DOCTORS SHOWN NEW METHOD IN **BRAIN SURGERY**

Dr. W. E. Dandy, Celebrated Surgeon, Illustrates Instructive Address.

SLEEPING SICKNESS

Its Characteristics Discussed Before Western Ontario Medical Academy.

New but radical methods of diagnos-ing tumors of the brain were unfolded to over 200 members of the Western Ontario Medical Academy in session in Ontario Medical Academy in session in Western University Medical School, Friday afternoon by Dr. Walter E. Dandy, brain surgeon of Johns Hoppins Hospital, Baltimore. Dr. Dandy, by means of lantern slides disclosed his new method, designated pneumography, which consists of injecting air in the spaces of the human brain, and then taking X-ray photographs of the Dattent's head.

With a tumor present, the air's prevented from filling all the brair spaces, and is revealed by the photo. By this means the definite location of \$\phi\$ tumor is determined, thus greatly fellitating removal and reducing mortalty. Dr. Dandy is a pioneer in this \$\pi k\$, which has won him international fame, and Western Ontario doctors ar fortunate in being enabled to hear \$\pi\$ deliver a paper on the subject. paper on the subject.

Cleanliness a Protection Against Fire and Disease

London is on the eve of a city-wide "Clean-up" campaign. By a royal proclamation next week throughout the Province of Ontario has been declared "Fire Prevention Week," and in every city. town and village unstinted efforts will be made to scure the co-operation

of the citizens in fire prevention work.

Of a long ilst of suggestions made by the Fire Prevention League of Ontario, as invaluable aids in combating the fire menace, the first is "Clean Up." In the opinion of that association the only way to fight an evil is to get rid of the cause, and it has been proven by actual statistics that the majority of fires are directly traceable to rubbish heaps and

During the next week every nousenouser in London, every snopkeeper and manufacturer is urged to clear up the rubbish and waste materials, which in so many cases collect during the busy summer months. Every corner and nook, especially those under stairways should be thoroughly cleaned of accumulations before another week has passed.

It is expedient that the work should be done immediately because in another few weeks the winter will have come and the opportunity for a general clean-up will have passed.

It will be found that the work can be much more easily done during a city-wide organized drive, for in that time the garbage department will have special instructions to remove all manner of goods, which in other times the collectors would not move.

Other organizations, too, have lined up behind the movement. The local chamber of commerce has spent considerable money in some very effective publicity, and it has taken upon itself the duties of organizing

and financing the campaign.

The fire department will give its assistance in spreading the gospel of cleanliness. The Boys' Work Board has promised its support and like last year will undoubtedly give splendid assistance to those unable to do their own cleaning. The school children also will be urged to assist in the very important work.

And one other thing. In addition to cleaning the debris away with a view to preventing fires, citizens are urged to clean up yards and lawns so that London may better maintain its name as "The City Beautiful," as well as its splendid standard of health,

The weather situation today is such that those who have not a supply of coal in their coal bins or in their cellar are gambling with

The cool, wet and damp fall period is by far the most unpleasant of the whole year. It is a forerunner of the coal blasts of winter, and the very thought of it makes one feel much colder than they really are. For this reason it is just playing "safety first" to take it for granted that this weather is going to continue and rush in all the fuel possible, a whole winter's supply if it can be financed.

The coal dealers of London today are fairly well stocked as compared with other years, but the coal is going out fairly fast.

"We can deliver coal now and will be able to do so for same time," said one coal dealer. "But don't let the people believe that there is going to be an abundance of coal. There really may be a scarcity.'

Anything may happen. Certain it is, production at the mines is behind other years. This may be a factor. There may be a railroad strike. This menace still hangs on the horizon.

And the price will not go down. It is hardly likely that it will go up, unless the demand comes to the point of greatly exceeding the supply. So the dealers have not much to gain by pressing for early buying. They are considering the welfare of their customers only.





Few Mushrooms Are Deadly, And Many Are Delicious

The Best Way Is To Become Familiarized With Poisonous Ones and Follow a Process of Elimination To Know the Many Good To Eat.

The food value of mushrooms is not so great as that of many of our staple doods, such as meat, wheat, flour or beans, but it is about equivalent to that of our fresh vegetables. In addition, they give distinct and pleasing flavors to other food, and by furnishing the needed variety to our diet they become valuable as food accessories also. Further, if one knows wild mushrooms, this extra food and luxury may be obtained at the expense of a few minutes walk on a cool morning, or a trip to the woods or parks on a holiday.

The term mushroom is applied to those large, woody or fleshy fungit which are found growing on the trunks of trees, on stumps or failen logs, coming out of the leaf mold on the

of trees, on stumps or failen logs, coming out of the leaf mold on the forest floor, or in the grass in yards, lawns fields and needlines or leaf and the borders of the woods, but has lawns fields and needlines or leaf to the poison. Where Mushrooms Are Found.
Mushrooms may be found from the time the ground thaws out in the spring until it freezes up in the fall. They are most plentiful after prolonged wet weather, or after warm rains, when the days are warm and the nights fairly cool and damp. It is best to look for them on cool, devy mornings, a day or two after warm, heavy rains. They grow in any place where there is plenty of decaying vegetable or animal material which is not too much disturbed by cultivation.

There are in Ontario at least 150 kinds of fleshy fungi, which are large enough to attract the attention of a person collecting mushrooms for table use. However, not all of these can be used, as some of them are poisonous, and four are classed as mildly poison—

As previously stated, there are few poisonous mushrooms, but some of these are deadly poisonous and occur in considerable numbers. In Ontario the deadly poisonous kinds are all closely related, and a description of there common species will enable one to avoid all of them.



In Kent County the total grown is: Burley, 1,043 acres; snuff tobacco, 90 acres; other varieties, 11 acres. Elgin, 144½, acres of Burley tobacco, and ¼ acre of cigar tobacco, the lowest yield on record. Norfolk, the yield is 27½ acres of Burley and only one acre of other varieties. Lambton has only ¾ acre of other varieties. Lincoln has 40 acres of cigar tobacco, and Middlesex, 41 acres of Burley tobacco. The total acreage, therefore, for Western Ontario is 5,224½, which is considerably lower than previous years, and especially for 1919, when record crops brought record prices. Particularly notable feature about the 1921 crop is the small amount of snuff and cigar tobacco. The small price now paid for tobacco, owing to an alleged glut on the market, has deterred many farmers from growing the "weed" this year. Some adventurous spirits have taken the bit in their teeth and have sown several acres in the hope that price conditions would improve. 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

MUMMIFYING SECRET CLAIMED BY PARISIAN

Doctor Believes His Fluid and Process Are Like Old Ones.

PARIS, Oct. 7 .- After years passed in studying chemical traces in ancient Egyptian mummles, Dr. Edmond Bartha, of the Paris School of Practical Medicine, has announced the discovery of a new embaiming fluid that he asserts will maintain o lifelike appearance in corpses for a period of between

twenty and fifty years.

Dr. Bartha in demonstrating his discovery described how the same process and a fluid similar to his were undoubt-edly used in the times of the Pharaohs, except that the incisions probably were through the carotid artery, as the mum-mies he had examined showed no trace of femoral incisions, as now practiced. After a body has been embalmed for a week, he explained, the flesh and tissues harden, leaving the body as rigid as marble, and although time may de stroy the color effects produced by Dr. Bartha's fluid, he is of the opinion that the long lost secret of mummifying the dead has at last bee discovered will again be practiced generally in another decade.




