Seely Resigns War Post; Asquith Takes His Place

Week Opens With Happenings of Importance in London

FRENCH AND EWART BOTH TO GO

Their Resignations Accepted, is Cable Report—Sessions of Cabinet Followed By Visit of Premier to King George—Home Rule Bill Second Reading Tomorrow—Asquith Now Must Stand For Re-Election

GIST OF HOME RULE NEWS

Seely resigns from government and resignation is accepted.

Premier Asquith takes post of secretary for war.

Resignations of French and Ewart reported definite.

London, Eng., March 30.—Colonel Seely's resignation has been accepted.

This was the euphemistic expression employed by Premier Asquith in announcing to the House of Commons today that his war secretary had paid the penalty of his indiscretions in adding to a cabinet document the two paragraphs which have aroused such feeling as to threaten the existence of the entire cabinet.

The first intimation received by members of parliament that Colonel Seely had definitely retired from the cabinet was when he entered the house and took a seat on the back benches, instead of among his late colleagues.

The two paragraphs which caused the crisis were those giving guarantees to Brigadier General Hubert Gough and the officers serving under him in Ireland that they would not be called upon for active service against the Ulster Unionists.

These guarantees were afterwards repudiated by the cabinet and this was taken as a rebuff by Field Marshal Sir John French who, as head of the imperial general staff, was virtually commander-in-chief of the army and by Sir John Ewart, the adjutant general to the king.

Vigorous steps were taken by the Liberal ministry today to avert its downfall and end the suspense over the army crisis.

Long session of the cabinet was held at which the army and Ulster situations were discussed.

Afterwards it was stated that the government had accepted the resignations of Field Marshal French and General Ewart.

Mr. Asquith will, it is understood, make an official announcement to this effect later in the day in parliament.

Possible changes of cabinet were also discussed. The chief efforts of the members of the cabinet were directed today towards quieting public clamor before tomorrow, when the home rule bill will be up for its second reading.

Colonel Seely, minister of war, in the cabinet meeting today, refused to withdraw his resignation, and notified Premier Asquith that his place would have to be filled.

Premier Asquith accepted, and himself decided to take the secretaryship of war in place of Colonel Seely.

Sir John French and Sir John Ewart definitely resigned from the service today.

GREEN STAKE OF BUSINESS IN ENGLAND

Hundred and Seventy Thousand to be Out of Yorkshire Pits

(Canadian Press)

Leeds, Eng., March 30.—Thirty-five thousand miners in the Yorkshire pits laid down their tools today, demanding the introduction of a minimum rate of wages.

Notices have been handed in by a further 80,000 and these will expire at the latest on Thursday, which will bring the total to 70,000.

The miners' federation of Great Britain has given its support to the strike and a long struggle is expected.

Later in the day it was announced that another 100,000 miners had given notice to quit their work bringing the total to 170,000.

ONLY ONE GRAND JUROR ABSENT

No Bill in Case of James A. Harris—Joshua Goodwin Left Much to Acadia—Other Requests

At the adjourned sitting of the March Circuit Court this morning twenty-three out of twenty-four grand jurors, summoned, attended at the court.

His Honor Mr. Justice McKeown commented upon the excellent attendance of the grand jurors, saying that it was very gratifying indeed.

The attendance was a tribute to the late sheriff departed, as well as to the newly appointed sheriff, A. A. Wilson, K. C.

In the case of the King vs. Jas. A. Harris, charged with bringing open a case of knives the property of the C. E. B. and stealing some, the grand jury returned no bill.

Argument was commenced this morning in the matter of the winding up of the May Queen Steamship Company limited on the petition of Keith A. Barber, K. C.

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The court took up the matter of the estate of John Goodwin, of St. John, watchmaker.

His will was proved and he was appointed executor of his estate.

There was a full attendance at the weekly meeting of the Common Council this afternoon.

Commissioner Schofield came from Hampton. A delegation from the Free Kindergarten Association asked endorsement of their request to the provincial government.

There were opened for residuum oil, road oil and asphalt for the department of public works, and the application for authority for the purchase of two additional horses for this department was taken up.

John Jackson applied for a renewal of his lease of wharfage toll privileges on North and South Market wharves.

Some Commissioners and Board Trade President May Go

STATEMENT BY MR. McLELLAN

Commissioner, at Council Meeting, Says Legislators Should Adjourn Over Easter Holidays to Give Important Question Full Consideration—A "Show Down" is Wanted

Mayor Frink will leave this evening for Fredericton to consult with Premier Planning regarding the Valley Railway in his relation to this city, the premier having advised him that he will be able to go into the matter this evening.

He may be accompanied by one or more of the other commissioners.

J. H. Robinson, president of the Board of Trade, who has been taking an active interest in the subject, said this morning that the bridge to secure entrance into Saint John by the eastern route.

It will also give us time for other matters as well. The air is full of damaging rumors. I have been credibly informed—I do not know if it has been disclosed yet—that the credit of the province of New Brunswick has already been used in the mind by Mr. Gould and his railway company when he expected to pay the interest upon the guaranteed bonds in London, and the New Brunswick government was requested to make good its endorsement and had to cable \$45,000 in a hurry to the London bankers to meet the interest.

I will tell you there is no need for haste when we are up against such a proposition as this. We want to know the facts—we want to see one paper has said—"A show down."

And while the show-down is being made let the legislature adjourn to meet again in a few weeks when the facts will all be known.

These should include some expert opinion as to the cost of the road so far. I understand the fact that the New Brunswick government has already guaranteed bonds to the extent of nearly three million dollars, and that the Federal Trust Company of New York has paid that amount to Mr. Gould.

What the people, and particularly the people of Saint John, have a right to know is, has the money been all earned, or has a large amount of it been wasted or squandered in one way or another?

We hear—we cannot help hearing—in every part of the province, stories of an ill-built road, of take-offs, paid by contractors to members of the government, of a large election fund provided by some of the proceeds of the bonds guaranteed which should have gone into the building of the road.

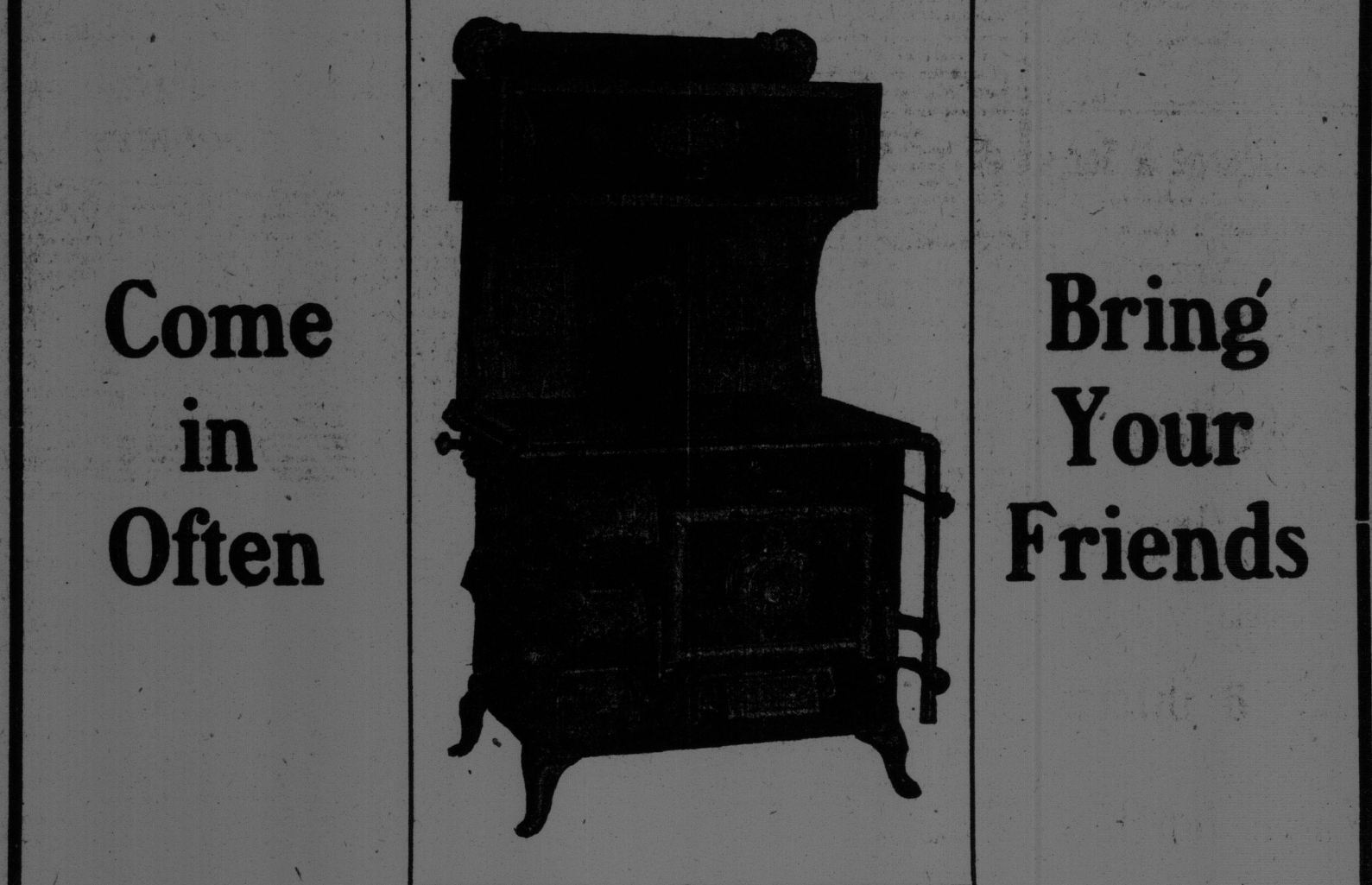

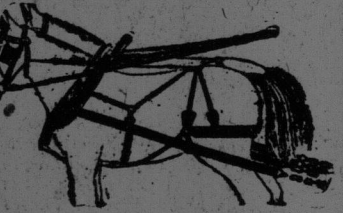

St. Stephen, N. B., March 29—(Special)—Mrs. Eliza Mills, widow of Lewis A. Mills, passed away at her home on Main street last evening. Mrs. Mills had been a sufferer from ulcer of the stomach for some years, but during the last few months failed rapidly. Mrs. Mills, who was a daughter of the late William Andrews, was about seventy years of age. She leaves three sons—William A. of Calais (Me.); N. Marks, barrister, of this town; and Lewis, at home. A brother, Frederick Andrews, also survives her.

The funeral will be from her late residence on Monday afternoon at 8 o'clock, and interment in the Rural cemetery.

The death of Miss Elizabeth Abbott Gard occurred on Saturday after a long illness. Miss Gard having been in failing health for about six years. She was a daughter of the late Thomas Gard and a few months ago. She had long been identified with Queen square Methodist church. She leaves one sister, Miss Anne Gard, of this city. The funeral will be held this afternoon.

Newcastle, March 29—Mrs. Jane Hinton, of Nelson, died at the residence of Mrs. and Mrs. Thomas Cochrane, of this place, yesterday, at the age of eighty-five years. Deceased leaves Mrs. Ellen Hinton, Mrs. John Appleby, of Nelson; Mrs. Daniel Ferguson and Mrs. J. C. Blackmore, of Newcastle; Mrs. Ellen Astley, of Marquette (Wis.).

Grand Falls, March 28—The death occurred on Thursday night of George McCormick, third son of the late John McCormick, of the age of twenty-eight. He had been in poor health for some time, and a few months ago the doctors found that tuberculosis had developed. Though everything was done for him, the disease made rapid strides. He leaves a widow, one sister and two brothers, all of whom have the deepest sympathy of the community.

The funeral will be held on Monday at the Church of the Immaculate Conception, and interment will be made in the Roman Catholic cemetery.

Mrs. Phoebe C. Smith, widow of Merritt Smith, died at the home of her son, H. W. R. Smith, Grandville, King's county on March 18. She leaves one son Joseph C. in the Canadian West and three daughters, Mrs. O. S. Jones of Grandville, Mrs. Alfred Day, McDonald's Point, Queens county and Mrs. Scoble wife of Rev. F. B. Scoble, of Jacksonville, Camden county. Mrs. Smith was eighty-one years of age and was a daughter of the late Robert Collette of Eglon, N. B. She belonged to a family of fourteen of whom William A. of Mapleton and Robert P. of Pleasant Vale, Eglon still survive.

Mrs. George Day, of McDonald's Point also survives. Mrs. Smith husband died about fifty years ago.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. R. M. Bynon at the Baptist church and were largely attended.

B. F. KRITH'S CAREER. Retired Theatrical Business in Small Way in Boston in 1883—Became Vaudeville King.

(Boston Globe.) On Jan. 8, 1888, a handful of people gathered in a small store in Washington street on the site now occupied by the drug store under the addition of the Adams House, to see the wonderful "Baby Alice," a midget weighing a little more than twenty-four ounces.

This room, hardly thirty-five feet long, fifteen feet high and tapering to a width

of six feet in the rear, was the real beginning of the successful career of Benjamin Franklin Keith. Today there are twelve theatres devoted to vaudeville in the principal cities of this country bearing the name of Keith, besides the eight Keith & Porter theatres in New York city and fifty-five other playhouses throughout this country and Canada affiliated in bookings with the Keiths through the auditing offices in New York, of which B. F. Keith was president.

He did not confine his attention to the American field exclusively, for in 1890 he purchased the Princess Theatre in London. Soon after the opening of his new Boston playhouse he spent almost nineteen months in European travel and returned with many new ideas.

Some time ago Mr. Keith began to relinquish the reins of management to others. E. B. Albee, who has been general manager of his enterprises since the beginning, and A. Paul Keith, assistant general manager, taking over the great bulk of the work.

In Boston, his home city for many years, Mr. Keith was known and admired by hundreds. That Tremont street, between Boylston street and Scollay Square, is free from electric cars and a great boulevard is due to the fight put up by Mr. Keith at the head of a number of residents.

It was said that Mr. Keith had but three hobbies, his magnificent yacht Courier, his beautiful Boston and Philadelphia Theatres and his reputation as a purveyor of clean, high-class vaudeville. Of the three hobbies the last was undoubtedly the strongest.

Mr. Keith lived in a splendid house in Kent street, Brookline, and had a summer home at Deeracres, Mass. He was a member of the Boston Athletic Association, the Riverside Casino, the Twentieth Century and Economic Clubs. Mr. Keith was married a second time

to Miss Ethel R. Chase, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. E. Chase, of Washington, on Oct. 29, 1913, in Washington, D. C.

MORE THAN HALF MILLION Will of Frederick Townsend Martin Filled—Art Treasures to Metropolitan Museum.

New York, March 30—The will of Frederick Townsend Martin, died here estimates his estate at "More than \$500,000." When the province guaranteed the bonds of the Valley Railway for an amount, which, together with the subsidies, was supposed to be ample to complete the railway, the agreement was that the line into St. John was to be finished before the end of next year.

Those who have been watching the development of this project were anxious that boards of trade and other representative bodies should confer with the government last summer, for the purpose of pointing out the danger of delay, and with the idea of taking steps to insure the completion of the railway by the time the Grand Trunk Pacific is ready to carry through traffic, but nothing was done.

happen if the proposed aid were refused. The granting of the \$15,000,000 subsidy last year committed the government to a further plunge this year.

It is understood that Sir William Mackenzie will leave shortly for England to arrange for additional financing in the British money market, and that he will carry with him authoritative assurances as to the government's providing security for nearly half the total amount still required to be raised to complete and equip the Canadian Northern Transcontinental system.

Strong Pressure Exerted. There has been during the past couple of weeks an immense pressure brought to bear on the government by all the affiliated Mackenzie & Mann interests.

What the government is now worrying about is the effect upon the public. The recalcitrants within the party ranks in parliament, who possibly have three exceptions, will, it is expected, all be brought into line.

The impression grows among those in touch with the situation that the latter corporation has a well defined plan, not unknown to the Mackenzie & Mann interests, for final absorption of the whole, or at least a part of the Canadian Northern system.

It is probable that a further caucus of Conservatives will be held before the final announcement of government policy is ready for publication.

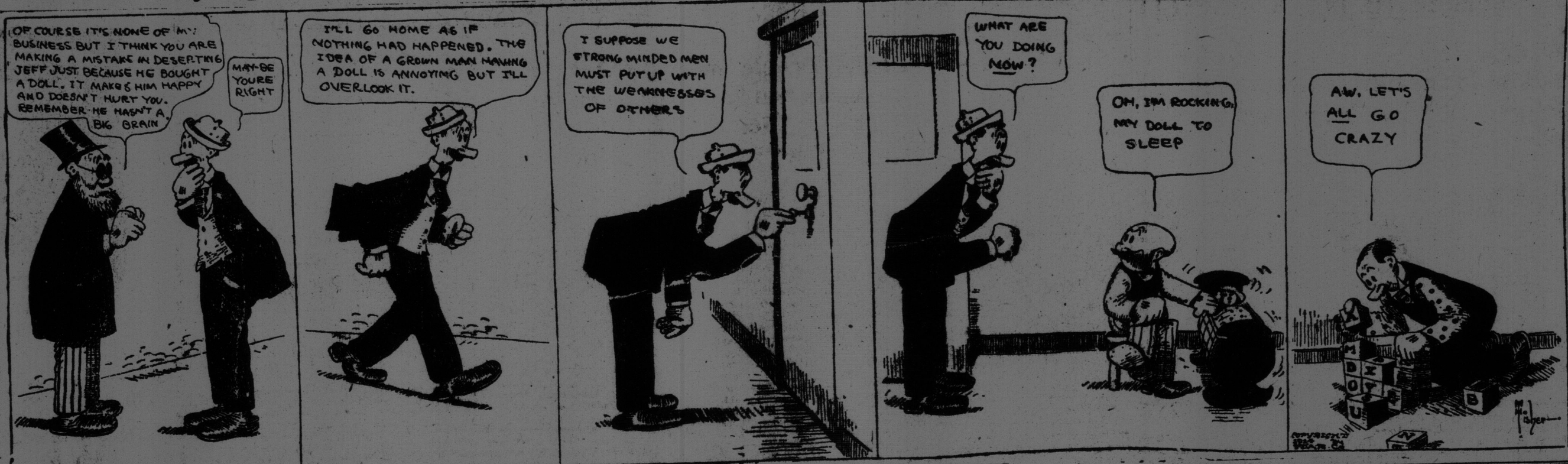

Asvedo must have caught Ad Wolgast woefully out of condition to get a decision over him on the coast in ten rounds, or his form against White was away off. The Chicago boy simply toyed with him at times. In the first round Charlie gave him a severe lacing while against the ropes and during this White hurt his right hand so badly that he could not touch him as he did the rest of the fight. He depended entirely upon his left hand and easily labored the coast boy who had no other weapons. Asvedo did prove himself a glutton for punishment and stood up under a rain of blows which he probably would not have shirked from. He has a lot to learn yet about the boxing game, but there are about the best things which can be taught and gain experience thereby. White, unless his hand puts him in a position which should be in line now for matches with Wolgast and Ritchie.

AQUATIC Henley Matters. New York, March 29.—It remains with the board of stewards of the Royal Henley regatta of England to decide whether or not the regatta to be held on July 2, 3 and 4, shall be added to those events of 1914 already on the international list of sporting competitions. Both the Winnipeg Rowing Club of Winnipeg and the Union Boat Club of Boston have announced their intention of entering eight-oared crews in the Grand Challenge event of one mile and 600 yards. GIVES DETAILS OF SHAMROCK IV

Designer Nicholson Sets Some Rumors at Rest

COMPOSITE CONSTRUCTION

Steel Frames and Wooden Planking—Centreboard Craft—Has Hollow Masts of Wood—Will be Launched in April Despite All Delays

Shamrock IV is a centreboard craft. The hull is of composite construction—steel frames and wooden planking—and she has hollow masts of wood. The yacht is to be launched in April. Charles Nicholson has set at rest all rumors about the challenger for the America's Cup by a statement which he gave to the representative of the Yachting World and is printed in the latest number.

Mr. Nicholson states that there has been a little delay in the construction of the hull due to some difficulty in obtaining delivery of the aluminum alloy which enters largely into its construction. There are some points about the design of the yacht on which Mr. Nicholson is naturally reticent. He naturally wishes to keep secret the dimensions of the vessel, its displacement and its sail area. These, if announced just now, might have some effect on the plans of the three contenders now building here, as it is not late to make radical changes. Mr. Nicholson does not say for what purpose the aluminum alloy is needed, but it is probably used for deck plating and to be covered with canvas or cork. This reduces the weight above the water line considerably.

"One of the most interesting features of the new boat is her centreboard," says exactly with the sections as designed. "The building of the mast is in itself a most interesting operation. Two masts will be ready by the time the boat is launched, for, as Mr. Nicholson observed, we almost expect the loss of a mast as one of the incidents in the tuning up of an America's cup competitor. The masts will be of wood, hollow, and will be the biggest spars of that description ever built."

Mr. Nicholson remarked that there was an idea that Sir Thomas Lipton was entering into a contest under much more favorable conditions than those of that American designer had had eight years experience with the present rule. Mr. Nicholson said he would have preferred to build a 75 footer under the old rule and if that plan had been accepted there probably would have been only one defender built, while now three were in process of construction.

"It has been generally known for some time past that Shamrock IV, is to be of composite construction. Her planking will be of mahogany. All the previous Shamrocks were of metal construction throughout. Mr. Nicholson states his reason for reverting to the wood skin for his vessel. In the first place, had the hull been built of metal throughout there would have been the difficulty of riveting. The rivet heads have to be counter-sunk flush on the outside to give a perfectly smooth surface, and with plating so thin as they necessarily would be there would be considerable difficulty in making the rivets hold. The loosening of the thin plates, which introduces the buckling between the frames. Talking all these considerations into account, Mr. Nicholson believes that the lines of his vessel will be more truly preserved in a wood skin, which there is also more resilience than in metal.

"The boat is being built very similarly to the methods adopted in the construction of small yachts, moulds being set up to insure that the frames conform

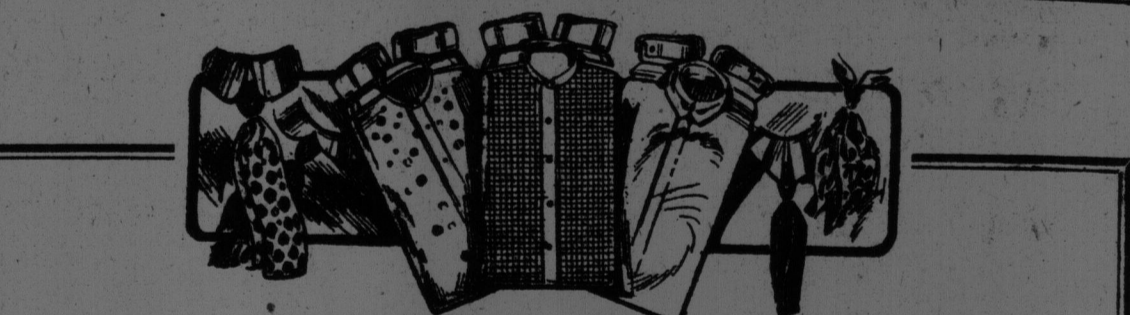
