ARMY OF 500,000 TAKES
36 PER CENT. OF MEN OF
MILITARY AGE IN CANADA

Figures Tabled in House Show That Material is at Hand for Numbers Wanted

Hon. Dr. Pugsley's Suggestion for Economy Considered—Two New Privy Councillors—Mining Experts Criticize New War Tax.

Ottawa, March 1—Information as to the number of men of military age in Canada was furnished in the house today by J. A. E. B. The figures show that 36 per cent of the men of military age in Canada are in the army.

Mr. Buchanan, of Medicine Hat, was furnished information as to wheat rates on the N. T. R. He was told that twenty cents of wheat had been shipped at the six cents per bushel rate from Armstrong to Montreal, and eighty cents from Armstrong to Quebec.

Dr. Pugsley's suggestion for economy was considered in the house today. Two new privy councillors were appointed, and mining experts criticized the new war tax.

The government has made representations to the imperial munitions board in Canada, and the board has agreed to supply munitions to Canada.

The mining men were careful to say that they did not wish to avoid paying their share of taxation, but they want the tax to be just and equitable.

CHARGES AGAINST THE ALBERTA GOVERNMENT

Edmonton, March 1—At the sitting of the legislature this afternoon Dr. Stanley, Conservative member for provincial parliament for High River made the following charges:

First—That the government or its agents have for some time received large sums of money from the Licensed Victuallers Association for election purposes.

Second—Large sums of money have from time to time been paid by licensees in the province to agents or officials of the government for the purpose of obtaining concessions from the government in connection with liquor licenses.

Third—That thousands of dollars have been paid to agents of the government to settle prosecutions under the Liquor License Ordinance.

Fourth—That in the year 1914 a large number of licenses of the province paid the sum of \$25,000 to the agents of the government to secure immunity from such extortion at the instance of such agents.

E. M. MacDonald Takes Up Canada's Finances

Says Sir Thomas White "Spends \$51,000,000 to Debt, Exclusive of War Expenses—Budget Passed"

Ottawa, Feb. 29—The budget resolution carried without division at 1.50.

Ottawa, Feb. 29—"It is a time for plain talk," declared E. M. MacDonald, of Pictou, in parliament tonight toward the close of the budget.

Mr. MacDonald's arraignment of Sir Thomas White and his administration of Canada's finances was a scorching one.

He quoted from the blue book of the fiscal figures to show that, altogether apart from the war expenditure and the interest on the public debt, the government had spent \$51,000,000 on the public debt.

Frederickton, N. B., Feb. 28—Commissioner Teed of St. John today began an investigation into the charges against Mr. Blair of the Provincial Public Works Department contained in an affidavit of E. C. Colby, former manager of the concrete construction which was paid \$30,000 for cleaning and painting steel bridges in New Brunswick in 1913.

Frederickton, Feb. 29—The investigation into the Colby charges against Mr. Blair of the public works department was concluded this afternoon by the commissioner, M. G. Teed, K.C. The witnesses today were Mr. Blair, Dr. McMillan and Percy Ryan, contractor. Colby was also recalled and was cross-examined again by A. J. Gregory, counsel for Blair.

There are some of the proofs given by Mr. MacDonald. In 1911 it cost \$24,000,000 to collect the revenue of Canada; in 1915 it cost \$42,000,000. This is an increase of 75 per cent. The increase in revenue during that time was \$16,000,000, that cost \$26,000,000 to collect that amount.
