



Berlin, Jan. 4.—How King Edward VII, when he was Prince of Wales, once won two million marks from a son of Prince Radziwill, one of the leaders in Prussian demi-royalty and a crony of former Emperor William, has been revealed in connection with the current investigation into the banking policies pursued by the Prussian State Bank.

Dr. Karl Furchard, the son of a former president of the Prussian bank, is authority for the statement that the Prince of Wales, during a visit to Berlin in the middle 90's, won half a million dollars in the course of one night's gambling from young Radziwill. As the debt had to be paid within 24 hours the elder Radziwill piedged his estates to the Prussian State Bank for the cash covering his son's gambling debt.


