BELLS IN CHURCHES.

FIRST USED BY PAULINUS, BISHOP OF NOLA, ABOUT 400.

The Early British Christians Used Wooden Rattles to Call the People Together For Worship - Bells and Thunder and Lightning.

Church bells are of ancient origin. The ancients had bells for both sacred and profane purposes. Strabo says that market time was announced by their sound and Pliny that the tomb of an ancient king of Tuscany was hung round with bells. The hour of bathing was made known in ancient Rome by the sound of a bell. The night watchman carried one, and it served to call up the servants in great houses. Sheep had them tied about their necks to frighten away wolves,

or, rather, by way of amulet.
Paulinus, bishop of Nola, is generally considered the first person who introduced bells into ecclesiastical service about the year 400. Historians say that in 610 the bishop of Orleans, being at Seno, then in a state of siege, fright-ened away the besieging army by ringing St. Stephen's church bells, which is a clear proof that they were not at that time generally known in France. The first large bells are mentioned by Bede in the year 680. Before that period the early British Christians made use of wooden rattles to call the congregation of the faithful together. Hand bells probably first appeared at religious processions and were after-ward used by the seculars. The small bells were not always held in the hand. They were sometimes suspended upon a stake and struck with ham

The arrival of kings and great per sonages was anciently greeted by ringing the church bells. Inguiohus, abbo of Croyland, who died about 1109, speaks of them as being well known in his time and says that "the first abbot of Croyland gave six bells to that monastery—that is to say, two great ones, which he named Bartholomew and Beladine; two of a medium size, called Turketulium and Bettrine; two small ones, denominated Pega and Bega. He also caused the great bell to be made called Gudla, which was tuned to the other bell and produced an admirable harmony not to be equaled in Eng-

The bells used in the monasteries were sometimes rung with ropes hav-ing brass or silver rings at the ends them according to instructions, and very soon indeed I was greatly relieved. The doctrine of the Church of Rome concerning bells is that they have merit and pray God for the living and the dead; second, that they produce devotion in the hearts of the faithful. The dislike of evil spirits to bells is well expressed by Wynken de Worde in the "Golden Legend." The passing bell was anciently rung for two good purposes, one to be peak the prayers of all good one to be speak the prayers of all good Christian people for a soul just departing and the other to drive away the evil spirits who stood at the foot of the bed or about the house. Such was the general opinion respecting the efficacy of bells before the reformation, but since that period "it has been the usual course in the Church of England that when any sick person lay dying a bell should toll to give notice to the neighbors that they might pray for the neighbors that they might pray for the dying party, which was commonly called a passing bell, because the sick person was passing belt, because the sick person was passing hence to another world, and when his breath was ex-pired the bell rung out that the neigh-bors might cease their prayers, for that the party was dead." It is now only

tolled after death.

The saint's bell was not so called from the name of the saint that was inscribed on it or of the church to which it belonged, but because it was always rung out when the priest came to that part of the service, "Sanctus, Sanctus, Sanctus, Domine Deus Sabbaoth," purposely that those persons who could not come to church might HEALTH AND MANLY VIGOR RESTORED know in what a solemn office the congregation were at that instant engaged and so, even in their absence, be once, at least, moved to lift up their hearts to him who made them. 

North American Life Co.'s Managing Director Says So.

Policyholders Had Practically No Voice In the Direction of the Affairs of the Company, the Shareholders Being Controllers - No Proxies For Policyholders-Mr. McCabe's Salary

Royal Insurance Commission resumed here. The affairs of the North American Life Assurance Co. were investigated. Mr. Goldman, managing director, was examined at length by Mr. Shepley, Dominion bounsel, regarding the forma-tion and regulations of the company. He had been connected with the com-pany since 1881, and had been appointpany since 1831, and had been appointed to his present position on the death of Mr. McCabe. The company had been incorporated in 1879 with a capital stock of \$100,000, afterwards increased to \$1,000,000, with \$60,000 paid up and \$40,000 subscribed.
