#### Conference Adopts Sir Wilfrid's Plan

London. May 14.—The Colonial Conference at its closing session today adopted the motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in favor of an all British subsidized steamship route from the United Kingdom to Australia, by way of Canada. A committee is to be appointed to inquire into the cost of such a route, and draw up definite proposals on the subject. The motion of Sir Wilfrid is designed to bring about a reduction in freight charges, thus giving an indirect form of preference to the British colonies, reducing the time from England to Australia to twenty, instead of thirty days, and in the end diverting some of the traffic now going by way of New York.

NOVEL BASEBALL PROTEST

Pittsburg Blames Shinguards for Loss of Game to New York.

Boston, May 14. - Manager Clark, of the Pittsburg National baseball club, announced last night that he had protested the game played last Saturday with New York on the ground that Catcher Bresnahan, of New York, had worn shinguards. 

Such is the opinion of an American merchant who has just been intertour throughout the east.

"I was amazed at the amount of speculation which is now being inclose. December jumped from 104 to dulged in by all classes in the principal cities," he said.

"The stock exchange in Tokio, which unlike ours in Wall street is thrown open to the public, is frequently the scene of great excitement, and bucket shops of the worst description abound both in the capital and in other cities. The produce and the rice exchanges are other centers of feverish gambling and already the newspapers are predicting that unless legislation is changed some Japanese Leiter will yet attempt a corner in rice.

"I have just learned that companies and syndicates floated during the 12 months ending January last represented the astonishing total capitalization

"Many of these concerns were originally of the soundest description possible, but Japanese company promoters whose numbers are rapidly growing have recently been responsible for the most rotten deals.

"In land and house property, too there was much speculation. In northern Japan, more especially, property has in many cases trebled in value. "Happily Japanese women do not speculate and take very little interest in business affairs. The railways owned by the state also afford no field for mamnipulation and speculation, and the tramways in Tokio are shortly to be municipalized.

"I have talked with some of the sober minded statesmen of Japan and they believe that the present fever is a passing phase, due to the great wave of prosperity which is passing over the nation and to the elation consequent upon her victories."

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
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



When it was evident that he could not retrieve his losses, a lawyer was consulted, who advised that the only way out of the dilemma was to steal \$1,000,000 worth of securities, and turn them over to the lawyer, who might negotiate with the officials of the trust company for their return. 
