The trotting horse is not confined to the track, but is useful on every hand. On the road he is great; on the farm he does the work of a mule, plowing, harrowing and hauling heavy loads. In cities he pulls butcher carts, milk wagons, buggies, carriages, omnibus and express wagons, and is found indispensable in many other places where nothing but fast harness horses can be used. Horses that make trotting race horses are about one in every 100, and the man who breeds a common mare to a trotting-bred horse and fails to get a 2:20 performer need not be disappointed, but has some assurance of a nice roadster that will be worth three colts from a scrub horse. What could a good roadster be sold for? It would be safe to say \$300, while a scrub would sell for \$100, and perhaps a good deal less, and cost the same amount to raise.—

CANADA AND THE UNITED

Of all the good speeches made on the oc casion of the opening of the St. Clair tunnel the other day the most pithy and eloquent was no doubt the speech of our own George W. Ross. The occasion was one which naturally suggested a fraternity of trade relations, and Mr. Ross correctly interpreted the celebration of the day when he accepted it as a token of commercial unity on this continent. Every railway that has been built, every canal, every bridge, every tunnel, every work to emove barriers to transit or to cause the current of traffic to move smoother or more quickly -what has been the object of it but to facilitate trade and commerce beween severed communities and States and to widen the circle of neighborhood? It costs less to ship a barrel of flour from Minneapolis to Montreel or Boston to day than it cost 40 years ago to ship it from London to Hamilton—very much less. And a journey of 1,000 miles is undertaken more readily to-day and accomplished easier, quicker and cheaper than was a journey of 100 miles 40 years ago. But, absurdly strange, while this great progress has been made in the means of transit through the energy and enterprise of the peoples of Canada and the United States, the policies of political parties on both sides of the international line have been piling up obstacles to the free movement of intercommunication between the two countries. The Mrs. Partingtons of parties have been busy with their brooms sweeping back the tide; but it moves on in spite of them, and soon it will sweep them all away. 

POLITICAL UNION.

An Organization in Windsor to Promote it.

The Members Give Their Reasons for Their Advocacy of the Change.

Windsor, Sept. 29.—For some time past the Review newspaper (Conservative) has been asserting that the N. P. has proved a thorough failure, and that the country must have independence, or, failing that, political union with the United States. This view is sustained by the Continental Club, a citizen organization which has just been established in this town, with Dr. Soper as president, Ald. Nash secretary, and Dr. Brien treasurer, and passed the following resolutions as their platform: Whereas, the census returns of the Dominion of Canada, recently issued by the Government, show the population of the Dominion to be but 4,823,344, an increase of less than 500,000, or only 11.52 per cent. during the past ten years, and

Whereas, while the immigration returns show that since 1881 1,000,000 immigrants in round numbers have arrived in Canada, the census returns exhibit an increase in population of but 500,000, showing that all our own natural increase as well as half the immigration during that period have left the country, and

Whereas, in a young country like Canada, embracing an area of 3,470,000 square miles, the increase in population should be approximate to the increase in the United States, a country similarly situated and its next neighbor, and in which the increase during the past ten years was 24 per cent., or about two and a third times greater than that of Canada and

Whereas, when the confederation was entered into the people of Canada were assured that by the year 1891 there would be 10,000,000 people in the country has been almost at a standstill as compared with the prosperous nation to the south of us on the same continent the burdens of the people have been increased out of all proportion to their ability to bear them, as for instance the debt which in 1871 was only \$21 per head of the population, has in 1891 grown to the enormous sum of within a fraction of \$50 for every man, woman and child in the Dominion, and the annual expenditure increased during the same period from \$3 to \$8 per head—that is WINDSOR, Sept. 29. than at confederation. While, so far from being the case, the expenditure per head has nearly trebled and the debt per head more than doubled during the period since confederation; be it therefore.

Resolved, that in the opinion of this meeting the above recited facts are such as to call for the most serious reflection on the part of all, irrespective of party, who desire the advancement and prosperity of their country, and it is a matter for regret that these extraordinarily large expenditures have been made with such an unprofitable result that the Northwest lands, the finest on the continent, are developing the finest on the continent, are developing slowly in contrast with those of our immediate neighbors; that we desire to express the opinion that this unfortunate state of affairs is due almost wholly to the press the opinion that this unfortunate state of affairs is due almost wholly to the fact that we are divorced politically and commercially from the continent of which we form an important part. That to secure our proper place with respect to the trade of the continent a political union with the United States is necessary; that such union would render Canada a field for American capital with which it would enter as freely for the prosecution of public works and private enterprise as any of the present States. That it would equalize the value of real estate upon both sides of the boundary, thereby probably doubling at once the entire value of property in Canada, a circumstance which should not be lost sight of by the British investor in Canadian securities, whose confidence in the value of our public institutions must have been seriously impaired by the recent revelations in connection with both the Dominion and Quebec Governments. That whilst giving stability to our institutions and introducing prosperity it would enhance our public, corporate and private credit; that our commerce both with the United States and foreign countries, would be increased, while our intercourse would not necessarily be diminished with Great Britain, into which our products would enter on the same terms as at present; that our rivers and canals, to the incalculable advantage to the territory contiguous thereto, would become the comis corruption alone that can look upon corruption without indignation, and such corruption will not fail to attract the eagles of divine judgment. If this evil goes unpunished it will but serve to show that the life of the nation is fast ebbing away, and lite of the nation is fast ebbing away, and that soon upon the rotten carcass there will swoop down the eagles of a judgment that will leave behind but little trace of what has been. Whether our financiers will find it impossible to float their business projects, or whether that strange people clamoring at our doors will burst the arbitrary boundaries established, and, sweeping across our land, establish a new China, I know not; but this I know, the resources of divine judgment are infinite, and are never wanting when the conditions require them. THE CITY MORTALITY.

the Statistical Returns.

London is a comparatively healthy city. Its death rate per 1,000 of population is 11.59, a proportion creditably lower than that of other large cities of Canada. According to the returns 359 people died in London during 1890. The classified tables show that of these 162 were males, 197 females, and 152 widowed; 178 were English, 104 Irish, 56 Scotch, 2 French, and 19 of other nationalities; 112 were Church of England, 113 Methodists, 58 Roman Catholics, 19 Baptists, and 2 of denominations undefined. the Statistical Returns.

ations undefined.

Statistics inform us that of this number 76 died under 1 year of age, 22 from 1 to 5 years, 17 from 5 to 15, 31 from 15 to 25, 28 from 25 to 35, 23 from 35 to 45, 26 from 45 to 55, 46 from 55 to 65, 41 from 65 to 75, and 49 who were over 75 years of age and 49 who were over 75 years of age.
Their occupations were also classified as
follows: 111 industrial, 120 laborers, 69
commercial, 9 domestic, 24 professional and
26 in other pursuits. This evidence speaks
strongly for the advantages of domestic

strongly for the advantages of domestic life.

The compiler has also prepared a table of the diseases in the order of latality. Among the foremost are: Lung diseases 47, phthisis 37, old age 35, heart and blood vessel diseases 25, cerebro spinal affections 19, catarrhal affections 18, diarrhal affections 17, paralysis 16, enteritis and other affections of the bowels 15, cancer 13, epilepsy and convulsions 12. As regards the contagious diseases, scarlet fever claims 6 victims, typhus 6 and diphtheria5. The greatest mortality in any one month was in January, the rate being 2.05 per 1,000 of the population; the least was in July with .62.

Deaths by accidents aggregate 16.71 to 1,000 deaths, and .19 to 1,000 population. In the latter respect London's proportion is remarkably low compared with other cities, Quebec, the next in order, showing .46.

Every railway that has been built, every canal, every bridge, every tunnel, every work to remove barriers to transit or to cause the current of traffic to move smoother or more quickly-what has been the object of it but to facilitate trade and commerce be tween severed communities and States and to widen the circle of neighborhood? It costs less to ship a barrel of flour from Minneapolis to Montreal or Boston today than it cost 40 years ago to ship it from London to Hamilton-very much less And a journey of 1,000 miles is undertaken more readily to-day and accomplished easier, quicker and cheaper than was journey of 100 miles 40 years ago. But, absurdly strange, while this great progress has been made in the means of transit through the energy and enterprise of the peoples of Canada and the United States, the policies of political parties on both sides of the international line have been piling up obstacles to the free movement of tries. The Mrs. Partingtons of parties have been busy with their brooms sweeping back the tide; but it moves on in spite of them, and soon it will sweep them all away. That is inevitable, and every work such as the St. Clair tunnel, the Grand Trunk, Can adian Pacific and Michigan Central railways, and the international bridges spanning the St. Mary, Detroit, Niagara and St. Lawrence rivers, is hastening the day when the trade of the continent shall be commercially free. The fight against nature is always ridiculous, but it becomes doubly so when nature and human interest are on the same side. If this be so, then, pray, from what motive did their own citizens enlist? The bounty was not for Canadians specially. It was primarily for the young men of the United States, for those whose country was in jeopardy. If young Canadians were mercenaries, were young Americans patriots? The taunt is unworthy of any American citizen, and it becomes despicable in the mouth of a Federal secretary. The fact is that nowhere on this continent was hostility to the institution of negro slavery more keenly felt than in Canada. It was our pride and our boast that our country wa his liberty, and so when the time came to the incontestible documentary proof laid strike the blow for emancipation of his race on the American continent, the Canadian people were heart and hand with the cause. They were not influenced in any degree by the sentiment of European notions. They had nothing in common with the aristocracy of England. The democracy of the new world was theirs, that purer democracy which had liberty. equality and fraternity for its motto, and for that cause the young men of Canada offered their lives. But another battle of freedom is yet to be won. The freedom of

Here is a complaint of this character last Here is a complaint of this character last made to him. 'I have got but two months, and I am entitled to four. Please have it altered for me; I want all four months that I was sentenced for.' Again, meeting in a county prison a physician sentenced for two years for malpractice, the writer was astounded with this conversation. The prisoner was a man who had been noted for his enjoyment of the luxuries of existence. He said: 'It is a great mistake you fellows make in thinking you are inflicting punishment when you send men here. I have been here a year, and can truly say I have enjoyed it herea year, and can truly say I have enjoyed i so much that I shall not feel sorry if my pardon is not obtained. You see, it has been vacation with just enough to do to amuse me. The novels in the prison library are entertaining, and I am very fond of dominoes and checkers, and find some first. dominoes and checkers, and find some firstrate players among the men. Now, if it
strikes me in this way, who have been accustomed to every luxury, how must it be
to the poor devils who never have a square
meal outside? Do you wonder that they
flock by hundreds and thousands to the
jails in winter? My only suprise is that
you can keep any of them out at all.' This
is the opinion of an educated man who has
experienced the benefits of the system in
his own person, and finds them delightful'
—a life from which he is loath to part. But
it is evident that it is far from the 'auster-—a life from which he is loath to grate Jot it is evident that it is far from the 'auster-ity and severity' which once did 'pervade the prison place;' and it will be hard from this to realize the good man's desire of 'impressing the prisoner with the idea that the way of the transgressor is hard.

The balance was to be paid in quarterly payments of \$25 each. Last December Mr. Parsons went to Cincinnati, Ohio. On July 9 Wm. Seccombe, brother-in-law of Mr. Parsons, had the piano shipped per G. T. R. to parts unknown. Seccombe stated that the instrument was shipped early in June to Port Huron but was not sure to whom it was addressed. Fraser & Fraser, solicitors for the Bank of British North America, waited on Mrs. Parsons, and she oftered them \$100 to settle the payment. There was at the time \$136 due. She would not say where the piano was when questioned. A bailiff was then engaged to search for the instrument and he reported that it was not in the house. The Bank of British North America of Toronto had placed the claim in the hands of their solicitor. The Grand Trunk authorities stated that on

claim in the hands of their solicitor. The Grand Trunk authorities stated that on July 9 a piano was shipped to A. L. Holmes, Detroit, and that no other piano had been shipped for some weeks previous to this time, in fact since May. E. Meredith, counsel for the defendant, went into the box on behalf of his client. He said he advised Mrs. Parsons that she had a right to ship the piano wherever she wished, and that she did it on his advice. He thought it was a most scandalous proceeding, and the prosecution was entirely unjustified and harsh. The magistrate, after considering the evidence, dismissed the case.

THE CITY MORTALITY Interesting Statements Gleaned from

the Statistical Returns.

London is a comparatively healthy city. Its death rate per 1,000 of population is 11.59, a proportion creditably lower than that of other large cities of Canada. According to the returns 359 people died in London during 1890. The classified tables show that of these 162 were males, 197 females, and 152 widowed; 178 were English, 104 Irish, 56 Scotch, 2 French, and 19 of other nationalities; 112 were Church of England, 113 Methodists, 58 Roman

19 of other nationalities; 112 were Church of England, 113 Methodists, 58 Roman Catholics, 19 Baptiats, and 2 of denominations undefined.

Statistics inform us that of this number 76 died under 1 year of age, 22 from 1 to 5 years, 17 from 5 to 15, 31 from 15 to 25, 28 from 25 to 35, 23 from 35 to 45, 26 from 45 to 55, 46 from 55 to 65, 41 from 65 to 75, and 49 who were over 75 years of age. Their occupations were also classified as follows: 111 industrial, 120 laborers, 69 commercial, 9 domestic, 24 professional and 26 in other pursuits. This evidence speaks strongly for the advantages of domestic strongly for the advantages of domesti

The compiler has also prepared a table of the diseases in the order of ratality. Among the foremost are: Lung diseases 47, phthisis 37, old age 35, heart and blood putnisis 31, old age 35, heart and blood vessel diseases 25, cerebro spinal affections 19, catarrhal affections 18, diarrheal affections 17, paralysis 16, enteritis and other affections of the bowels 15, cancer 13, epilepsy and convulsions 12. As regards the contagious diseases, scarlet fever claims 6 victims, typhus 6 and diphtheria 5. The greatest mortality in any one month was in January, the rate being 2.05 pe

Deaths by accidents aggregate 16.71 to 1,000 deaths, and .19 to 1,000 population. In the latter respect London's proportion is remarkably low compared with other cities, Quebec, the next in order, showing .46.
