



Mrs. John W. Grant of Kilburn, N. B., recently received a letter from a chum of her son, the late Lance Corporal Robert Grant of the 46th Batt., which will prove of interest to his friends:

Erance, Feb. 3, 1918 Dear Mrs. Grant :- I have often thought of writing to you and know that I should have done so. I had lots of time while in the hospital but was not sure of your address and the rest of the time it was just neglect. I know that Pte. Stonebridge writes to you, and he often lets me read your

As you want to know, Mrs. Grant, I can tell you Beh was killed with a machine gun bullet in the head. It was a fatal place and he did not suffer at all. I did not see him afterward for 1 was in a different section, immediately on his right, but one of the boys stayed with him a few minutes. He was not dusfigured at all, only a small hole.

If Bob sent you any pictures while we were in camp, you will likely bave one of me. If you have no late pictures of him I could get my mother to send you one. I left nearly all of my photo's at home, so I have not one of him here.

The weather has been very kind to us lately, but two we ke ago the mud was awful. Mud and wet weather are so depressing to one's spirits that I will gladly welcome the summer.

Pte Stonebridge and I are in the same section. We are runne s, or messengers.

I like to read your letters, Mrs. Grant, They are so much like those I get from my mother. They very often drive away a fit of the blues. I really don't know what we would do out here if it were not for the mail. Engouragement from real friends is such a helping hand.

My youngest beother enlisted some time ago and mother was very much put out about it. He is only 17 and I hope he will take my advice and go home for awhile. at least, of course, mother sould claim him but she thinks perhaps that is not her duty. I would mind if father was living, but it leaves her so lonely.

I am sure you know what a a noble son you had in Bob, and l can say that everything I knew of him was absolutely to his credit. He was a man among men in the Battalion.

I will close for now as I am a very poor hand at writing a letter, I would like to hear from you if you have time to write, I am sure mother would have written if she had known your address.
