The geting in of the harvest is just as particula a work as any that women can undertake, and our sisters in Britain have shown us what they can do. Who will organize a Troop of the Land Army? There are thousands in England alone, and are Canadian girls any weaker or less brave?

If some of our women clubs or organizations would take up this work and place women friends could go to gether and much good might come of lit. The more crops are lost, the higher living will be and the poor will suffer.


