty the sincere thanks and deep appreciation of the Canadian people for the evidence of his favor. The Exhibition in its scope embraced the products and manufactures of the Dominion from ocean to ocean and the desirable testimony to the progress of this young nation.

To Lord Strathcona he paid high tribute in his name and by universal consent become a synonym for Canada and things Canadian. Pressed the button.

In the cheering throng, Lord Strathcona, at 3 o'clock, pressed the button that set the machinery throbbing to life. The wheels began to revolve, the whistles screamed a delighted acknowledgment, and the crowds scattered thru the grounds and nearby toward the big Exposition of 1903 was ready for business and to entertain its scores of thousands of guests.

Mr. Strathcona, who arrived later, proposed a health to the King. Mr. McNaught was loudly applauded when, in proposing the toast, he said: "Canadians and Englishmen, we the great Jubilee presents to make them loyal or to keep them so. He heartily wishes the guests to be fair, and told them that he had invited more of Canada and Canadians in twenty-four hours walking around the grounds and buildings than he could in twenty-four days' travel thru the country. Here was gathered together every true Canadian and of Canadian product."

C. H. Hussey, member of the London Chamber of Commerce and Trade Association, spoke of the trade conditions between Canada and the Old Country.
