THE RAILWAY BILLS PASSED.

During the last week, the Railway Bills passed both Houses of the Legislature. In the Assembly on Wednesday, the vote on the second section of the Bill was in the affirmative by a large majority...

The negotiations between Mr. Jackson and the Canadian Cabinet for the completion of the Great Trunk Railway, have been brought to a close...

In the Legislative Council, on Wednesday, the Bills were passed two members only, (Messrs. Gilbert and Connel), voting against them.

On Friday, at two o'clock, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor came down in state to the Council Chamber, and gave his assent to the Railway Bills...

Mr. President and Hon. Gentlemen of the Legislature, Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

I rejoice to find that it has been possible to sanction the scheme for the construction of the European and North American Railway.

The measures to which I have just alluded, imply some confidence in the Executive Government. I thank you for that confidence, and I desire to assure you that the funds that you have placed at my disposal shall be expended economically...

Mr. President and Hon. Gentlemen of the Legislature, Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

We may hope that a new impulse will be given to your progress by the acts just passed. For my own part I believe that the completion of this Railway will benefit not only those whose houses it passes, but that the most remote settler and the poorest labourer will receive a fresh element of enterprise and prosperity at work amongst us.

I have only to repeat my thanks for the assistance you have given me, and to relieve you from your labours for the present.

We heartily congratulate the Province at large on the successful termination of this most important question. We believe that brighter days are now in store for us, and that every section of the Province will participate in the advantages resulting from the projected enterprise. May the "good time coming" speedily arrive!

DEATH OF DANIEL WEBSTER. The melancholy tidings, which have been hourly expected for the last two days have at length arrived. Mr. Webster departed this life at Marshfield, a little before three o'clock on Sunday morning. His health for a year or two has been somewhat impaired, and the annual catarrh, to which he has been subject in the month of August, attacked him both the last year and with unusual severity. Other complaints followed a few weeks since, and his constitution, originally of great strength, has at length yielded.—Mr. Webster was however able to attend to the public business of his department till within a very few days of his decease, and his piercing intellect remained unclouded to the last.

Mr. Webster was born at Salisbury, N. H., on the 18th of January, 1796. He was educated at the Law Academy and Dartmouth College. His legal pupillage was passed in the office of Governor Gore of Massachusetts, who stood in the first rank of jurists.

In 1819 Mr. Webster was elected to Congress as one of the Representatives from New Hampshire, and took his seat at the extra session in May, 1819. The country was then engaged in the war with Great Britain, and he was re-elected in June. Congress at that time embraced an unusual number of eminent members, both of the State and the House of Representatives. Clay, Calhoun, Lowndes, Pickens, Cass, and others were among the number. Several of these added the advantage of some experience in legislation to talents of the highest order. Mr. Webster had never been a member of any other body, but he rose at once to the very front rank. It was soon remarked of him by Mr. Lowndes, "that the South had not his superior nor the North his equal."

In 1822 he was elected to Congress for the city of Boston by an overwhelming majority, and in the next session of 1823, he was re-elected by a vote nearly unanimous. He resigned his return to political life by the ever memorable speech on behalf of the Greeks, which gave him the name of "the Liberator." He was re-elected in 1825, which he had already resigned.
