Amsterdam, Feb. 28—The terms on which the Central Powers are ready to conclude peace with Rumania have been communicated to king Ferdinand by Count Czernin, Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, according to Bucharest advices received by way of Berlin. Money with Morgan Firm Was His Own and Sent There to Purchase Paper, He Claims.

Paris, Feb. 28.—Senator Charles Jumbert, owner of the Journal, who was arrested last week in connection with the investigation of German propaganda in France, has written to Captain Bouchardon, of the Paris military court, a letter saying that he has been placed in a false light by the cabled despatches from New York regarding funds on deposit to his credit with J. P. Morgan & Company (An investigation made at the (An investigation made at the request of the French government by Attorney-General Lewis, of New York State, showed that Senator Humbert had cashed bonds to the value of \$324,000 to his credit). The senator asked a hearing on this subject, engating to produce complete documentary proofs of his asertions.

Part of the money in question, he writes, came from his personal fortune, being deposited in August, 1915, for the purpose of purchasing print paper for the Journal. Another account was opened with the Central Bank of Norway for the same purpose. As a matter of fact, he says, no paper was bought in America, better terms having been obtained in Norway.



## THE NOVA SCOTIANS DISTINGUISH THEMSELVES

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Canadian Army Headquarters in France, vis London, Feb. 27.—(By W. A. Willison, Correspondent of the Canadian Press)—Raiding the enemy by night and day, Canada in the field is continuing the policy of trench activity with marked success. No less than three raids have been carried out in the last twenty-four hours, netting us enemy prisoners and a machine gun.

Without the support of artillery, an officer and seven men of the Nova Scotia troops attacked an enemy position in Lens last night. Creeping through the virus of a village they first shot and killed an enemy sniper. Then the officer and three men, breaking through the breach in the wall, entered an enemy trench where four of the enemy were killed. Others forced to take shelter, were bombed in their dugouts. The single Hun in the enemy bombing post who showed first made a good stand until finished with a grenade. Then, taking their prisoners with them, the party wither were slightly injured by a bomb spark splinter.

Quebec Men Attack.

In another sector, some Quebec men, supported by a fifteen minute bombardment by our artillery trench mortars and machine guns, carried out a daylight raid into the enemy position, but the Hun had taken shelter and no prisoners were se-cured.

# SMUGGLE DRUGS

Arrest Leads to Belief Syndi- Perfect Understanding Exists cate of Opium Handlers Will Be Broken Up.

Burlington, Vt., Feb. 28.—It is expected that with the arrest of Jack Lawrence, who for the last 18 months has eluded the government agents, a powerful blow has been struck at a big syndicate of oplum smugglers which has been reaping tremendous profits by obtaining "dope" in Canada and disposing of it to wealthy drug addicts in New York city.

Lawrence is alleged to be the owner of 195 ounces of heroin discovered some time ago in the linen closet of a parlor car on the Central Vermont railroad, the porter, one Williams, having been arrested at the time.

Lawrence stepped off the train during the excitement. He was later indicted in New York. He was arrested on a warrant issued by Dist. Atty. VA. Builard of Vermont and will be tried at the Federal Court.



Toronto, Feb. 28.— Captain George
T. Bailey, of the Canadian Army Medical Corps, who made startling charges at the Dominion Alliance convention yesterday as to the conditions of the soldiers at the front at Christmas, was today arrested by the civil police charged with making statements deranged; to the King's troops and calculated to injure recruiting. In the police court he was remanded without bail. Bailey is an officer who got only as far as England.

Captain Bailey came from the vicinity of Cochrane, Ont. He went oversees from the London military district but on arriving in England, it is said, he was found to be physically unfit for service in Flanders.

In addition to a fine of \$5,000, imprisonment for five years may be given for the offence of which Captain Bailey is charged.


