GOOD WATER

On account of the epidemic of typhoid fever in Montreal the management of the Intercolonial Railway has made arrangements that all the sleeping, dining and passenger cars on the Intercolonial trains running in and out of Montreal will be supplied with fresh spring water from the celebrated Sugar Loaf Mountain Springs, near Campbellton, N. B. Presently all the cars on the I. C. R. tracks & several were furnished with the ordinary city water, but the officials of the railway consider that in the interests of the travelling public it is preferable to have the cars supplied with pure spring water.

We wonder how the Tribune can stand for this, as the overflow from Smith Lake and the town reservoir flow into the Tobique Brook which supplies the I. C. R. reservoir. It has been proved that the town water supply is superior and free from contamination than that in the I. C. R. reservoir.
