NAVAL PORT OF KRONSTADT FIRED BY GUNS FROM BRITISH WARSHIPS

AMERICAN CAVALRYMEN PURSUING MEXICAN BANDITS

British Forces Are Said To Have Lost Eleven Men and Three Motorboats in Naval Fight of Sunday - Andrea Pervosvan, One of Enemy's Largest Battleships, With a Crew of 933 Men. Is Lost.

ADMIRALTY CONFIRMS SINKINGS.

London, Aug. 19.—The British admiralty officially confirmed today the sinking on Monday of the Bolshevik battle cruiser Petropavlovsk, the battleship Andrea-Pervosvah, and a Bolshevik destroyer by British naval forces during an engagement in the Gulf of Finland. A Russian cruiser probably was seriously damaged also, it was announced.

Helsingfors, Finland, Aug. 18.—The Bolshevik battleship Andrea Pervosvan, the battle cruiser Petrovlopavloovsk, a transport and a guardship are reported today to have been sunk during an engagement with the British fleet in the Gulf of Finland on

The British were said to have lost three motor boats and to have had eight officers and three men killed.

The Andrea Pervosvan was reported as probably sunk by a torpedo near Kronstadt on June 19, according to dispatches received in London shortly afterwards, but there was no confirmation of this.

The Pervosvan carried normally a crew of 933 men, and was armed with four 12-inch guns, twelve 4.7-inch guns and a heavy minor battery. She was built in 1907.

The Petrovlopavloovsk was a late-type Russian battleship, 590 feet long and with a displacement of 23,370 tons. She carried twelve 12-inch guns and the usual batteries of smaller weapons.



Two Airmen, Who Were Kept Prisoners by Bandits, Are Accompanying Troops as Guides—Airplanes Are Being used as Scouts in Effort to Locate Mexicans-\$7,500 Was Paid to Gain Liberty of Aviators Peterson and

Candelaria, Texas, Aug. 19 .- Troops of the United States cavalry crossed the Mexican border at 6:40 o'clock this morning in pursuit of the bandits who held Aviators Peterson and Davis for ransom. The two men accompanied the troops, acting as guides.

Other aviators are co-operating with the cavalry as scouts to Fliers Were Forced To Write locate the bandits on the Mexican side, flying over the Ojinaga district, south of Candelaria.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 19 .- The American punitive expedition into Mexico after the bandits who held the two American eviators, is being conducted with the full knowledge of authorities n Washington, who have been withholding announcement of the Government's purpose until the two Americans were safe.

It is the second expedition of its kind since the Pershing xpedition in pursuit of Villa. The other was the expedition into Juarez at the time of the recent fighting.

In its diplomatic aspect it is an expedition on a "hot trail." It does not take on the character of an act of war as its sole purpose under international law is not to invade the sovereignty of Mexico nor to attack its government, but to punish or exterminate he bandits who held the two American army officers for random.



PEACE TREATY WITH SENATE COMMITTEE

U. S. President Answers Questions and Gives Details of Peace Conference.

UNPRECEDENTED MEETING

Nothing Approaching the Conference Since the Days of George Washington.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 19.—In a conference at the White House today, unprecedented in American history, President Wilson discussed the peace treaty with the Senate foreign relations committee, answered questions put by senators, and gave out a stenographic transcript of the proceedings to the public. Some of the inside details of the peace conference, how the league of nations covenant was drawn, and other Appeals Must Be Made Before tions covenant was drawn, and other historic happenings were handed out verbatim for the world to read, in contrast to the time-honored procedure of secrecy, presidential and senatorial "confidence." Whether Mr. Wilson will answer fully in so public a manner all the questions put to him, or will consider that some of the information be received at the peace table should be held in confidence as a matter of national policy, remains contributed.
