

FOR PRESENTATION TO THE ANNUAL MEETING, MAY 17TH, 1886.

GENTLEMEN :-

Your Directors take much pleasure in presenting to you a very satisfactory report of the past year's proceedings.

There has been no slowing off in the progress and forward march of the Association. We are becoming more popular, and the benefits derived from being a member of a body of this kind are apparently more and more appreciated every year.

The Financial Statement, of which every member has been supplied with a copy, shows an excess of revenue to the amount of \$4,183.76, thus raising the capital account to \$20,289.81, and of the \$9,000 mortgage on the building, \$8,000 has been paid, and the balance, together with the outstanding current accounts, are the only liabilities the Association has.

During the year a new roof has been put on the building, and the reading room has been remodeled, and refurnished with new carpet, chairs, clock, window shades, and gas fixtures, and a number of new periodicals have been added to the list. A portion of the room was partitioned off for a secretary's office and Board Room, and a new safe, desk, table, chairs, and stove purchased. Awnings have been placed on all the front windows, and add much to the appearance of the building. A large flag was presented, and a new flag-staff erected. A handsome trophy case was placed in the reading room, and also a supply of chess-men and tables. The ventilation of the billiard room has been considerably improved; a new rifle was purchased for the shooting gallery; and young trees planted in front of the building.

Early last spring, the Directors having found that there were several imperfections in the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association and affiliated clubs, a committee on revision was appointed, consisting of one member representing the Association and each affiliated club.

Their efforts resulted in the presentation of new Constitutions and By-Laws, which were adopted at special meetings held on March 2, 1886.

We had an agreement with the Turkish Bath for members to have the use of them for the sum of 50 cents, but the management stated that it did not pay them at that rate, and cancelled the arrangement. Members can now get a bath for 75 cents, on presentation of their certificate of membership in the Association.

A minstrel show was given in the gymnasium hall on the 6th and 7th of May, and, thanks to the untiring zeal and energy of the gentlemen who took part, proved a success every way.

A new feature of amusement was inaugurated in the shape of a Moonlight Excursion, held on August 25th, and would, no doubt, have been a greater success than it was had not the weather been remarkably cold for the season of the year.

An entertainment was given by the Dramatic Club, on the 4th and 5th of March, which was well attended both nights. Great credit is deserved by the members for the efficient manner in which they carried out the programme, and the thanks of the Association are due to the lady members of the club, who took part.

The Cinderella Club held two "At Homes" on the 11th Dec. and 19th March, which proved as great successes as before.

Mr. Doig was re-engaged as gymnastic instructor, and has given great satisfaction. Four prizes and a Green prize were offered for competition, and resulted as below:

# CHAIRMEN OF DEPARTMENT'S REPORT.

MONTREAL, May. 1886.

To the Board of Directors of the M. A. A Association.

#### GENTLEMEN:

I have again the honor to present the Annual Report of the Gymnasium Department of our Association—the fifth in its history and of my term of office.

The past season of 1885-86 has been the most successful since the Association assumed its present corporate form, and will compare favorably with any in the past history of the Institution, under the old regime.

A judicious expenditure was incurred for two new mattresses, altering and improving the old horizontal ladder into a bridge, and putting up a stair to ascend the stage; the purchase of a most attractive and useful piece of apparatus, the German horse; also additional Bar Bells, Dumb Bells, Single Sticks, etc., and putting up some twenty new lock boxes in the dressing rooms. These, together with a few minor improvements in the arrangement of the apparatus, make the equipment now most complete, and a matter for congratulation.

The marked improvement in the classes, with regard to attendance, progress in physical development, and profiency in the exercises taught has been most noticeable; their performances at the entertainments given by the class in October and April being creditable alike to themselves, the instructor, and the Association. The shining "lights of other days," whose brilliancy was wont to dazzle the eyes of fair admirers, on the occasions of their public appearances in days gone by, need have no fear but that the present votaries of the healthful, manly excercises of the Gymnasium, are doing their utmost to uphold the traditions of the Institution; and if the older members

would only turn in and lend a hand to help along the classes, and encourage the younger ones by their presence and example, the effect would be much greater, and at an expenditure of a tithe of the energy sometimes displayed in endeavors to prove that "the former days were better than these." A more regular attendance, and a display of greater enthusiasm on the part of *some* members whose names appear on the roll, would greatly encourage the instructor, and materially assist in keeping up the interest in the classes through the whole season.

#### RULES:

- I.—Unless three-fourths of a possible score is obtained the "Champion" Medal will be withdrawn, and the winner awarded 2nd prize. Winners of prizes in gymnastics are debarred from taking the 4th prize. Only members who have not prior to October 1st, 1885, taken part in gymnastic classes, are entitled to compete for the "Green" Medal.
- 2.—Only those members attending at least twenty regular classes after November 30th, shall be entitled to compete. Entries free and will close one week before date of competition.
- 3.—All competitors will be required to perform, in rotation, such exercises as may be selected by the Judges, at their discretion, from a list furnished by the Instructor of those in use, on the following apparatus: parallel bars, horizontal bar rings, inclined and bridge ladders, flying trapezes and vaulting horse; also, jumping, vaulting, peg pole, climbing rope and the regular class exercises with dumbbells, clubs and bar-bells. In addition, competitors will be allowed three minutes each for a series of advanced exercises of their own choosing, on each of the following apparatus, viz: parallel bars, rings and horizontal bar.
- 4.—Three judges, to be named by the chairman, will have entire control of the competition, subject to these rules, and their decision shall be final and without appeal.

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The competition took place, as usual, the last week in March, the judges being Messrs. J. A. Taylor, Fred. W. Barlow and Saml. M. Baylis, with the following result:

Although Mr. Rodden's actual marking fell 4 p.c. short of the required three-fourths, the judges recommended, in view of his exceptionally creditable all round performance, that he be awarded the Champion Medal. Mr. Reynolds objected to the award of the judges in allotting him the 4th prize, he as a "green" man, claiming the Green Medal awarded to Mr. Cottingham, who ranked next lower, the judges on this point following a precedent and a general understanding that one man should not receive two prizes. matter having been referred to the Board, the Directors held that, in the absence of any special rule to the contrary Mr. Reynolds was entitled to the 4th prize, and "green" prize as well, and decided that as Mr. Cottingham had been awarded a medal, that a special and Prize, " Green" be made for him.

Some newspaper discussion arose on the publication of the report of the competition, the sporting editor of the Gazette, and one of his correspondents agreeing in criticizing one of the rules requiring attendance at a certain number of classes to qualify for entering. This, together with some reflections on Mr. Doig's style of exercises, which the correspondent characterized as child's play, etc., I deemed it my duty to reply to, as I consider this particular rule very useful in keeping the members at work when other attractions might have a tendency to draw them away; and the principle of allowing only those who by their attendance show their interest in the gymnasium, to compete for the prizes offered, I consider a good one. I would, however recommend that no restrictions be placed on the Champion-ship, further than that a certain standard of excellence be required, (say 75% of a possible), and that the competition list be selected from the exercises taught by the instructor and in regular use.

We have to deplore the sad and sudden death, during the past season, of Clarence G. Hyde, one of our most promising young members, and winner of the "Green" Medal in season 84-5.

I have much pleasure in placing on record my unqualified approval of the manner in which the duties of instructor have been fulfilled by Mr. Doig, since they were assumed by him; the success of the classes during the past season, may be attributed in a great measure, to his efforts. His personal good qualities, enthusiasm for his work, and friendly interest in the members, combined with a proper regard for discipline, have made him popular and respected; and his success with beginners has been most marked. I would recommend that his salary be increased.

The addition of a pair of improved stirrup pattern rings, leather covered and swivel mounted, would prove an attraction, and add to the comfort of the members using them.

The privilege of a medical examination by Dr. Gurd, either in connection with the pulley-weight system, or merely as a preliminary to general work, was continued to members, but not largely used. The system, while lacking that spirit of emulation to be found in class work, is, in my opinion, of great value to those desiring a less severe course of exercise, and is esteemed by many as one of the greatest attractions of the gymnasium.

I would again impress upon the members, the immense benefits to be derived from the proper use of the gymnasium, especially to those entering the Association at an early age, a continuous course of exercise judiciously taken in their early manhood, would find them at the end of the few years they could hope to devote to it, infinitely better men. Our athletes in active training, and our lacrosse and foot ball teams, would find a few hours a week devoted to work in the gymnasium of untold value in building up a development impossible of attainment, where, as in running, one set of muscles only is used, and while this would undoubtedly ensure greater success in contests on turf or cinder, on broader grounds than a mere training to win, the time so devoted to their own physical culture would be well spent, and the effect soon apparent.

## GENTLEMEN :-

I have much pleasure in submitting a report of the Billiard Room Committee for the past year.

In my report last year, I drew your attention to the want of more tables to accommodate the increasing number of members who patronize this department, and during the past year this want has still more severely felt.

Although the rule of not allowing members to use the tables for more than one hour, when others are waiting, has been strictly enforced, many of our members, especially the older ones, have had to go away without being able to enjoy a game, thus causing some dissatisfaction.

I would therefore ask the incoming Board of Directors to give this matter their earnest consideration, and try and devise some means to overcome this difficulty.

The tables are in very good order, but it is necessary that a lot of the old cues be replaced by new ones of a better description. It is necessary to have a new set of balls for the American pool table, also a new set of 3 balls for the English table; the pyramid set also wants overhauling. With these additions the appurtenances of this department will be pretty complete.

By the treasurer's statement you will see that the expenditure has been kept within the revenue, which, I think, is quite satisfactory.

The usual handicap tournaments were held, the entries being more numerous than in former years, and the competitions throughout were keen and well contested, resulting as follows:—

# REPORT BUILDING COMMITTEE.

To the Directors of the M. A. A. A.

GENTLEMEN :-

The work of my department the past year has resulted in considerable improvement to the building, and likewise added considerably to the comfort of the members.

The first work of consequence was the changing of the Directors' quarters and Secretary's office from the rooms on the ground floor, to the reading room above, the removal of the mercantile library books and cases leaving ample space for a very commodious and well lighted reading room, and private office for Secretary and Directors. The next substantial improvement has been the introduction of ventilating shafts direct from the billiard and bowling room, up through the roof, which has given complete satisfaction, and a flag staff has been placed on the top of the building for use on red letter or gala days of the Club, and lastly, awnings have been placed over the front windows to protect from the sun's rays.

The above, along with the fitting up of the present Secretary's, Director's and reading rooms, new safe, stove, &c., has necessarily entailed considerable outlay.

I would also bring before your notice the fact that very soon, to accommodate our growing membership, more space will be needed. This can be easily got by raising the present roof to allow another range of rooms above the present Gymnasium and reading rooms.

It will give enough space for a billiard room nearly one-half larger than at present and also a large room for boxing and fencing. The present billiard room could be utilized by adding two more bowling alleys, and whenever found necessary a long plunge bath, or whatever is thought most desirable.

The expense will, of course, be heavy, but these improvements will enable us to increase our membership to one-half more without being any more overcrowded than we are now, and give additional value to our noble building, of which we are all so justly proud.

#### REPORT BOWLING DEPARTMENT.

MONTREAL, May 1st., 1886.

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The President and Directors of the M. A. A. A.

GENTLEMEN:-

In making my report it gives me very much pleasure to be able to show the department to be in by far the most flourishing condition since the incorporation of the Association.

The competitions have been more numerous and have had larger entries, there has been a greater number of prizes given, and the receipts from the bowling have been greatly in excess of any previous season.

During the season there were six regular monthly competitions in ten pins and four in cocked hat, which, with a preliminary sweep-stakes for each in September, makes seven competitions in ten pins, with an average of 26 4-7 for each, and five competitions in cocked hat, with an average of 25 4-5.

In prizes, there were given for ten pins, seven firsts, three seconds, two thirds, one aggregate and one record; for cocked hat, five firsts, three seconds, one third, one aggregate and one record, in all 25 prizes, amounting to the value of \$101.00, which is about double that of any previous season, as far as can be found out from records fyled.

The value of the prizes, as usual, has been made up with the entrance fees for the monthly competitions, with the exception of the two record prizes, value \$5.00 each, which are given by the Association, the aggregate prizes being made up by taking a proportion from the monthly entrance fees.

A list appended gives a full memorandum of the prize winners in each competition, with their scores and amount of value for each prize.

The receipts from the alleys show an increase of nearly 50 per cent. on the best year recorded.

The expenses also have shown an improvement, being much lower in proportion, thus enabling the Association to derive a net receipt from the department of nearly 100 per cent. more than the best year on record.

A list appended will show the receipts and expenditures since 1881-2.

During the season improvements were made in the department by two new gas jets, with shades over the pins, four new sets of ten pins, the leather buffers repaired, and two new, large balls, also two blue Jerseys, with belts, for the alley boys.

The general bowling during the season has been very good, although not quite equal to some of the previous years, notably, season 1881-2, when an average in ten pins of 188 2-5 for five strings was made by R. Summerhayes, and 39 2-5 for five strings in cocked had by A. T. McPherson.

The records for single strings, however, have both been satisfactorily beaten this season, 258 in ten pins being made by Fred. Cushing, and 55 in cocked hat by W. G. Robertson, the best previous scores, 237 in ten pins and 49 in cocked hat, being made by G. R. Starke in season 1882-3, therefore, taking into consideration that the alleys are now not so good, this season's bowling is very creditable.

If the Directors can see their way clear, I would strongly recommend the alleys being renewed, as the present ones are anything but perfect, and not at all in keeping with the rest of the Institution.

I would also suggest that the Directors appoint a committee for the purpose of framing a new set of rules for the department, and have them printed and hung up in the alleys.

I would also strongly recommend the keeping up of the monthly competitions, as they certainly were the main cause of the present successful season. and that prizes be continued to be offered for the aggregate scores, as good bowlers have very little chance of winning the monthly prizes from scratch.

Furthermore, I would recommend the continuing of the present season's large handicaps, as it helps very materially to work in new bowlers, and also to swell up the entries.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SHOOTING COMMITTEE, 1885-6.

#### The President and Directors of the M. A. A. A.

GENTLEMEN :-

In submitting the report of the Shooting Committee for the season of 1885-6, I regret to have to call your attention to the fact that the interest evinced by the members of the M. A. A. A. in this department is year by year steadily decreasing. What the causes of this are I am not prepared to say, but it is an undeniable fact that the shooting competitions are not what they should be, or what they have been in past years.

I find by referring to the reports of former chairmen that the number of entries has been steadily dwindling down, until at last it is now a difficult matter to procure enough entries to pay for the prizes.

The committee have done all in their power to revive the interest of the members of the Association in this department, but I regret to have to report that their efforts have been for the most part of no avail. Complaints were made about the rifles being old and leaded, and a new rifle was at once purchased, which, I have reason to believe, is really a very good one; but though there was a slight improvement in the entries for a short time after this, they again fell very short of what the Committee had hoped and expected to see.

Nothing now remains, in my opinion, but to have something entirely new for next season, and I would respectfully suggest that in place of the targets now in use, a moving, or a drop target be substituted, the moving target to be in the form of a man, or some living object. In this way, I think a new interest might be awakened, and I trust my suggestions will receive your serious consideration.

## REPORT OUT-DOOR SPORTS COMMITTEE.

To the Directors of the M. A. A. A.

GENTLEMEN :-

As Chairman of Out-Door Sports Committee, I beg to make the following report for the season just terminated.

The Annual Spring Games were held on Saturday, June 6th, and whilst the entries were not as numerous as could be wished, competition, on the whole, was good. Out of eleven events, members of the Association, or affiliated clubs, won seven first places. An encouraging feature of the meeting was the presence of competitors from several of the surrounding towns and villages. Representatives from Cornwall, St. Johns, Hemmingford, Lachute and Brockville being present.

On June 28th, Messrs. J. S. Robertson and D. D. McTaggart competed at Toronto in the Spring Meeting of the Bank Athletic Association, the former gentleman winning the hundred and two hundred and twenty yard races, and the latter winning the mile in 4 min. 38 2-5 sec., lowering the Canadian record 4 3-5 seconds.

The Annual Championship Games of the A. A. A. of Canada, were held in Toronto, on the 26th of September, our Association being represented by four of our members.

From the fact that a representative Irish team were among the competitors, this meeting was endowed with special interest, but notwithstanding the large number of entries, our men won three first and two second prizes. J. W. Moffat winning the half mile and mile in 2min. 1 1-5 sec, and 4 min. 36 sec., respectively, latter time now being the Canadian record for the distance. D. D. McTaggart won the two miles in the handsome time of 10 min. 5 sec. J. S. Robertson winning second place in both the 100 and 220 yard races, from a large field of competitors.

Our Annual Fall Games took place on Saturday, 3rd October, on the Club grounds.

Notwithstanding the disagreeable weather, the stand was very fairly filled with spectators, and the games pushed through on time.

Out of fourteen events our men won eight first and four second places.

This Association having been authorized by the A. A. A. of C., to hold a Cross Country Run for the championship of Canada, the race came off on the 24th October, the course being from the head of Durocher street to Peloquin's hotel, Back River, and was won by J. W. Moffat, M. A. A. A., over an exceptionally heavy track, in 38 min. 47 sec.; R. Larkin, Shamrock, J. G. Ross, M. A. A. third, in 39 min. 3 sec. In the Cross Country Run for the championship of America, held at New York, on the 3rd November, we were not so fortunate, neither of our men being placed.

Interest in our races seems to be steadily growing among our members, and your Committee look for a considerable increase in the number of competitors during the coming season.

### GENTLEMEN:

It is my pleasant duty to present the report of your committee on the work of the past season of 1885.

A season never to be forgotten in the annals of our club, distinguished by a succession of hard fought and brilliant victories, and ending with our club holding the proud title of

### "CHAMPIONS OF THE WORLD."

At the annual convention of the National Amateur Lacrosse Association, held at Montreal last April, a proposition was carried, by which the winning of the championship was to be decided by a majority of matches won, in a series to be played between the first-class clubs. This system to be given a trial for two years; but your committee are of the opinion that the rules in regard to this system are, as yet, defective (where defaulting clubs are concerned,) and, in order to ensure its proper working, some changes should be made and the matter, we trust, be brought up at the next convention meeting.

Some difficulty was experienced at the beginning of the season in obtaining field captains; but at a meeting of the committee and players, held on May 2nd, Messrs. D. E. Bowie and F. M. Larmonth were appointed. Shortly afterwards Mr. Bowie resigned and upon Mr. F. M. Larmonth devolved the position, which he held to the

entire satisfaction of the team and club throughout the season. As it is necessary, in accordance with our by-laws, to have two field captains, our President, Mr. W. H. Whyte was prevailed upon to accept the vacant position.

Carlind, D. Paterson, J. Graham, A. Urquhart, J. Baird, J. Grant, T. L. Paton, representing the Montreal Club, with Mr. F. M. Larmonth, captain.

On May 25th, we met and defeated, by 4 games to 2, a picked team of St. Regis and Cornwall Island Indians, our team being as follows: Messrs. T. L. Paton, W. J. Cleghorn, W. D. Aird, E. Sheppard, J. Michaud, J. Paterson, D. Paterson, J. Louson, T. Carlind, S. Struthers, J. Grant, N. J. Fraser. F. M. Larmonth, captain.

On May 29th, our team journeyed to Toronto to play on the 30th their first match in the Championship Series, with the Toronto Lacrosse Club, but owing to over confidence, wet weather and new uniforms, came home with a whitewash to their credit, being defeated in three straight games in half an hour's actual play. The following gentlemen represented the Montreal Lacrosse Club: Messrs. T. L. Paton, W. J. Cleghorn, J. Louson, E. Sheppard, J. Michaud, J. Paterson, D. Paterson, T. Carlind, N. J. Fraser, W. C. Hodgson, J. Grant, J. Baird. F. M. Larmonth, captain.

The severe defeat given our team by the Torontos had evidently its benefits, for the players at once settled down to hard practice; and on June 13th, met the Shamrocks (champions) on our grounds, in the second match in the Championship Series, resulting in our team winning the match by 3 games to 2, after a lengthy struggle and a magnificent exhibition of Lacrosse. The following composed the Montreal Twelve: Messrs. Percy Gorman, W. J. Cleghorn, J. Louson, E. Sheppard, J. Michand, N. J. Fraser, D. Paterson, T. Carlind, J. Paterson, T. L. Paton, W. C. On June 20th, the same team who defeated the Shamrocks on

the preceding Saturday, met the Ontarios on their Grounds in Toronto. (Championship Match,) and succeeded in beating them by 3 games to 1.

About this time a sub-committee reported on the advisability of forming a "Young Montreal Lacrosse Club," but as yet, no steps have been taken in regard to its organization.

The Toronto Team paid us a visit on June 27th, in accordance with championship arrangement, but without success, as our boys won the match by 3 games to 2. During their stay in Montreal, the St. Paul Lacrosse Club were entertained to a drive to Lachine, and given a good send-off by the members of our club.

The fall season opened by our Team defeating the Torontos on the Rosedale gounds in Toronto, on September 5th, by three straight games. About 90 outside members accompanied the team to Toronto, and it was very gratifying to the men on the field to know that so many friends were watching their movements from the grand stand. The following players upheld the honors of the Scarlet and Grey. Messrs. W. Aird, W. J. Cleghorn, J. Louson, E. Sheppard, J. Michaud, N. J. Fraser, D. Paterson, T. Carlind, J. Paterson, T. L. Paton, W. C. Hodgson, J. Grant. F. M. Larmonth, captain.

The final match played by our team in the Championship Series, was against our old opponents, the Shamrocks, and took place on the Shamrock grounds, September 12th. The match resulted in our boys inflicting a most crushing defeat on the Shamrocks in three straight games, notwithstanding very rough play on their part, in which several of our players were injured, particularly Mr. J. Louson, who was laid up for some weeks owing to injuries sustained, and who deserves the sympathy of the club for the plucky manner in which he played out the match, while crippled. The following gentlemen so successfully battled for the honor of the winged wheel on that memorable day: Messrs. W. D. Aird, W. J. Cleghorn, J. Louson, J. Michaud, N. J. Fraser, D. Paterson, J. Due notice was given us by the Secretary of the Ontario Club that they would not be on hand for the match on September 19th, preventing a chance of our club scoring another victory. Thus by their default the matches they had played for the championship were forfeited and struck from the score of the winning teams. The Toronto Club defaulting in like manner with the Shamrock Club, left the contest between our old rivals, the Shamrocks and ourselves. It is to be regretted that clubs should have been allowed to default in this manner without any penalty being attached to them for such conduct, while, by such actions, an injury could be done to those clubs who honorably carried out the programme laid down for them by the National Association.

Thus closed the Championship Series, and as stated at the beginning of this report, with our club holding the most envied title of "Champions of the World."

Out of eight matches played, seven were won by our team, the only match lost being the first one of the season. Twice we defeated the Ontario Club, the last time, three straight games.

Probably never before in the history of Lacrosse has a club had a more brilliant record, and your committee think that the captain and team are most deservedly worthy of the thanks and esteem of the members in general, for the admirable manner in which they upheld the honor of the "Old Club" during the past season.

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Arrangements for an American tour were now completed for the Champion Team, to take place in October, and as an appreciation of their services on the field, several influential members of the Club raised a guarantee fund to cover the cost of their travelling expenses while away, in the event of the gate receipts not being sufficient. The following players under Captain Larmonth left Montreal on October 3rd: Messrs. W. D. Aird, J. Allen Lowe, Percy Gorman, E. H. Brown, D. Paterson, T. Carlind, W. J. Cleghorn, G. D. Baillie, T. L. Paton, E. Sheppard, J. Paterson, J. Grant, N. J. Fraser, and after a succession of victories in Baltimore, New York, Boston, and Cambridge (Harvard College), and visiting Washington and Philadelphia, arrived home again on October 15th, having most thoroughly enjoyed their holiday.

Messrs. Jas. Sutherland, Alex. Stewart, G. W. Clarke, D. W. Allen, Wallace Stroud, Dan. Stroud, jr., and J. E. Bulmer, accompanied the Team, and added to the pleasure of the trip.

Invitations were received to play matches during the season, from the Kingston Lacrosse Club, at Kingston, Caughnawaga Indians, at Caughnawaga, St. Hyadinthe Turf Club at St. Hyacinthe, and Ottawa Lacrosse Club at Ottawa; but had to be declined owing to want of time.

Some correspondence was had in the fall, with Mr. J. Sinclair, of Belfast, in reference to a proposed tour to Canada during 1886, or a representative Irish Lacrosse Team, but as yet, nothing definite has been settled.

As a closing event to such a victorious season, it was decided to have a Club banquet, at which our Champion team would be guests. The banquet took place in the Windsor Hotel, on the evening of November 10th, about 130 members sitting down. During the evening the team and captain were presented with medals

and clasps from the Club, commemorative of the Championship Matches won during the season.

Long and enthusiastic applause ensued when the President annouced that a summary of matches played during the year, showed 17 won out of 18 played by our team.

The number of members on the roll is now 28 life, and 1426 paying members, being a total of 1454, an increase of 417 since this date last year.

During the year your committee provided a new outfit for the players. At the President's suggestion a Club Saratoga was purchased. Each uniform had the player's name attached, and after each match,

was handed back to the Secretary. By this means your team appeared on the field at every match clothed in the same uniform, complete.

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Early in the season the President was appointed to act for this Club on a Board of Revisors, to revise the By-Laws of this Club and the several Clubs composing the M.A.A.A. After many months of arduous work, the new By-Laws were submitted to the Club at a General Meeting called for that purpose, on the 2nd of March last, and were unanimously adopted. On the same evening the various sister Clubs composing the Association, as also the Association, adopted new and revised Constitution and By-Laws.

The National Lacrosse Association meets this year in Toronto, and your committee would suggest that your delegates be instructed to bring before that body the advisability of the Association appointing a special committee to revise the laws and rules of the game, to make them as short and comprehensive as possible, and to do away with, as at present, different conflicting laws.

Your committee have to announce with sincere regret the resignation of the popular Secretary-Treasurer of the M.A.A.A. and treasurer of this Club, Mr. Horace S. Tibbs. They wish to add their testimony to many services rendered this Club, and to the ready interest evinced in all its affairs during the past four years, by Mr. Tibbs. The Board of Directors have filled the vacancy by the engagement of Mr. R. Lloyd.

Though your team played more matches than usual, the large majority were played off the Club grounds, the receipts, therefore, as a consequence being less than in former years.

Your committee, however, have endeavored to lessen the expenditure, and a balance, \$309.00, will therefore appear to our credit, as will be shown in the Treasurer's statement.

#### GENTLEMEN:

Another season's work has been completed, and it now becomes the duty of your committee to lay before you the Forty-fourth Annual Report of the Club's doings.

In taking a retrospective glance at the past season, one is struck with the peculiar freaks which a Montreal winter sometimes takes, as it was the end of January before we were able to take a cross-country tramp, so sparsely was the snow distributed over the ground during the earlier part of the season.

But although the tramping was not as good as that of many previous years, it may safely be asserted that the evenings of the first year spent in the new Club Room were most enjoyable, and the remembrance of these pleasant occasions will remain deeply imprinted in the memory of those who had the pleasure of being present.



GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting the Report of your Committee for the second season's work.

The second season of the Club has not been as successful as the first,—we lost the championship this season to the Crystals,—and I think the principal cause is the trouble and inconvenience the Club has in the way of getting ice to practice on. If we had ice of our own to practice on I think we could make a better showing; as it is now, our boys only get one or two—at most—practices a week, whereas they ought to have ice where they could skate every day; as it is in skating that most of our players are backward.

The membership of the Club is not as large as it should be—only 25—but I trnst it will be largely increased next season. I think Hockey should be encouraged, as it takes the place of Lacrosse in the winter, and is very healthy exercise and quite exciting.

The season opened with the Crystal Championship Tournament, and it fell to the lot of our team to play against the Victoria Hockey Club, on the Crystal Ice, on Friday evening, 15th January; play two half hours; which was won by the Vics, after 1 hour and 20 minutes'

play; the puck being put through the goal by one of the Vics, and unopposed by any of our players, after an offside had been claimed by one our team. The referee, on being appealed to, gave the Vics. the game. Our team was composed as follows: T. L. Paton, F. M. Larmonth, W. C. Hodgson, D. McIntyre, R. A. Smith, T. Crispo and F. W. Barlow.
