The curse of hard times prevails everywhere. It is often suspected that the complaints of shep keepers about the bad condition of trade are not genuine, but this year such complaints are known to be saddy true, and the outlook for improvement in any branch of trade is encedingly gloomy. Ottawa, Dec. 25.—President Van Horne, of the C. P. R., has sent a startling letter to Mayor Durocher through the C. P. R., solicitor here. After referring to the inconvenient situation of the sempany's depot here he says the C. P. R. have for some time been considering a scheme for a new entrance to the city. It is proposed to bridge the Ottawa River west of Gatineau Point to a point near Nepean Point, crossing Nepean Point near Nepean Point, orossing Nepean Point and the Rideau Canal. LONDON'S NEW SYSTEM OF COL-LECTING CITY TAXES. The retiring City Council deserves credit

for passing a new and satisfactory bylaw

with regard to the collection of city taxes. In future, as has been enacted in every progressive city in Canada, to the manifest advantage of the overwhelming proportion of the people, the taxes will be payable in two installments. One half the regular rate less any fractional part, and the assessment for local improvements must be paid on or before Aug. 15, and the remainder on Oct. 15. The taxpayer who pays his second installment before Oct. 15 will receive a discount of 3 per cont., equivalent to 18 per cent. per annum. The council has decided that if these installments are not paid as pro-

vided for, 5 per cent, shall be added. The practical effects of this change will

1. The city will not be compelled to borrow money from the bank, and to tax the people to make good the interest, to defray all civic expendi-tures from January to December. No business man manages his own affairs as the council has hitherto conducted civic business. Why should city affairs not be conducted with as scrupulous regard for economies as private business? While they are not, the taxes cannot be reduced.

The taxes will be collected when the mass of the taxpayers can best afford to pay them. In December, when the taxes are now called for, the heaviest bills of the household fall due, and when taxes are added the burden is too heavy. In the early fall work is more plentiful, and coal and wood bills do not come due as they do

3. With the taxes paid on the dates named, the city will save several thousand dollars in bank interest, thus enabling the aldermen to reduce the taxation, as well as pay the substantial discount granted to citizens when they pay their final install-

4. Another saving under the new system will accrue from the fact that the new council will be able to estimate its own expenditures in March or April at the latest, before the money is all spent. Under the system now discarded, the estimates are not made up till August or September, after all the money has virtually been spent, thus affording much scope for extravagent and haphazard expenditures.

5. The generous discount granted on payment of second installment will insure a pretty prompt response on the part of the mass of the taxpayers, who, it must be said, are not backward in paying their legitimate debts. Our discount of 3 per cent. is much more liberal than that granted in Toronto, where a similar system exists, and where only one half of 1 per cent. discount is allowed on the second installment.

A demagogic agitation has been in progress for some time intended to injure those aldermen who inderse the principle that London should conduct its financial affairs London should conduct its insucial analise on business principles, as all progressive communities now do. The detractors whisper into the ears of electors that the aldermen have decreed that citizens must aldermen have decreed that classess must pay two years' taxes in one, and they ex-claim, "Just think of the extertion! Would you vote for such men?" It is not true that the new system calls

The council would not collect two years taxes in one year if it desired to do so. The Legislature has given it no power to do so, and never will give it or any other council The coupeil wou

The letter contained a most distorted estimate of the stocks of cheese in Canada, alleging that the make was in excess of that of 1891 by 300,000 boxes and that we were about to flood the British market with the surplus. As a matter of fact, there is no R. W. Holman living in this city or vicinity.

There can be no doubt the conjecture of the Montreal Bulletin is correct, that the letter was written for the disgraceful purpose of deceiving the cheese buyers of Great Britain, and thoroughly caring them by stating in an apparently disinterested manner that there were about that actually existed, in order that they would hold off buying and thus cause the market to sag, and enable someone who had previously made short sales of about 30,000 to 40,000 boxes of September cheese for January delivery in London at 50s to 51s c. i. f. to cover at lower prices. That is believed by the entire trade in Canada to have been the sole object of getting the "Holman" letter published in the London, Eng., Grocer. It is really astounding to witness the contemptible tricks which some traders will resort to for the purpose of making money by gulling the public. In the above instance, however, the "Hol-man" short seller of cheese did not suc-

ANOTHER GREAT CANAL SYSTEM

In the Canada Gazette of this week notice is given that application will be made by an international syndicate for a Dominion charter for the International Navigation Company, which promises to be one of the most remarkable enterprises undertaken in modern times. The syndicate has been organized to connect Lake Eric, Montreal and New York City by 22foot navigation, with locks 22 feet draft, 50 feet wide and 450 feet long. The canal between Lakes Erie and Ontario will be about 24 miles long, and the descent will be made with four locks, each of about 80 feet lift. Visuals will pass from lake to lake in four hours. The navigation will be: Down the St. Lawrence, reaching Lake St. Francis, with one lock of 48 feet lift at Cornwall; from Lake St. Francis one arm of the navigation will descend to Montreal, with one lock of 82 feet at Lake St. Louis, and one of 45 feet at Montreal harbor; the other arm will strike Lake Champlain, descending into it with one lock of about 50 feet; then down Lake Champlain, and cut through to the Hudson, descending to tide level with one lock of about 85 feet lift. Be-tween Lake Erie and Montreal there will be seven locks and 363 miles of navigation, of which 45 miles will be canal. Between Lake Erie and New York there will be seven locks and 706 miles of navigation, of which 131 will be canal. Between Montreal and New York will be four locks and 403 miles of navigation, of which 115 will be canal. The time from Lake Eric to Montreal will be 32 hours; irom Lake Erie to New York, 60 hours; between Montreal and New York, 38 hours. The striking feature of the navigation is the lift of the locks, the greatest being 3 1-2 as high as any ever built. Such high lifts are said by the promoters to be rendered possible by the use of compressed air operating in locks built entirely of steel and working with the greatest speed consistent

with safety.
It is understood that the canal between lakes Erie and Ontario will be constructed in the United States, and that it will prove a formidable competitor to the Welland canal, on the Canadian side, which does not now pay expenses. The new system of navigation, indeed, if carried out successfully will revolutionize the lake carrying trade, and have an important influence upon the several lines of railway. It will be a severe blow to Canadian canal interests if, after our Government has spent many millions of dollars on constructing and im proving them, this new syndicate, which is understood to be controlled by United States capitalists, should now supply a waterway that will have the effect of largely neutral.

We know may they Sir John Thompson was so anxious to get rid of Hon. John Carling, but it is probable that the new Premier was thinking of two-rowed barley when he ordered the old Minister of Agriculture off the premises. IN A WATERSPOUT'S PATH.

IN A WATERSPOUT'S PATH.

Narrow Zecape of a British Ship from Total Destruction.

Philadelphia, Dec. 25.—The British steamship Amur, from Caibarien, dropped anchor off Gloucester Friday night, and her appearance indicated the thrilling experiences she has had with the elements. On Dec. 19, when on the southern edge of the gulf stream, the ship had a narrow escape from total destruction by a waterspout, which passed under her stern not many yards from the ship. The first seen of this monstrous disturbance was in the shape of a heavy cloud on the horizon direct to windward, but as it drew near it appeared as though it would overtake the ship and send all on board to the bottom. It was a desperate struggle to get out of its way, the ship being already in a disabled condition. The engineer put on all steam, realizing it was a race for life. Nearer and nearer the dangerous water column drew to the ship, but the ship had gotten north to a place of safety. The waterspout passed the Amur's stern with a dealening noise and disappeared. The same evening the wind freshened up and by midnight was blowing a gale, the ship driving directly under the waves and sweeping from her decks everything movable. The tarpaulins on the hatches were washed away, ports were started and boat coverings were torn away. A tremendous sea from the northeast still continued and her decks were started through the immense pressure brought about by the great quantities of water that was being continually shipped. Everyone on board was more or less in jured through the ship's terrific rolling, and the captain pronounces it the worst passage he ever experienced.
