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INTRODUCTION.

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To the Members and Adherents of St. James Square Church:

It is especially pleasant to speak a word of greeting, when one's heart is hopeful and when one's outlook glimmers and smiles with good cheer. Would that these brighter visions were *all* that rise into view, as I think of the past and glance again towards the future!

The year 1898, considered as a whole, must be pronounced a good year indeed. In so far as our numerical growth is concerned, it has been far and away the best year the Congregation has had since I became your Pastor. But we have made progress in more than in numbers: there has been advance along the whole line.

As regards material things, we have very happily ended the year with a surplus,—and with a substantial surplus. The Treasurer's Statement shows indeed a deficit of \$142.56; but this deficit, so far as 1898 is concerned, is not a real deficit. The adverse balances of 1896 and 1897 amounted together to \$318.51 and it was with this very unwelcome handicap that our work last year began. But when the year had reached its close, it was discovered that we had not only fully paid our way, but had paid off in addition \$175.95 of these arrearages! Hence our nominal deficit of \$140.00 is really a surplus of \$175.00,—a very commendable advance upon our recent records.

Moreover, while we were accumulating this surplus,—as if to demonstrate what we can do when we try,—almost \$2000

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were dropped in varying amounts into the treasury of our newly-established Church Furnishing Fund. And free-will offerings, bearing the same designation, are coming in still, and bid fair to reach fully another \$1000. Thus the fabric of the building is being put into first-class order, and the interior will soon be brightened up by that much-needed new carpet, for which it has waited so long. And more: when, at the Annual Meeting, I ventured to broach the question: "Ought we not soon to do something to remove the debt on our building?" the response was sympathetic and prophetic.

In this connection, I cannot forbear to mention and commend your generous action at the Annual Meeting in relation to Dr. Anderson and Rev. Donald MacGillivray. Both of these young men,—the one as our esteemed Organist, and the other as a Missionary supported by us in China,—have proved themselves "worthy of double honor:" and the step you have taken will certainly not fail to lend its encouraging impulse to those two willing workers in whose interest it was deservedly re-

commended and adopted.

As regards higher and more important results,-results which are spiritual, not material,-much that is heartening comes into mind as we review 1898. Our Communion Roll, after making the usual necessary deductions, shows a net gain of 29 persons,—which is ground for more than ordinary satisfaction. St. James Square will soon be one of the downtown churches, and in several ways it experiences already the difficulties incident to its altered surroundings. At this point, an explanation touching our membership falls to be made: for, owing to a strange oversight, seventeen of the names at present upon the Roll have never been counted in making up the total! When the register was revised at the time of my settlement as your Pastor, it was said to contain the names of 520 communicants. Closer scrutiny reduced this number to 506; but afterwards, upon due representations being made, it was increased to 512. This figure has been held to be correct since January, 1894, and all additions and subtractions have been made upon this basis. But it now appears that, subsequent to January, 1894, no fewer than seventeen persons claimed to be bona fide members of the Congregation, whose names should never have been removed from the Roll; and, for sufficient reasons, these claims were recognized and admitted. These persons, be it observed, did not join us "By Examination," or "By Certificate," or "By Restoration:" they were simply reinstated in a position which they had never actually forfeited. Hence their names were never included among the "additions" of subsequent years. But the initial number 512 was not advanced to 529, as it ought to have been! Hence our present membership is not 591, as reported at the Annual Meeting, but is in reality 608. This correction, so long deferred, has properly been incorporated in the present Report.

Another matter. It might at first sight seem that our gifts to Missions during 1898 reveal an unexpected shrinkage, and that here at least there is cause for discouragement. But this shrinkage is apparent, not real. It will be remembered that, in 1897, the cause of Foreign Missions was in great straits, and hence we took up a special offering for that purpose: \$1140.00 were laid upon the plates, of which \$910.00 appeared among our missionary givings of last year. Add to this amount \$223.00, which was the sum of the collections taken at two special Missionary meetings held in the church during the last twelve months; and we get a total of over \$1100.00, contributed for Missions in 1897 and all of which passed through the hands of our Treasurer, which was in truth an extraordinary offering. These givings we could not expect to see repeated, during the year just closed, unless some special necessity urgently called for them.

Hence, with regard to our survey thus far, we cannot feel otherwise than glad and very hopeful. Were this *all*, as I stated at the outset, we might indeed account ourselves happy. But a thick cloud overhangs and shadows our joy.

While we forget not to be grateful for what has been at-

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tained, we cannot lose sight of those repeated and very severe Old and young were losses which we suffered during 1898. taken from us: and death in several cases came with a suddenness which rendered us speechless. Especially do we mourn the loss of Principal Kirkland and Mr. John Y. Reid. Both were beloved Elders. Their names stood respectively second and first on the roll of the Session, of which body they had been members since 1872 and 1862. Both were active and representative leaders in the Congregation,—the one as Clerk of Session for some sixteen years, and the other as Treasurer of the Board of Managers for about twenty-one years. Words cannot express how profoundly the sense of these losses has come home to myself. To these two bereaved households, as also to those many other homes amongst us which have recently been darkened, I extend anew the expression of my personal sympathy.

The prospective enlargement of the Session, to which allusion is made in the annual report of that body, needs no emphasis from me. This step has now been rendered simply imperative, and it would be well if those who are shortly to cast their ballots in the determining of a momentous selection would begin at once to bethink them of suitable names. I ask most earnestly that, when the time shall come, you nominate such only as are of honest report, full of zeal and wisdom, men who hold the mystery of the faith in a pure conscience.

The changes which have just occurred in the offices of Superintendent and Assistant-Superintendent of the Sunday School suggest a word of cordial acknowledgment to those by whom these posts have recently been vacated. Mr. McDonald's leadership was devoted, unwearied and able; and, in all his undertakings, he was most loyally supported by Mr. Long. It is an added satisfaction that the School to-day, under its new management is not only in competent hands, but that two of the younger members of the congregation have worthily been advanced to offices of high and honorable responsibility.

The Session have been pleased in their report to refer to the completion of the fifth year of my ministry amongst you. To me the retrospect is a grateful one: and it has brought me many joys that will abide forever. Little did I dream when I sought release from my pastorate in Montreal, and when my work in the active ministry seemed plainly to have been concluded, that I should so soon have been inducted into another pastorate, and under conditions so inviting and congenial. I rejoice with you that our labors together have not been without some fruitage: in order that you may the more easily understand what these results have been, I have prepared a brief statistical table covering the period 1894-1899. It will be found on some subsequent page of this Report, and will repay your study.

And now, our survey being completed, let us return once more to our work. As hitherto, we shall be found co-workers. I say this all the more confidently because you have upheld me, as only true and loyal supporters can do, in the year just past. The Session, the Managers,—in truth, all the office-bearers,—have been indeed my helpers. This aid I beg to acknowledge with most cordial thanks.

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THE ANNUAL MEETING.

WEDNESDAY, January 18th, 1899.

The forty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held this evening in the Lecture-room.

After devotional exercises by the Pastor, it was moved by Mr. A. A. Allan, that the Rev. L. H. Jordan, B. D., take the chair, and that Mr. R. A. Grant act as Secretary.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting having been printed in the Annual Report were on motion of Mr. Robert Carrie, seconded by Mr. Thomas Woodbridge, taken as read. The minutes of the Congregational Meetings of June 1st, 1898, and January 11th, 1899, were read and all were confirmed.

Mr. A. A. Allan presented and moved the adoption of the Report of the Board of Managers, which, along with the Treasurer's Statement, was taken as read. The motion was seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh and carried.

A vote of thanks to the Treasurer, Mr. R. M. Gray, was moved by Mr. Joseph Henderson, and seconded by Mr. W. M. Douglas, and heartily concurred in by the meeting.

Ballots were then delivered to those present for the election of Managers, and the chairman asked Messrs. James Watt, W. E. Long, W. A. Cameron and Wallace Anderson to act as scrutineers.

While the ballots were being counted the following resolutions were carried:—

Moved by Mr. J. R. Lyon, seconded by Mr. W. P. Rodger, that a cordial vote of thanks be given to the Organist and members of the Choir for their services during the year.

This resolution was supported by Mr. Henderson who urged an increase in the salary of the Organist, Dr. Anderson, and moved that the Managers be authorized to pay him the sum of \$900 per annum. The motion was seconded by Mr. W. Macdonald, and after a short discussion was declared carried.

Moved by Mr. Thomas Woodbridge, seconded by Robert Carrie, that the Congregation are indebted to the ladies for their successful efforts in behalf of the furnishing fund for the past year and desire to convey to them their hearty thanks therefor.

Moved by Mr. A. A. Allan, seconded by Mr. John Paton, that the Managers be authorized and instructed to proceed with the selection of a carpet for the Church proper and to expend such a sum as is requisite for the purpose.

Moved by Mr. W. P. Rodger, seconded by Alexander Nairn, that the Rev. L. H. Jordan, B. D., and Messrs. W. E. Long, R. M. Gray and R. A. Grant be appointed a Committee to attend to the printing of the Annual Reports.

Moved by Mr. Joseph Henderson, seconded by Mr. R. C. Steele, that a vote of thanks be given to the Managers for their services during the year.

Moved by Mr. T. R. Bain, seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, that Messrs. W. M. Douglas and W. A. Cameron be auditors for the ensuing year.

The Scrutineers now reported the election of the following Managers: R. M. Gray, A. A. Allan, R. A. Grant, John Watson, Robert Carrie, Thomas Woodbridge and Robert Darling.

The Report of the Session was presented by Rev. Mr. Jordan. The number on the Membership Roll is 591, an increase during the year of 29. The Report also referred to the losses during the year by death; the work in the Sabbath School; the departure of the Rev. Donald Mac-Gillivray for China, and the need for another increase in the number of members of Session.

In presenting the Report of the Sabbath School the Superintendent, Mr. C. S. McDonald, reported a slight decrease in the attendance. There was a great need for more teachers and he hoped for better work during 1899.

The Report of the Missionary Association was presented by Mr. Joseph Henderson, the Treasurer. The amount received through the collectors was \$2603.49 and for the MacGillivray fund the sum of \$802.56. The Report showed in what way the funds of the Association had been allocated and on motion of Mr. Henderson, seconded by Mr. John Paton, the Report was adopted, and a vote of thanks given to the lady collectors.

It was moved by Mr. W. E. Long, seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh that the officers of the Missionary Association for the year 1899 be as follows:—

Mr. R. C. Steele presented the Report of the Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary. There had been an increase during the year both in interest and membership. The total contributions, exclusive of clothing were \$350.67 and on Mr. Steele's motion the report was adopted.

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The Wayside Gatherers' Mission Band presented their Report through Mr. W. Macdonald and reported a most successful year in every respect. The total receipts for the year had been \$121.88.

The next Report was that of the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, which reported a membership of 40 and receipts during the year of \$232.25. A quantity of clothing also had been sent to the North-West.

In the absence of the President the Report of the Young People's Association was presented by Mr. James Brebner. During the year it had been thought advisable to discontinue The Young People's Prayer Meeting, but the other two branches of the work, viz:—The Young People's Bible Class and The Young People's Institute, had a most successful and instructive year.

The Poor Fund as shown by the Report presented by Mr. Long disbursed during the year \$10350. The receipts in-

cluding a balance from last year were \$137.65.

The total amount paid for the Church Furnishing Fund during the year was \$1766.85. Of this amount \$1576.50 had been expended on the heating apparatus and other improvements to the Church property. Payments are still being made by subscribers to this fund.

The Chairman closed the Meeting with a few appropriate remarks, in which he thanked the Congregation for their many kindnesses during the year, and for the help given him in his work. He urged that steps be taken to secure a sufficient sum to discharge the Church Debt when it matured so that another renewal would be unnecessary.

At the close of the business Meeting a social half hour was spent by those present, refreshments being served by the ladies.

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ANNUAL REPORTS.



THE SESSION'S REPORT.

The cycle of another year having been completed, it is fitting that some brief record should be made of the events which have marked its course.

No one can make survey of the past twelve months without being strongly moved, alike by feelings of joy and sadness. Many things have occurred which have abundantly encouraged every well-wisher of the congregation. number of those who statedly worship in St. James Square, notwithstanding continual losses, is more than being maintained; for newcomers are constantly seeking our fellowship. The means of grace also, with the one exception of the Prayer Meeting, are manifestly esteemed and are gratefully honored. On the other hand, however, our losses of late have been serious. The removal of families to new homes, either within the city or beyond it, has cost us much. Faithful and experienced workers have been suddenly summoned away. On the closing day of the year, Principal Kirklandfor nearly twenty-seven years a member of the Session, and for sixteen years its clerk—was called to his reward. Words cannot express how profoundly we shall miss the help and valued counsel of one who was ever a most devoted watcher of the spiritual interests of those over whom he had been appointed an overseer.

THE COMMUNION ROLL.

Perhaps the first question that ought to be answered is:— How is the membership of the congregation being maintained? In this regard, there is abundant cause for gratitude; for, notwithstanding the rigid standard adhered to in the annual revision of the Roll, the membership is steadily increasing. During the year just completed, the strength of the congregation in this particular has been more markedly augmented than during any equal period since 1894. In January of that year, the Roll contained the names of 529 persons. Since that time, 348 additional names have been written upon it. Of these, 62 were admitted to fellowship during the year just closed. The present condition of the Roll, which suffers changes almost literally every week, is set forth in the table given herewith:—

THE POOR FUND.

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If the receipts of this Fund, as received annually by the Treasurer, be compared for the period covering the last five years, it will be noted that there has been a gradual but steady shrinkage. Surely this is not as it ought tobe, especially in view of the fact that those who might be expected to give an offering are steadily increasing in number! The belief is general that the demands upon this Fund are exceedingly few, and that accordingly small offerings suffice. But what about the nurture of the quickening emotion of gratitude, which ought never to be allowed to become latent in any communicant's breast! Besides, twice the amount now received could easily be utilized each quarter, in the relief of the poor and needy, were this greatly increased sum to be made actually available. This matter is affectionately commended to the consideration of those whom the Master steadily enriches, as they gather from time to time at His Table.

THE SABBATH SCHOOL.

Excellent work has been done in our School during the year just closed,—the Bible Classes, the Intermediate Department, and the Infant Class being well attended by the young people of the congregation. There has been a lack of teachers however, and especially of male teachers, which has often caused the Superintendent no little inconvenience. Such a fact, furthermore, causes the Session considerable anxiety: for there should be cheerful volunteers, in abundance, seeking to engage in a work that is full of encouragement for all who loyally undertake it. The prospective resignation of Mr. C. S. McDonald, who has proved himself to be a most devoted and successful Superintendent, is regretted by the whole School. The Session express their cordial appreciation of the services he has rendered the congregation, in this connection, since 1894.

REMOVALS BY DEATH.

The past year has been an especially trying one, as regards the thinning of our ranks by death. Many of the aged of the flock have passed hence, since the publication of our last Annual Report. Reference to another page will show that two of our members had reached and passed the goal of eighty years, while other four had more than attained to the age of sixty years. Mr. Hugh Miller, genial and warmhearted to the last, enjoyed the esteem of all who came in contact with him, throughout his long and honorable career. As a citizen and as a Christian, he was a man of sterling qualities, as regards both head and heart. Of PRINCIPAL KIRKLAND it is needless to utter any word of praise: most of all is it needless to speak thus in the hearing of those who knew him so intimately. Called away almost without warning, he was not unready for the summons when it came. His death has left a very serious blank in the life and work of St. James Square Congregation. "He now rests from his labors, and his works do follow him." And we recall others, who

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have very recently been taken away from us,—persons not advanced in years, but standing at the very beginning of life, and just commencing to take their respective parts in the busy world's affairs. Mr. William I. Anderson is not forgotten by those who remember his modest, manly, genuine worth. He too, like those already named, was taken from us very suddenly. The outstanding fact, indeed, concerning the deaths which fall to be recorded last year, is that so many of them were unlooked for. Surely they voice again, for all, the timely urgent warning:—"Be ye also ready." To the bereaved, in every sorrowing household, we extend the assurance of our sincerest sympathy.

AN ENLARGEMENT OF THE SESSION.

Although an election of Elders was held less than two years ago, it will be necessary at an early date, under existing circumstances, that the hands of the Session should be strengthened. Ill-health, removal from the city, and the increasing pressure of professional engagements are the causes why five of those who at present constitute the Session are unable any longer to discharge, or at least to discharge fully, the active duties of their office. Those who remain are not sufficient to overtake effectively the visitation of districts, and the other demands upon their time, which the claims of the Eldership require.

REV. DONALD MACGILLIVRAY, B.D.

Rev. Mr. MacGillivray, upon the termination of his furlough, set out for China last June. Sailing from Montreal, he returned to his post in Honan by way of Liverpool and the Suez Canal. While passing through India, he availed himself of the opportunity of visiting the Canadian Missions which have been established in that country; and, in items of his recent correspondence, he shows how much he enjoyed his brief intercourse with the Canadian and native workers whom he met there. He is now once more in his allotted field, fortified by greatly increased resources of strength for all the

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exacting labors that await him. Our prayers and good wishes go ever out for one whom we are privileged as a congregation to maintain in a far distant empire.

THE CHOIR.

As in previous reports, it gives the Session satisfaction to acknowledge, and most cordially to commend, the admirable help which has been rendered to the congregation by the Choir. The public service of praise during the past year has reached an unusual standard of excellence, and the organist and his able assistants are evidently discharging diligently the duty assigned to them, and in a conscientious and painstaking way. The new Book of Praise, recently introduced, has now won an undisputed place in the favor and in the affections of all who use it.

In Conclusion.

And now our survey is ended. In some particulars, it will have been observed, the review has been allowed to cover the interval of five years; for our Minister has just completed the first quinquennium of his pastorate amongst us. Within the period named, as within the lesser period of the past twelve months, the chords of sadness have often been touched. But our retrospect, alike longer and shorter, has awakened also a note of gladness. God has exceedingly blessed us, both in things temporal and spiritual. Many have been begotten unto a new and abiding hope through the Gospel. May we all henceforth go on from strength to strength,—every one of us at length, with exceeding joy, appearing in Zion before God. So shall we be found once more re-united, ransomed from the pains of eternal death through Him who loved us and gave Himself for us.

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THE MANAGERS' REPORT.

In presenting their Report for the past year, the Managers have pleasure in announcing that there has been an increase in the contributions during the past year, and that the adverse balance, with which the year was commenced, has been substantially reduced.

The increase shown above is the more gratifying in view of the special contributions which became necessary for the purpose of renewing the heating apparatus of the Church. A system of steam heating was put in during the past summer, and the Church steps and sidewalks were renewed.

The Managers feel that it is imperative that a new carpet should be purchased and laid during the summer

months, and recommend that they be authorized to purchase a suitable carpet, at such cost as may be reasonably necessary.

On the 1st of April last, the mortgage on the Church property became due, and a new loan was effected for the same amount (viz., \$15,000) payable in five years with interest at four per cent. instead of five, as had formerly been paid.

During the coming year the fire insurance on the Church buildings amounting to \$38,000 will expire, and the expense for the renewal of the same for a further term of three years

will be \$240.00.

The Managers would again bear testimony to the zealous work of our Pastor during the past year, both in the pulpit and in the homes of the members of the Congregation. His preaching has been faithful and instructive, and his efforts to encourage and assist the Sunday School, Bible Classes and Missionary Societies, as well as the individual members of the Congregation, have been unwearied and appreciated.

The Managers who retire this year, but who are eligible for re-election, are Messrs. R. M. Gray, A. A. Allan, Robert Darling, John Watson, Robert Carrie, Thomas Woodbridge,

and R. A. Grant.

While the work of the Sabbath School has been in some ways very encouraging, in point of attendance we regret that it shows a slight falling off. This we believe is due to the fact that a number of very valued teachers have withdrawn owing to removal and for other reasons, and that we have not thus far been able to complete our staff. During the autumn

session, several classes have not had regular teachers and we would here invite the more active interest of those who can assist in this most important work.

The meetings for the study of the lesson were held on Wednesday evenings, and were very helpful to those able to attend.

The Library, under the charge of Messrs. McGregor and Steele, continues to be largely used by the scholars.

The School was closed during August, owing to the very small attendance during the summer months.

The Pastor's Bible Class continues to meet and to form part of the School; and as the members of it study the same course of lessons, it is easy for the older scholars to pass directly into it, as they make advance in their work. To some of the members of this class the School is much indebted for assistance as substitutes for absent teachers, and to them, and to others who have rendered help in this work, we wish to express our sincere thanks.

The Annual Picnic of the School was as usual largely attended by members of the Congregation, and was in every way very enjoyable.

The School Festival which was to have been held in the early part of January was postponed owing to the death of Principal Kirkland, who had been for many years the teacher of one of the Bible classes, and who had during this year, for a considerable time taught one of the classes in the School. In him the Sabbath School had a warm friend, and always a very willing helper; and we very gratefully remember his cheerful kindly presence with us.

By the unanimous wish of the Session and the Teachers, Mr. Wallace Anderson has been chosen Superintendent for the coming year. We look forward to a period of earnest work, and we trust and believe to one of real spiritual blessing for the members of the School.

The Committee of the Missionary Association have again to report to the Congregation the result of another year's work.

The Missionary Collectors have made their usual calls at the homes and the amounts received have by them been paid over to the Treasurer. We regret that owing to unavoidable change in the collectors for some of the districts and the difficulty experienced in promptly filling the vacancies, these calls were in some cases not made with the usual regularity.

The sums received from the collectors and those paid by contributors directly to the Treasurer amount to \$2,436.63.

There has also been received for the special fund in connection with which we contribute to the Foreign Mission Committee for the support of Rev. D. MacGillivray the sum of \$804.56.

The contributions make a total of \$3,410.05. Some of the contributions have been specially designated by the donors, and after deducting these there remains for allocation amongst the various church funds the sum of \$2,104.03.

In taking a retrospect of the past year the officers of the Auxiliary find many tokens of God's goodness for which to record sincere gratitude. A more general interest in this department of congregational work has been very manifest. To an increasing number it is presenting itself in a new aspect, that of a privilege, and the cheerful and ready response of members when asked for assistance has been universal.

Ten meetings have been held during the year, twentyeight members have taken part in the proceedings and several members have prepared excellent papers on different phases of Missionary Work. Five of these meetings were addressed by missionaries on furlough, namely, Rev. Donald MacGillivray, Rev. Norman H. and Mrs. Russell, Mrs. Marling and Miss Gowans.

The annual Thanksgiving meeting was held in October.

The offering amounted to \$144.65.

The membership of the Society has increased, numbering ninety-four. One life member has been added to the roll, Miss Janet Smith. Owing to the removal of some and others uniting with the Auxiliary, the number of "Scattered Helpers," those who for various reasons are unable to attend the meetings of the Society, has decreased to seven, and these have contributed seven dollars and sixty cents.

A marked decrease in the amount of goods and money sent annually to the North-West has to be reported for the past year. It is believed that the decrease is due to a mistaken impression that too much is being sent in the form of supplies to the North-West, but such is not the case. The contributions in goods amounted to twenty-one dollars and twenty-five cents, and in money, three dollars. In addition to these a special contribution of clothing valued at twenty-seven dollars and fifty cents was sent to British Columbia. The total amount of money contributed by the Auxiliary during the year is \$350.67.

The funds of the Society are obtained by membership fees, General Society fee, \$1.00, "Auxiliary" fee 25 cents, by offerings in envelopes and by donations, also a life mem-

bership fee, \$25.

The monthly "Letter Leaflet" continues to stimulate the interest in our missionaries and their work in the foreign field and is a welcome pamphlet in the homes of the congregation. Its circulation is one hundred and forty.

The work of the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band for 1898 has been carried on in much the same way as in previous years. The average attendance at the monthly meetings has increased this year from twenty-eight to thirty-two and the membership has been forty.

As in each year some of our members have, for different reasons, been obliged to withdraw. However, the membership is kept up by additions being made to it and this year has been no exception.

The subjects taken up and most thoroughly studied, from which much missionary information has been gained, have been the Indians of the North-West, Syria, Persia, India, Africa and the New Hebrides. Twenty-four of the girls have taken part at the meetings.

The interest taken in making articles of clothing, quilts, etc, for the North-West Indians still continues and was shown this year in a larger donation than ever before, which

was valued at seventy dollars.

Miss Eva Monteith was present at the March meeting and gave a most interesting account of the Sunday School work carried on in Toronto among the Chinese. Our June meeting was held at the residence of our President and was addressed by Mrs. Charles Harvey. Miss Bricker and Miss O'Hara kindly sang for us, and a social hour was spent.

Mrs. Knight, lately returned from China, addressed the Thank-Offering meeting, held in October, and her address was very thoroughly enjoyed by all who heard it. Our thanks are due to all those who have helped to make our meetings enjoyable as well as instructive. We feel very grateful also to those ladies of the Auxiliary who were present at some of our meetings, and in different ways have shown their interest in our work. We fully appreciate the continued kindness of a former member of this Society, who each year sends so valuable a contribution to our Treasury.

To the Rev. Egerton Young we extend our sincere thanks for his kindness in delivering for us his very interesting lecture on, "Life Among the Auroras," which was such a suc-

cess in every way.

Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Jordan, as always, have in many ways shown their interest in the Band.

She wore the native dress and her earnest words interested all present.

The history of the Association, during the past year, has been satisfactory and encouraging. As explained in our last report, the Association does not undertake work directly in its own name, but acts rather as a sort of central bureau. Its province is to supervise carefully the activity of its various departments, and to organize new departments whereever such may seem to be needed.

No new branch has been instituted since our last report was drawn up. The advisability of organizing a Young People's Choir has been more than once discussed, but it has been decided to postpone taking this step until the outlook shall seem to be more promising. On the other hand, one department of the Association, in active operation last winter, has been discontinued for the present. When the Young People's Prayer Meeting was founded, it was intended to provide for a contingency which no longer exists. Hence it has been deemed wiser to disband it, and to combine all the forces of the congregation in the general Prayer Meeting, which has so long been held in the Lecture Room on Wednesday evenings.

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The Annual Meeting of the Association was held on Monday, October 31st, and was well attended. Office-bearers for the current year were elected, and various plans of work were discussed and referred to suitable committees.

The annual Assembly of the Association, held on December 15th, took this year the form of a public Lecture. The services of Rev. Dr. Barclay, of St. Paul's Church, Montreal, were secured for the evening, when he delivered an excellent critique upon the career and reformatory activity of the martyred "Savonarola."

As regards the work of the two Departments of the Association, at present in operation, a brief statement should be made.

The attendance at this Class, while very gratifying as regards both numbers and regularity, is not so large as it was last year. Several reasons have conspired to bring about this result. In addition to visitors, who are always cordially welcome, forty-two names have been recorded upon the Secretary's list. Of this number, fifteen (or about one-third) are young men. Fully two-thirds of the Class are communicants. The average contributions to missions is about \$1.50 per Sabbath; and thus far, the offerings have been voted towards meeting a portion of the salary of Rev. Donald MacGillivray in China. The Class continues to render most useful help in the Sunday School, through its supplying

emergency Teachers for vacancies which occur unexpectedly from time to time. Several members of the Class have lately been added to the permanent teaching staff of the School.

This fund was begun in April, 1898. It was found by the Managers that certain repairs and improvements upon the Church building, hitherto postponed from year to year, required to be undertaken without further delay.

The heating apparatus had become defective; the platform and steps around the Church needed to be renewed, a new carpet had become imperative, and one or two other alterations, which would involve considerable outlay, plainly demanded attention in the near future.

It occurred to the Managers at this juncture that it would be a wise step to enlist the active assistance of the ladies of the congregation. Accordingly on March 15th a conference with the ladies was held, when it was resolved to form a Church Furnishing Committee forthwith, and to strive to raise \$2,000 in freewill offerings during the current year.

Before many days had passed a number of sympathizers with the effort sent in their cheques for \$100 each, and the fund was fairly launched.

The enterprise thus begun has been crowned with very successful results.

Up to this date \$1,766.85 have been handed in to the Treasurer either by cheque or special envelope laid upon the

collection plates on Sundays. The condition of the fund at the close of the year may be briefly summarized as follows:

It is a satisfaction to report that payments are still coming in, varying in amounts from thirty-five cents to \$8.00 per week. But in view of the probable action of the Managers at the approaching Annual Meeting, when the necessity of a new carpet will certainly be referred to, the friends of the Furnishing Fund are invited to lend it their generous support.

At least \$1,000 additional will be required before the Committee can regard its work as finished. It is likely that a slight alteration in the pulpit platform may have to be made, and one or two other trifling changes could most easily

be effected at the present time.

If therefore the congregation will during 1899 give as willing a response to our appeal as they gave last year, and will put into the treasury a sum of between \$1,200 and \$1,500, a most useful undertaking will very soon be found to have been successfully completed.

The help rendered this movement by our former President, Mrs. Kirkland, and by our former Treasurer, Mrs. Woodbridge,

is entitled to special acknowledgement.

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

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MISCELLANEOUS.



Historical Notes.

The first printed ANNUAL REPORT of the Congregation covers the history of its life and work during 1865. An effort was begun about three years ago to collect a few complete sets of these Reports, in order that they might be bound and preserved for reference when necessary. Only one full series, thus far, has been secured. The history of the Congregation, prior to 1865, must be sought in the official minutes of the Session and of the Board of Managers.

The Congregation of St. James Square was formed by act of the U.P. Presbytery of Toronto, June 23rd, 1853. This step was the outcome of a Petition, already favorably considered at a meeting of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, whereby the Presbytery was urged to organize a second U.P. congregation in Toronto. The Presbytery granted the prayer of the petitioners, and at the same time it agreed to sanction the invitation extended to Rev. John Taylor, M.D., to act as stated supply of the new congregation.

At the beginning of its history, the Congregation was known as the "Gould Street U. P. Church." For about twenty-five years it worshipped in the structure now occupied by the adherents of the Catholic Apostolic Church, corner of Victoria and Gould Streets. In 1877 the original property was sold for \$10,000,—which sum, by the way, was exactly the amount paid for the Gerrard Street site. The present structure was at once commenced. On November 17th, 1878, the new church was formally set apart for the worship of God, Rev. Dr. Taylor, of New York, and Rev. Dr. Jenkins, of Montreal, preaching the opening sermons.

The following ministers have served in the pastorate of the congregation. The dates set after their respective names indicate the period during which each held office:—
Rev. John Taylor, M.D., D.D. Nov. 23, 1853—May 6, 1861.
Rev. Robert Burns, D.D.* . . . July 9, 1861—May 28, 1863.
Rev. John M. King, D.D. May 28, 1863—Oct. 28, 1883.
Rev. Samuel H. Kellogg, D.D. . May 20, 1886—Oct. 6, 1892.
Rev. Louis H. Jordan, B.D. . . . Mar. 27, 1894—

The Rev. Dr. Taylor spent his later life in Edinburgh, Scotland, where he died October 30th, 1880, in the eightieth year of his age. The Rev. Dr. Burns died in Toronto, August 19th, 1869. The Rev. Dr. King is still a trusted leader in our Church in Canada, occupying the important post of Principal of our College in Winnipeg. The Rev. Dr. Kellogg has returned to his missionary labors in India, where, at the same time, he is assisting in the re-translation of the Scriptures into Hindi and Urdu.

^{*} Dr. Burns, strictly speaking, was not Pastor of the congregation, for he was never inducted. He, nevertheless, for a time, discharged the duties of the pastorate, in addition to his professional work in Knox College.

ORDINARY REVENUE.

"Upon the first day of the week, let EVERY ONE of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him."—I. Cor. xvi. 2.

The Managers derive no revenue from the pews. All the sittings are free, no pew-rent being charged to any one.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES IN ST. JAMES SQUARE CHURCH may be made in one of three ways:—

- (1) Weekly Offerings, enclosed in special envelopes and placed on the collection plate each Sabbath.
- (2) Quarterly Subscriptions.
- (3) Open Contributions, placed upon the collection plate.

The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation: it ought, if possible, to be adopted by all.

The necessary envelopes are given out at the beginning of each quarter, as well as upon the allocation of sittings. Any one not now receiving envelopes, but desiring to contribute in that way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers; and the matter will at once be attended to.

All who occupy sittings are expected to contribute, according to their means, towards meeting the current expenses of the congregation. All alike derive the benefit which accrues from the expenditure of the congregation's funds: All therefore should aid in raising these funds. All cannot give

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ation, for ged the College. amounts equally large,—this is neither asked nor expected: but all can give something. Every one who is in receipt of a regular income, be it small or great, is in a position to dedicate a portion of it to the Lord. "Let each man do according as he hath purposed in his heart; and not grudgingly, or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Perhaps it may not be amiss to say that, in order to meet promptly the current expenses of the congregation, an average of fully \$150.00 per Sabbath is required.
