SUGGEST HARDER TESTS.

The High School entrance examinations are understood to be again under fire. There has been some suggestion that the tests should be more severe, as many pupils, unable to benefit from the High School course are now admitted. Dr. W. S. Carter, chief super-intendent of education, is reported to have said that the regulation governing the High School entrance in St. John may be to some extent under the control of the local school board. # PEACE MOVE MADE IN EQUITY QUARREL

Stage to be 80 Per Cent. Closed Shop, is Rumored Offer.

New York, March 18 .- Rumors of a new compromise on Equity shop circulated along Broadway, but neither Equity heads nor producing managere likelihood of a strike on June 1 still omed large. Both the Equity Council

likelihood of a strike on June 1 still loomed large. Both the Equity Council and the Producing Managers' Association held meetings, thus lending color to reports that new negotiations were under way.

The new proposition, it is said, comes from the managers, and calls for them to guarantee that 80 per cent. or more of the actors employed will be Equity members. This stipulation, it was felt, would meet the main objection of Equity officials, who insist that they must have Equity shop or some equivalent thereof in order to hold their organization together.

The proposition also provides that the remaining 20 per cent. of actors must pay, either to the Actors' Fund or to another recognized theatrical charity, a sum equal to the dues called for by the Actors' Equity Association. In its original form the proposition lacked this latter provision and was refused by the Equity on the ground that it would enable the 20 per cent. to enjoy all the advantages guaranteed by Equity without being required to pay for them.

This proposition was openly discussed by individual managers and there was a tendency in some quarters to believe that it might prove acceptable to Equity. Others, while not so confident of the acceptance of exactly this proposition, felt that a settlement based on this principle, with perhaps some slight alternation of percentages, might prove the eventual way out of the difficuity.

The formal proposition to the Equity from the Producing Managers' Association, embodying these or similar terms, probably will be made in a day or two.

The Equity council meeting, customarily held on Tuesdays, was advanced a day, but it was said at Equity headquarters that this shift had no particular significance, as it had been made to enable Frank Gillmore and other council members to go to Albany today in connection with the proposed bill permitting Sunday night theatrical performances. In addition to Mr. Gillmore, those who will go to Albany will be Frank McGulre, Katharine Emmett, Jefferson de Angelis and perhaps Helen MacKellaar.

Late in the afternoon Winifred Lenihan, together with several other Equity members who are said to be uncertain about the advisability of Equity shop, visited Frank Gillmore to discuss the situation. Miss Lenihan was the first of two Equity members to speak out against Equity shop at the actors' meeting at the Forty-eighth street Theatre on Sunday afternoon.

Edgar Selwyn of the Selwyn brothers, who control three theatres on Forty-second street and will take over another on June 1, yesterday allied his firm definitely on the side of those who will make a separate peace with Equity.




