The attack on Mr. Ernest Hutchison i the last Advance is in harmony with that paper's course in all matters relating t railways in Northumberland. A number of Newcastle gentlemen have beeu subjected to columns of ridicule and abuse simply because they felt called upon, in extremely cold. the interests of their own side of the river, to advocate and secure much-needed railway communication. But the policy of abuse failed in accomplishing the end thankfulness. so much desired by the Advance writer s follows :and the company in whose interests the abuse and ridicule were indulged in What do we find now? Why an attack in the columns of the Advance directed against Mr Ernest Hutchison because h is deeply interested in a proposed branch line of railway, intended to benefit the lower portions of the county, and particularly the residents in Lower Newcastle All kinds of charges are dovetailed in the article headed "The Spite Line," which might more appropriately have been headed "The Spite Again Cropping out against the Newcastle Side of the River." What does the Advance want for its railway friends? Does it expect that, because they construct a line of railway they are therefore to enjoy a monopoly in that business, to the exclusion of others who feel that their sections, which have to some extent been left out in the cold. can be made more prosperous by means of railway communication? Surely not -yet the course it has pursued, and is still pursuing, is open to such an interpretation. It is evident to all, that had the Advance

would crush out any railway enterprise calculated in any way to benefit Newcastle or vicinity. It may be argued by that paper that the proposed new line first received the support of some of the Chatham people, and that a change in sentiment resulted only when it was found (as alleged by the Advance) that Mr. Hutchison was in league with certain Newcastle gentlemen.
