HIS LAST ASCENT.

An Aeronaut Meets With a Fatal Acci-dent at Beardstown, Ill.

BEARDSTOWN, Iil., July 5.—Prof. Samuel Black, an aeronaut, met with a horrible death at this place yesterday afternoon. When at a height of 400 feet in his ascent he signaled that he was about to descend, but something seemed to have gone wrong with his parachute. A few minutes later a thin stream of smoke was seen issuing from the parachute, which in a few seconds burst into a flame, severing the parachute from the balloon, and the aeronaut was seen falling through the air at a frightful speed. Half an hour later his body was found, horribly mangled, about two miles from the seene of the ascent. It is supposed the parachute caught fire from sparks from a mill near by. After encouraging them with the fact that it was their Father's good pleasure to give them the Kingdom, and that therefore He would surely see to their present need in the small matters of food and raiment, He commanded them to be watchful and diligent, expecting persecution while they improved the present time of grace. He then turned to the people with an admonition to repent, and by the parable of the fruitless fig tree taught them that they were spared as a nation only because of intercession, and through the long suffering of God.

Not so bad as the man at the pool of Bethesda who had an infirmity thirty-eight years (John v. 5), but bad enough surely. In Luke v. 15; vii, 21; viii, 2, we read of many who had been healed by Him of their infirmities, and it may be that this woman had heard through some of them of His wonderful power and love, or she may have been, notwithstanding her infirmity, a regular attendant at the synagogue and a true worshiper of the One God. The word translated "infirmity" signifies also "without strength" or weakness, siskness, disease—and it is the word used in reference to our Saviour in Matt. viii, 17, where it is written: "Himself took our infirmities and bare our sicknesses." In Him is health of body and soul for all the world.

12. "And when Jesus saw her, He called her to Him, and said unto her, Woman, thou art loosed from thine infirmity." When He called, she evidently came; He is still calling "Come unto Me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest;" but how few seem to come. This woman was conscious of her helplessness and earnestly desired release, therefore she came readily. Sinners, though bowed down and urable to lift themselves up, are too often unconscites of it, do not think they are sick, and therefore heed not the physician. 

THE KREUTZER SONATA

Beautiful Duet of Beethoven Whose

Name is the Title of Tolstoi's Book.

Name is the Title of Tolstoi's Book.

The title of Count Tolstoi's last novel, admirably suggestive to musiciaus and to the great majority of even moderately cultivated amateurs of music, seems, says the Speaker, to have puzzled many of the Russian authors, commentators and translators. The Kreutzer Sonata is the most beautiful, as it is also the most popular of Beethoven's many beautiful duets for violin and piano; and the two evenly balanced and constantly responsive parts, full of tender and passionate phrases, cannot but give the idea of a love fluet. No one but Beethoven could have written it, and, as a matter of fact, Beethoven itid write it. Yet the French papers appear to think that it was composed by Kreutzer and boldly call it "La Sonate de Kreutzer, the composer of "Lodoiska" and the principal violints of Marie Antoinett's concert orchestra. The name of Kreutzer ought to be known to the French, though Berlioz has told us that his countrymea could never master either its orthography or its pronunciation. They now fattrioute to Kreutzer one of the most characteristic and most fascinating of Beethoven's works. The writer of the interesting account of Count Tolstoi's book published in the Universal Review makes the performer of the string part in the Kreutzer Sonata play it on the violoncello. If this prodigious mistake occurs in the novel (a supposition scarcely tenable), Count Tolstoi's elequent rhapsodies as to the dangerously seductive character of the work lose a good deal of the value which might otherwise belong to them.

That Beethoven was passionately in love when he wrote the Kreutzer Sonata is evident, not only from the thrilling melodies of the work liself, but also from positive external testimony. He dedicated the sonata in the first instance to a violinish named Bridgetower/well known in London; and Bri

What is a fire? is the question which a Paris court was recently called on to de-cide. The Countess Fitzjames had had all her effects insured by the Union Fire Insurance Company for 685,000 francs. In the list of jewels covered by the policy In the list of jewes covered by the policy was a pair of poarl earnings valued at 18,000 francs and insured for 10,000. One afternoon while dressing the Countess knocked the earnings accidentally from the mantelpiece into the open fire. Despite her strenuous efforts with shovel and tongs the jewels were destroyed. She recovered the gold, valued at sixty francs, and demanded from the company 9,940 francs indemnity for the loss of the pearls. The company refused to pay a cent, on the ground that an edinary grate fire was not the kind of a fire contemplated in the insurance policy. Countess appealed to the courts, and got a decision in her favor. The Judge held that 'an insurance against fire was an insurance against all kinds of fire—that was, insurance against any loss caused by any flames."
