PREDICT REVOLT OF THE PEASANTS ALL OVER RUSSIA

Already is Spreading in Some Parts of Country

Big Guns in Use Near Petrograd—Kronstadt Being Bombaraded—Warsaw Hears of Soviet Government Being Overthrown.

London, March 8.—A despatch to the London Times from Warsaw says a peasant revolt of unusual proportions is spreading in the governments of Tambov, Voronezh and Kursk, under the leadership of Antonoff, a former regimental commander of the Red army, according to General Borzavkoff, head of the former Russian proletarian committee here and political adviser to General Blakovich, Finnish leader.

Antonoff's forces have seized Czestoch, an important railway junction in Tambov, co-operating with General Makhov, Ukrainian anti-Bolshevik leader.

"These revolts are premature and may be suppressed," said Savinkoff yesterday. "But even if they do not succeed, there is not the slightest doubt that because of the beginning of the summer there will be a peasant outbreak on a large scale all over Russia. The success of this uprising will depend upon whether the Red army can be used to suppress it. That is not very likely at present. The cavalry is dependable, but the moral of the infantry is very bad. Certain divisions, at any rate, would not fight insurgents.

"I do not expect peasant armies to be formed which will march on Moscow and Petrograd to overthrow the government, but if local revolts of village populations are repeated all over Russia, the towns will certainly follow suit and eject the communists from power."

Allied Troops Occupy Cities on Rhine to Enforce Demands

BRITISH, BELGIAN AND FRENCH FORCES IN DUSSELDORF AND DUISBURG

Allied Rhine Flotilla Takes Possession of Ruhrort—German President Says "Imperial Government Will Not Rest Until the Foreign Power Yields Before Our Right."—London Paper in Critical Review.

Mayence, March 8.—British, Belgian and French troops entered Dusseldorf this morning.

French and Belgian troops occupied Duisburg at noon.

The Allied Rhine flotilla took possession of Ruhrort.

Mayence, March 8.—Occupation of the additional German territory, which the Allies had announced they would take possession of for Germany's failure to meet the Allied reparations demands was carried out today. No untoward incident marked the eastward move of the Allied troops, so far as reports up to a late hour showed.

The occupation of the city of Dusseldorf, the largest of the cities taken by the Allies, was completed this morning and that of Duisburg and Ruhrort, comprising together the chief port of the Ruhr coal and industrial region, this afternoon.

The entire movement was effected in a way to obviate, so far as possible, a show of force, but the French and British Rhine flotillas were prepared for eventualities.

The troops moved forward both afoot and on board French and British river craft. The Belgian troops entered Dusseldorf by way of the bridge across the Rhine.

The French and British proceeded by way of the Cologne bridgehead, marching along the east bank of the Rhine and entering Dusseldorf from the south and east.

Ebert's Protest.

Berlin, March 8.—Frederick Ebert, the German imperial premier, declared in a proclamation issued today that Germany was not in a position to use force to oppose the forcible methods of the Allies in occupying additional German territory, but she nevertheless protested vigorously against the Allies' move. In his proclamation, addressed to his "fellow citizens," Ebert said that the Allies' move was not in a position to oppose force with force.

We are defenceless.

"Nevertheless we can cry out so all that still all who recognize the voice of righteousness may hear. Right is being down-trodden by might.

The whole German people is suffering with those of our citizens who are forced to suffer foreign domination. With firm bonds, must this sorrows unite in one sentiment, one will.

"Fellow citizens, meet this foreign domination with grave dignity. Maintain an upright demeanor. Do not allow yourselves to be driven into committing ill-considered acts. Be patient and have faith.

"The imperial government will not rest until the foreign power yields before our right."

BADLY BURNED IN EXPLOSION

Young Men Experimenting With Tank of Gasoline Are at Death's Door—One Lit a Cigarette and Accident Resulted.

Montreal, Que., March 8.—Roméo Barret, aged 30, of 10 Suzanne street, and Henri Picard, 21, of 31 Vitre street, East, were badly burned last night when a tank of gasoline which they were experimenting for the purpose of increasing the strength of volatile essence, exploded when one of the victims lighted a cigarette.

Early this morning the last rights of the church were administered to Barret, who was not expected to live. Barret's condition is also regarded as critical.

One of the rooms of the house was severely damaged by the explosion and subsequent fire, and the premises underneath and next door suffered from smoke and water when the firemen were called to extinguish the fire.

SAYS HON. M. W. DOHERTY HAS NO RIGHT TO ATTEND

London Post Wants Embargo On Overseas Ministers Interfering With English Questions.

London, March 8.—(Canadian Associated Press)—In addition to maintaining an embargo against Canadian live cattle, the London Morning Post would place an embargo on overseas ministers interfering with English questions.

The Post says that there was a meeting last night in London between the British minister in Ottawa, Mr. Manning W. Doherty, and Mr. Lord Beaverbrook, minister of agriculture for Ontario, to discuss a meeting called for tonight by the Canadian minister.

The Post says the meeting is calculated to exert an influence upon the imperial government and compel them to modify their declared policy.

"Therefore," the newspaper declares, "Mr. Doherty will associate himself with political action here, a proceeding so obviously improper that we can only suppose that the minister from Ontario had not understood to what he is being called."

Atter Beaverbrook.

The Post adds that if Mr. Doherty merely came to England to tell the people the Canadian cattle are free from disease, he might have spared himself the journey, because this information does not need his personal confirmation.

The Daily Express refers this morning to a meeting yesterday when Hon. Lord Law received several Unionist leaders, who, according to the Westminster Gazette, wanted Mr. Law to excommunicate Lord Beaverbrook for his part in the Dudley election. The Express says there was complete silence on this matter.

Hon. Law, according to the Express, told the Unionist leaders, that at present he could see no alternative to coalition government, a statement which was received with a murmur.

Sir Edward Carson, who presided, made a similar statement on the political situation.

NATIONALISTS OCCUPY BATUM

Belief That This Will Make It Impossible for Reds to Control Armenia.

Batum is a strong fortified seaport on the eastern shore of the Black Sea, and one of the chief shipping points for petroleum products in the Caucasus region of Russia.

It formally was a Turkish possession, but was ceded to Russia in 1878. Some 6000 men are garrisoned there, and the Bolshevik forces in Caucasus region were attempting to reach Batum before the Turkish Nationalists occupied the city.

Batum is the chief avenue of supply for Armenia, and it has been declared that if the city should be in control of the Nationalists, Russia's occupation of Armenia would be impossible.

NEW LIQUOR CONTROL ACT

May Be Passed Soon in British Columbia—Beer Clause Remains Centre of Interest.

Victoria, B. C., March 8.—There is a fair possibility of the new liquor control bill being passed in the legislature by the end of the week. The bill is now ready for discussion in committee. The "beer clause" remains the center of interest. Now the non-party vote on this section will come out in a matter of conjecture. Some beer advocates in the House will move it and members will vote as they please. It is said that most of the independents are, however, reported in favor of beer. Some liberals, however, have not declared their opinions and in view of the change of a close vote, the outcome is somewhat uncertain.

FARMERS' PRODUCT SET AS TO PRICE

Hon. Mr. Crerar Favors Greater Encouragement of Trade With United States—Would Close Unprofitable Rail Lines.

Montreal, March 8.—(Canadian Press)—Speaking at a Canadian Club luncheon here Hon. T. A. Crerar, chief of the National Progressive party, said that the farmers' product was set as to price in competition with the entire world, and they believed that the price for the equipment necessary for such production should also be fixed in competition with the world.

He favored greater encouragement of trade with the United States and advocated a reevaluation of the national raw wool system and the closing down of lines that did not offer sufficient inducement to operate them. He strongly urged vigorous immigration policy and the settlement of large numbers of newcomers along the national railway lines.

IN PARLIAMENT

Ottawa, Ont., March 8.—(Canadian Press)—Yesterday in the House of Commons: The premier announced that the government was being kept informed of the negotiations between the Allies and Germany.

There was considerable discussion in committee on a government bill to amend the acts regarding the inspection of gas and oil meters. Progress was reported.

A bill to amend the executor court act went through committee and stands for third reading.

Major G. G. Power of Quebec, Qc., moved that amounts may be deducted from soldier's pension payment, at the discretion of the pensioner, and applied to insurance premiums under the returned soldiers' insurance act.

The premier stated that the government intends to move for the appointment of a parliamentary committee on the re-establishment along the lines of last year's committee.

Subsequently there was an animated discussion on a further motion by Major Bay, St. John, N. B., who asked the government to provide for the pensioner to be the widowed mother of a deceased soldier, irrespective of her income, whether or not she has other living children. This motion was also withdrawn. The House adjourned at 10:30 p. m.

TWO STOCKS AT THE LOWEST POINT ON MONTREAL MARKET

Montreal, March 8.—The trading on the local stock exchange during the first half hour this morning was extremely weak, two new lows being registered both in prominent issues, viz., National Breweries and Spanish River. The former, after closing at 42.38 yesterday afternoon, sagged to 40.14 this morning, which represents the lowest this issue has yet descended to. Spanish dropped from its closing level at 69.78, which likewise is a new low. Atlantic Sugar and Brailian were both steady at 30 and 33 respectively. Brompton weakened five-eighths of a point to 34.88, while Laurentide dropped a half to 82.75. Other leaders did not put in an appearance during the early trading.

BOOST SALARIES FOR THEMSELVES

Members of Toronto Council Increase Their Stipend—The Increase is Large.

Toronto, Ont., March 8.—Members of the Toronto city council last night voted themselves big increases in salaries. The controllers' salaries at present are each and are being advanced to \$5,000. The present salaries of aldermen are \$3,000 each, but they are to be \$3,500.

The mayor's salary remains at the \$7,500.

ALBERTA HAS BIG SURPLUS

Total Revenue in 1920 Was \$10,919,776.08, Nearly Half a Million More Than Expenditures.

Edmonton, Alta., March 8.—Alberta closed the year of 1920 of an actual surplus of \$406,420.07 on ordinary income accounts, according to Hon. Mr. Mitchell, provincial treasurer, who tabled the public accounts in the legislature today.

Total revenue in 1920 reached \$10,919,776.08, while the ordinary expenditures were \$10,483,356.01. The surplus in 1919 was \$216,090.78.

The provincial telephone department shows a net profit of \$34,610.02; net expenditure is given as \$5,544,067.70 on income account and \$2,141,918.85 on capital account, a total of \$7,685,986.55.

"Then I see only one thing to do," remarked Mr. Briand quietly. "What's that?" inquired Mr. Lloyd George.

"For the French delegation to take the next train for Paris," replied Mr. Briand.

"The Belgian delegation will leave for home tonight," added M. Jaspard, the foreign minister.

"Don't be too hasty," said Lloyd George with one of his winning smiles.

"I was only discussing hypothesis. It clarifies the judgment to examine all sides of a question."

Lloyd George and M. Briand really got on admirably together, they are fellow low cots and not unlike each other in temperament. They both arrived at the conclusion that what the German government and people required was an order that would be obeyed; that otherwise Germany would wear down the Allies by continually shifting the basis of negotiation.

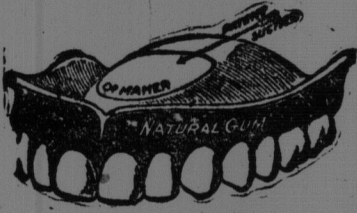

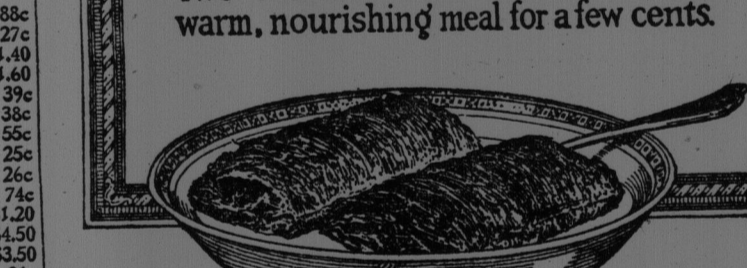

THE AMERICAN TARIFF

The portion of President Harding's inaugural address which bears most directly upon Canadian interests is his reference in general terms to the tariff legislation which his administration favors.

Mr. Harding says he recognizes that the United States cannot sell largely in foreign markets unless it buys largely there, but he intimates that his administration will increase the tariff.

It has been proved again and again that we cannot, while throwing our markets open to the world, maintain American standards of living and opportunity and hold our industrial empires in such unequal competition.

The inference generally drawn from these words is that although the Fordney bill was vetoed by the retiring president and the House of Representatives failed to pass it over the veto, the incoming administration will introduce heavier duties some of which may seriously affect the sales of Canadian natural products in the American market.

The Fordney bill was not put forward in good faith. It represented an attempt on the part of the high protectionists to commit the American farmers to the policy of protection, in the hope of enlisting their support for higher duties against foreign manufacturers.

Mr. Wilson, in the message which he delivered to the American Congress some food for thought which may not be entirely lost upon the incoming House and Senate.

Mr. Wilson pointed out that Canadian wheat, strictly speaking, did not compete with but merely supplemented the American crop, for the American demand has been for special kinds of foreign wheat to meet particular milling and planting needs.

In spite of this warning the Harding administration will probably go on for higher duties, and its policy may affect Canada adversely. This country, however, will find markets for its natural products, and though the Harding tariff may subject us at first to some loss and inconvenience its probable effect will be to raise the cost of living in the United States and to limit the export trade which is so vital to the American people.

The Allied forces of occupation are in Düsseldorf this morning. This time they will stay until Germany shows a sincere willingness to take its medicine. The victors, not the vanquished, have decided what Germany must do. And there is no appeal.

THE FEDERAL ELECTIONS

The western provinces look forward naturally to a considerable increase in their representation at Ottawa as a result of this year's census, and they would be glad to have redistribution before the elections are brought on, if that would not involve too great delay.

That the government may survive this session is possible, but the odds against it remaining in office until the termination of the regular five-year term are very heavy.

The majority of twenty-five secured in the Commons yesterday morning against Mr. King's motion of non-confidence was not an expression of the popular will. They may have succeeded in deceiving themselves, but they need be under no illusion as to what the people of Canada think about their action.

INFLUX OF AMERICAN LABOR TO MEXICO

Presence of Foreigners Said to Be Working a Hardship on Natives.

Mexico City, Feb. 20.—(A. P. by mail).—An influx of American labor to Mexico, especially to the oil regions, is causing much concern to government officials, who are receiving complaints daily from Mexican workers' organizations that the presence of the foreigners is working a hardship on native labor.

It is asserted that unemployment in the United States has caused thousands of Mexicans to return to the republic, many of them in destitute circumstances. Arriving here they find large numbers of Americans holding the jobs which, they declare, rightfully belong to them.

Washington, March 8.—Social and diplomatic Washington looks for a revival under the President and Mrs. Harding of the formal state dinners and other social functions at the White House, which ceased with the entrance of the United States into the world war.

Directions from Mr. Harding for abandonment of the official social events incident to his inauguration were cancelled by those hoping for a return to the social normalcy to be a blow to their expectations, but the recent shopping trip made by Mrs. Harding to New York and other events have renewed their optimism.

Whether the President and Mrs. Harding will revive the state dinners remains to be developed. Four of these usually are given each season, one to the cabinet, one to the diplomatic corps, one to the judiciary and one to congressional leaders.

Greater participation by the White House in society is expected to be attended by removal of many of the restrictions which since 1917 have barred uninvited visitors from the White House grounds. Since the United States entered the war, the regular Tuesday cabinet meetings, it is also reported that she will restore the custom of Marine Band concerts on the White House grounds.

President Harding's friends declare that orders for the opening the gates to the grounds will be issued in the near future, and it is regarded as assured that they will not be revived, at least, until next winter.

SMALL SIZED ARMY ON HUGE PATRONAGE ROLL

President Harding Will Appoint 50,000 to Public Offices—Salaries Will Aggregate Over \$100,000,000.

(The Associated Press.) Washington, March 8.—Upwards of 50,000 appointments to public offices carrying salaries aggregating more than \$100,000,000 a year are to be made by President Harding. Some of these have already been made, many others will be announced during the next few months, while still others will be made as the terms of present Democratic office holders expire.

The first fruits from the shaking of the official "plum" tree were cabinet officers whose salaries are \$10,000 a year each. Others to be named include newly appointed ambassadors whose salaries are \$17,500 each, many ministers at \$10,000 each, assistant secretaries, federal judges, attorneys and marshals, customs collectors, members of various government boards and commissions and postmasters by the thousands.

In contrast to the huge patronage roll of Mr. Harding are the appointive perquisites of Vice-President Coolidge, whose immediate appointments comprise only his secretary, clerks, page boy and a private telegraph operator. Their salaries total \$7,700 a year. The vice-president himself receives \$15,000.

Among ministers now holding office who have come up from the ranks in diplomatic service are William Phillips at The Hague; Hugh Gibson, at Warsaw; Richard Crane, at Prague; Joseph G. BREAKWATER EXTENSION TO COMMENCE SOON

It is understood that work on the extension of the breakwater at St. John harbor, from the west side of the port to Partridge Island, will be commenced in the spring, according to a Canadian Press dispatch from Ottawa, and that the call for tenders will be issued in the immediate future. The agitation for this breakwater extension has been continuing for more than a quarter of a century, the dispatch adds.

WHAT NEW BRIDGE WILL LOOK LIKE

A beautiful reinforced concrete arch bridge visible from all sides and providing a dignified and becoming gateway to the city at the southern end of Douglas avenue, probably would be the city's solution of the problem of connecting Douglas avenue with the highway bridge over the reversing falls if the proposed new railway bridge is not raised, said George N. Hatfield, road engineer in a lecture which he delivered at the Rotary club luncheon in Bonds yesterday.

The arch bridge, he said, would be built about 100 feet east of the point where the most of the line of Douglas avenue to the east, Mr. Hatfield said, would give a much better visibility for people driving both towards the bridge and towards the city as it would make the curve connecting Douglas avenue and the Highway bridge much less sharp than at present.

The grade from the proposed bridge down to the present highway bridge would be about five and one-half per cent, and that from the proposed bridge back to the present level of the point on Douglas avenue from which the road would rise to the new arch would be about three and one-half per cent, Mr. Hatfield said.

The proposed change would raise the problem of connecting Chesley street with the highway bridge but for the present the street would be practically as it now is. One solution would be to take the bend out of it by running the road straight through from the highway bridge to a point several hundred feet back on the present line of Chesley street. It is also suggested that the bridge might be connected with Merritt street.

Mr. Hatfield gave the dimensions of the new railway bridge and discussed the amount of clearance under the new bridge in its relation to the clearance under the existing highway bridge.

The central span in the new cantilever will be 150 feet in length and under practically the whole length of this span there will be a clearance of 84 feet six inches above mean sea-level which is two and one-half feet more than the clearance under the present cantilever bridge.

The clearance under the centre line of the present highway bridge is nine feet six inches and for about twenty-five feet on each side of this centre line there is a clearance of ninety feet or more.

In practice, however, only the clearance to the west of the centre line of the highway bridge will be of use to vessels passing under the bridge because they are obliged, on account of Split Rock, to keep over to the west of the mid-line of the highway bridge, Mr. Hatfield said.

John Kimball was chairman of the gathering and, at the conclusion of Mr. Hatfield's address, tendered the latter the thanks of the Rotary club for his address.

NORTH POLE GETS MOST SUNSHINE

Enjoys a Week More Than the Equator, Says Lecturer in Toronto.

(Canadian Press Limited) Toronto, March 8.—"The sun shines longer on the North Pole than any other place in the world," Horace L. Seymour, Town Planning Engineer, who delivered a lecture here recently.

From figures recently furnished by Mr. Connor of the Meteorological office the speaker said he was able to state that the North Pole enjoyed about a week's more sun shine than the equator, and that in the latitude of Toronto it was possible to receive some thirty or forty more hours of sun shine than at the equator throughout the year.

Mr. Seymour's subject was "Town Planning" which he covered in a general manner but treated in some detail the matter of "Planning for Sun Light". He showed that Toronto last year had actually 2045 hours of sun shine or about 46 per cent of the possible varying from over 60 per cent in some months to less than 15 per cent. In December last, he explained the effect of the sun's altitude in relation to the actual amount of sun shine received and to the intensity of the sun shine enjoyed. While the North Pole might receive the most sun shine throughout the year, what is actually received at the earth's surface would be considerably diminished on account of clouds and climatic conditions and the sun's rays would not be very strong. The records show that the interior of continents and especially on high plateaus are the localities best favoured with actual sun shine.

"What did Toronto do with the 2045 hours of sunshine that she enjoyed last year?" queried the lecturer. The best location of detached free standing dwellings as well as attached high buildings was discussed at some length by Mr. Seymour. From studies on the subject, he referred to numerous authorities, and he said that he had come to the conclusion in his Town Planning work that for residential areas streets should preferably run north-east and south-west and north-west and south-east. For intensive city developments, on the other hand, he showed that blocks should be long and narrow with main streets running north and south. While explaining that there are many factors that may

MANY LABOR DISPUTES IN 1920

Greatest Number in History of Great Britain—1,930,000 Work People Were Involved.

London, March 8.—(By Canadian Press)—There was a greater number of labor disputes, causing stoppages of work, in Great Britain in 1920 than in any previous year in the country's history, according to an official report which has just been issued through the Labor Gazette.

No less than 1,715 labor disputes began in 1920. The total number of work-people involved in these disputes (including those thrown out of work at the establishments where the disputes occurred) was about 1,930,000 and a further 90,000 were involved in disputes in progress in 1920 which began in 1919. The aggregate loss of working days in all disputes in 1920 was about 27,000,000. These totals are smaller than those for 1919," the Gazette explains, "but the number of work-people involved is greater than that for any year prior to 1919, and the aggregate loss of working time shown is greater than in any year except 1919 and 1918."

Wage increases accorded to 7,600,000 workers in 1920 amounted to 4,893,000 pounds per week—a record; for 1919 the corresponding figures were 3,160,000 workers and 2,432,000 pounds.

In 1918 some 6,500,000 work-people received increases amounting to about 7,200,000. In this connection the Gazette remarks:

"The increase in numbers in 1920 as compared with 1918 is partly accounted for by the rise in the numbers employed in various industries as a result of demobilization and by the fact that, owing to the improvement in the numerical strength of the workers' organizations, larger numbers are affected by the changes in wages negotiated by such organizations, which form the great bulk of the changes recorded by the minister of labor. But, even when due allowance has been made for these two factors, it is evident, from the great rise in the aggregate amount of increase recorded, that 1920 was a year of unprecedented advance in money rates of wages. It should be observed, however, that owing to the serious decline in employment in the closing months of the year actual weekly earnings in many industries were

considerably lower at the end of 1920 than at the beginning of the year."

Following on the large reduction in 1919 in the hours of the working week, there was a further fall of 2,685,000 hours in 1920, the changes affecting 560,000 work-people whose recognized full-time working week was reduced by an average of 87 hours. The outstanding reductions resulted by the adoption of a forty-four hour week in the building trades in those districts in which it was not already in force, and of a forty-eight-hour week for the work-people in the wholesale clothing industry.

The remaining three stranded sailors got away last evening to their homes in Montreal, from the Seaman's Institute. Funds for these men's passage were secured by the immigration authorities.

GROCERY REPORTS

The following comment on the market situation as regards food stuffs appeared in the Canadian Grocer last week: A great deal of interest is being centered in the sugar market since the Cuban crop has been placed into the hands of the commission for marketing. The commission is fully functioning, and some heavy transactions have taken place both to American and Canadian refineries. Another interesting point is that Australia has purchased some 155,000 tons at 40 cents f. o. b. Cuba. It is also reported that Japan has secured 600 tons on the same terms. The price paid by the Canadian refineries was 4 1/2 cents c. and f. or 5.77 duty paid. The harvesting of the Cuban crop is well advanced and there is now ready for immediate shipment in Cuban ports 416,211 tons plus 101,847 tons of sugar in transit. The total of 517,558 tons. The visible production in Cuba to February 19 is 656,326 tons against 1,077,219 tons to corresponding date last year. Refined sugar is in fair consumption here and all refineries are fairly well kept up and price cutting for the present is not expected.

Generally speaking, the markets for general grocery commodities show few price changes of any amount, and a firmer feeling prevails in many lines. Tea, coffees and allied items are decidedly strong with prices in primary markets higher and stocks in Canada are

iron washers. Prices of pipe fittings have been further revised and show some lower prices. Lead traps and bends are quoted at a lower level. The lighter grades of corrugated sheet are reduced in price, and lower quotations are made on English standard galvanized sheets. Boiler tube prices are lower and are made in prices, lead having declined on all markets. In the primary iron and steel markets there is no increase of activity reported and further price cutting is reported on the part of the independent steel mills in the United States. The lower quotations are largely on black and galvanized sheets, less on plates and shapes and bars, and. Wholesalers report a slight increase in business and a little more activity in spring and summer lines, although orders are smaller in size than usual at this season.

IDENTITY OF SOLDIER WILL NEVER BE KNOWN

Explains How Choice Was Made From Hundreds of Thousands — Work on Graves.

(Canadian Press, Limited.)
Ottawa, March 7.—(By Ottawa Bureau.)—There is not the slightest possibility that the remains of the empire's unknown soldier, now resting in Westminster Abbey, will ever be identified. Captain the Reverend M. Mullineux, M. C., now at the Chateau, made this very clear when he explained to newspaper

men recently how the soldier was chosen from the hundreds of thousands of unknowns, who gave life for the cause.


Wise precautions were taken in this direction and the consequence is that any mother or wife whose son or husband was numbered among the unknown dead on the battlefields of any of the fighting fronts may cherish the hope that the ashes of her hero rest beside those of England's honored dead to be a subject of reverence and respect for generations yet unborn.

Captain Mullineux is a member of the directorate of the Graves Registration and Enquiries Board, whose function it is to check the graves of soldiers. It was created by the war department of the imperial government and has already done much valuable work. Captain Mullineux is also the agent of the Canadian and New Zealand Red Cross Society entrusted with the duty of assisting relatives of deceased soldiers to locate the bodies of their dead.

The selection of the unknown soldier whose body now rests in Westminster was made from a number of bodies of unknowns, one taken from each fighting front. These were assembled at a central spot in France and confined, the coffins being identical in appearance. From the eight or nine bodies so chosen three were selected. Another selection committee then picked one from the three, and this was taken to Paris and

finally formed the central figure of London's mournful but impressive pageant. Captain Mullineux was present at the ceremony of interment in the Abbey and describes it as unforgettable. Speaking of the work being done on the graves of soldiers in France and Flanders, Captain Mullineux said that there are some 1,500 cemeteries in which empire dead are buried. There are no distinctive Canadian cemeteries, the men being buried in the cemetery nearest to the scene of death. Three cemeteries are complete with the graves in shape, the memorials erected and ready for inspection. Some fifty others are nearly completed.

The work of caring for the graves of the soldiers is done by the Imperial War Graves Commission and has been going on practically since the signing of the armistice. The process followed converts each grave from a mere heaped mound identified by a peg bearing a series number of the grave's occupants, to a finished, sodded, flower-growing plot, each bearing its stone headstone. The cemeteries are walled or fenced whichever proves to be best in the case. At one end of each cemetery is the stone of Remembrance bearing the inscription "Their name liveth for evermore" and at the other the Cross of Sacrifice. All cemeteries are identical in general design.



WOMAN JUROR GIVES HER VIEWS

Impressions Formed by Her at British Murder Trial
None Were "Nervy"—Should Certainly Be More Than One Female on Panel.

London, Feb. 18.—(Correspondence)—An English jury which included three women returned a verdict of guilty at Bucks Assizes against Geo. Arthur Bailey, charged with poisoning his wife at Little Marlow.

One of the jurywomen, Miss Tack, (who manages a farm with her sister and brother), has written her impressions and emotions during the five day's ordeal. After serving on this murder trial at Aylesbury my experience leads me to the belief that women should always serve on a trial no matter how grave the offence, if the law calls upon them to do so. I am the "sister" of a farmer, and with another sister we run the farm. It is our own, and our experience has

brought us in contact with most of the phases of life in its realities. I am naturally proud that I should be one of the first Englishwomen to share the privileges of serving on a jury and exercise my capabilities in endeavoring to serve an English court of justice in the way that men have done during many generations. I say this although I have never taken part officially in any feminist movement, nor have I been active in any suffragette cause. I took my stand in the jury box because I was called upon to do so, and felt it my duty and privilege to respond. None of them "Nervy"

To the many thousands of women who will read these impressions let me say at once that I have never been in a police court before; but having experienced five days of the ordeal of this trial, I could go through it again, and unless they are very nervous there is no reason why women should not be called upon to take part in trials.

"None of us were very 'nervy' but there is one thing I feel bound to air a grievance about, and that is that the seats were not comfortable. Hour after hour we sat, and the longer we listened the harder seemed the seats.

Although we were secked-up from the outside world, there is a distinct reason for this, and in spite of personal inconvenience of this, let me say for the benefit of other women who may have the honor to perform the same duty that it is very necessary that the opinion of a jury should be kept a secret. There is an old saying that "women will talk." To prevent any possibility of women or men talking about such grave matters in the course of a murder trial it is obvious that the men and the women should be kept in the closest confinement.


Need of Company.
Certainly there is this point to be made. If women are placed on a jury there should be more than one, because there is the likelihood of long hours as we had, and the necessity for mutual discussion. One naturally asks: What are the emotions of a woman who takes part in such a terrible affair as this? Let me say frankly that when the fatal word "guilty" was uttered I faced the prisoner, and I am bound to admit he kept his countenance well.

It was not a thing I liked. Especially did I feel hurt at some phases of the trial, and the emotions through which we passed were so poignant that I would suggest, as my personal opinion, that only women of mature age should be called to undertake the responsibilities of a long trial.

Mature Age and Judgment.
My age is forty-eight. I believe that at such an age one's mind is settled and experienced, and I consider that women should be found about the age of fifty before they serve on such cases. I am bound to confess that throughout the trial I was very interested, and not bored by legal detail for a moment. 





BUSINESS NOTE.

Announcement of an important business association was made this morning when it became known that the firm of J. A. Grant & Co., engineers and contractors, had formed an affiliation with the world-famous English firm of Pearson Son & Partners. The best known work of the latter firm in America is the building of the Pennsylvania railway tunnels at a cost of approximately \$20,000,000. They also did extensive work in Chile. The new firm is J. A. Grant & Co., Ltd., and S. Pearson Son & Partners (Canada) Limited.

CONVENTION OF FARMERS AND DAIRYMEN

The 45th Annual Gathering Was Opened Today in Fredericton.

Fredericton, N. B., March 8—With attendance of upwards of twenty-five delegates the 45th annual convention of the New Brunswick Farmers and Dairymen's Association opened here this morning, with H. H. Magee, of Quispamsis, in the chair.

John Woods, drainage superintendent of the department of agriculture spoke on "under drainage." He advocated the use of clay tiles but said he would not discourage those farmers who were remote from railway stations from adopting the open drainage system as it was better than none.

F. H. Walsh, treasurer, of Middle Cove, thought that it was about time that the government should find some way of getting a cheaper tile. He said farmers had to send out of the province for tiles they wanted and had to pay a high freight rate. It was all right, he said, that the farmers needed under drainage but he would like to know where the money was coming from.

Mr. Woods said that in Prince Edward Island and Ontario the governments loaned money for such purposes on easy terms.

W. W. Hubbard of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Lower Fredericton, said that in the long run he had found the tile system cheaper than wood or stone, and said that the under drainage had given great benefits.

M. A. MacLeod, superintendent of agricultural societies, said that in order to have good crops the ground must be under-drained, and if it could not be done by clay tiles, the question of using stone should be discussed.

Tonight there will probably be 800 or more delegates in attendance. The convention will continue until Thursday night.

PEOPLE NOT SO KEEN ON TRIAL OF ST. PIERRE

Case Opened in Edmundston This Morning—Much Different Than in November.

(Special to Times.)

Edmundston, N. B., March 8—The case of the King vs. William St. Pierre, charged with the murder of Miss Minnie Stevens, was opened here this morning before Judge Chandler in the Kings Bench Division of the Supreme Court. The prosecution is being conducted by Hon. J. J. Byrne, attorney-general, while A. T. Leblanc and Max D. Cormier are conducting the defence. The grand jury were called. They are Elude Albert, St. Francis; Arthur Flourde, St. Hillaire; Francis H. Cyr, St. Francis; Edouard, St. Basile; Leon Boudreau, Edmundston; Philippe Roy, St. Basile; Paul Gervais, St. Leonard; Fortunat Cyr, St. Hillaire. Four of the jury were absent. The judge issued an order to summon four additional jurors. After the panel had been filled Leon Boudreau was elected foreman. The additional jurors were Levite Mornesault, Pascal Sirote, J. B. Gaurin, J. Senezy.

Interest in the case had subsided to a great extent and the court presented a much different aspect from what it did last November, when the preliminary hearing took place. Entry was gained only by ticket issued by Sheriff J. H. Pelletier, so many being allowed from each parish. After the judge had been charging the grand jury for an hour adjournment was taken at one o'clock for lunch.

DR. A. B. ATHERTON DEAD IN SAN DIEGO

Was Prominent Fredericton Physician and Once Ran Election in York.

Fredericton, N. B., March 8—Dr. A. B. Atherton, for many years a practicing physician and surgeon in Fredericton, died yesterday in San Diego, Calif., where he had been residing for five years.

Dr. Atherton, who was 78 years old, was born at Queensbury, York County. For some years, he practised in Fredericton and then in the late eighties removed to Toronto where he practised for eleven years before returning to Fredericton to resume practice here. In 1911 he unsuccessfully contested York County in the federal general election in the liberal interests.
