



Below was a sheer drop of about 200 feet, and then a steep incline of probably 300 feet more. Had the car gone over it must have been smashed to atoms and its passengers dashed to pieces on the rocky ground 500 feet below, in the bottom of the valley where the village of White Pass nestles. 
