OF NEW BRUNSWICK AND PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,

SACKVILLE, N.B.,

From the 27th of June to the 5th of July, included, 1878.

THE FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK AND PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND CONFERENCE, began in Sackville, N. B., at 9 o'clock, a. m., on Thursday, June 27th, 1878, the Rev. John Prince, President, in the chair.

WILLIAM McCarty who was born in St. John, N. B., in May, 1816.

When about 21 or 22 years of age, under the preaching of Rev. Dr. Wood, he was convinced of sin and became an earnest seeker of salvation through Christ.

In these ways he used his gifts until called to a wider sphere of usefulness in the Church of his choice. In 1845, having passed the March Quarterly Meeting, he was proposed by Rev. F. Smallwood, Superintendent of the Woodstock Circuit, to the New Brunswick District Meeting, as a candidate for the Ministry. And on being satisfied with his conversion to God, his call to the ministry, and his belief in the doctrines and discipline of our Church, the District recommended him to the British Conference as a suitable candidate for the ministry.

On being received he was sent to the Petitcodiac Circuit, and from that time he devoted to the work of the ministry all his energies. His preaching was earnest and faithful, and his pastoral visits to the people were highly profitable. On many of his circuits the Lord was pleased to honor him and to make him the means of the conversion of many souls to Christ.

During the last two years of his ministry, he held the chairmanship of the Sackville District, but by loss of health, he was compelled in July, 1876, to become a Supernumerary, and retired to his native city.

Here he continued to work as he was able until his heavenly. Father was pleased to call him home, and on Nov. 17th, 1877, he peacefully passed to his reward in the 62nd year of his age, and the 33rd of his ministry. "Mark the perfect man and behold the upright; for the end of that man is peace." Ps. 37. 37.

REV. JOHN ELLIS was born Dec. 26, 1846, at Gorland, Donegal Co., Ireland. He came to America in 1858, and, for a time, resided in St. John, N. B., where he was converted under the ministry of Rev. James England, in 1860. In 1871 he offered himself for the ministry of our Church, and being received was allowed to attend our Institutions at Sackville.

For one year he was stationed as assistant on the Bedeque and Tryon Circuit, and for two years, in the same capacity, he laboured with success on the Baie Verte Circuit. He the Circuit, what was his no labor in M of his var Christian all things.

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He then received ordination and was sent to the Dalhousie Circuit, where gracious results attended his ministry. Benton was his next and last circuit. Failure of health interrupted his labor in March 1877. By his pastoral intercourse with the people of his various charges, he won many friends, and by his truly Christian character he adorned the doctrine of God his Saviour in all things.

Early in the Summer he removed to his father's residence in St. Martins, where he died peacefully, on Thursday, July 26th, in the 32nd year of his age, and the 6th year of his ministry.

Pursuant to appointment the Fourth Annual Meeting of the S. School Committee was held in the Methodist Church, Sackville, N. B., July 2nd, 1878, when Rev. J. J. Colter was elected Chairman, Rev. R. Wilson, Secretary, Rev. Isaac Howie, Treasurer.

The whole subject of Sabbath School work was thoroughly discussed, and the following conclusions were unanimously arrived at:

(1.) That in view of the increasingly active efforts put forth by other Churches to reach and gather in the young, it becomes the duty of all our ministers to be more than ever

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careful to seize every opportunity that is presented to foster and build up this important interest of our Church.

- (2.) That we would call attention to the importance of holding regular District Sabbath School Conventions as provided for by the Discipline, in order to provide the best means for the successful carrying on of this difficult but deeply interesting work.
 - (3.) That more attention should be paid to the theological education of our children, and to this end we would urge a more general use of the Catechisms of our Church.
 - (4.) That we think it advisable to hold a public meeting in the interests of Sabbath School work in connection with each Annual District Meeting, similar to that held at the Conference; and that a collection be taken on such occasions in aid of the Funds of the Society.
 - (5.) That following the example of the British Wesleyan Conference, and the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, we think the time has come when some Brother should be set apart to this work, and the Conference is respectfully recommended to give this matter its most serious consideration.

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APPENDIX I.

STANDING ORDERS.

I.—DISTRICT MEETINGS.

The Chairmen of Districts are peremptorily required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several annual and other meetings of the District Committees, financial and ordinary, duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary; one of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records, the second shall be reserved for the use of the Conference, and the third shall be delivered to the Secretary for preservation in the archives of the Conference. Furthermore, it is required that the last mentioned copies be handed in on the forenoon of the day preceding that on which our first preparatory committee meeting may be appointed to be held, that the Secretaries may prepare classified lists of all matters which are to come before the Conference, and thereby expedite business.

2. That as much trouble has been caused at different sessions of Conference in consequence of alterations made in the District Minutes, it is determined that when the Minutes of the several Districts shall have been signed by the Chairmen and Secretaries, they shall not be altered, except by special permission of the Conference.

II.—PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.

That in regard to subscriptions for the Wesleyan, inquiry is to be instituted in the District Committees respectively, as to the fidelity of each brother responsible for the collection of such moneys—the accounts being previously sent to the chairmen, and distributed at the Annual District Meetings.

III .- MISSIONARY LISTS.

Each Superintendent is required to present, at the Annual District Meeting, prepared on foolscap paper and made up in Canada currency, a perfect list of all Missionary moneys collected on his Circuit; and each Chairman is required to present such lists to the Missionary Secretary, in a state ready for publication, on the day previous to the meeting of the Missionary Committee.

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IV .- CHILDRENS' FUND.

The Financial Secretaries of the several Districts are required to send to the Secretary of the Children's Fund, immediately after the Annual District Meeting, the names of all the Ministers in their respective Districts who are claimants upon the Children's Fund for the current year; and to state the number of children for whom allowance is claimed; and, as far as possible, the name and date of birth of each of the said children.

V.-BOOK ROOM ACCOUNTS.

Resolved, That every Minister and Preacher is peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward each year, at or before the meeting of Conference.

VI.—TIME FOR COLLECTIONS IN AID OF THE CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.

Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Fund-

VII.—FINANCIAL ECONOMY.

The Conference recommends to the Quarterly Meetings of the several circuits, the following plan, by which it is hoped they may he more effectually raise the amount necessary to meet the allowance of the ministers and preachers, and which will make the collection of class and ticket money hereafter unnecessary.

- 1. Let the Quarterly Boards at the beginning of each financial year, estimate the amount needed for the year.
- 2. Then ascertain from each member of the church, and, as far as practicable, from each attendant of the congregation, what each purposes to give as his or her weekly or monthly contribution.
- 3. Let these sums be entered by a steward appointed for that purpose in a book which he shall keep as Treasurer of the Quarterly Board.
- 4. If the total amount of these sums does not equal the needed, amount then let the stewards apportion the deficiency

among such as are willing, for Christ's sake, to assume such deficiency, setting down to each person, with his or her consent, the additional amount which they think he or she ought weekly or monthly to pay.

- 5. Let the stewards then adopt and carry out a plan by which every one shall have the opportunity of regularly contributing each week or month, by envelope or otherwise, not grudgingly or of necessity, the sum which has been pledged by him or her. Lea these contributions be paid over regularly to the steward appointed to receive them, and be brought up by him to the quarterly meeting. The said steward shall keep an individual account of all the pledges and contributions, and shall pay over the same, under the direction of the quarterly meeting, to the preacher or preachers authorized to receive them.
- 6. That quarterly meetings adopting the envelope system be recommended not to include in their estimates the claims of Foreign and Home Missions, but to provide for these funds as in times past, by special collections and subscriptions.

7. That in the opinion of this Conference, the minimum

salary of ministers should be \$750. 8. That in the opinion of this Conference, the minimum amount sf young Men's salary should be \$200.

9. That in the opinion of this Conference, the salary of ordained, but unmarried, ministers should be \$520.

10. When a deficiency occurs upon a Circuit having two preachers (a married and a single man), it shall be borne by each, according to a pro rata amount.

VIII.—MINISTER'S REMOVING.

In the case of ministers removing, they shall be held responsible for the supply of the pulpits on the Circuits which they are leaving, for two Sabbaths after the close of the Conference, and shall be required to provide for the pulpits of their new Circuits on the third Sabbath after Conference.

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APPENDIX II.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF THE CONFERENCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK AND PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Dearly Beloved Brethren:

We rejoice to send this our annual greeting, from Sackville, N. B., in which place we-as your ministers-are now assembled. On this spot we are surrounded by several buildings, erected at different periods in our connectional history, for the purpose of giving to a portion of the rising youth of these Provinces, a sound, religious, and yet unsectarian education; and by which already a large number, both male and female, have been sent forth to bless and adorn the homes and professions, not only of these, but of It is likewise worthy of note that the ministers of the Nova Scotia Conference are now in session but a few Our intercourse with these beloved miles from this place. Brethren has been refreshing, and we hope mutually profitable. We have realized the presence of the Divine Master while occasionally mingling together for consultation and worship; and now as we are about to separate to our appointed spheres of labor, we cannot but think of our fathers in this ministry, many of whom since we last held our Conference in this villlage have passed to their reward. And as we clasp hands (perhaps in some instances) for the last time with the Nova Scotia Brethren, our songthough in sadness-is

"Even now by faith we join our hands With those that went before, And greet the blood-besprinkled bands On the eternal shore."

Our resolve is to be "followers of them who through faith and patience inherit the promises." We intend to profit by the teaching of the past—to abide by the old truths—to practice the old methods, and to preach no other gospel than that by which our Fathers won for Christ such signal victories. In our day as in those of the earlier preachers, the truth when proclaimed with

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beautiful simplicity,-with intense yearnings for the salvation of those addressed,-and accompanied by the power of the Holy Ghost, will we believe produce the like results. We wait before God for this unction for souls-for this endowment of power-for this fire baptism, that the word in answer to your prayers, may be effectual "to the pulling down of the strongholds of sin." As Methodists we have already an admirable ecclesiastical organization—a compact brotherhood, and an intense family sympathy, but our faith has no rooting in these things; we also turn with loathing from holy water, candles, and crosses, with all the other sanctified trumpery of an æsthetic ritual, to the Gospel of Jesus Christhave never felt uncertain about that, nor about our duty in relation to it. The Master came not merely to instruct those who flocked to listen to his gracious words,—but came, that there might be a Gospel to preach in this day, and in these the ends of the earth;to that work we are consecrated, and our purpose is to "serve our generation by the will of God."

The Apostle John, in one of his Epistles, speaks of believers as "fellow helpers to the truth," that truth we have, and are pledged to preach it; but Brethren beloved we much need your help in this work, and that help we must have, if the edifice (the foundations of which were laid-near this place-by the Blacks, the Bennetts, and the Marsdens of a former age) is ever to stand entire in the sight of the people. Our ministrations will soon close, and your opportunities for doing good soon end; but what will be our lot in the evermore to which we are all passing, if when the Lord shall come, our work is found-not all done but scarcely commenced? "Time is short," and we all, whether ministers or people, bow in universal assent to the acclamation, "Dust thou art and unto dust shalt thou return." But does that conclude our individual history? No! In every zone, and in every age, the conviction that this life is only preparatory to a new and everlasting existence has ever prevailed. Materialists, both ancients and modern, of all sorts and dimensions, tell us that soul and body are alike in their nature and must perish together. Others, who turn from our evangelical theology, and claim for themselves great license of thought, flout the idea of man being immortal, either in perennial joy or in future sadness; while others admit the imperishibility of the soul in the future history of the good, but deny its

natural in exclusive who thus of the wr utterance immortal thoughts point in in the ca God; her see deatl beggar, perfecte for so gl ships-t and the

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erishy its natural immortality, and regard blessedness in the future life as the exclusive privilege of the righteous. From the teachings of men who thus give us a tortured exegesis of some fragmentary portions of the written Word, we turn to the large, consistent and glowing utterances of Him who "abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel." His sermons abound with thoughts and sayings, which teach us to regard this life as but a point in an unending existence; as the mere bud whose flowerin the case of the holy-shall bloom for ever in the paradise of God; hence he said, "If a man keep My sayings he shall never see death." Death now lays his hand on the brow of king and beggar, of saint and sinner, but Christ tells us of a new, a better, a perfected life. And Brethren, is it not that we may obtain a fitness for so glorious a resting, that we have entered into those relationships—the one to the other, which now obtain between the Pulpit and the Pew, between the Pastor and the Flock,-and thus in our ascending course, to become helpers of each other's faith.

Among the many exhortations of the Great Teacher, in which he insisted upon the religion of the heart beaming out in the life, and in common things, He said, "Let your light so shine before men"-not make or compel it, but let it shine or beam out "that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in Heaven." We would therefore ask, that the religion you profess may be manifest in a faithful discharge of the duties which devolve upon you as ordinary citizens; the higher life may bring us into union with the spiritual and unseen, and the lower life into contact with the things of sense-but both are of God,-fellowship with the invisible when the soul in quiet faith lies hushed before the Lord is our abiding privilege. But for a man not to "provide for his own," is to deny the faith and show himself "worse than an infidel;" but the drudgery of human toil may be so conducted as to leave at the close of the day, the assurance that the work done was required of us. Let those, therefore, who are engaged upon the farm, in mechanical or professional life, throw into their daily business generosity of purpose, and honesty of aim, for there is no greater error than the too prevalent opinion that the legitimate employment of the "bread winner" is that part of life in which Divine light can never shine, much less be guilded with the hope of heaven. "Every creature of God is good, and nothing is to be

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refused, if it be received with thanksgiving, and be sanctified by the Word of God and prayer." The immoralities of trade at a period when competition is the animating spirit of commerce, have too often caused us to blush over the selfishness and frauds of some who we had hoped would rise by the rewards of honest business, to stand abreast with the most successful, in agricultural, mechanical or professional life. But why divest human industry of all that is sacred? and in that way reverse the divine order, which is "Not slothful in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord." Brethren, if the employment in which the Spirit found you, when first He came to illumine and to save, is one on which you can conscientiously implore His blessing from day to day, then let it be so conducted that while it is made to insure you the legitimate rewards of high business qualities, it may likewise be a benefit to all around you.

Wherever God has permitted you to pitch your tent, there let there be an altar, from which both morning and evening there shall ascend the incense of prayer to His holy name. It is said of Abraham, "He will command his children, and his household, after him." This as a duty is still devolved upon christian parents, and of them the Master "seeks a godly seed." Prayer in the family, with the right government of children, will smooth down rising asperities, prevent misunderstanding among the members of the of the homestead; beget, foster and mature true affection among the children, and lead them, when you shall have passed to your rest, to hold and to propagate the faith in which they were instructed while yet young. But to promote the glow and fervor of the religious life, there must be due attention to closet duty; the man who is recreant in this, has no right to expect the open reward which Christ has promised to those who pray in secret places. Hence many yield to the foe in publc during the day, because they had not been girded with power in communion with God at early dawn, and having lost the clew, they wander farther from the right path to their final undoing. But "beloved we are persuaded better things of you, and things that accompany salvation, though we thus speak."

At this period in our history, the religious training of youth in our Sabbath Schools is of the highest importance, the young people of to-day will be the race of to-morrow, the Sunday School

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of the present is to be the Church of the future. And just as we salt the far off fountains of supply, so will be the stream of life in in these Provinces of our Dominion, when the present generation of men shall have passed from their surface. One of the questions of the day is, "how can our Sabbath Schools be made more potent for good," and the answer comes to us not all at once, but little by little, from the many conventions which have been held for the purpose of collecting and propagating the desired information, so that at present, there exists no reason why these Institutious should have merely a feeble existence. Many periodicals are now issuing from the press to assist both teacher and scholar in this work. The "International Bible Lessons" are a much prized compendium, and they monthly sparkle with useful hints,-but that is no reason why the old Catechisms of our Church should be laid aside. Direct questioning stimulates thought, and if the answer be once learned, it may prevent a relapse into error in future years. The theological novelties of the day find the principal number of their abettors among those who were not grounded in the truth while yet young. Therefore let us give all diligence to make our Sabbath Schools, not only in town and village, but in all the settlements of the land, sources of supply to keep up and augment the membership of the Church. To attain the end for which our Sunday Schools exist, Bible classes should be formed where at all practicable. Such classes not only afford opportunities to the more advanced youth youth of our congregations to obtain correct views of saving truth, but are promotive of true piety,-a vague apprehension of the doctrines of "the Book" prevents robustness of spiritual life and usefulness in the Ceurch of God. To Bible Classes we also look for the Local Preachers of the future; we cannot afford to let this class of excellent workers be diminished in number, much less relegated to the limbo of forgotten agencies. Such men have done nobly in the past,—in their ranks we once stood,—and there is a vast field still awaiting their self-denying labours. "The young men should prophesy," and in such preliminary training schools, seek earnestly the best gifts for the still higher work of the ministry, whether Local or Itinerant.

During the year the cause of temperance has been greatly revived in many places, and our desire is that Bands of Hope, and congregational organizations, should be at once formed for the

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purpose of abating the drinking usages, and of sweeping from our land this curse of intemperance. We have no word of commendation, however, for the frivolous sports and pastimes which in some localities have got linked on to the late temperance revival; and our prayer is that from the "Club" there may soon be separated all that is calculated to enervate the man, destroy health, or beget in the rudimental history of our youth, a wish for the higher forms of gambling, with other debasing and sinful courses. Take forms of gambling, with other debasing and sinful courses. Take the religious element from the temperance movement and it is powerless for good; try therefore, in all places where your influence is felt, to make temperance the avenue of a higher, a better, a religious life.

But what we most need at present is individual consecration to God, and then a general endeavor throughout the entire Church, to attain that holiness of heart and life for which the early Methodists were so distinguished. Christian holiness involves the idea of separation to the Lord, and to his service; when attained it resides in the soul of its possessor, and thence projects into the life "Whatsoever things are true, honest, pure, lovely, and of good report. This doctrine in the sense in which it involves privilege and possession, is now receiving much attention among the churches of the land. In the past it was regarded almost exclusively as one of the peculiarities of Wesley, and our pulpits in those days, gave out no uncertain sound upon this subject. But of late the too general absence of living witnesses of its reality, has discouraged its broad and persistent proclamation as the common right through Christ of every believer. But the command, "Be ye holy for I am holy," rings out with more than clarion distinctness from the written word; and Brethren, if ye are called"-at all-"ye are called not unto uncleanness but unto holiness"—if "elected" it is through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience, and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ,"—and if "predestinated" it is to "be conformed to the image of His Son." And that is about all that can be said in relation to the meaning of words which too often have been employed to bolster up opinions, for which there is no warranty in the Word of God. Called, elected, and predestinated, not to heaven irrespective of the meetness for its enjoyment, but to holiness in this life, as the sole preparation for the other in the glory-land beyond. We therefore exhort you to seek this great salvation,-present salvation from inward and outward sin, "And we is a short away to Bro. Wn ness. Ethe genu As a man He rend enjoyed N. S., in the 33rd

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the very God of peace sanctify you wholly. Faithful is he that calleth you who also will do it."

We are glad to be able to say that our Ministerial death roll is a short one for this year, but two of our Brethren have passed away to the rewards of heaven since we last met in Conference. Bro. Wm. McCarty was with us last year, though in great feebleness. He had lived and laboured among us long enough to reveal the genuineness of that piety, which he had obtained in early life. As a man, he was "a workman of whom we were not ashamed." He rendered valuable service to the Church of his vows, and he enjoyed the entire confidence of his brethren. He died at Digby, N. S., in the fall of last year, in the 62nd year of his age, and in the 33rd of his ministry.

John Ellis, a young evangelist, possessing both zeal and ability, was cut down in the midst of his usefulness. He died on the St Martins Circuit, N. B., in July of last year, in the 32nd

year of his age, and the 6th of his ministry.

We are happy to inform you that our Educational Institutions at Sackville, N. B., are in a state of prosperity. The badness of the times—in a business sense—has not lessened the attendance to the extent that was once feared. Recent changes in the staff of officers will, it is hoped, give to the working of these institutions yet greater efficiency, and they still commend themselves to your

patronage and support.

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The Methodist Book Room in Halifax is intended to subserve the interests of our Church in all the Conferences in these Maritime Provinces, and has attained already, under the skillful management of the Book Steward, a high degree of success in the various branches of its legitimate business. This Book Depot is intended to supply to our people, all publications necessary in Sabbath School work, as well as books for the private library, or for family reading. At this office the Wesleyan newspaper is still published, and it is regarded as a necessity in many of the homes of our people, and our hope is that in due time it will be found in all the Methodist families within the bounds of the Conference.

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THE INDIAN MISSIONS.

These are carried on in British Columbia, the North West Territory, Manitoba, and in Ontario and Quebec. They number 43 Missions, in connection with which are 32 Missionaries, with 7 assistants, and they have

Rev. Henry Steinhauer writes from White Fish Lake under date of

"There were nearly a hundred at the communion table last Sunday 3d April, 1877: (Easter). It was a glorious day,—a day of much spiritual enjoyment. If this obscure Mission Station be an oasis in the midst of this moral waste, howling wilderness, it is God's work; therefore, not unto us but unto His name, whom we call Lord and Master, be all the glory, for we only are your servants for His sake. It is God's doing, marvellous in the eyes of outside lookers on, deprecating, as some of these do, of the means eyes of outside lookers on, deprecating, as some of these do, of the means made use of to raise the poor Indian from his degradation, considering him too deeply sunk in depravity to be benifitted by the balm of Gilead and the skill of the Physician there, is not sufficient to reach his case. The tree is known by its fruit. If Facts, however, prove it otherwise. the deprayed heart is changed and renovated by the influence of the Divine Spirit, it is known in the life. Our enemies themselves being judges, what they say of our people prove that Christianity has done a great deal what they say of our people prove that officiality has done a great that for this people; they themselves know it, and often express their heartfelt thankfulness for what God has done for them individually and collectively.

You are aware the great want which is felt here is a new church. Some years ago we collected some timber for building a place wherein to worship God, but not having means sufficient to carry out the work, the thing was dropped, and the timber we collected has most of it gone to

A church we must have. When I mooted the subject to some of my friends here they gave me an incredulous smile, saying, the last thing they ever expect to see at White Fish Lake is a new church. I said nothing. Though I have been laid up a long time during the past winter by illness, however, I went out with my boys to the woods and began to by illness, however, I went out with my boys to the woods and began to cut and square timber, and when I had nearly a sufficient quantity of timbrout and squared, I went off to Edmonton, and after a day's cantass among good friends in that part of the district, I collected in cash and some subscribed, in all the amount of £30 sterling. Yesterday, at the Indian's council, I took the opportunity of saying to the council that, the Indian's council, I took the opportunity of saying to the council that, as we had not our Missionary Meeting at White Fish Lake all the other stations in the district had theirs. I explained to them the depressed state of the Misssionary treasury: that we could not reasonably expect any stations in the district had theirs. I don't know how much we may be able to get altogether. In adopting this method of getting money for to build a church, appropriating Mission money is out of the usual way. If I am doing wrong herein, pray forgive this wrong, and do not allow the Missionarv Board to hang me until after the church is built. As regards our school, I know not what our estimable teacher, Miss Barrett, is going to do, as her three years' term of service at white Fish Lake expires this spring. Whether she goes away or remains a little longer, I can't say, as I cannot get a definite idea of her future movements; at any rate, we are in want of school apparatus, books, stationery, slates, blacklead, slate-pencils, &c., &c.

Rev. Alfred E. Green writes from Naas River, B. C., under date of Sept. 21, 1877:

After receiving my appointment to this distant field, I had two weeks for the *Otter*, which did not leave Victoria till the 3d of August, calling at Departure Bay the following morning. On our way we called at Albert Bay, Fort Rupert, and Bella Bella, where we saw a large number of natives living in heathen darkness (we ascertained from the Hudson Bay Company's servants that they number nearly five thousand souls, who speak one language), without any teacher or missionary. Athirst for the water of life, what a pity that we should have to tell those poor people that our church is too poor to send them the Gospel. O that men and means were ready for the Master's use.

Tye Rev. A. Hall, sent out by the Chvrch of England Missionary Society, and on his way to take charge of the Metlakatlah Mission, was one of the passengers. We had blessed and refreshing seasons while waiting together at a throne of grace. I found at Port Essington that Bro. Crosby had been there, and now an intelligent Indian woman holds a sabbath School among her people, Bro. Crosby supplying her, as she informed me, with cards and books.

We arrived at Fort Simpson on the 7th, and stayed over Sabbath with Bro. Crosby. A great many of their people were from home, as it was in the midst of the fishing season, yet I enjoyed the services much. I was astonished to hear them sing so well; and it is a beautiful sight to see three or four hundred of them with their Bibles in hand all turning to the text, and after the congregation is dismissed, many remaining to read it over till they can pronounce it right.

On Monday, Bro. Crosby and I, with a company of Indians who volunteered to take us, started for Naas by a large canoe. We slept in the canoe at night and arrived at the lower village on the Naas at 4 o'clock the next day "We held service a few minutes after our arrival, and as we stood in that large Indian house (where so many heathen scenes had been) and sang,

"God, our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come,"

the goodness of our God in the past came to our minds, filling our hearts with gratitude, and the promises of our Master came with power to the heart, and we did feel that by simple faith we could trust Him for all the future. The next morning we met the chiefs in council. After a hymn of praise and prayer, Bro. Crosby invited them to speak, and they all expressed themselves as highly pleased with our visit, for they had waited a long time for a Missionary. One old chief, as he leaned upon his staff, said: "I am getting old, my body is getting weaker every day, I am

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Another said, "My heart got very warm last night when I heard God's Word. I heard a little last Spring. I was down the river and saw Mr. Crosby and I took just a little of the good medicine and my heart felt well, but after the Missionary went away I had trouble and my heart got I did bad and my heart got very sick, so I say to myself when the good medicine comes again I will take more of it. Last night I took more of it, now my eyes open and everything looks beautiful." Then as he pointed up the river, he said, "There are ten tribes of people living up there. Missionary, we give them all to you are and the people in the people up there, Missionary; we give them all to you, go and see them, they all want to know the Great Spirit."

We held three services each day and the people attended, and the best of all God was, and is still with us blessing His Word, so that the house was filled with the cries of penitents seeking for salvation, who now stand in class-meeting and say they are happy in Jesus, so that we have a class of twenty members as the first fruits of what we have abundant cause to hope will be a great and glorious harvest.

Rev. Wm. Pollard writes from New Westminster under date of Nov.

Our Indian Missions are making encouraging progress. Bro. Crosby writes, "On my return from Naas I was glad to find a blessed revival 27th, 1877: The people had been so much concerned about their souls that for several days and nights they neither ate nor slept. The church was crowded night and day, and Mrs. Crosby, Miss Knott and Kate, had was crowded night and day, and sired those poor people to Jesus. Since I remined the meetings have been going on twice a day and souls brought to Christ at nearly every meeting. Blessed work

Bro. Green writes as follows:-"The work has been going on wonderfully the last month. of the most wicked men that heathenism can produce, have bowed at the feet of Jesus, and have been made new creatures by his wonderful power and mercy, so that at every service there are those whose hearts are touched by God's Holy Spirit, and are led to renounce their superstitious ways and take the new way, and every day some are coming to ask for advice as to how they may settle old heathen "Potlach" debts, as they want to be Christians.

JAPAN.

In this interesting Mission field we have four devoted Missionaries, Messrs. Cochran, Eby, McDonald, and Meacham. Mr. McDonald, who is a medical man, is just now on a visit to Canada to take a special course of medical study, and then to return to his great work in Japan.

Dr. McDonald has been greatly prospered in his work, and, by the blessing of God, a large and well-organized church has been raised up. There are now several classes, with leaders, stewards, and local preachers, all in a hopeful condition of prosperity. Amongst the local preachers there is on a man of g and earnes tation of th

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and, by the a raised up. ocal preachcal preachers there is one, Yamanaka, at present a candidate for the native ministry, a man of good education, sound judgment, fair addresss, undoubted piety, and earnest zeal. He has the confidence of the church, and a good reputation of them that are without.

Rev. Dr. Wood, the senior Secretary, in a recent address adverted to the fact that it was now only five years since the inception of this undertaking, and already we had four Missionaries there who had succeeded in organizing several congregations and forming several churches composed of native Japanese. Japan contained between thirty and forty millions of a population, and Providence had wonderfully opened and prospered our work there. A native ministry was the hope of Japan and he was thankful to be able to say that several promising young men, men of social and intellectual influence who had not only been converted to Christianity, but who had undergone thorough training and discipline, now offered themselves as candidates for the Christian ministry.

At the Toronto Conference just held, four Japanese candidates for the ministry, all of whom had passed the usual examinations, and whose adaptation and fidelity had been successfully tested, were, on motiou, received as probationers.

One hundred and twenty members were reported in this field of labor.

TO THE GERMANS.

We have six of these missions in the Province of Ontario, with three Missionaries and 266 church members, and the work is growing in interest and importance.

TO THE FRENCH OF QUEBEC.

We have here eight missions with seven missionaries, and 217 members. The importance and value of this work cannot be overestimated, and Christian patriotism demands that it be prosecuted with vigour. There is a growing desire in many parts of the Province for the unadulterated teachings of the Word of Life, and many recent facts afford great encouragement in the work.

MISSIONARY DISTRICTS.

We have also prosperous missions among the English speaking population of British Columbia, Manitoba and Algoma.

From these Districts where we have 24 Missionaries and 1068 members, the most encouraging reports are received from time to time. The claims of this field are of the most imperative character. The Rev. J. Walton writes from Battleford, N. W. T., Jnne 20th, 1877:

"We were nine days reaching Battleford, arriving there on Sabbath, the 16th. To my great sorrow I found at least half of the men away from Battleford cutting timber. There had been over 100 white men here all winter and spring, and could I have reached here in May as intended, would have found all of them at home. However, I had a congregation of over 40 men, morning and evening,

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and great was their delight to hear a sermon and have service. There were a number came out to a Bible-class held in the afternoon. Several young men have spoken to me about deciding for Jesus: but they say, "What are we to do? we have been here more than twelve months, and previous to your arrival had but one sermon preached to us all that time. If we give ourselves up to God's service we shall stand alone without the support of church or minister, and against overwhelming odds. What are we to do when you leave?" I could only tell them of God's ability to keep them, and of the promised grace, and promised also to lay their case before you for consideration. I confess to weeping frequently while listening to the recital of struggles against temptation, of efforts to keep up prayer and reading of God's Word, but how in spite of all they have gone down into the mighty work. how, in spite of all, they have gone down into the mighty vortex of pro fanity and sin. Here are young men who came from religious homes, and from receiving the blessing of Christian parents, and who, for the first time, have come in contact with vice, and profanity, and impurity in all its grosser forms, and they have gone down "like a snow-flake, from heaven to hell"; but, thank Gol, they are not lost to some good influences, for, when on Sunday night I spoke of a mother's prayers as being something they could not forget nor break away from, many were visibly affected. Here are young men who, before they left Ontario and Winnipeg, were members of our church, related to our ministers, and they tell me with tears that they have backslidden, and I do not wonder to the word I know that the fifther convention?" at it when I know that "filthy conversation" and immorality meet them on every hand. Sunday is a day of recreation, for shooting, card-playing and Sabbath-breaking of various kinds. Said a young man on Sunday night: "This has been the first Sunday we have had for a year."

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

The last section of the General Report refers to the Domestic Missions of the several Annual Conferences. Of these there are 416 with 436 missionaries, and 38,709 members.

These missions are scattered throughout all our Conferences and Districts. We have now reached a point where, owing to the distressing embarassment under which many of the brethren in this work are placed, our operations must be restricted and some of these fields be abandoned, unless there be a considerable advance in the receipts of the Society. There is now a demand for such lively interest and sustained effort as obtained during the continuance of our Home Missionary Society in connection with the late Conference of E. B. A., and we strongly commend the matter to the intelligent friends of the Society.

The contributions of this Auxiliary for the year now closing are as follows:
