Troops From the Dominion Cleaned Out Last of the Foe From Regina Defences-Within Half Hour's Time Were in Complete Possession, Many Counter-Attacks Failing To Shake Their Grip On Position.

(Canadian Press.)

London, Nov. 14.—The following communique is issued by the Canadian war records office, London:

Just before midnight, November 10-11, our troops attacked the remnant of the Regina trench, which still remained in the enemy's hands. The distance of the objective from our trenches was about 500 yards.

The attack was completely successful. Soon after our first wave went over the parapet, our barrage lifted from the enemy's trench and our men went into the trench with bombs and bayonets. Within half an hour of the time of starting the whole position was in





POST YOUR CHRISTMAS PARCELS

EARLY.

SENDING PRESENTS BY PARCEL POST. (Clip This Out for Reference.)

For the information of those sending parcels to soldiers in England or at the front, The Advertiser publishes the rates of postage: To England, the rate is 12 cents a pound or any fraction thereof. Limit weight on parcels to England is 11 pounds. To France or Belgium, the rate is 24 cents for parcels any weight up to three pounds; from three pounds to sever pounds (the limit), the rate is 32 cents, not 32 cents per pound, but 32 cents for any weight from three to seven pounds. Any letter or parcel for any soldier in the hospital (even if this hospital is not known to the sender), having the word "hospital" marked across it will be delivered. A customs declaration must be attached to each parcel, for which application should be made at the stamp window of the postoffice.

His Ross rifle attitude was not so much a reflection upon Sir Sam as upon the premier, who permitted the concealment of the Alderson report long after it had condemned the Ross rifle as a weapon unfit for Canadians on active service. Sir Sam's bombast and bungles have been tremendous, but Sir Robert Borden gave "him his head," even after the Allison scandal, until the situation became such as could be condoned by no self-respecting country. The Camp Borden flasco and the awful "blurts" of Sir Sam in public proved either that the premier was not strong enough to control the untameable lion of Lindsay, or that the premier believed in all Sir Sam did,

Sir Sam was sent away to England, like an erring son, to live down his political wild-oats. He was told to behave, and he performed reasonably well in England. Perhaps he was trying to "make good." But while he was away the Rogers influence was at work. Sir Sam was plucked of his feathers, one by one. He was not nearly so powerful when he returned. A cringing Government and a hesitating premier tried to tear the official Sir Sam limb from limb, and succeeded. Purchasing, recruiting, financing, active management overseas and home were taken away. Sir Sam must have seen it coming, but perhaps his egotism blinded him. Finally, having stripped him of the honors which they so eagerly bestowed upon him, they called him forth to walk the

To Sir Sam Hughes, his ears still full (and if his ears are not, Hansard is) of the praise these erstwhile colleagues gave him, the present method of disposing of him must indicate a Judas kiss somewhere in the plot. They have praised him to his face and stabbed him behind his back, in his view of it. Canada may expect to hear from him. Are his judges worthy to pass sentence upon Sir Sam? If he is guilty enough to be dismissed, what of those who aided and abetted him?

The nation will examine the results of the change with the most eager interest. It will not deny Sir Sam Hughes a fair meed of praise for the good work he has done, even if it cannot forgive him for his strange confidences and "blunders"-a mild word that. The removal of Sir Sam leaves no excuse for anything but bold, capable, honest administration. Can it be possible that the present cabinet is equal to it? Have their recent acts and appointments shown size or reform over the old? The war machinery has been provided, and with its lessons before the Government, surely the people have something to hope for, and the least they can hope for is a war Government that will utilize the country's capable men to conduct military affairs. The final effort of the Borden cabinet to save itself involves the dismissal of the man on whom that Government has been wont to shower the "honors" of the last two and a half years. They have discharged their "leading man."

SUDANESE REBELS SIGNALLY BEATEN BY BRITISH FORCE

Revolting Sultan Killed and Main Body Defeated.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Ali Dinar, the rebellious Sultan of Darfur, (a province of the Egyptian Sudan) has been killed and the main body of the rebels, which he headed, badly defeated by a British expeditionary force, it was officially announced today. The campaign was carried out by 300 men detached from the Egyptian army for the purpose of catching up with and disposing of Ali Dinar's force which fled after the British victory in the Darfur region last summer.







BORDEN DISMISSES SIR SAM HUGHES FROM DOMINION CABINET, FOLLOWING QUARREL BETWEEN THE PREMIER AND MINISTER

Gradual Stripping of Official Powers Followed by Resignation Demand.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Nov. 13.—Gen. Sir Sam Hughes has been asked for and has tendered Premier Borden the resignation of the Canadian portfolio of militia and defence. The break has come from differences over questions of policy and details of admin between Gen. Hughes one one hand and Premier Borden and other members the Government on the other.

Wanted Deputy Only.

Gen. Hughes returned from a three months' visit to England with a plan to have a Canadian war council organized in England, with a deputy minis ter of militia at its head. The Cana Government held that with more han 200,000 Canadian troops in the trenches in France or in training in England, there should be an overseas minister of militia. Gen. Hughes opposed this, as it would greatly deprive him of authority. When the Government insisted upon its proposals. Gen. Hughes suggested that Sir Max Aitken should be appointed to the British post. Premier Borden, however. appointed Sir George Perley to the post, although there had been lack of harmony between Gen. Hughes an Sir George Perley. This took from Gen. Hughes control of the greater portion of the Canadian forces.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13.-Premier Borden's office in the evening handed out the following on the separation of Gen. Hughes from the Canadian Government:

"It is announced that the prime minister has requested and has received the resignation of the minister of militia and defence. The retirement of Sir Sam Hughes is in part the outcome of the establishment of the ministry of overseas forces, and in part is due to the assumption by Sir Sam of powers which in the judgment of the prime minister can be exercised only by the Government as a whole. It is anticipated that the correspondence which brought about the request for the minister's resignation will be made public immediately. It must first be submitted to the governor-gen-

When shown the above, Gen. Hughes gave out the following:

"Correspondence will show Sir Robert Borden asked for the resignation of the minister of militia on account of the tone of a letter written on November 1 by the minister of militia showing that the prime minister had made misstatements which the minister of militia promptly showed to be incorrect, and criticisms by the premier which were unwarranted when all the facts were considered.'
