Back To Back Canadians Stood, Firing at Enveloping Germans; Deeds of Heroism by Our Men

London, May 12.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Northern France, says the Princess Patricia's backed by other British regiments, suffered terribly during the furious German bombardment of the British trenches west of Zonnebeke, on last Saturday. The bombardment was almost the heaviest of the war. The Germans had an overwhelming mastery of artillery.

Many deeds of heroism are credited to a small group of the Canadians who stood back to back firing in both directions on the enveloping Germans. The trenches in which they were fighting were soon knocked out of shape by the heavy shells but the Canadians continued fighting, their ranks being cut to pieces.

FIRST GRAVE IN FERNHILL, 1848

Lot Committee See it During Visit — Some Improvements — Soldiers' Graves

The lot committee of the Fernhill Cemetery Company visited the grounds yesterday afternoon and arranged for additional improvements at the front entrance, including a boulevard to divide the front driveway, a coat of paint for the partition, the removal of unsightly trees, and the laying of a concrete gutter to carry off the surface water from the hill. The new drain pipes laid on the marsh last autumn are already proving effective and the soil on what has hitherto been marsh land, unit to spot, is drying out.

The superintendent was also requested to clean up the underbrush on the public ground or no man's lot, so-called, at the expense of the company, as many of the interments in this section were the only link of families which had long since severed their connection with St. John.

LIBERAL LEADER TO TAKE THE REINS

Winnipeg, Man., May 12.—The Roblin Government has resigned. The Opposition Leader, Norris, was called upon to form another administration.

Premier Roblin said:—At the late session of the legislature certain serious statements were made affecting over payments and other matters in connection with the construction of the new parliament buildings. A royal commission was appointed to enquire into the whole matter. The authority of jurisdiction of the commission is now challenged. This means considerable delay before that point can be determined by the courts. The government believes such delay undesirable and contrary to public policy.

WILSON WAS NOT REFERRING TO LUSITANIA OUTRAGE

Disavowal of Interpretation of His Pride and Fight Speech. Well He Has so Explained, is New York Editorial Comment—London Standard Does Not See Any Benefit to Britain in United States Entering Into War—Indignation in Japan

New York, May 12.—Some editorial comment in today's New York morning newspapers regarding President Wilson's Philadelphia speech follows:—The Tribune:—"Since Lincoln, no president has had to make so grave a decision as Woodrow Wilson must now make. His responsibility and his tragic duty should alike command the respect of the sympathy of Americans. No party lines should survive the present crisis."

Quebec, May 12.—The bodies of nine men and eight women from the Lusitania were brought ashore at Baltimore and other Irish coast points here this morning. The only body of a first class passenger was that of Percy Scamby of Peterboro, Ont., son of the late Captain C. W. Scamby of the Cunard Line. His sister, Elizabeth, still is missing.

WILD TIMES IN LONDON TODAY

Anti-German Riots Worse Than Yesterday and Police Have Serious Trouble

London, May 12.—Anti-German riots in the East End of London were renewed this morning. Whenever a German showed himself, he was attacked. The police had difficulty in dealing with the angry crowds. When Germans were caught, they were severely mauled. One German was thrown into a horse trough.

ESTY MATTER GETS INTO COURT

In the matter of the estate of Wesley B. Esty who left the city in last December and against whom proceedings were afterwards taken under the Absconding Debtors' Act, an interesting hearing took place this morning before Judge Forbes as to the ownership of a motor boat called the Myrtle E. When the trustees were appointed they took possession of this boat and application was made to the court to decide the question of ownership, as the boat was also claimed by J. Fred Evans, father-in-law of Mr. Esty. This morning's evidence was given in behalf of the trustees of the estate by Charles A. Clark and Thomas X. Gibbons, while Mr. Evans, his son Henry, and Morton I. Harrison gave evidence on the other side. It appeared from the evidence that Mr. Evans and his sons built the boat and Mr. Esty furnished the engine, which Mr. Evans said was sold to him for \$150. Mr. Clark said that after Esty left the city a shortage of after \$7,000 to \$10,000 was discovered.

The matter was adjourned to hear another witness. Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., appeared in behalf of the trustees of the estate and E. P. Raymond for Mr. Evans, etc.

GREATEST SINCE THE BATTLE OF THE MARNE

That is Said of French Victory North of Arras — Russians Drive Enemy From Kovno But Fall Back in Western Galicia

Paris, May 12.—(By C. F. Bertell)—Information reaching the highest official circles in Paris is to the effect that the French advance to the north of Arras is the finest success of the allies since the battle of the Marne. Presidential congratulations for General Joffre are expected as soon as the operations are terminated. The German line is practically crumpled up in this region, despite that it was strongly defended.

London, May 12.—The Petrograd correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph says:—The news has overtaken the German raiders in the Kovno government. One body of the enemy's cavalry has been placed in a difficult position by a double advance of the Russians. This German force consisted of a Bavarian cavalry division, supported by a regiment of the Prussian Guard Infantry. Soon the battle became a desperate fight by the Germans, and a hot chase by the Russians, however.

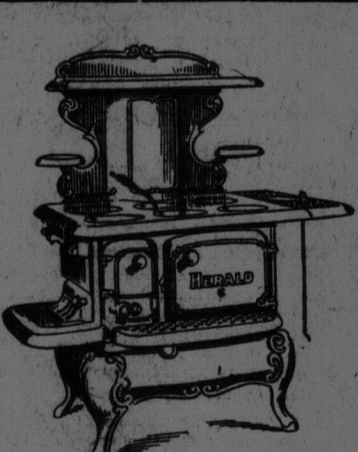

POLITICS HOLDS UP THE EQUIPMENT OF TROOPS

More Revelations at Ottawa—Construction Corps Among Those Affected

Ottawa, May 11—Further revelations of mismanagement in the equipment of the second Canadian contingent are made. It is now said that orders for uniforms for the men were given to makers of corsets, ladies' blouses and underwear and that the result was unsatisfactory all round, and there was much delay. The recently appointed war purchases commission is said to have found, on assuming office a mass of requisitions for articles for the troops, some of these requisitions were months old but differences over details and similar matters had blocked them.

On a requisition for 60,000 pairs of army boots of the new design at a fixed maximum price of \$4, the price has been exceeded, some orders at \$4.15, others at \$4.25, none at \$4. Some of the prominent firms have been left out of the orders, for the commission did not advertise for open competition but placed themselves in touch with certain dealers.

In November there were differences over accepting the lowest approved tender for 180 motor trucks. They were not ordered until January and are not yet ready to go forward.

The fine Construction Corps which mobilized here, has been waiting for weeks for picks, crowbars and other necessary equipment. Requisitions for these supplies have been held up. So too, the engineers and artillery have not received binoculars, range finders and other articles in the quantity needed. There also is reported a shortage of harness, hospital equipment and other things which are easily procurable.

WHEN McCORMICK BECAME WORLD'S PREMIER SKATER

Gruelling Race With Frank Dowd in Victoria Rink

OLD TIME SKATING

Races in Montreal and St. John Between These Two Speedy Men — Championship Contest Won By Two Feet

In the Jubilee rink, Montreal, on February 15, 1897, F. Akerley of this city skated a two mile professional race and won in fine style in 7m. 30s. Dingee, another St. John speed artist, skated a half mile against time, doing the distance in 1. and 30s.

Dowd Beats McCormick
On the same evening Champion Dowd defeated Hugh McCormick, of St. John. The details of the race follows: Frank Dowd of Montreal and Hugh J. McCormick of St. John, N. B., probably two of the fastest skaters in Canada, competed in a five mile race last night. There are to be three races between the men for a purse of \$50, the first being for five miles, the second for ten and the third for twenty-five miles.

When the word go was given the men were off like a flash, McCormick taking the lead by a few feet, and this position was maintained for the first mile. It was evident from the start that Dowd was content to bide his time, and was driving his opponent by simply keeping close upon his heels. In the first lap of the second mile Dowd made a spur to pass McCormick, and in so doing, braked against him with his arm, when McCormick lost his feet, fell to the ice and slid along for a considerable distance. He claimed a foul, which however, was not allowed. Before he had picked himself up and got to work again Dowd had managed to put half a lap between them.

It was now a stern chase for McCormick, who went in with vigor, both men skating for all they were worth, and for the next mile and a half so closely were they matched that no perceptible diminution or increase of the gap between them could be noticed. McCormick was more at home in turning the corners than was his adversary and this gave him an advantage. Slowly but surely he crept ahead and when the third lap, or half the distance, had been covered he was again on the front, having gained one lap. Cheer after cheer arose from his sympathizers and cries of "Good boy, Frank!" "Make it hot for him," etc. were frequent.

McCormick made strenuous efforts to recover his lost ground but all to no avail and from this out the race was a foregone conclusion. Dowd again contenting himself with dogging the other's heels until the last lap, when he made a brilliant spur and put another quarter lap between them. McCormick was unable to follow, the best time ever made in Montreal.

The ten mile race between McCormick and Dowd took place on Wednesday night, February 16. The account following refers to the race between McCormick and Dowd in the Crystal rink last evening. For four miles they skated in this way without a change in positions and it became evident to the spectators that judgment, as well as muscular ability, would be the deciding factor. On the fourth lap of the fifth mile Dowd took a slight turn to the outside and McCormick at once went down and began to cut out a pace at a more lively gait. Dowd hung closely to his rival, and on the fourth lap of the sixth mile the struggle was a splendid one, but all sorts on the part of Dowd to reach McCormick were unavailing. On the last lap of the ninth mile both men buckled down to their work in their prettiest style, and when they got the word that they were entering on the last mile for the championship the crowd witnessed one of the best contests that was ever held on skates.

McCormick was but slightly in advance and Dowd was going along in fair form. Spurt succeeded spurt and both men were on their feet, and McCormick's nerve. The eleventh and thirteenth laps were skated at a killing pace and when they passed the stand on their last and fourteenth lap with the watch then showing the fastest time of the race the excitement was intense. For the first half of the lap they went almost side by side, the long sweeping stroke of Hugh contrasting with the short but speedy one of the Montrealer. Nearing the finish McCormick made a grand burst of speed and, amid deafening cheers, crossed the line a victor by about two feet. Time 37m. 2s.

McCormick's speed, endurance and style were admirable, and he well merited the championship laurels.

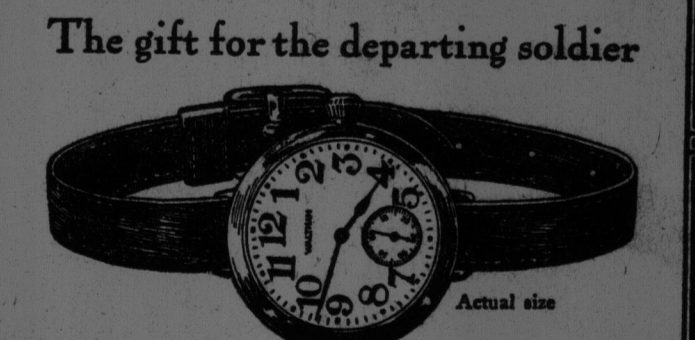

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FIVE CANADIANS FROM LUSITANIA NOW IN HOSPITAL

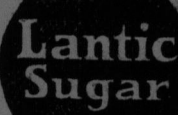

FRESHET ON UPPER ST. JOHN HAS DROPPED TWO FEET.

Miramichi Drives All Out Except James Robinson's On Renous River.

Fredericton, May 11.—The river has fallen almost two feet at VanBuren during the last twenty-four hours, according to the report received here today. The logs are running freely there, however, and the lumbermen are very optimistic over the situation. Since last night the river has dropped twenty-three inches.

At almost every point on the Upper St. John the river fell off last night, a drop of six inches being recorded at Andover and a drop of three inches at Edmundton.

The water remains at the same height here, however, at yesterday, and is still at a higher pitch than any other time this season.

All the Miramichi drives with the exception of the James Robinson drive on Renous River have been brought out. The Fortington Pulp and Paper Company's drive on the Bartholomew has been brought out with the exception of the headwaters. The Robinson drive on the Renous is the largest drive on the Miramichi, but favorable reports have been received regarding it.

TRANSPORT "LIVE" CONCRETE BY PIPE AND "BLOWING"

Spokane, Wash., May 12.—Transportation of live concrete by compressed air is a decidedly novel method used for the first time in Spokane in building huge concrete retaining walls for the grade separation of the Northern Pacific, which is elevating its tracks through the city at a cost of about \$3,000,000.

A giant compressor connected to a 300-horsepower motor drives the "live" concrete from the mixing machines through a six-inch steel pipe to where needed. The scheme, known as the blowing system, obviates the use of many cars and skips, as a flexible pipe along the huge forms deposits the material at the proper spot without having been handled several times.

Regina, May 12.—"When the war in Europe is over there will be a repetition, on a larger scale, of the greatest immigration movement in modern history, when people will rush across the Atlantic into America, in greater numbers than they did at the conclusion of the Franco-Prussian war," said W. B. Lanning, assistant freight traffic manager of the C. P. R. "Just so surely as the unsettled conditions at the time of the great war of 1870 drew thousands of people from their native land to seek new homes across the Atlantic, so will the thousands come into Canada when the present war is ended. The low priced lands of western Canada are surely the place where these men will settle. Mr. Lanning rears his views on the inherent wealth of the land and the fact that the public mind has turned from fictitious values to first principles."

FIVE LAKE STEAMERS CHARTERED FOR THE ATLANTIC SERVICE

Montreal, May 11.—Five of the Canada Steamships Lines' freighters have been chartered for the season by outside interests, and will likely enter the transatlantic service, according to a statement given out today by J. W. Norcross, vice-president of the company. This was all the information that Mr. Norcross would give on the matter. The company now has twenty-one of its freighters out under charter.

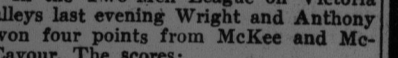

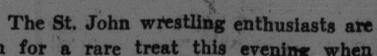

BUSY SEASON FOR SEAMEN'S INSTITUTE

Much Valuable Work Accomplished in Spite of Smaller Number of Large Steamers in Port

At the annual meeting of the board of directors of the Seamen's Institute last evening the annual report of the manager was submitted and considered. Officers will be elected at a postponed meeting to be held next Tuesday.

The manager reviewed the work of the year, pointing out that the smaller number of large passenger steamers coming to the port during the winter and the fact that most of these were not here

over Sunday had resulted in a smaller attendance at the meetings, but that the work had been kept up to a high standard. He gave a summary of the work as follows:

Aggregate attendance of seamen, 11,402; average daily attendance, 63; religious services held, 17; pledges signed, 204; concerts given, 5; hospital visits, weekly; reading matter distributed, 8,190; hand rags for firemen, 1,222; comfort bags given, 840; religious books given, 664; letters posted, 3,883; visits to ships, 230; free beds provided, 24; distressed seamen aided, 37; money exchanged, \$4,300.

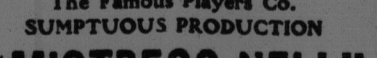

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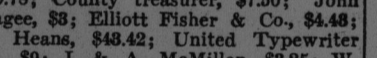

PATRIOTS' ONE DUTY IS TO PROSECUTE THE WAR

Hon. Dr. Pugsley Hopes Patriotic Counsels Have Finally Prevailed at Ottawa

(Toronto Globe, Monday)

Hon. Dr. William Pugsley, M. P. for St. John, N. B., and former minister of public works, who was in Toronto yesterday, gave his views of the political situation to The Globe. In the course of a short interview he declared: "At the beginning of last week I think it had been fully decided to have an election in June but, owing very likely to the strong protests which were voiced from all sections of the country, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, my belief, after what I heard at Ottawa yesterday, is that more prudent and patriotic counsels have prevailed and that an election has been indefinitely postponed.

One Duty Is Paramount

"With regard to the propriety of holding an election at the present time, I think there can be but one opinion, that it would be nothing short of a crime at a period when it is most desirable that the whole people should be united in making every possible effort for the defence of the empire and also contributing the various funds which are being raised for the comfort of the soldiers, particularly the wounded, as well as for the families of those who have gone to the front. It would be utterly inexcusable to force a political contest upon the people of Canada, which would necessarily, to a very considerable extent, divide them into hostile camps.

No Party Considerations

"In expressing this opinion I am not at all influenced by the question of party success or failure, my own view being that if an election were to take place now there would be such a strong feeling of resentment against the course of the government that the fact alone would materially assist in carrying the Liberal standard to victory. But the question is not to be looked at from a party standpoint, but from the interests of the country as a whole, and by the interests of the country I mean not only the interests of Canada, but those of the empire as well."

Dr. Pugsley is on a business trip, and will leave Toronto for Detroit.
