As this payment has not been made France, without asking the authorization of Germany, England and Italy, intends to revive her right of direct collection. This activity on the part of France is evidently in connection with her intention to revive her rights, and is considered as an answer to the attitude adopted by the allied powers.

BRIGANDS ARE ACTIVE.

Levying Tribute on Towns in the Caucasus.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 2.-Brigands have been terrorizing the Caucasus re-cently, levying tribute on towns and holding up trains to an extent hitherto unknown. Even garrison towns have been frightened into paying regular tribute, in return for which the bandits not only refrain from plundering but protect the towns from other maranders. The attempts of the troops to cope with the situation have been generally foiled, owing to the complicity of the inhabitants, who are fearful of the brigands' vengeance, and therefore warn and shelter the latter. Stations and trains on the Vladi Kavkas Railroad have frequently been attacked.

SOME FIGURES THAT STARTLE

London News Continues to Investigate the Prices Charged by Coal Dealers.

How Did the Price go so High in Chatham ?-Some Government Figures Sworn to.

London, Jan. 31 .- To-day the News obtained, through its special correspondent at Ottawa, the amount of coal cleared by the London dealers at the Customs House here, during the months of November and De cember, 1902, and the present month of January up to the 28th. In view of the extortionate prices of the dealers for anthracite, the figures are astonishing. For the month of De cember, the prices paid by London dealers for hard coal were the highest-but then the price was only \$5.08, free on board at Buffalo, per gross

the News' correspondent at Ottawa by the Department of Customs:

During the month of November, London dealers cleared at the Customs House here 2,028 tons of hard the dealers, show the coal to have been worth \$7,913—or an average of about \$8.90 per ton, free on board at

During the month of December London dealers cleared at the Cus-toms House here 5,042 tons of hard coal, and the invoices sworn to

show the coal to have been worth \$25,635—or an average of \$5.08 per ton, f.o.b., Buffalo.
During the month of January—that is up till Jan. 28—London dealers cleared at the Customs House here, 8,727 tons of hard coal, and the invoices

727 tons of hard coal, and the invoices sworn to by the dealers show the coal to have been worth \$41,691, or an average of \$4.77, f.o.b., Buffalo.

This is the price for gross tons of 2,240 pounds. Figuring a ton of 2,000 pounds, which is all the dealer gives the customer, the prices would be:

For November, \$3 60 per ton For December, \$4.60 per ton For January, \$4.30 per ton Now, the freight rate on hard coal from Buffalo to London, is 50% a ton Add the freight rate and we have the price the coal cost the dealers laid down in London:

We understand that included in these clearances are 22 carloads of anthracite screenings, which were bought at the mines, according to the invoices, at \$1 per ton. These screenings, of course, would go to lessen the average price of the coal, but not to any greater extent them. but not to any greater extent than 10c to 25c per ton.

These figures will be very interesting to Chathamites who were called upon to pay local dealers such high prices for coal. It has been pointed out, too, that, while Mr. Crow's price never went above \$7.50, that of J. L. Scott and others was up to \$8.50 and over

The Dominican Government has in-formed United States Minister Powell that it cannot agree to his request made in the name of the United States Gov-ernment in the matter of claims of Clyde steamships, and that if this com-pany feels aggrieved at the action of the Government it should seek redress before a tribunal of the United States. To this communication Mr. Powell in-formed the Dominican Government that

the United States would insist upon re-dress for its citizens, and the pending cases must be settled by the Govern-ment and not through the courts.

The claims of the San Domingo Improvement Company, which alleges that it was unjustly deprived of certain valuable franchises by the Dominican Government, have been in dispute for several years. The Government has strongly resisted any settlement of the case up to the present time.

TO RENOUNCE THE THRONE. be Taken by the Crown Prince of Saxony.

Berlin, Feb. 2.-A curious widely told in the provincial and Berlin papers yesterday is that the to renounce his succession to the throne in favor of his son, George, who is ten years of age, for the reason that the military code of honor does not permit a husband wronged as he has been to remain in the service, and the Crown Prince, as commander of the contingent, must pass upon the findings of military courts of honor, which, in contingent, must pass upon the findings of military courts of honor, which, in circumstances similar to those of the Crown Prince, requires a challenge or the laying aside of the uniform. The Crown Prince, it is added, is scarcely expected to challenge Professor Giron, the teacher of languages, who cloped with the Crown Princes, but opinion in the army is so rigid on points of honor that the Crown Prince is regarded as inclinible for reviewing the garded as ineligible for reviewing the decisions of courts of honor and pro-tecting the honor of the uniform. It is to be hoped that the members of the Public School Board will heartily co-operate with the City Council in the project to abolish the ward system in the election of trustees.

The movement is a decidedly popular one. The citizens have witnessed the excellent results which have accrued by adopting the amenament to the act in municipal elections for aldermen, and the principle is certainly a right one, in that it is the only system which can make the trustees thoroughly representative and responsible to the people at large.

Celestial Bodies That Astronomers Are Not Greatly Pleased to Find

In the space between Mars

In the space between Mars and Jupiter there are hundreds of little planets called asteroids which have been discovered during the last century by astronomers all over the world. Some of them are hardly bigger than a big western farm, and very few are large enough to be seen without the aid of a powerful telescope. Nowadays they are noted chiefly by photography and are interesting to professional astronomers only for their eccentricities.

It has been found, for example, by a computation made by astronomers that one of them approaches nearer to the sun than any other known

to the sun than any other known planet and at the same time de-scribes a greater ellipse around that body. This special asteroid was originally discovered on one of the photographic plates taken at Arequipa, from which the entire sky south of the equator and extending to the antarctic pole is photographed as a matter of routine once every

Astronomers do not take any special delight in finding asteroids, which, in fact, cause more trouble than they are worth, since, once discovered, they have to be first catalogued and then constantly watched in order to keep them in their proper relation to the other heavenly bodies in the more essential business of cataloguing the important stars.

makes a specialty of taking care of
all asteroids and wherever found
carefully numbers, names and describes them as rapidly as possible for the benefit of other astronomers

The genius to arrange a railroad time card, or time table, so that it may be readily, easily and accurately understood by the occasional traveler is not stood by the occasional traveler is not yet born. Perhaps he will have to be made. But no matter how much the patrons of a road may be mystified the management takes particular pains to supply a special card "for the government and information of employees only." This table is so simple that a child can understand it. The second child can understand it. The second page usually contains a table showing the rate of speed required per mile for a train to travel a given number of miles in an hour. It starts at fifteen miles an hour, which is four minutes to the mile, and goes as high as 100 miles an hour, or a mile in thirty-six page and shows 200 employisions.

This card gives locations of regular water stations, yard limits, situations of standard clocks, maximum speed of standard clocks, maximum speed of of standard clocks, maximum speed of freight trains between different towns, what days are holldays, speeds at which trains may cross bridges at various hours and a list of all stations and trains. It is likely, of course, that were similar cards furnished to the traveling public there would be no abatement of fool questions. Besides, it is not to the interest of a railroa company to take the public too entirely into its confidence.

Brandon was not available for retribution. He had died in his bed six months after Charles was beheaded and had been hurried ignominiously into his grave in Whitechapel churchyard. As public executioner of London he could hardly escape his destiny, but it is said that remorse and horror shortened his days. In his supposed "Confession," a tract widely circulated shortened his days. In his supposed "Confession," a tract widely circulated at the time, he claims that he was "fetched out of bed by a troop of horse" and carried against his will to the scaffold; also that he was paid £30, all in half crowns, for the work and had "an orange stuck full of cloves and a handkerchief out of the king's pocket." FREAKS OF FIGURES.

Interesting Tricks With Numbers
For Little Mathematicians.

Tell some friend to put a number down on a piece of paper. Let it be any number above hundreds. For instance, 98.301. Tell him that he may place an other number under this containing the same number of figures. Then you place under that another number. Then he the next and you the last.

Allow him then to place a paper or omething over all the figures but the top row, so that you cannot see them You can then draw a line below the paper and almost instantly tell him the sum of the several numbers, never failing. He may say that you have committed the figures to memory while they were being put down. Let him try it, when he will be convinced that he is

It is done in this way: He puts down, say, 98,301 for his first number and 35,-428 for his second. Then you put down, offhand, 64,571. He has one more chance and puts down, say, 83,692, and you then follow with 16,307. The figures will stand thus:

Now place the paper over all the figures but the first number and quickly put down the sum of the columns—298,-299-which upon verifying will be

Now I will explain how this is done. After the figures have been set down and covered you have the key to the problem in the first number, which is left uncovered. In any number of fig-ures—say five, as in the example given -99,999 would be the largest number that could be written. Very well. Your friend set down as his second number 35,428, to which you added 64,571. Now

99,999

You have put down a sum which, added to his second number, will equal all and no more than can possibly be put in the five figures. His third row was 83,692, to which you added 16,307.

You see, you have twice added to the original figures 99,999, which is equal to adding 18 to each of the figures in the first number, which would equal 298,299, the correct answer.

The simplest way to arrive at the re sult, however, is to subtract two from the first number set down and when done prefix a 2 to the remainder. Thus: 98,301

2||98,299

No matter what your figures are, you will always get the correct result, provided, of course, you have made no error in your operation.

ow Every Boy May Become His Own lee-Boat-Skillul Plans of Construction Very Clearly Described.

It will doubtless be many years below flying through the air becomes practically possible for all; but a timing over the glassy surface of an icebound rive or pond, propelled by the wintry blast blowing against artificial wings of cloth, is but a artificial wings of cloth, is but a degree removed from it. The friction of the sates on the smooth ice is so small and the motion is so steady and rapid that it is hard to believe that one has not left the earth and is soaring through the air. It is the purpose of this article to describe how any boy or girl can make a pair of these artificial wings. No scrious accident caused by this sport is on record.

The construction of this curious


serious accident caused by this sport is on record.

The construction of this curious sail is as follows: First procure two long bamboo poles and cut off enough from the small end of each to make them both twelve feet long, then lash together the large end of one and the small end of the other with strong cord or wire; bind the other ends firmly in the same way, so that the two poles lie side by side firmly bound together at each end.

For the two masts or cross-spars (A A in the Fig.), either bamboo or soft-wood sticks may be used. The length of these is eight, five and a quarter feet each, and if made of hamboo each should be three-eighths to five-eighths of an inch thick. Near the ends of each fix metal knobs or hooks and fasten similar knobs at both ends of the main spar. Next whittle two small cleats and fasten one firmly on the centre of each mast with cord.

To make the sails, purchase two yards and eight inches of factory cotton, or other suitable stuff, forty inches wide, and cut it in half, making two squares of forty inches each. Bind each firmly around the edge with tape and at each of the "clews" or corners fasten small rings or loops of strong cord to fasten on the imobs at the ends of the spars. Attach the sails to the cross-spars by slipping the rings over spars. Attach the sails to the cross-spars by slipping the rings over the hooks or knobs at their ends and then spring the main spar apart and slip the cheats of the cross-spars between the two pieces and turn them so they fit as shown in the Fig. Fasten the outside clews to the knobs at the ends of the main



A SKATER'S BAIL.


spar and with a cord draw the nearer clews together so that both sails will be tight, and the novel arrange er clews together so that both sails will be tight, and the novel arrangement is now ready for a trial trip. Take the sail to the nearest sheet of ice and, standing with your back to the wind, hold the sail by the centre against your back with your arms and let yourself go before the wind, steering with your skates. There is not much use in giving directions for "tacking" and other sailing manoeuvres, for after a little practice all this will come quite naturally, and any boy or girl will be able to go with gase from any point or a sheet of ice to any other point and return by the aid of the wind alone, no matter in what direction it is blowing.

The dimensions given are about right for a rather large boy, so that a small boy would have to construct a smaller sail, with the main spar about ten feet long and the rest in proportion.

If the sails are made of a fancy striped cloth with brilliantly-colored pennants attached to the corners, the skater will present a very dashing appearance as he glides over the ice. It need hardly be added that when not in use the sail can be taken apart and the three spars wrapped up in the sails, and tied with the cord which is used to join the inner clews.

Are Apt to Follow.

Hecker is outspoken in his objections to the methods pursued in the so called "hardening" of children by the means of cold douches or baths. As a rule children thus treated are more suscep tible to nasal catarrhs, throat affect tions, bronchitis and pulmonary inflammations than those who have not been subjected to the "hardening" process. Furthermore, such measures frequently give rise to pronounced anæmia and various disorders of the nervous system. Children so "hardened" are especially prone to acute and chronic inter-


thal disorders.

While in healthy children a properly conducted "hardening" process is often of advantage it must be remembered that there are no hard and fast rules and that every case must be treated ac-The fundamental principles of a proper 'hardening" system are as follows: (1) Gradual acclimation to the air of the room; (2) gradual acclimation to out-door air; (3) gradual acclimation to cold water; (4) suitable clothing-varied ac cording to the weather and time of year. Great care should be observed in acclimating the child to cold water, and the effects of the same should be carefully watched, the endeavors being at once suspended on the first appearance of any unfavorable symptoms.

On no account should any of the "hardening" measures be commenced until the nursing period is passed, and in all cases the process should be one of gradual advancement.-New York

easily made by the amateur carpenter.

Sleeping and Sitting Room. If one has to use a room for both sleeping and sitting in, it is a good plan to fit up one corner with shelves not more than four feet from the floor where the bath and all other washing appliances can be kept. This corner should be cut off from the rest of the room by a handsome cretonne or tapestry curtain, which should be suspended by a rod hidden by a piece of cornice molding. Having the corner of the room thus cut off will add to rather than detract from its appearance, for the convenience of this little private nook will be a very great comfort to its owner, who will probably put up another shelf a few feet higher than the first to keep her boots and shoes upon.

For silk or fine wool goods, such as cashmeres, flannels, etc., gasoline is a much better cleansing agent than water. For a dress waist about one gallon of gasoline will be required. Take one-Brick house, two stories, 7 rooms, of 40 feet front by 208 feet deep, washbowl. Put, the garment in and wash with the hands, rubbing good wash with the hands, rubbing good white soap on the soiled spots same as with water. Squeeze and rub until the dirt is loosened, then squeeze dry and rinse in the remaining fluid. Squeeze dry or partly so and hang in the open air until the odor has evaporated. Never use this in any room where there is a light or fire, as the gasoline is very inflammable. Goods cleansed in this way require no ironing.

New Silver.

New silver frequently is lacquered.

In other words, the surface has been varnished with a solution of gun cotton and ether. This is done by manufac turers to prevent the silverware being tarnished, also to keep the surface in good condition. The varnish sometimes peels off, leaving the exposed surface to tarnish. In this case there is nothing to do but to place the silver in boiling water for two or three minutes, after which the lacquer can be easily removed. Silver can be relacquered if de-

Dusty Books.

To free books from an accumulation of dust, first brush them carefully. Then, holding with the backs uppermost, rap them gently upon a table or other solid surface so that the dust will drop out from between the leaves. Re-peat this operation, holding the book on end. Then carefully wipe again and re-turn to the shelf. This is the way a librarian does it.

Wooden Tubs. When wooden tubs or pails have to stand for some time, instead of filling them with water, which is sure to be come stagnant, try painting them over with glycerin. The wood will not shrink until the glycerin dries on, and that will not happen for months.

General Andre, Minister of War; Col. Rousset, a Republican member of the Chamber, and other leaders of the military element, took an active part in defending the army from criticism. M. Messimy (Radical-Serratist) made a long speech on the heavy financial bur-den the maintenance of the army im-posed upon the country, saying this posed upon the country, saying this limited industrial and agricultural progress, and took the best years of youth of France for military service. Col. Rousset pointed out the dangers

surrounding France, and declared peace to be at the mercy of a single adverse incident. Amid much enthusiasm he asserted that the part of wisdom for France was to prepare for all even-

tualities.

Gen. Andre devoted his attention to the desirability of keeping up the army on a peace footing, so that it would readily be transformable to a war be transformable to a war

footing.

M. Jaures (Socialist) repudiated the statement that Socialists are opposed to the army. He said he considered the army to be one of the strongest arms of the republic, and that its first line and the reserves should equal in strength the German army He said it was necessary to maintain an effective peace footing, corresponding to the needs of

Amid a patriotic demonstration the first chapter of the army budget was finally adopted.
