LONDON, Eng., Sept. 29.—Lord Milner in the Nineteenth Century, writing on the value of the Canadian preference, says when British goods are competing with foreign goods in any part of the British Empire on more or less equal terms, even a moderate preference in favor of the British goods will turn the scale in their favor. Where they are competing against a slight but decided disadvantage such a preference can neutralize the disadvantage, and where the disadvantage is great owing to distance or other natural causes of a preponderating character, or even of the settled habits or customs of an important community, no preference that I desire to see imposed can wholly counteract the disadvantage, and though preference may certainly mitigate it it cannot work miracles, but it can and does exercise so great an influence on the course of trade that it is well worth making some effort and even some sacrifice to maintain and extend it. Lord Milner thinks the time has come when all fair-minded free trade importers will admit this,

Equally creditable is the record of the Liberal immigration policy. 

But the dry spell has continued beyond all records, and everything is so parched that Luther Beard, who has ust returned from a trip to Ohio, declares that in several districts he visited the product of the cows is now milk powder. This is rapidly being packed in small cartons and being sold packed in small cartons and being sold to druggists for sugar of milk.

Mr. Beard further relates how the drought has seriously affected the meat trade. In a few butchering establishments the cattle killed were quite unfit for beef purposes and the butchers were slicing up the meat and selling it at a large profit for dried beef.
