Farm and Household.

VALUABLE HINTS.

If a leak appears in the roof, stop it at once.

Never allow the hens to drink from stagnant water.

Every tool should have its own place and be in it when not in use.

John Gould says: Don't put 20 worth of feed into a 50 cent calf.

Don't expect a good colt from a poor dam, nor a good crop from a poor soil.

Horses should have their feed cut in the morning, so as to give them plenty of time for digestion before work commences.

When you get a young animal to understand your commands there is not much difficulty in directing its course. Avoid, if possible, bringing the excitable horse in contact with that which unnerves him.—Southern Cultivator.

The cow has four large stomachs; the horse has one small one; therefore they need to be fed differently. The horse must have food often, and it needs to be fairly concentrated and rousing. The cow can take a large amount of food at once in her paunch and then lie down to ruminate and digest it. Therefore she must have time between meals to do this work. Food twice a day is often enough for her.

The best thing for a driver to do is to keep calm and use common sense at all times in handling the team. When a horse understands that he is not to be hurt, he will not be exercised or unreasonable, unless of bad disposition. Such cases require special treatment, and the judgment of the driver will determine the success of his work in handling the horse. Always take time to quiet an excited horse.

The best and only thing to do when your horse is excited is to calm him down. This is best done by getting to the horse's head and talking to him and gently rubbing his face and otherwise diverting his attention from the cause of his fright. If the horse is very angry the best treatment will be found beneficial. In a high state of excitement the horse does not comprehend what you want and it is useless, worse than folly, to insist on besting the frightened horse.

All men are excitable more or less; some more, and very many unreasonably so. What would be the effect of trying to abuse one of these red-hot, excitable men into being calm and considerate when under the influence of passion? It would certainly end in disaster to someone, and this may explain the consistency in some horses, kicking the end-gate out of the wagon and otherwise demolishing things when they are whipped and excited about something.


