All Previous Violent Gather- Evidenced by the Delay in Nominations to Take Place on issue within three months from the ings Overshadowed.

DESKS AND TABLES WRECKED THE WAR BUDGET OF JAPAN

Guards Driven Out of the Chamber -Sittings of the House Had To Be Postponed.

Budapest, Hungary, Dec. 13.-Violent as have been the scenes at past sessions of the Hungarian Parliament, they have been entirely overshadowed by the wreckage effected by members of the Opposition party this morning at their successful efforts to prevent the opening of Parliament. A quarter of an hour before the time appointed for the commencement of business the Opposition mustered in full strength. Not one of the Government's supporters had arrived, and the Opposition had the House to themselves with the exception of the personal guard of 40 men provided for the protection of the president of the House,

The presence of these guards, who occupied the approaches to the parlia-mentary platform, seemed to inflame the Opposition deputies, who shouted opprobrious terms at the "Hungarian" who could perform such shameful ser

The deputies then approached the platform and a scuffle with the guards ensued. The deputies fought their way to the platform, tore it to pieces scattered the debris over the House, tore to atoms the codes of law occupying the president's tables, smashed the tables and chairs, and destroyed the platform and distributed the broken pieces among the deputies who, thus sian destroyers, which were supposed armed, attacked the guards, and after a brief fight drove them from the

The desks were then torn down and the interior of the House was practically completely wrecked. None of the Liberal members ventured inside the House, and the Opposition members

Jap War Budget.

London, Dec. 13. — The Times' correspondent in Tokio says: The politiparties indorse the Government's scheme to increase war taxes, but to reduce the land tax by 14,500,000 yen about \$7,250,000), making additions of 4,500,000 (\$2,250,000) in other directions. The net diminution is only 10,000,000 yen (\$5,000,000), which doubtless will be obtained by loans.



New York, Dec. 13. + The air in New York's \$35,000,000 subway is undergoing official investigation. Grave charges off. Tests show that the air at the pave-ment level fairly reeks with bacilli, and in some districts 9,600 colonies of them were found on a plate of a few inches area at the end of fifteen minites exposure, The reason New Yorkers can live in such an atmosphere is Amateur Actress Attacked Near

Her Home is such an atmosphere is because sunlight kills these swarming bacilli. According to the bacteriologist of the Health Department bacteria will thrive especially well in the subway because of the lack of sunlight. The absolute necessity of adequate ventilation and sanitation is shown by an examination made of the cocoa mats on the floors of the elevated cars. One fibre only 11/2 inches long plucked from such a mat showed 4,000,000 bacilli of different sorts, which would breed consumption, pneumonia and grip, besides many more diseases. These mats get plenty of sunlight.




