ONE DIES; ONE CONQUERS AIR

French Aviator Plunges To His Death

BLINDED BY FROST

Lieutenant Boncour Falls From Great Height—Provost Meanwhile Carries Passenger About and Then Starts to Fly Across Channel

Paris, April 12—Lieut. H. A. Boncour, of the 27th infantry regiment, was killed this morning in an aeroplane accident. He was making a flight in the vicinity of Paris, about 125 miles to the east of Paris, when he fell from a great height, while passing over the village of Lamoignon.

His aeroplane collapsed from an unknown cause, and he totally destroyed the body of the aircraft, when found in the debris, was almost unrecognizable. The lieutenant's eyes were covered with frost and it is supposed that this prevented him while attempting a landing. From seeing that he was flying directly into a thick forest, he probably made a sudden turning movement, which caused the aeroplane to turn over.

Calais, France, April 13—Marice Provost, a French aviator, landed near this city at eleven o'clock this morning, after a flight with a passenger in his monoplane from near Les Moulins, where he had been at the time of the accident.

SAUSAGE KING IS DEAD

Eccentric Wm. Harris Had Three Sons, William First, Second and Third

London, April 13—William Harris, who is known as the "Sausage King," died at his residence in Salisbury, England, at the age of 73. He was the father of three sons, William First, Second and Third. He was a very eccentric man and was known for his habit of eating sausages. He was also a successful businessman and had a large estate.

RELAYED BY AN ACCIDENT IN MAINE

The wreck of a freight train near Forest, Me., early this morning caused a hold-up of traffic for some little time on the Maine Central Railway near Bangor. The wrecked train was carrying a large amount of goods and it is not known how serious the wreck was but it is believed that the train was damaged to some extent.

GRATEFUL FOR SUPPORT RECEIVED IN CANADA

John E. Redmond and Lloyd George Express, for Times Readers, Their Opinions on Home Rule Legislation—Ulster Continues Efforts—Marked Change in Reception of Bill

(Times' Special Saturday Cable). London, April 13—Leaders of Wales and Ireland, recognizing that home rule has a special significance for the Irish, which led the way in national opinion, under the empire flag, send me special messages for the Times-Star and for the Canadian people in the fight for Home Rule. Mr. Lloyd-George telegraphed: "The lesson we first learned from Canada we are applying to Ireland, that the loyalty born of freedom is the true bond of Union. The guiding principle of Liberal statesmanship has ever been to make each of the daughters of the empire mistress in her own house."

PEARY MEN TO MAKE ANOTHER ARCTIC TRIP

Two Year Expedition to Explore Land Which Peary Sighted

Washington, April 12—George Borup and D. B. McMillan, two of Peary's associates in the successful dash for the North Pole, are to head an expedition to be sent to the North Pole to explore the land in the middle of the Arctic ocean, which Peary sighted on his memorable trip. The party will sail July 30 next in the sealer Diana, and will be equipped for two years.

SUIT FOR \$6,000,000 AGAINST PATTON IS NOT CARRIED ON

Chicago, April 13—James A. Patton, retired board of trade operator, felt relieved over the dismissal of a \$6,000,000 damages suit, which had been filed against him two years ago. The suit, which was instituted by Doctor Paul Burnmaster, president of the Chicago anti-gambling league, was dismissed in court, when the complainant failed to file a declaration of law in the case.

TO LEAVE ROAD IN A BODY

Mexico City, April 13—American engineers and conductors will leave the employ of the national railways in a body April 17. E. P. Curtis, president of the Order of Railway Conductors and Assistant Grand Chief E. Corrigan of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers left for the United States tonight, having failed to effect an agreement with the railway management.

COUNTESS EVERETT'S LOSS BY FIRE

Frederickton, April 13—(Special)—Councillor Tabor Everett's loss by the fire which destroyed his home at Kingsclear yesterday will be close to \$5,000. In addition to the buildings he lost twenty-nine head of cattle and three horses. His daughter Lena, while trying to release the live-stock from the barn, became dazed by the smoke and narrowly escaped death. She was rescued by Menassa Dunphy, a neighbor, and taken to the hospital.

WESTERN FIREMEN INJURED IN PRACTICE

Ladder Buckles and They Fall From High Position

Vancouver, B. C., April 13—Four men were injured yesterday at practice by the breaking of a ladder truck. Murphy was at the top of the ladder when it buckled and fell from a height of eight feet below him. The ladder buckled and three men were injured. They were rushed to the hospital but doctors laid out no hope for them.

CANADIAN WOMAN TENNIS CHAMPION IS SUNG

Wants \$5,000 Damages Because of Injuries in Auto Accident

Cleveland, Ohio, April 13—Alleging that her skill in tennis, ice skating and what has been impaired by injuries to her right arm and right wrist, sustained in an automobile accident here in August, Mrs. Anna, charges \$5,000 damages against the "Hudson" Brothers' Company, street paving contractors.

TRY TO SAVE SEDDON'S LIFE

Petition for Revival of London Murderer is Signed by 100,000

London, April 13—A petition containing more than 100,000 signatures, praying the home secretary to reprieve Frederick Seddon, who is under sentence of death for the murder of Miss Barrow, was presented yesterday. Mr. McKenna's decision is expected on Tuesday. The execution was fixed for Thursday.

THOUSAND SQUARE MILES WILL BE UNDER WATER BY NIGHTFALL

But Loss of Life is Not Expected to Be Large

Grenville, Miss., April 13—The Mississippi is taking its toll on southern Arkansas and northern Louisiana today. With the force of the greatest tides in the history of the waterway behind it, the flood is pouring through two gaps in the levee, at Panther Forest, in Arkansas, and near Roosevelt, over fertile flat lands of the Louisiana Arkansas delta. Before nightfall it is estimated that 1,000 square miles in East Carroll and Madison parishes Louisiana and Chicot, Arkansas, will be flooded.

YEGGMEN ROB BANK

Explosion Fails to Rouse Anyone and They Get Away With Cash

Hillsboro, N. C., April 13—Yeggmens blew the safe of the Bank of Orange with nitroglycerine nearly yesterday and got away with \$4,000 or \$5,000 in gold and currency. The explosion failed to arouse any suspicion and the robbery was not discovered until the janitor opened the building. The vault had been closed out of practically everything but documents. Three strong, non-carrying a wheel, came to the bank the night before and have disappeared.

Milwaukee, April 13—Mary Swain Wagner, president of the American suffragettes, has declared war upon the long hat pin. She goes so far as to say that she will have a bill introduced in the legislature.

HOLD-UP AND ROBBERY IN NEW YORK RESTAURANT

New York, April 13—Four men, armed with revolvers, invaded a restaurant in East Fourteenth street early today, held up and robbed Morris Last, a hotel manager, of jewelry and money aggregating \$700 in value. Thirty persons were in the restaurant at the time, but the robbers made no attempt to molest the others. Last and a friend were playing cards in the room, when one of the four men strolled over, thrust a revolver in Last's face, and demanded his valuables. The hotel man thought it was a joke, and laughed, whereupon the other three highwaymen covered him with their pistols. After the hold-up, the bandits backed out of the room, warning the occupants to make no outcry, and escaped in a taxicab.

IMPLICATES OTHERS IN TORONTO MURDER CASE

Toronto, April 13—Following the appearance of Charles Gibson in the police court, accused of murdering Joseph Rosenthal, old wounding Bill Dunlopman on Friday last in the Hydro Electric yards, the police are seeing two other men whom Gibson implicates in the tragedy.

COAL PRICE DROPS TEN SHILLINGS A TON

London, April 13—The price of coal was reduced 10 shillings a ton on the London coal exchange yesterday, bringing the best coal down to 58s. (8.16) a ton. This was the largest drop in price ever recorded at one time.

CONSUL GENERAL LEAVING

Ottawa, April 13—H. Ketafel, for five years consul general of Belgium in Canada, is to leave Ottawa for Brussels on Monday. His successor has not been announced.

**BRITISH ENGINEERS AND SCOTCH TEACHERS ON VISIT TO CANADA**

London Symphony Orchestra is Also to Pay a Visit — The Plans

(Times Special Correspondence.)

London, April 9.—The visit of several British engineers to Canada and the United States this month is another evidence of the desire on the part of all classes here to learn by actual experience the prosperity and possibilities of the dominion. There has been a great demand among engineers to join the party, and several well known public men are taking a keen interest in the tour, among them being Lord Strathcona, Lord Brassey, the master of Christ's College, Cambridge, and the master of Downing College, Cambridge. A visit to the locomotive shops in Montreal, an official entertainment in Ottawa, study of the street car system of Toronto, the Rockies, the wheat pit and stock yards of Chicago, and the St. Louis breweries are items on the itinerary. The tour will be for three months.

Another tour of great educative value is that of the Scottish teachers who will go to Canada in July. Composed of all drawn from all parts of Scotland, the party will visit the universities, colleges, schools, and agricultural experimental stations of eastern Canada. Opportunities will be given for meeting Canadian teachers and for the exchange of educational ideas. The trip is organized by the convener of the Educational Institute of Scotland under the patronage of which the teachers are going out.

This week will see the departure of the London Symphony Orchestra for a visit to Canada and the United States in fulfillment of a programme which provides for thirty-one concerts before return early in May. The principal cities in the States and Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa will be visited.

**PROMOTION FOR A. P. HAZEN**

Hearty congratulations were extended to Arthur P. Hazen, manager of the Bank of British North America, Prince William street, yesterday, when it became known that he was about to be transferred to Montreal as the manager of the present branch of the bank, a position second only to that of general manager. All arrangements for his promotion, which provides for the removal of Mr. Hazen from St. John, will be completed this week.

Mr. Hazen's successor here will be A. G. Skelton, at present manager of the branch at West Toronto. Mr. Hazen has been in Montreal since the removal of the bank to the service of the Bank of British North America.

Mr. Hazen has taken a very prominent part in the commercial life of the city for several years. He is the president of the Union Club, and a member of the executive committee of the board of trade. Mr. Hazen is also a member of the board of directors of the city of St. John.

The change in the bank management comes just at a time when larger things are being planned for the branch here, as a result of the business built up by Mr. Hazen, but his departure will not interfere in the least with the progress of the new building at the corner of Dock street and Market square. His successor will take charge here with every prospect of increased business.

**NO SITE CHOSEN YET FOR CANADIAN QUARTERS IN LONDON**

(Times Special Correspondence.)

London, April 2.—W. L. Griffith, the permanent secretary in the high commissioner's office, says there is no announcement to be made as yet concerning the site of the new London quarters for the dominion government. It is understood that several sites are under consideration.

It is hoped that Lord Strathcona will be able to be at his office again after Easter, but there are those who fear that it will be a great risk after his recent severe illness for him to attempt to work as he has in discharging his social and official duties.

Rev. J. H. Wickstead, vicar of Bexley, Kent, England, has presented to the Wesleyan Methodist of Gravesend and Dartford circuit a tree from the vicarage garden, a sapling of the oak, under whose branches John and Charles Wesley, with George Whitefield often met in friendly conference. It is believed that Charles Wesley composed some of the hymns in the shade of the tree.

**MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE**

The Quebec-Moncton section of the G. T. P. has been completed and 350 miles west of Quebec as well.

J. E. Kane, of St. John, has been awarded the contract for sewerage construction at St. Andrews. G. G. Murdoch, of St. John, is the engineer.

Wm. Murray, aged 82, for thirty-three years governor of the Halifax prison, died yesterday as the result of an accident. He fell downstairs in an office building.

It is reported in Toronto that Knox College has been sold to a publishing house there for between \$225,000 and \$250,000.

The house and barn owned by T. C. Everett, of Lower French Village, were destroyed by fire yesterday and several thousands of dollars damage done. The buildings were insured for \$1,500. It is thought that about 600 barrels of potatoes were destroyed.

Leat. Governor Wood, Mrs. F. B. Black and Mrs. H. H. Wood held an enjoyable reception at the Barker House last night from nine to eleven.

John P. Ruch, aged twenty-two, and Helen Ruch, aged 24, were divorced yesterday in Cincinnati, after it was learned that they were related, she being his half sister. Neither knew they were brother and sister, as their mother had told them the girl was but an adopted child. The youngest of their children is only a few weeks old.



THE BANK OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA BUSY ST. JOHN

The new map of St. John showing the location of every property in the city and the surrounding district, which has been prepared by Engineer G. G. Murdoch is now complete. The map was submitted to an informal meeting of the real estate men in the board of trade rooms yesterday afternoon. The work of publication will be commenced immediately. The real estate men present ordered 2,000 copies. The map covers an area four miles west from the centre of the city and four and a half miles east to Brookville station. Newton Griffiths & Co. has secured temporary offices at East St. John, which will be occupied by their staff on next Thursday. The engineers are now busy with preliminary work for the location of the dry dock and the breaker and this is to be finished as soon as possible in order that a good start may be made on the actual work of construction this summer. A bill has been introduced in the legislature to amend the Imperial Dry Dock Company act by giving the municipality power to give out property to the company. This was taken to mean that the company is seeking to acquire the Municipal House property for use in connection with the dry dock, but G. F. Palmer, who has charge of the work here, said last night that he had heard nothing of this proposal. It has been thought that the municipality will have to seek some more suitable location when the work commences and the pulp mill property at Mispic has been suggested for this purpose. In addition to other industries promised for St. John there is a possibility of the establishment of a plant for crosscutting lumber. This announcement was made yesterday by Howard Boulton, director of the Dominion Tar and Chemical Company. 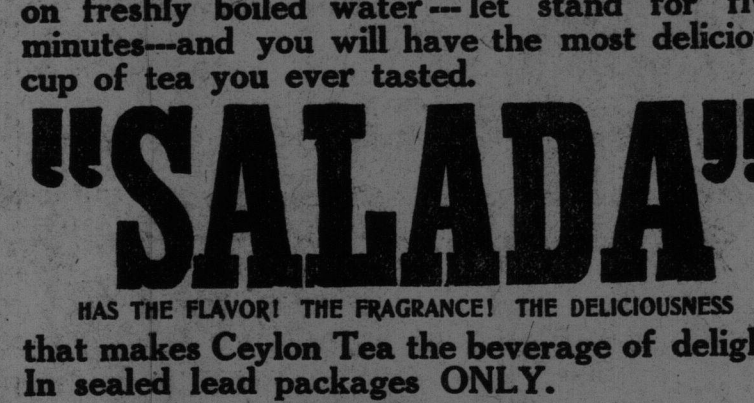

speaking of our domestic concerns that I must not exhaust your patience by referring in detail to the many points of interest which naturally occur when reviewing the progress of the Dominion during the past year. I have, however, to make an interesting task to speak at length, but I must endeavor, quite briefly, to touch some of the matters in finance and industry which appear to me to be of principal importance.

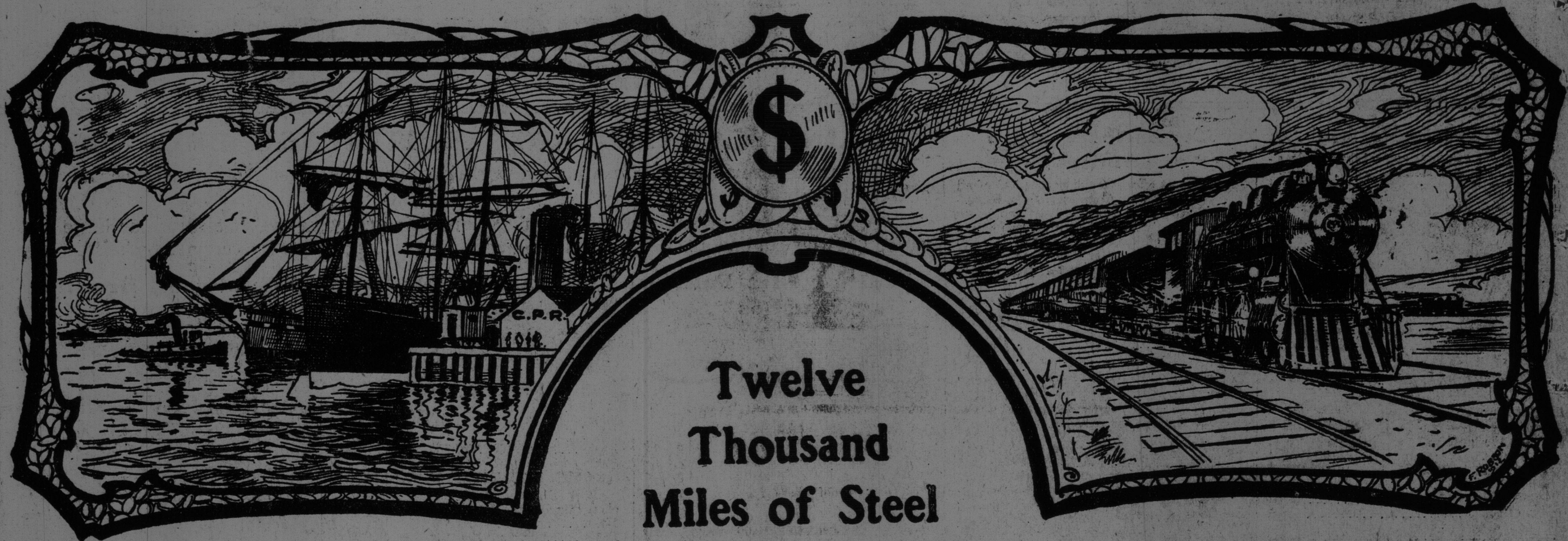

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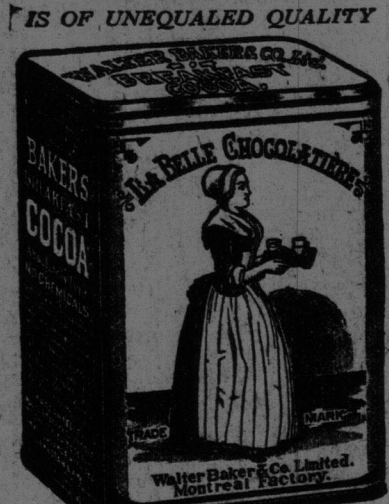

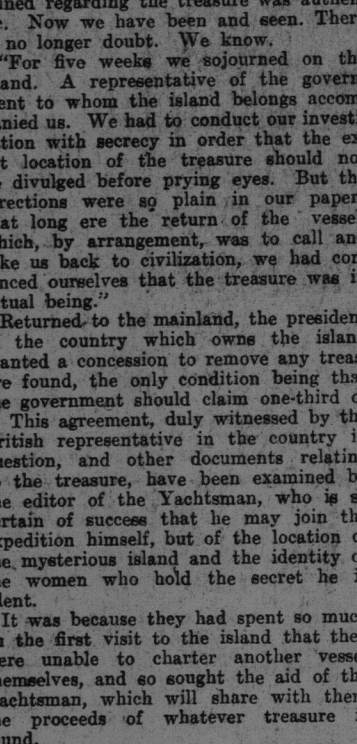
