## REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

---

In presenting to the Congregation their annual statement regarding those matters entrusted to their oversight, the Kirk Session would humbly acknowledge the continued mercy of the Great Head of the Church. They are not permitted to report any special increase of spiritual life, nor any marked addition to the Communion Roll; indeed they have to regret that so large a proportion of the adherents of the Church, in the regular enjoyment of Gospel ordinances, still refrain from professing their faith at the Communion table, and from fulfilling, in this respect, their duty as baptised members of the Church. At the same time they would recognize cause for gratitude in the increased attendance at the Communion services, and in the continued support of the schemes of the Church, among other indications of spiritual activity.

The present numerical strength of the Congregation is:—Number of families, 276; 23 families having been removed during the year, and 27 having been received. Number of Communicants, 383; 16 having been removed during the year, 5 by death and 11 by departure from the city, while 21 have been received, 12 by certificate and 9 on profession of faith. On account of the pastor's absence the Communion has been dispensed only twice during the year instead of four times. 23 Baptisms and 14 burials have been entered on the records of the Church.

The three Sabbath Schools connected with the Church, continue to be very efficiently maintained. Upper Town S. School, under the superintendance of Mr. Gibson, including the Bible Class under Mr. Hamilton, numbers 240 pupils, with an average attendance of 189, with 24 teachers, 3 Librarians and a Sec-Treasurer. The receipts for the year have been \$162.94, the disbursements, which include the support of an orphan in India, and additions to the Library, as well as the purchase of



S. S. papers, catechisms, &c., \$146.83. There is, however, a sum of \$75.00 still due for S. S. Libraries.

Lower Town School, superintended by Mr. Larmonth has 8 Teachers, 1 Librarian and 70 pupils, with an average attendance of 55. Its receipts for the year have been \$53.91; expenditure, inclusive of \$20 for support of an orphan in India, \$52.74.

The S. School at Stewarton, of which Mr. Elliott is Superintendent, numbers 7 Teachers, with 1 Librarian and 80 pupils, with an average attendance of 50. Receipts for the year \$51.25; disbursements \$49.98. There are thus under religious teaching in the Bible Class and Sabbath Schools of the Congregation 390, with 45, inclusive of Librarians, engaged in connection with this work of instruction. The revenue of the S. Schools for the year has been \$268.10.

The Session would draw the attention of the Congregation to the propriety of maintaining the Wednesday evening Prayer Meeting in greater vigour, by increased attendance. If even those members who are within easy access of the Church were to attend with regularity there would be a marked improvement in this respect, and it might reasonably be hoped that a larger attendance at our weekly Prayer Meeting would quicken the spiritual life of the Congregation.

During the absence of the Pastor for several months, the Rev. G. C. Haney ministered to the Congregation. The Session adopted the following minute expressive of their appreciation of Mr. Haney's services, in which they have no doubt the Congregation generally concur:

"That the Kirk Session record their satisfaction with the labours of the Rev. Geo. Colborne Haney while ministering to the Congregation during the absence of the Rev. D. M. Gordon; they highly appreciate the zeal and fidelity manifested by him, the efficiency of his pulpit ministrations and of his private services, and they express the hope that he may be more and more abundantly fitted for the manifold duties of the Christian Ministry, and that he may be greatly blessed in his work by the Divine Head of the Church in whatever portion of the Master's vineyard he may be called to labour."

reference was made to the death of the Rev. Dr. Spence, and to the legacy left by him on behalf of the poor of the Congregation. The Session regret that the heirs of the late Mrs. Spence having disputed the validity of Dr. Spence's will, this bequest, originally amounting to nearly \$500, may, like some of his other bequests to the Church in Canada, be seriously diminished.

The late Mrs. Mackay, widow of the Hon. Thomas Mackay to whose exertions the erection of our first Church was very largely due, and whose name was long and intimately connected with the Congregation, bequeathed, at her death in August last, the sum of \$40.00 for the benefit of the poor of the Congregation.

Through the valued assistance of the District Visitors, the Schedule System for securing the Congregational contributions to the schemes of the Church, and to the payment of interest on the Church debt, continues to be efficiently wrought. There is still a goodly number of the Congregation who do not avail themselves of this method of advancing the general work of the Church, and it will be found from the report of the Temporal Committee that there are a number who do not, through pew rent, contribute to the funds of the Church. It is manifest that if any large proportion of the Congregation take no part in bearing the burdens that should be shared by all, the remaining members must be unduly weighted. It is the desire and hope of the Kirk Session that all will contribute both for the current congregational expenditure and for aid to the schemes of the Church. They feel persuaded that, under the present combined method of pew rents and Schedule System, it only requires the hearty co-operation of all to enable the Congregation to render a worthier assistance to the mission work of the Church, while at the same time meeting all their own financial obligations.

The Session continue to supply, out of the funds at their disposal, the "Presbyterian Record" to all the families of the Congregation in the hope that all may follow with intelligent interest the general work of the Church.

## REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

*To the Congregation of St. Andrews Church in General Meeting:*

The Temporal Committee on the close of another year again beg leave to present a report of their proceedings on your behalf, during the year now closing, with such observations as may appear proper and necessary.

The accounts are herewith, showing collections and payments for the year between the 15th February, 1879, and the corresponding date in 1880 in accordance with the By-laws established, but for the purposes of this Report, your Committee propose to deal with figures exhibiting the collections and receipts, &c., during the full year from 1st March 1879, to 1st March 1880.

Against \$3,363.55 for the corresponding period of 1878-9. Shewing an increase in favor of this year of \$309.54.

Your Committee after due deliberation have decided to recommend that all payments for pew rents shall be

printed in detail this year, for which purpose a list thereof has been prepared by the Treasurer.

Again the subject of unpaid pew rents is brought before the meeting; these have accumulated from year to year for the last four years, till they have now reached the large sum of..... \$2,614 15

Leaving still unpaid..... \$2,156 09

No business that comes before the committee is so perplexing as how to deal with defaulting pew holders.

The pew rent is, and has been, since the first organization of this Church made payable in advance. In the old Church it was half-yearly, but when the new Church was built it was altered to being quarterly: 1st March, 1st June, 1st September, and 1st December. These regulations have never been rigidly enforced, although some pew holders have complied with them, but many others prefer paying up at once for the whole year after a little delay, others again desire to pay half-yearly. There is no doubt but a too strict and indiscriminate application of the rules above mentioned would in many cases be injudicious, and be the reverse of advantageous to the interest of the Church,—yet the committee would earnestly press upon members of the congregation the desirability of making early payments so that their monetary obligations can be duly met.

It will be interesting to present the pew rent subject in another aspect, embracing only the past year thus:

The amount collected from Glebe rents has this year fallen short, being only \$505.70, while the revenue from that source should be about \$650.00, if all rents were paid within the year; to explain this, two exceptional causes may be mentioned.

2nd. Sub-lots Nos. 13 and 14 have yielded no rent this year, and your committee have instructed their solicitors to eject the occupant by legal process which is now being carried out.

Your committee have received from the Kirk Session towards interest during the year, counting as before from 1st March to 1st March, \$1,510, of which \$1,030 was received since the closing of the account, while the payments for interest during the same period was \$2,197.47, leaving the difference, \$687.49, to come out of ordinary revenue.

REPORT OF  
THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

---

In addition to some items that appear in the Treasurer's Statement, the work of the Ladies' Aid Society has been largely confined to the relief of the poor, a Committee being specially charged with the duty of visiting the needy before any applications for relief were granted.

During the past year 30 families have received assistance, some for a few days or weeks, according to the nature of their distress, until employment could be procured or until sickness had passed away, while others required and received help throughout the year. Assistance has been given in various forms, such as payment of rent or taxes, aid in defraying expense of travelling to friends at a distance, donations of clothing received for this purpose from members of the church, and, chiefly, in donations of food. A large quantity of fuel has been supplied through the kindness of two members of the congregation, whose generosity, in this respect, has greatly relieved the labours and the funds of the Poor Relief Committee. As will be seen from the Statement of the Treasurer of the Kirk Session, a legacy of \$40 was received from the late Mrs. MacKay for the benefit of the poor, and an anonymous gift of \$20 was received from a member of the congregation for the same purpose.

The total receipts for poor relief—made up of Communion and Thanksgiving Collections, bequest and contribution above referred to, and balance from last year—have been \$266.81; the expenditure, \$229.42; leaving a balance of \$37.39.
