Eddie, Mike and Bill to End Middleweight Dispute

McGoorty, Papke and Gibbons. The eternal triangle has bobbed up again with the feminine angles missing—and the public sees Mike Gibbons, Billy Papke and Eddie McGoorty, claimants of the middleweight boxing championship.



Gibbons recently graduated from the ranks of the welterweights. McGoorty is a slam-bang, knock-out-with-a-punch fighter. He has beaten the champions of Australia and England, and when middleweights are scarce he takes on light heavies for exercise. It was McGoorty who tickled Dave Smith, champion of Australia, under the chin with his left hand and then hung a right swing on the Smith jaw, landing the antipodean upon his right ear. When he arose Eddie promptly knocked him out. Jack Arrison, champion of England, lasted less than two minutes with the north of Ireland person from Oshkosh. Mike Gibbons, whose 10-round draw with McGoorty has added to the middleweight fog, is a stung phantom. Jim Corbett says he is the cleverest in the world. He is a master boxer, but like most clever men lacks the snappy punch that ends fights suddenly. In a 20-round bout Gibbons would outbox any middleweight living—providing he was not knocked out. Usually when boxer meets fighter over a long route the fighter wins, but Gibbons is so infernally clever that he may be the exception. Papke is different from either Gibbons or McGoorty. He is the biggest man of the three, and the most experienced. He was world's champion at one time, as the result of knocking out the incomparable muck-coke-like Ketchell. Papke is champion of France now, because he beat Georges Carpentier in 17 rounds. He did not knock out Carpentier, but made him quit. Papke has been charged with yellowness, but no man, unless it was Ketchell, ever made him tin-can to any noticeable extent. The "Keweenaw Thunderbolt" is a boxer of the Jeffries type—whose blows crush rivals by degrees instead of dropping them suddenly. For the fatal count. McGoorty and Papke should make a rattling good fight. Both are terrific punchers, and about equal boxers. They have pile-driving rights and like to stand up and exchange wallops. At 158 or 160 pounds ringside they should be worth going miles to see, and a meeting between them is inevitable. Then, Gibbons for the winner. California will doubtless see these engagements. New York's 10-round bouts are not calculated to bring out the best in a fighter, and so important an affair as a championship should not be held over a route shorter than 20 rounds. It looks like Papke and McGoorty, and then Gibbons with the winner, before the roses bloom again in this country.

AFIRE AT SEA
St. Johns, Nfld., Jan. 10.—A narrow escape from destruction from fire and severe experiences by passengers and crew were reported by the Allan Line steamer Carthagenian, which arrived here tonight from Liverpool. The steamer left Liverpool Dec. 28, for St. Johns, Halifax and Philadelphia. Capt. McKillop said that when the vessel was three days out her cargo caught fire in some unexplained manner. The flames spread so rapidly that it was necessary to pump an enormous amount of water into the vessel to drown them out. The fire was finally extinguished, but for twelve hours the water was knee deep on the lower deck. It is estimated that repairs to the vessel will cost \$10,000. A large part of the general cargo was damaged.

EDUCATION BY THE NATION BRITISH LIBERAL SCHEME

SPECIAL RACES ALONG WITH CAR IN FLAMES
Exciting Experience of Train Crew on a Lake Shore Mail Train.
[Cleveland, Jan. 11.—Special No. 43 on the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Railroad, a seven-car, mail and baggage train, raced into Cleveland late yesterday with a baggage car afire, and was met by an engine company, which put out the blaze after the car and contents had been almost destroyed. The fire was noticed by the agent at Painesville, 30 miles east, who telegraphed ahead for the engine company. The car was filled with a consignment of shirts and collars valued at about \$1,500. Damage to the car was estimated at \$2,000.

BIG LAKE BOATS ARE IN WINTER QUARTERS
Fast in the Ice in Harbor They Present a Desolate Scene.

The vegetable section was rather smaller than usual, and there were but few changes in the prices. Celery was quoted at prices ranging from 40 to 60 cents per dozen bunches.

There was also a drop in the price of hay today, as the market which has been prevalent for the last five or six days has enabled the farmers to bring a large supply to the city.

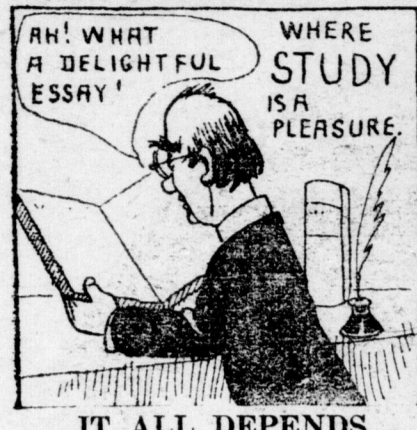
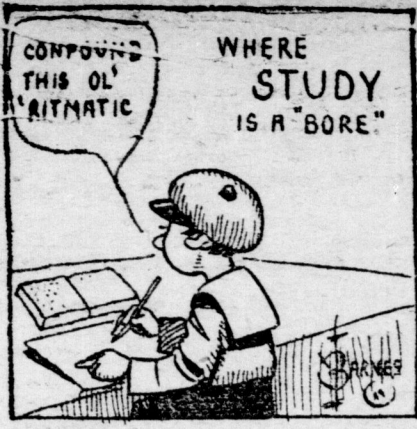

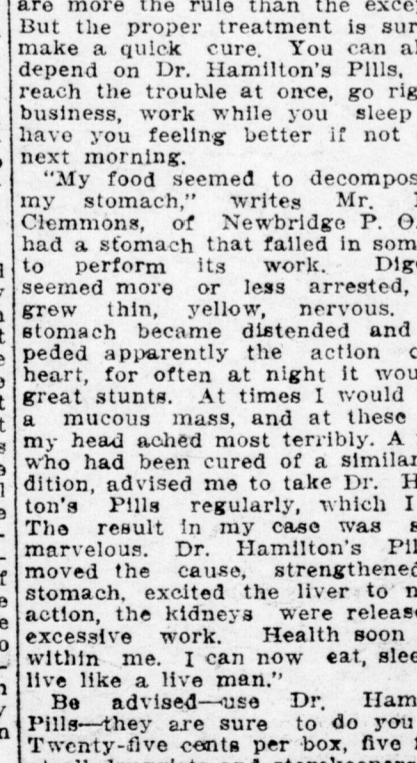

The Biggest Event of 1913 Will Be the Panama Canal Opening

What It Means to You, Told By a Big Man Who Knows.

EDITOR'S NOTE—The greatest world event of 1913 will be the opening of the Panama canal—Ships will pass through it before another two months is gone. What does the canal mean to Canadians? The London Advertiser asked a man whose business it is to study such big topics to tell. Here's his answer:

BY JOHN BARRETT, Director-General of the Pan-American Union.

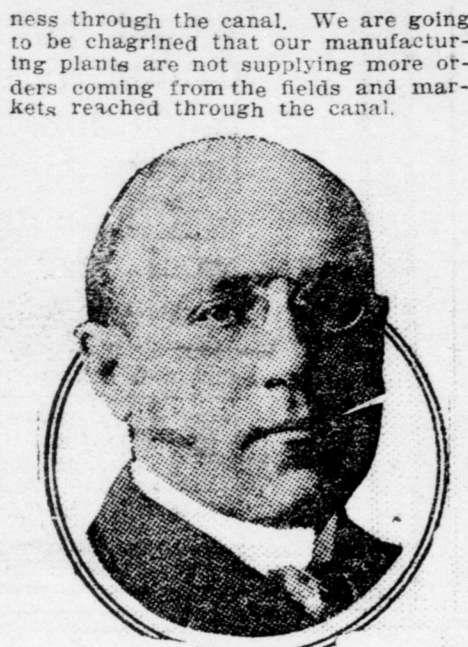
There is not a province, city, town or hamlet of the Dominion of Canada which should not be interested in the Panama Canal and in Pan-American commerce.

It behoves the American people en masse to be studying every phase of the Panama canal, and to be investigating what it leads to, what it expects, and what other countries are planning to do with and through it.

Every university, every college, every preparatory and grammar school and every academy should have part of its annual course devoted to the canal, and to the effect that it will have upon the power, standing and responsibilities of the United States.

Every chamber of commerce and every commercial, educational and social society should devote special sessions to discussing the Panama canal, what it is, and what it means.

If this is not done, we are going to be terribly disappointed at the results which will come from the canal after it is opened. We are going to be surprised that our harbors and ports are not filled with more vessels doing busi-



As the minister of the United States in both Asiatic and Latin American countries I have been overwhelmed with the vastness of what I might call the Pan-Pacific and Pan-American op-

portunity for the United States, but I have also realized that other countries of the world are investigating these opportunities and preparing to use the Panama canal to reach them.

A few remarkable and concrete facts must convince the most skeptical person of the importance of the canal. The foreign trade of all the countries bordering on the Pacific ocean, including Canada, the Pacific coast of the United States, Mexico, Central America, South America, Australasia and Asia amounts to nearly \$2,000,000,000.

The whole great Atlantic coast of the United States and five-sixths of its manufacturing interests will have a shorter route by water to this mighty trade than will Europe.

The Panama canal will shorten the route from Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Charleston, Mobile, New Orleans and Galveston to Valpa-

iso, Callao, Guayaquil, Panama, Corinto and other ports of the western coast of Central America and Mexico by distances averaging from 3,000 to 12,000 miles.

The 12 countries of Latin America bordering on the Pacific ocean last year without the canal did an annual Pacific trade of nearly \$500,000,000—an increase of nearly 100 per cent. in 10 years. It is reasonable to argue that when the canal is opened that trade will grow in a decade to \$1,000,000,000, or even \$1,500,000,000.

Now a word about all Latin America—the 20 countries which with the United States, form the Pan-American union.

These countries cover an area of 5,000,000 square miles or three times that of the United States proper. They now have a population of 70,000,000. They conducted last year a foreign trade of \$2,500,000,000—an increase of nearly 100 per cent. in 10 years.

If the 20 countries of Latin America can maintain a trade of this kind before they are fully appreciated and before the canal is opened they certainly will astonish the world by what they can do when the world realizes their importance and their value, and they themselves are making use of the canal.

FAMOUS FOLK WITH SOME FAMOUS DOUBLES

Thomas Nelson Page is best known as an author, so that it should be no surprise that he is predicted to be appointed ambassador to Great Britain when Woodrow Wilson assumes that office.

When he took the law course at the University of Virginia, obtained his degree, was admitted to the bar and began the practice of law in Richmond. He had frequently contributed stories to the university magazine and while away spare moments in his law-office writing similar stories.

"Marse Chan," a tale of the Civil War, was accepted by the same magazine in 1881 and Page was paid \$80 for it, but the publication was deferred for three years, the editor explaining that the war was too recent to admit of its earlier publication.

With his marriage in 1885 to Miss Anne Seiden Bruce, daughter of Charles Bruce, of Charlotte County, Virginia, came a renewal of the literary impulse. She cared for his stories and he wrote for her "Meh Lady," which Mr. Page has been heard to say he thought his best work was a product of this period, and took its tone from suggestions of the editor of the Century, that he should prepare something for publication treating of a more pacific state of feeling between the North and South.

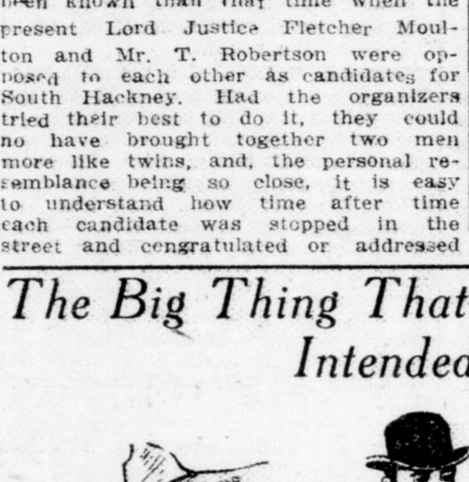

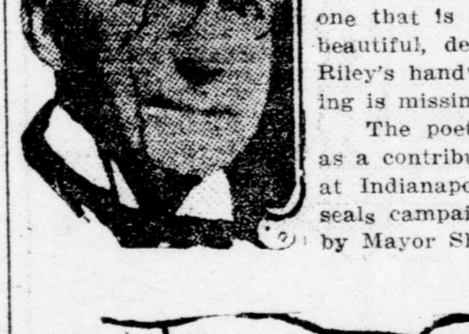

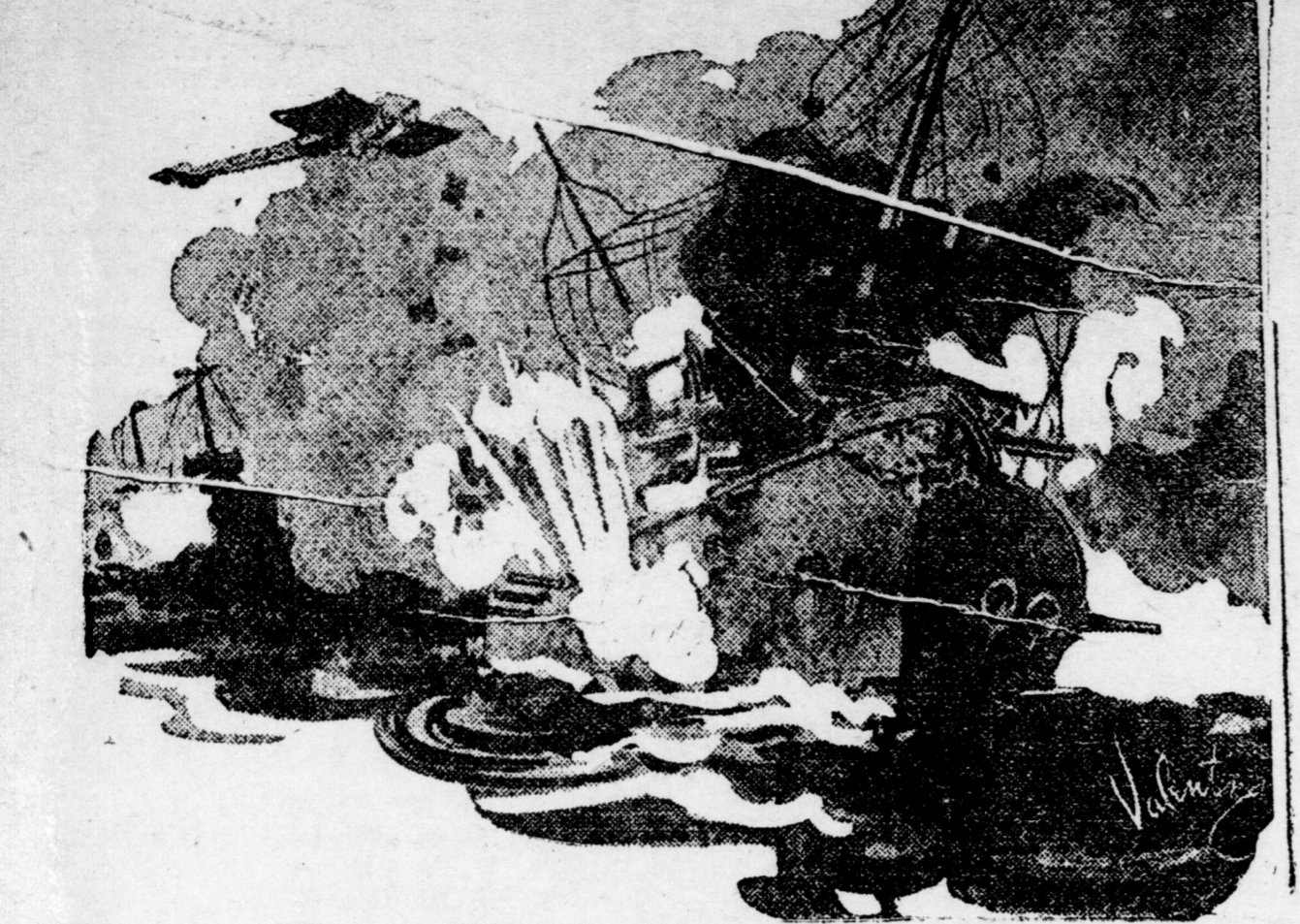

Manless Navies Will Battle By Wireless, Says Expert

Future Wars May Be Fought by Property, Not Men—No Bloodshed, No Heroes, No Patriotism, Only Electric Engineering!



Chicago, Jan. 10.—Before this century is more than half spent fleets of warships without a man on board may meet in battle at sea, piloted by wireless operators on the shores or on auxiliary vessels 30 miles away, and their guns aimed and discharged by sparks that fly through the air from the operator's key.

The same as sending a fleet manned by human beings is today. "Christopher Wirth, a German wireless inventor, has already demonstrated in a test on a lake near Berlin, the fact that a vessel may be managed and its guns discharged by wireless from the shore. The German navy department has taken up the idea and is trying to develop it.

"On board each warship will be the guns, the powerful storage batteries—for there will be no engineers and firemen aboard—and the wireless outfit that will keep the ship's course and its cannon in close obedience to the commander's orders. If the battle is waged within 50 or 100 miles of the shore the commander will be stationed there.

Mr. Kipling, the artist, died a dozen years ago, about the time of the Boer War; Mr. Kipling, the writer, still carries on the business and the work of his famous partner (who is dead) probably receives a higher price per word for anything he writes than anyone else living. He will go on receiving it, and the world will go on buying him and remarking with unflagging freshness that his latest thing is sadly below his old form. Give an author a good name and he may live on it to a great age.

It is so, in some measure, with Mrs. Ward. The echoes of that great episode of a quarter of a century ago still reverberate about her name and give her a factitious greatness. 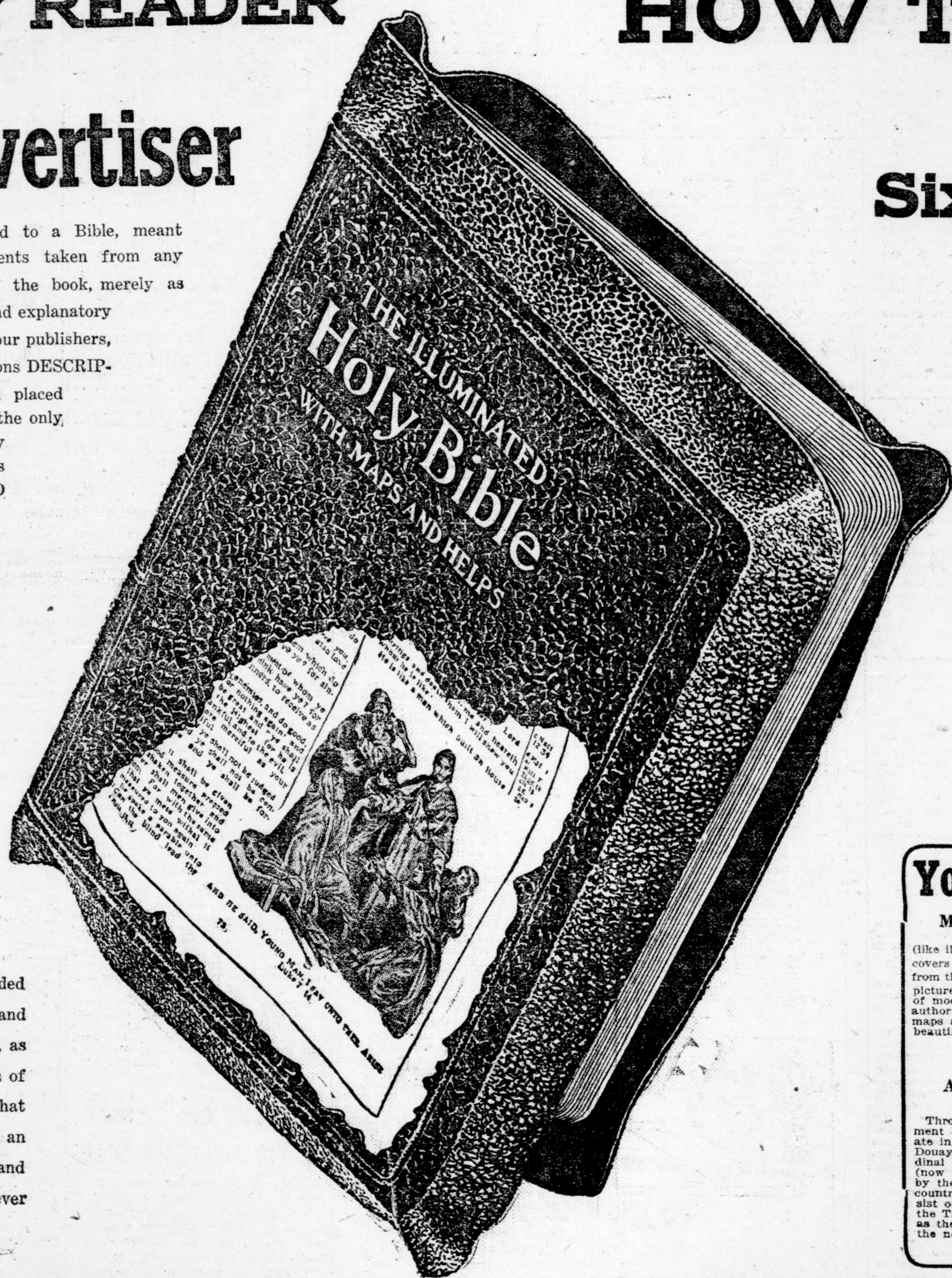
