EDITORIAL NOTES.
Since England's military resources have been concentrated in South Africa, the Crar's Government has made several moves on the strategic chess-board. It has guaranteed a loan to Persia, for the repayment of which the receipts of all the Persian customs houses are pledged, including those upon which British creditors have hitherto possessed a lien. In consideration of this concession which the when turned to account, should render her a vantage point in the Persian Gulf. It is also certain that the Russian garrisons near the northern frontier of Afghanistan, and especially in the neighborhood of Herat, have been largely re-enforced. More recently, a Russian squadron has appeared on the west coast of Corea, and has demanded the cession of a naval station near Chemulpo.

None of the three moves mentioned, however, is likely to plunge Russia into war. Her preponderance in Persia is, at present, uncontested; Japan has not yet ready to meet strength with her, and would not safely make acquisition of a Korean seaport by the latter power a casus belli; finally, nobody believes that Russia will invade Afghanistan until that kingdom is thrown into confusion by the death of the present Amier. More serious than any of these demonstrations is the assemblage of an army, said to number a quarter of a million, on the Russian coast of the Black Sea; adequate arrangements have been made, it is reported, for the transfer of this force to Turkish territory, and the Black Sea fleet has been mobilized in order to protect the transports. Such is the instrument of coercion by which the St. Petersburg Government is backing its demand for the cession of the Bosphorus and Dardanelles in Turkish Armenia and the adjoining territory, which would enable it to control the interchange of commodities between Asiatic Turkey and Persia, and also to control the railway, which the German subjects intend to build, for the trade of the Euphrates and Tigris valleys.

For upward of twenty years, Russia had a grievance against Turkey which could, at any moment, be made a pretext for war. By the Treaty of Berlin, Sultan was bound to cede to Russia the Crimean Peninsula of Kara and Batoum and the surrounding districts, but also to pay a considerable pecuniary indemnity. The indemnity has not been paid, and, even if he has the wish, to pay it, Herberot Russia would not consent to the payment of such a large sum. Agricultural
WOOD ASHES FOR ALL CROPS.
Good wood ashes are usually looked upon simply as a source of potash. While it is undoubtedly true that this potash is very available and is taken up by the plant at once, the good results from applying this fertilizer are partially due to the small percentage of phosphoric acid, ranging from 1 to 2 per cent. and quite a percentage of lime, amounting in some cases to 25 per cent. In soils of mineral origin the lime is very effective, in liberating plant food, particularly potash. The combined effect, therefore, of all these elements in wood ashes is always beneficial. As has been said, "They have been considered an excellent fertilizer. The supply, however, is rapidly decreasing, and in many cases it is impossible to obtain them. We depend chiefly on Canada and even that source is not always reliable. Furthermore, the wood ashes now on the market are exceedingly variable in composition. Some contain a great deal of dirt, and not a few lots have been leached for making soap before being sold for fertilizers. This leaching process removes nearly everything that is soluble, and is particularly effective in taking out of the lime. However, the greater part of the lime remains, and even leached ashes can be applied with profit. The ash should always be brought subject to analyses or the purchaser should require a guarantee as to the percentage of potash and phosphoric acid, and the Black Sea fleet has been mobilized in order to protect the transports.

EDUCATED NOSES.
Men whose olfactory nerves are so highly developed that they can distinguish between odors that the uneducated nose cannot discern are employed by chemists, tea-importers, and the large wine and liquor firms. A perfectly trained nose is of the utmost use in the compounding of perfumes, and it therefore happens that practical chemists should train their sense of smell to a very high pitch of perfection. Artists in sniffs can improve their ability by constantly exercising it. It has been proved that blind people develop a great deal upon their sense of smell. The throat as well as the nose of a professional sniffer must be entirely healthy, for any imperfection in either locality is apt to affect the nasal organ deleteriously. The very greatest care has to be taken against catching colds, for influenza or any kind of snuff will literally put a man off the scent for many days, and sometimes for months together. A highly educated nose reaches a state of useful activity in about five years, but ten are required to create a B.A. amount of sense, and even at such a state of perfection it can easily be beaten by many of the "lower animals," for these make up their lack of intelligence by their marvellous sense of smell.

OFFICIAL PRAYER.
Prepared by Episcopal Bishops For British Soldiers in the Boer War.
The great majority of the services held in the British army and navy, are according to the Book of Common Prayer of the Episcopal Church. The Book of Bishops of the Church of England has just issued a special "official prayer," for the use of their soldiers in South Africa. The prayer is interesting when read reflectively, it is as follows:
"Almighty God, I have often shrank before thee, Oh, wash me in the precious blood of the Lamb. O, Jesus, my Saviour, I have often shrank before thee, Spare me to see again those whom I love at home, or if not for Thy presence in peace, Strengthen us to quit ourselves like men in our fight and great courage. Keep us faithful unto death, calm in danger, patient in suffering, merciful to our brethren, true to our Queen, our country and our colors. If it be Thy will, enable us to win victory over the Boer, but above all, grant us the better victory, over temptation and sin, over life and death, that we may be more than conquerors through Him Who loved us, and laid down His life for us, Jesus, our Saviour, the Captain of the army of God. Amen."

PLANTING AND CULTIVATING STRAWBERRIES.
Do not plant in a small garden if you can help it, but choose some place where you can use a spade and team. A few long rows are better than many short ones. Never plant in the fall unless you have time and money to throw away. Plant on ground free of weed seed or you will rue it. Plant as soon as the ground is in good working condition, but not before. Have the stods well pulverized, then mark the ground off with furrows 3 or 4 in. deep and 40 in. apart. Have your plants ready before the furrows are opened. Take up a small bunch of plants, dip the roots in water, then sprinkle fresh dirt on the roots, then throw them set quickly before the dirt dries on them, and you will not lose a plant. Plant them 18 in. apart, spreading the roots out well and pressing the dirt down firm on the roots. Plant them on the level. If they are above it they will rot, and if they are below they will starve. The ground will rot down on them and cause much unnecessary labor. The same day you plant them, cultivate them. Keep the surface free of all weeds until frost in the fall. Never plow with big shoes. Never plow with a ridge. At all times, plow as close to the plants as you can, dragging the running wheels of the plow in between the rows. If weeds appear in the rows, pull them out with your hands, or cut them off. If you let no fruit grow on them the first year, you will get a much larger crop the next year and you will pinch off the fruit.

CARE OF WORKING HANDS.
Caution should be removed by the use of pumice stone, and stains by lemon, borax or ammonia, according to their nature. At night, after washing, rub the hands well with cold cream or any other emollient that agrees with the skin, apply oil of sweet almond or castor oil to the tips of the fingers, and keep them dry when they are out in the weather. Never wash the hands in very hot or very cold water, as excessive heat and excessive cold are as destructive to the beauty of the hands as to the beauty of the face. Most hands are unimpaired both to their owners and to those with whom they come in contact. To keep them dry wash them occasionally in water in which a lump of alum has been dissolved. Sunburn and freckles may be removed by the use of lemon juice and glycerine in equal proportions, or with a paste of coralline and glycerine.
I was talking to a lady whom I was sitting by at a dinner party last week, and deploring the loss of so many useful British lives in South Africa. 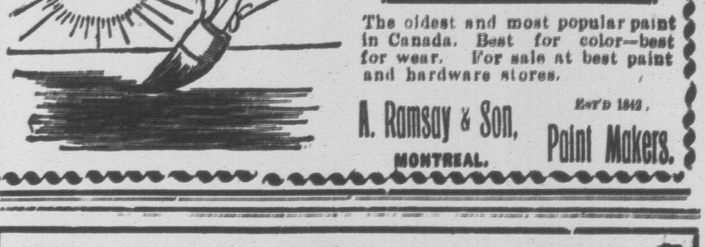

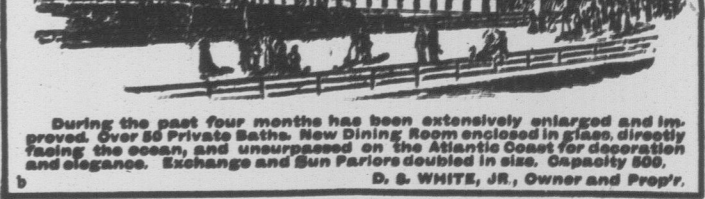
