





Boston, March 7.—There is a lot of romance wrapped up in a grain of salt. John Mills of New York, addressing the Eastern Association of Physics Teachers, told about it.

"Common salt," he said, "the sodium chloride of the chemists, is made up of two atoms, one of sodium and one of chloride. The sodium atom has one planetary electron too many to suit it. Chlorine, on the other hand, has one electron too few for its comfort."

The two atoms meet, the physicist continued, and allow their affinity to assert itself. "So they join forces and become sodium chloride, and in their new arrangement each has its own electrons arranged around it naturally, with the particular electron in question occupying a place of honor from which it could not well be spared."

To give an idea of the comparative size of electrons and atoms Mr. Mills pictured a cube of ordinary air three-eighths of an inch on each side as stretched out until one edge would reach from New York to Cleveland. Then every foot along the way there would be a molecule, but no one could see it because there would be only a few tiny specks, each one of them only one one-hundredth thousandth of an inch across, and moving at a tremendous velocity.





Sir:—I have a warm personal regard for Dr. Ephraim Scott, as well as a profound admiration for his skill as a tactician. He understands the futility of argument, the efficiency of brief, dogmatic and unargued propositions. He is well aware that everyone of the statements contained in his last letter have been answered scores of times. The only one of his twelve "fictions" that is new to me is that which refers to the Student Christian Federation, which Dr. Scott claims to be a separatist movement. The note of the whole recent convention in Toronto was union, not separation.

I beg your permission to express myself briefly on some of the points mentioned by Dr. Scott's letter:

1. It is not the truth—it is pure fiction—to say that the Assembly is the servant nor the master of the Church. It is the Church itself, acting in its representative capacity. The deliverance of the Assembly, arrived at under the due process of reference to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act, is the voice of the Church, and is final.

It is amusing to note that Anti-Unionists claim to be Presbyterians. This is not true. It is pure fiction. They are Congregationalists. Congregationalism has had a great history; but it is not Presbyterianism. The differentia of Presbyterianism is the principle of representative government. To deny this, and to pour contempt on the Chief Court of the Church, is to display ignorance of the constitution and history of the Church of Scotland,

## MAYOR FISHER PRESENTS REPORT

Says Building Inspector is Not a Safe Man to Have in Charge of Inspection of Buildings-The Matter in Commissioner Thornton's

At yesterday afternoon's meeting of the Common Council Mayor Fisher presented a report on the matter of the refusal of the building inspector to grant a permit for repairs to his build-ing in Charlotte street. It was as fol-

lows:

I beg to report: (1) That in compliance with the expressed wish of the council an application was made in writing on 2nd inst. to the building inspector for a permit to repair the building at 96 Charlotte street, and the application, as was the case with the preceding ones, has been refused.

(2) That the building inspector, in refusing to issue the permit, is continuing to act in direct opposition to the legal advice given to him in writing by the city solicitor, advice from whom is constantly being accepted by the members of the council in their departmental affairs.

(8) That the building inspector has, by his present action, shown that he is not a safe man to have charge of the inspection of buildings.

My recommendation is that this report be referred to the Commissioner of Safety with a request to consider same and to report at the meeting of the Council in committee on Thursday next.

work for hundreds of men at Rosyth, Alloa, Granton, Inverkeithing and Bo'ness.

Perhaps the most interesting of the warships to be demolished is the old Dreadnaught. This great ship, which when launched in 1905 heralded the world race in armaments, is ending its days in Inverkeithing Bay. It has been purchased for scrap, but as the present owners have to enlarge their plant, the inctual work of tearing her to pieces has had to be delayed.

Three ships with war records are being broken up at Rosyth. They are the Agincourt, the disw-Zealand and the Princess Royal. The Agincourt is perhaps the best known in the United States. She was built originally for the Brazilian Government, but was sold to Turkey Hefore completion. Then came the World War and she was seized and taken over by Britain—a matter which embarrassed Lord Curzon not a little at the recent Lausanne conference.

The Princess Royal is one of the Lion type of ships and had a large part in the North Sea battles, as did also the New Zealand—the latter being a gift to the Imperial Government before the war from the Government of New Zealand.

NEW ORGANIZATION.

Representatives of all the different transportation companies in St. John were present at a meeting in the Board of Trade rooms last evening, when a new organization was formed to be known as the St. John Transportation Association. A constitution was framed and adopted. The following officers were elected: President, W. M. Collins; vice-president, J. G. Burke; secretary-treasurer, E. S. G. Hansen; executive committee, C. H. Scott, J. Lord, J. R. Wood and J. H. McIntyre. The object of the association is to promote harmonious action and intercourse of its fitembers and, to deal with all questions affecting the welfare and efficiency of transportation, and also to work in harmony with the Board of Trade in all matters pertaining to the interests of the city and the Port of St. John.
