Back To Back Canadians Stood, Firing at Enveloping Germans; Deeds of Heroism by Our Men

London, May 12.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Northern France, says the Princess Patricia's backed by other British regiments, suffered terribly during the furious German bombardment of the British trenches west of Zonnebeke, on last Saturday. The bombardment was almost the heaviest of the war. The Germans had an overwhelming mastery of artillery.

Many deeds of heroism are credited to a small group of the Canadians who stood back to back firing in both directions on the enveloping Germans. The trenches in which they were fighting were soon knocked out of shape by the heavy shells but the Canadians continued fighting, their ranks being cut to pieces.

Would Have Won Praise of Pontius Pilate

Roosevelt's Comment on American Neutrality — Taft Looks Ahead on Effects of War

New York, May 12.—Theodore Roosevelt, in an article entitled "Murder on the High Seas," in the Metropolitan Magazine for June, calls the destruction of the Lusitania wholesale murder, and says this country must act with vigor to preserve the self respect of the republic, and to fulfill the duty demanded by humanity at large.

"We earn as a nation measureless scorn and contempt," says the writer, "if we follow the lead of those who exalt peace above righteousness, if we heed the voices of those feeble folk who bleat to high heaven that there is peace when there is no peace.

"For many months our government has preserved between right and wrong a neutrality, which would have excited the envious admiration of Pontius Pilate, the arch typical neutral of all time."

Philadelphia, May 12.—Addressing the Union League here last night, Ex-President Taft said: "We must bear in mind that if we have a war, it is the people, the men and the women, fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters, who must pay with lives and money the cost of it, and therefore they should not be hurried into the sacrifices until it is clear that they wish it, and know what they are doing, when they wish it."

LIBERAL LEADER TO TAKE THE REINS

Winnipeg, Man., May 12.—The Roblin Government has resigned. The Opposition Leader, Norris, was called upon to form another administration.

Premier Roblin said:—At the late session of the legislature certain serious statements were made affecting over payments and other matters in connection with the construction of the new parliament buildings.

A royal commission was appointed to enquire into the whole matter. The authority of jurisdiction of the commission is now challenged. This means considerable delay before that point can be determined by the courts. The government believes such delay undesirable and contrary to public policy.

The production of certain evidence during the inquiry of the public accounts committee caused the government to institute a departmental enquiry into these matters. The result of that inquiry together with the statement made before the Royal Commission by counsel for the contractors convinced the government that adjustments as between the province and the contractors were necessary.

Further the government believed that such adjustment could be made with more satisfactory to the public by a new government. The government also realizes that constitutionally they were responsible for the acts of their officials in matters of this kind.

Premier Roblin said that his decision was influenced by the withdrawal of a large measure of public confidence as indicated in the 1914 elections.

WILSON WAS NOT REFERRING TO LUSITANIA OUTRAGE

Disavowal of Interpretation of His Pride and Fight Speech

Well He Has so Explained, is New York Editorial Comment—London Standard Does Not See Any Benefit to Britain in United States Entering Into War—Indignation in Japan

New York, May 12.—Some editorial comment in today's New York morning newspapers regarding President Wilson's Philadelphia speech follows:—The Tribune:—"Since Lincoln, no president has had to make so grave a decision as Woodrow Wilson must now make. His responsibility and his tragic duty should alike command the respect of the people of this country. No party lines should survive the present crisis."

The Herald:—"The president is the central figure, in fact the only figure, in this affair for Americans until his intentions are disclosed. All eyes are fixed upon him. Every word he utters is bound to have significance affixed to it."

A brief paragraph in his speech, printed yesterday morning, was interpreted as indicating that he was strongly disposed to avoid the very appearance of war with Germany, no matter what turn events in the next few days of week might take. This appears to have been a false impression, because the president, at the very earliest opportunity yesterday, took care to disavow these words as they applied to matters before him at this time. He was only speaking of the country that he had disavowed, it was unfortunate that he used an expression so susceptible of misinterpretation.

The World:—"Not because we are for war, but because we are for peace, we rejoice in the fact that early yesterday morning, the president announced that at Philadelphia, on the evening before, he was not thinking of the Lusitania when he said, 'There is such a thing as a nation being so right that it does not need to convince others by force that it is right.'"

"Whatever these words may mean as abstracted, if applied to conditions now existing in a world cursed by lawless war, they are bound to be misinterpreted."

"We are dealing with Germany today, as Great Britain was less than a year ago. We have had our warning of its purposes. We know its methods. If we flinch, Germany advances; if we hold fast, Germany retreats. The essence of Prussianism is contempt of a coward. The substance of Prussianism is force."

WILD TIMES IN LONDON TODAY

Anti-German Riots Worse Than Yesterday and Police Have Serious Trouble

London, May 12.—Anti-German riots in the East End of London were renewed this morning. Whenever a German showed himself, he was attacked. The police had difficulty in dealing with the angry crowds. Some German establishments were raided and sacked.

The police in some cases were aided by the angry crowds. When Germans were caught, they were severely mauled. One German was thrown into a horse trough.

Several Russian Jews were flocking this morning to the police station in the East End, pleading protection, explaining that they were being mistreated for Germans.

Anti-German outbreaks of particular severity occurred today in the neighborhood of the East India docks. Sixty or seventy German shops were wrecked. Germans in the vicinity are uniting for self-defence and police reinforcements are being rushed to the scene.

That is Said of French Victory North of Arras — Russians Drive Enemy From Kovno But Fall Back in Western Galicia

Paris, May 12.—(By C. F. Bertell)—Information reaching the highest official circles in Paris is to the effect that the French advance to the north of Arras is the finest success of the allies since the battle of the Marne.

Presidential congratulations to General Joffre are expected as soon as the operations are terminated. The German line is practically crumpled up in this region, despite the fact that it was strongly defended.

The outcome of the great battle is a striking triumph for the allies' tactical initiative, and a magnificent evidence of the morale of their troops.

The whole affair constitutes the first triumphant move in General Joffre's spring campaign.

Paris, May 12.—The French War Office, this afternoon, reported: "In the sector to the north of Arras we have maintained our gains, except in the front of Loos, where a night counter attack resulted in taking from us a part of the terrain we captured in the daytime. On the rest of the front yesterday saw artillery engagements."

KOVNO CLEARED OF THE ENEMY. London, May 12.—The Petrograd correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph says: "The Germans have evacuated the Kovno region. One body of the enemy's cavalry has been placed in a difficult position by a double advance of the Russians. This German force consisted of a Bavarian cavalry division, supported by a regiment of the Prussian Guard Infantry. Soon the battle became a desperate fight by the Germans, and a hot chase by the Russians, however, was not to be."

For forty miles the latter clung close to the heels of the flying foe, not driving until the division, to all intents and purposes, was destroyed. The losses of the Germans undoubtedly were very great.

R. D. TAYLOR ABLE TO WRITE HOME

St. John Soldier Who Recently Was Mentioned in Casualty List

A letter received yesterday by James Taylor, of Erin street, from his brother, Private Robert D. Taylor, recently returned from the front, is a most interesting and comforting one. It is a letter which he has written from a hospital in England, where he is recovering from severe injuries received in France. The presumption is that it was in the battle of Langemarck that he received his wounds.

He was formerly a member of the 62nd Fusiliers and enlisted with the local volunteer company, becoming a member of the 12th Battalion. After some months in England he joined the 14th for action on the continent and was one of the first New Brunswickers to go to the firing line.

L. W. Lindsay is Coming to C. P. R. Here From Montreal.

W. B. Howard, district passenger agent for the C. P. R., announced today that L. W. Lindsay, at present ticket clerk in the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, had been appointed to succeed G. Bruce Burpee, as traveling passenger agent for the company here. He will probably arrive in St. John in about two weeks. Mr. Lindsay has quite a few friends here, made on different visits, who will gladly welcome him.

During the winters of 1912-13 and 1913-14 he was with the company in Halifax as exchange ticket agent. Mr. Lindsay belongs to Quebec and his met with success in the Canadian Pacific employ. In 1908-09 he was ticket clerk in Vancouver, B. C., after which he was for a time out of the company's roll, returning in 1912 and since remaining in the employ. His appointment to the position made vacant by the promotion of Mr. Burpee to the general offices in Montreal, is a forward step and will be received with pleasure by his friends. Mr. Burpee will probably leave to assume his new duties this week.

NO MEETING.

More Bodies Are Cast Up By Sea

Those of Three Little Ones Among Latest Recovered From Lusitania

Quebec, May 12.—The bodies of nine men and eight women from the Lusitania were brought ashore at Baltimore and other Irish coast points here this morning. The only body of a first class passenger was that of Percy Scamby, of Peterboro, Ont., son of the late Captain C. W. Scamby of the Cunard Line. His sister, Elizabeth, still is missing.

Slow progress is being made in identification, as few relatives of passengers are now here, and the authorities are relying only upon papers and trinkets found on the bodies. The names E. J. Harrington and A. P. Morris were found on papers in the pockets of two of the men, while that of K. Hickson was found on the body of one woman. Three of the dead were members of the Lusitania's crew.

ESTY MATTER GETS INTO COURT

In the matter of the estate of Wesley B. Esty who left the city in last December and against whom proceedings were afterwards taken under the Absconding Debtors' Act, an interesting hearing took place this morning before Judge Forbes as to the ownership of a motor boat called the Myrtle E. When the trustees were appointed they took possession of this boat and application was made to the court to decide the question of ownership, as the boat was also claimed by J. Fred Evans, father-in-law of Mr. Esty. This morning's evidence was given in behalf of the trustees of the estate by Charles A. Clark and Thomas X. Gibbons, while Mr. Evans, his son Henry, and Morton I. Harrison gave evidence on the other side.

It appeared from the evidence that Mr. Evans and his sons built the boat and Mr. Esty furnished the engine, which Mr. Evans said was sold to him for \$150. Mr. Clark said that after Esty left the city a shortage of from \$7,000 to \$10,000 was discovered.

The matter was adjourned to hear another witness. Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., appeared in behalf of the trustees of the estate and E. P. Raymond for Mr. Evans, etc.

DIGBY SOLDIER BADLY WOUNDED

G. Woodford Connell Went With Engineers in First Contingent

Digby, N. S., May 12.—A despatch received here announces that G. Woodford Connell, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Connell of Digby is dangerously wounded. He is an engineer with the first Canadian contingent.

BUSY SESSION OF POLICE COURT

A dispute between Mrs. Mary Connell and a Syrian, named Samuel Lewis, was aired in the police court this morning. The former accused the latter of assaulting her by shoving her along the hall of his house in Brunswick street and then kicking her out the door. The Syrian denied this and said that the trouble arose over the seizure of a sewing machine for rent. The case will be resumed tomorrow afternoon.

The defendant took the oath in the style of his countrymen, by first making a sign of the cross and, after taking the oath, pressing the Bible to his forehead. Magistrate Ritchie said it was the second time that he had seen the oath taken in that way.

David Hennessy appeared to answer a charge of failing to report to the chief of police upon dogs specified. He was remanded.

John Fitzpatrick was fined \$16 or two months in jail for drunkenness and using profane language. One man arrested on a drunkenness charge was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

William Brothers, who was sentenced three months ago to serve six months in jail for carrying a loaded revolver, was given his freedom upon promise not to commit the offence again. He said he received permission to carry a revolver about seven years ago from a country squire. He was informed that he could do so such a thing.

Harry Ostapovich and Emil Karl, two Russians, were remanded, one on a charge of stealing \$60 from a companion, Peter Kiriloff, and the other on a charge of receiving money which he knew to be stolen. The plaintiff said he had been robbed in his boarding house at 657 Main street. He said that Karl had told him, upon receipt of \$1, the one who took his money. He said he later learned that Karl had taken \$200 from him.

## WHEN McCORMICK BECAME WORLD'S PREMIER SKATER

Gruelling Race With Frank Dowd in Victoria Rink

**OLD TIME SKATING**

Races in Montreal and St. John Between These Two Speedy Men — Championship Contest Won By Two Feet

In the Jubilee rink, Montreal, on February 15, 1897, F. Akerley of this city skated a two mile professional race and won in fine style in 7m. 30s. Dingee, another St. John speed artist, skated a half mile against time, doing the distance in 1. and 30s.

**Dowd Beats McCormick**

On the same evening Champion Dowd defeated Hugh McCormick, of St. John. The details of the race follows: Frank Dowd of Montreal and Hugh J. McCormick of St. John, N. B., probably two of the fastest skaters in Canada, competed in a five mile race last night. There are to be three races between the men for a purse of \$50, the first being for five miles, the second for ten and the third for twenty-five miles.

When the word go was given the men were off like a flash, McCormick taking the lead by a few feet, and this position was maintained for the first mile. It was evident from the start that Dowd was content to bide his time, and was driving his opponent by simply keeping close upon his heels. In the first lap of the second mile Dowd made a spurt to pass McCormick, and in so doing, braked against him with his arm, when McCormick lost his feet, fell to the ice and slid along for a considerable distance. He claimed a foul, which however, was not allowed. Before he had picked himself up and got to work again Dowd had managed to put half a lap between them.

It was now a stern chase for McCormick, who went in with vigor, both men skating for all they were worth, and for the next mile and a half so closely were they matched that no perceptible diminution or increase of the gap between them could be noticed. 
Vote on \$8,550 Deferred For Special Meeting—Grants For Morgue and Children's Aid Society

## PATRIOTS' ONE DUTY IS TO PROSECUTE THE WAR

Hon. Dr. Pugsley Hopes Patriotic Counsels Have Finally Prevailed at Ottawa  
(Toronto Globe, Monday)  
Hon. Dr. William Pugsley, M. P. for St. John, N. B., and former minister of public works, who was in Toronto yesterday, gave his views of the political situation to The Globe. In the course of a short interview he declared: "At the beginning of last week I think it had been fully decided to have an election in June but, owing very likely to the strong protests which were voiced from all sections of the country, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, my belief, after what I heard at Ottawa yesterday, is that more prudent and patriotic counsels have prevailed and that an election has been indefinitely postponed.  
One Duty Is Paramount  
"With regard to the propriety of holding an election at the present time, I think there can be but one opinion, that it would be nothing short of a crime at a period when it is most desirable that the whole people should be united in making every possible effort for the defence of the empire and also contributing the various funds which are being raised for the comfort of the soldiers, particularly the wounded, as well as for the families of those who have gone to the front. It would be utterly inexcusable to force a political contest upon the people of Canada, which would necessarily, to a very considerable extent, divide them into hostile camps.  
No Party Considerations  
"In expressing this opinion I am not at all influenced by the question of party success or failure, my own view being that if an election were to take place now there would be such a strong feeling of resentment against the course of the government that the fact alone would materially assist in carrying the Liberal standard to victory. But the question is not to be looked at from a party standpoint, but from the interests of the country as a whole, and by the interests of the country I mean not only the interests of Canada, but those of the empire as well."  
Doctor Pugsley is on a business trip, and will leave Toronto for Detroit.
