

Last winter I understand the thermometer reached six below zero, which was the coldest they have had known to the oldest settlers, in fact usually the fowls are able to run at large nearly the year round. So far I like the climate very well and have not found July and August any hotter than Canada, how I will like the winter remains to be seen. POULTRY ASSOCIATION OF ONTARIO.

On September 11th, the Board of Directors met in the Board Room of the Industrial Exhibition Association, President White in the chair, others present being Messrs. McNeill and Bogue, London; Duff, Toronto; Goebel, New Hamburg; Clemo, Galt; Rice, Whitby; Massie Port Hope; Senior, Hamilton; Gibbard, Napanee; Trew, Lindsay; and Oldrieve, Kingston. Mr. Richard Oke acted as Secretary in the absence of Mr. Brown.

THE PRESIDENT,

in his opening remarks, stated that Port Hope would do nobly for the show and hoped to have an exhibition larger than any previously held. One room in the Town Hall would be devoted to Games and Bantains, one to Pigeons and Pets and the larger hall to the other breeds. A specimen of the new wire coops to be used was shown on the table, and a committee consisting of the President, Secretary, Treasurer and W. McNeill, was consisted to purchase five hundred dollars worth. The sizes are to be 18. 24 and 27 inches cube. An application was received from the Cobourg Poultry Association requesting loan of coops, but the Board declined to enter into any arrangement of this kind.

ADDITIONS TO LIST.

The following additions and changes were made in prize list: buff P. Rocks, buff Wyandottes, buff Leghorns, white Langshans, white Jacobins, and Show Homers were added, Japanese Bantams were made to read blacktailed. Classes for best pair of dressed chickens and for heaviest dozen eggs were also put on. In the latter double yolks are debarred and quality as well as size is to be considered. The breed which layed them must also be specified. The same money is to be given as for the present cross-bred classes and Port Hope to add what specials are procurable for other similar classes.

It was decided to allow Port Hope one hundred dollars and door receipts to run show. Ribbons to be used in lieu of cards. The date of show is January 13 to 17, 1896.

THE JUDGES.

The following motion was carried unanimously: "The members of this Association desire to place on record their deprecation of the letters written and also to express their confidence in the fairness and ability of Messrs. Butterfield, Jarvis, Smelt and Johnson as judges." Meeting then adjourned.

INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION, TORONTO.

N point of numbers this year's exhibition far surpassed any yet held, and a further enlargement of the building is now an absolute necessity. This, we have reason to know, will be done before next year's show, and if the ideas of the Chairman of the Poultry Committee can be carried out a still further classification by departments will result.

The quality on the whole was good and showed in many cases considerable advance. This was more especially noticeable in buff Leghorns, which made very large classes and were streets ahead in color of last year's exhibit. Soundness of color is yet to be desired, i.e. evenness and freedom from black or white splashes or specks. the females are yet correct in under color, all being too light. Taken all through we cannot speak too highly of the rapid strides in this section, and we were pleased to see competition so keen. In contra-distinction to these may be mentioned the good old light Brahmas. Where under the sun are they going to? The winning hens, which were grand, saved this class from mediocrity. Through the courtesy of the judges we are able to give critical reports of the classes each adjudicated upon, so that little is left for us to say. The judging of Incubators, in our opinion, is a farce of the worst kind. If we might be permitted to make a suggestion, it would be that ample space be allowed each manufacturer and that no award of merit whatever be made. The only proper test is that each machine from start to finish be run under seal and under the control of a committee. This it does not appear is feasible, and in its absence the course we suggest is, we feel positive, the wisest.

Mr. J. C. Nicol, Mr. Oldrieve's late partner in the fancy, was also up, and purposes going into breeding again for utility purposes.

Mr. J. J. Withrow, the President of the Association paid a fiying visit to the poultry building and saw for himself the necessity of larger quarters.

Mica Crystal grit was used in three sizes and from the way some of the exhibits gobbled it down they hadn't had much "grinding material" for some time. It is now a necessity in all up to-date yards.

Something seemed to go wrong with the preliminary arrangements this year and many of the entry tickets had to be corrected, indeed some, including those for all Kent&Oldrieve's large entry, were entirely overlooked. This and the taking of late entries caused a good deal of trouble to the Superintendent and led to much confusion in the cooping of the birds, something unusual at Toronto.

Brahmas, dark.—First prize cock a very good bird and will be a very good show bird when moulted; 2nd a good coloured bird excepting thighsand fluff, being all splashed with white; 1st prize hen grand it. colour and superb in pencil-

ling but looked small in size; and very fair but small in size; 3rd large enough, pencilling indistinct. First breeding pen contained two very good hens and a fairly good male bird; and was deficient in pencilling. Chicks young and only medium. Light-None of the males in good show shape. And when they should meet in good feather many, if not all of the prizes would be reversed. The winning hens very good. Cockerels, some of the young ones which were too young to place, will outclass the winners when they meet again. Pullets, the same may be said for them, more of the winners will get a second place, when the younger pullets get their development. Cochins, buff.—First cock a sound uniform buff, but carries his tail perpendicular instead of horizontal; and a little lighter in shade, and varies more in colour, and possesses the same fault of carrying too high a tail; 3rd in poor feather and not in any show condition, balance of class fairly good; 1st hen too high in colour but in fine shape, with grand short legs and heavy side leg and foot feathering; and and 3rd will have much improved when they get their new feathers; 1st breeding pen contained some good even coloured females, and the male bird was a grand fine coloured buff, and the best of the male birds in the buff classes; 2nd, hens all in mouland in very poor show condition; 1st and 2nd cockerels remarkably good in wing flights very sound and even buff, free from black or mealy colour and may develop into good show birds; 1st and 2nd pullets very good in colour. and promise to make good birds when matured; and pullet large and in good shape but not so sound in colour; 3rd cockerela nice young bird but yet too small to tell just what he will make, but every indication points for a good bird and several other youngsters in the buff classes promise to be very good birds. Partridge-First cock good in colour but lacks breast shape; 2nd very white in ear lobe or should have been 1st easy; 3rd very nice but very small-looking for a Cochin; 1st hen very well pencilled but not heavy enough feathered on legs; and rather small and not bright enough in bottom colour. She has good Cochin characteristics and that is short in legs; 3rd looks a better hen, but the pencilling on the cushion went nearly parallel across the feather, and had one very bad coloured eye; 1st cockerelfair to medium good; 1st pullet very good shape with good legs and feet; 2nd more distinct in pencilling but was away off in breast and body shape; 3rd very good shape but too young to show much pencilling. Whites-All pretty good birds. Blacks-Not a heavy class but fairly good birds in every section. GAME, black-red,-First cock a grand, well shaped bird, large and very sound and straight on his legs, not quite so clean in head as 2nd bird, but his health made

him show himself for all he was worth; 2nd a very good bird, and like balance of class in poor show condition; 1st hen a little short in head, otherwise a very good hen; 2nd a little thick in head otherwise a good bird, she had such a tired look about her, that I don't think it would have made any difference to her feelings, if she had received the 1st instead of 2nd; 3rd a very good hen but in poor feather; the hen with 1st prize cock looked like the winner, but her comb had been torn off her head and almost looked as if she had been very poorly dubbed, balance of class all good but in poor show shape; 1st cockerel a good straight bird and an easy win and and 3rd too slim in breast and body but will improve with age. First pullet a very well behaved youngster and had she been a little more developed would have been an easy win; 2nd too high in colour but very stylish; 3rd rather slun on breast and body. One pullet had she been as well behaved on the day she was passed upon as she was the day after, would certainly have won 2nd if not 1st, it shows how necessary it is to handle birds some before bringing them to be placed in a show coop, for no matter how good the bird if scared it spoils its chance of getting its proper place in competition. Lots of winners left con because the prizes would not reach round, and not one was shown that would not be worthy of a first prize at any show if the other winners were away. Duckwings-The old duckwing cock again to the front, I think that is three 1st prizes to his credit at Toronto, balance of cocks in poor show condition. Best hen in such a terrible condition that I could not place her. She was all torn to pieces and looked more an object of pity than of pleasure. The hens as a whole were very good but in poor plumage. Cockerels, least said would be the best, none worthy of a first. Pullets, fairly good, especially one of the younger ones. Brownreds First cock a good coloured bird and in grand show shape except his tail; and much faded in hackle and saddle. but will make a pretty good show bird for next winter; 3rd good but poor legs. First hen in good show condition and at her best; 2nd and 3rd very good but in poor feather. Balance of class good birds. First cockerel earlier and better developed than 2nd, but when 2nd meets again in three months I have no doubt they will have to change places. Pullets, 1st a grand promising youngster, looks sister to 2nd prize cockerel; and larger but lacks neatness; and a little too young but will make a good one. Pyles.-Not one bird in good show condition neither in old fowls nor chicks. Still when in show shape they will make a pretty good show. Indian.—Were so scattered that it was an impossibility to

all the old hirds being together there were chicks, old birds any other variety of game, and some chicks at one end, and old birds at the other, and in about the centre of I think about thirty coops, were games of any other variety, the most confused class I ever saw, and no matter bow careful one would be, it was impossible to get them correctly, and such a thing as that should never occur at such a large show as Toronto, where competition is so severe. In GAME BAN-TAMS a great many of them had the same tired appearance of which I spoke of the 2nd prize black-red hen, but the winners in every case were in grand show condition, and take the black reds as a whole, the birds were good enough for the best company, not even excepting New York, but condition played havoc with a lot of them. Take the game Bantam classes as a whole and I don't think I ever saw at Torontc so many extraordinary good birds. One new departure which is worthy of especial mention and that was the 1st and 2nd white Game Bantam hens and the white Game Bantam chicks, for length of leg and neatness of tail they were right in the front rank with the best Game Bantam females. I never saw white females so good, nor as good a white male bird as 1st cockerel. Now regarding the Other classes of Bantams the description of any one of the winners in one class would do for them all, for every 1st prize bird was a gem of the first water, followed very closely with the 2nd prize bird, and I am sure that never before were there so many first class specimens shown at Toronto and to begin to do them half justice individually, would take more time than I can spare. To Bantam lovers it must have been a high old love feast, for the wing which contained the Bantams was full of people from early morn until closing time every night and crowds were standing in great admiration. SHARP BUTTERFIELD.

The exhibit of poultry at the Industrial must have been the delight of the Exhibition Association and of the Committee. In all my experience I have never seen in Canada a larger or better stock of fowl. The entries, I understand, far exceeded last year, and the quality of stock shown was of the best. It was proved conclusively that there is not yet enough room, and extra accommodation must be provided at no late date. I was glad to see such a display of incubators and brooders. The public seemed to be very much interested and the part of the building in which they were located was crowded from morning to night. At your request, I give a description of the varieties which I judged:

Indian.—Were so scattered that it was an impossibility to Langshans, black—Taken as a whole the exhibit is not up get the prizes as correctly as one would wish, for instead of to last year in quality, especially in chicks. Cocks—first a

typical Langshan, good color; second a very good one, but matured. Pullets-First, a grand pullet, beautiful color, lacks in saddle. Hens-First very good all over with the good head and legs, grand Rock shape, well grown, one of exception of leg and toe feathering; others only fair. Cockerels-First a nice little bird, very small; second poor in back, lacks breast. Pullets-These were very small and it is not worth while referring to them specially. Breeding pens-First cock-a nice breeding bird; hens, good, two in particular; second pen contains a good cock but hens are poor. White-A very poor class with the exception of the winning pullet, which was very good indeed PLYMOUTH ROCKS, barred—This was a good class all round, especially so in young birds. In fact I doubt if a better lot of young birds were ever shown anywhere at such an early date. Cocks-First a very nice bird, in fairly good feather, nice shape, fair color, too much tail; second, a good bird, nice head, not yet moulted or might have been first; third a nice shaped bird but entirely out of showing condition-not moulted. Hens-First a good bird all over and in full bloom; second, a little light in color but in real good feather; third a good hen, with splendid legs and beak, not fully moulted, new feathers that are in, nicely barred Cockerels-First a nice colored hird, good shape, rather poor comb; second a good colored bird, lacking a little in breast color, grand head, splendid colored legs and beak; not so matured as first; third a nice colored bird all over. good colored legs and beak, at present a bit weak on legs. Pullets-First and second the best that have been shown in years, little to choose between the two, second has better under-color than first but takes second place on account of not being so well matured; third a nice pullet, well barred, good shape, lost her color a little. Breeding pens-First contains a cockerel which is a grand shaped Rock, good beak, good head and legs. Three grand pullets, one especially fine in markings and shape, grand head and legs; others close up but not quite so richly colored; all the birds in this pen have grand colored legs; second, three hens and a cockerel; one especially good hen; others fairly good, not in good shape; cockerel fair. Plenty of birds left that would win almost anywhere except at the Industrial. White-In old birds there was the best class I ever saw at the Industrial. Cocks—First a grand bird, pure white color, good Rock shape, good head, lacks a little in breast, well shown; second close up but lacks a little in breast and is a trifle straight in back; shown in splendid trim; third, good. Hens -Not quite as good as usual; first good white Rock; lacks in comb; second, a grand bird, good legs and beak, very ragged in feather. Cockerels-First, well shown, good head, a little short in leg but well matured; second a grand good cock not in good feather, hens good but one had cock white cockerel, good beak, best bird in the show if more leathers in her tail. Both were good pens.

the best seen this season; second, a good pullet, not so white in plumage nor so well matured as first; a little high in tail; balance of the class good. Breeding pens-First, a good pen all round, but cock is out of shape; second is also a good pen. Buff-No old birds were shown but the young stock was very good indeed. I was quite pleased to see them so good. Cockerels-First, a nice bird, good color all over, tair head, good legs, a little dark in wing; second, also a good bird, not so even in color as first; third, uneven surface color. Pullets-First, a nice bird, but hardly so good in under-color as an unnoticed one which was too dark on the outside; second, a nice little bird of good color all over; third, close up. MINORCAS, black-One of the largest and best classes I have ever seen anywhere. Competition was very keen but the old war horse still manages to keep at the top. I have never seen a better class all through. Cocks—First, a grand headed bird, immense large comb but perfectly straight on head, well serrated, grand red face. well shaped lobes, and good color throughout; second, a large bird, well up on legs, grand small comb, bright red face, nice lobes, wattles have been a little torn, splendid color, large well spread tail; third, an immense big fellow with grand face and lobes, comb over in the back; balance of class real good. Hens-First, an immense big one, nice evenly serrated comb, still has her old feathers but they are good in color. This hen also won the "McMaster Medal" for best Minorca female; second, a beautiful hen, perfect comb, good face and lobes, nice color throughout, crowds first close, but is not so large; third has grand lobes, one seldom sees such good ones on a hen; pure white, grand plumage but not fully moulted. Cockerels-first, the best cockerel ever seen at this season of the year, grand color. large well spread tail, full round breast, nice comb, fair lohes; second, a much smaller and younger bird, has a fair comb nice lobe, poor wattles, well up on leg; third, a nice small one. Pullets-first a beauty, grand shape and color, well grown, nice lobes; second, a nice bird, but will never be as large as first, nice face, lobes too small, light in bone; third, will likely make the best of the lot, just beginning to show comb, good color. There were many other pullets crowding close; there was not a real poor one in the class. Breeding pens-Very close between first and second; first contained a large cock, should make a good stock bird: there was one especially fine hen, very large, grand body, splendid lohes, comb not out since moult; second, had a

fairly large class of good birds. Cocks-First, a large bird with a grand comb, face and lobes; well up on leg; second crowds first hard but is not so good in body, good comb and lobes, good color; third, a well-known old bird and a good one. Hens-first, probably the largest white Minorca hen ever seen at the Industrial; poor comb but good everywhere else; second has a nice comb, good lobes; third, a bit small but good. Cockerels-First, a nice, well-grown bird, fair comb, good face, nice color and good shape; second, also a good bird, but not so mature as first; third, a smaller bird, good lobes, nice color, well up on leg, poor comb. Pullets-First, a nice large one, good color; second and third smaller but good. Breeding pens-First, a splendid lot; second hens good, but cockerel very poor, would have exchanged places with an unnoticed pen had not the cockerel in latter been red in lobe. Spanish-This class was a very good one and I was glad to see so many out Cocks—First a grand bird but a little out of shape, grand clear face, good comb, good legs and nice Spanish shape; second, good shaped Spanish; long face but coarse, comb over; third, a pretty good bird, nice comb but coarse in face. Hens-First, a good hen, nice face, small comb, good Spanish shape; second not nearly as good, has a very large face but quite coarse; third, good, but lacks in condition. Cockerels-First a splendid bird, nice smooth face; second, close up; third, well grown but is altogether too coarse in face. Pullets—A grand lot all round. Breeding pens-First, a nice lot of birds and won well; second, off in condition. The class of Spanish was undoubtedly the best shown in Canada for some time. WYANDOTTES, black-Cocks—First, splendid color, good comb, a little too small; second lacked shape, good head. Hens-First a grand hen, good comb, large, fine Wyandotte shape, good head; second, good shape but too high in tail. Cockerels-First, a good bird, but a little long in back, good legs and color: second close up, but not so fully matured. Pullets were a nice lot, especially the winner. White-Cocks-First and second close, both good Wyandotte shape; first in better condition than second. Hens-A nice class; first and second good Wyandottes. Cockerels-Not so well matured as we have seen but good all over; second more matured than first but lacks in style and shape Pullets were a real good class, but not so matured as we have seen other years. Breeding pens-Only one shown and that was just fair. Silver-Cocks-First, a grand Wyandotte in shape, lacks a little in breast, good head, nice color but not yet moulted out; second not so good in shape and out of feather; third, Hens-First a splendid bird, lacks in neck and saddle. grand shape and good color, free from outside lacing;

second and third close up. Cockerels-First a nice bird, grand saddle, off in breast color; second is a good Wyandotte but is off in earlobes; third, fair. Pullets—First, a nicely marked bird, good open centres, well grown, good legs; second, nice breast, lacks a little in back, good legs and nice shape; third, lacks in back and breast color, not so matured as winners. Breeding pens-First, a nice lot of birds, cock not in good shape, but hens first-class; second has a good shaped cockerel, pullets a bit'smutty on back but all have good Wyandotte shape. Golden -- Cicks-First a good Wyandotte all over. I would strongly advise breeders of this variety to be more particular in breeding for under-color, the majority of the male birds being light. Hens-First, good open centres, but out of condition; second, grand color, good open centres, but a small bird; third, a nice one. Cockerels—First, a good bird, nice breast; second, not so matured as first, off in head but close to first. Pullets—First, a real good one all over, hard to beat anywhere, well marked, rich in color, good legs; second, a good one; third, well up. HAMBURGS, black-Cocks, first a grand bird, hard to beat anywhere; second, lacks earlobes and wattles, light in legs; not so good in style. Hens-First, a grand colored hen hard to find fault with, in fact I do t know where she has one; second, grand color, but lacking in style of first. Cockerel-First, the best shown for years, grand style, pure in earlobe, grand color, magnificent tail; second more matured than first, but lacking in Hamburg style; nice earlobe. Pullets—First, a grand bird, splendid Hamburg shape, good color, nice head; second, a good one but not so fully developed as first; third, close up but younger, should make a good bird. Golden pencilled - Cocks, first, good style, off in head; grand color; second, better in head but lacking in evenness of color. Hens-First, a grand hen; grand style; second, close up but lacking condition. Cockerels—First, grand shape and color, a little off in earlobes; second, a nice bird but not so matured as first. Pullets—First a daisy, good all over; second a good one but not so nicely pencilled. pencilled—Cocks, first in grand shape, good head; a little rough in lobes, grand in tail color; second a good bird. Hens-Fust, the best that has ever been shown here. according to my recollection; second, good but not so rich Cockerels-First, a good bird; second, not in pencilling. so matured. Pullets -First, a young one but a beauty, fine in pencilling, grand all over; second, well matured, but off Silver spangled—Cocks—First good bird, in pencilling. well spangled breast, good tail, grand shape; second, good but out of condition. Hens-First, a good one all over; second very nice. Cockerels-First, the best shown for

years, very little wrong with him; second, not so fully matured as first but a grand bird, lacks in tail. Pullets-First as good a bird as the first cockerel; second, close up but lacks the spangling of first. Golden spangled-First cock good style, lacks a little in earlobe, rich in color; second, close up; third, off in condition; if fit an easy winner. Hens—First a Hamburg all over, rich in color, fine spangling; second, close to first but lacks that richness of color. Cockerels-First, a grand bird, lacks a little in shape of back, but hard to find fault with elsewhere; second, not so rich in color and not so fully developed. Pullets -First, a good one all over; second, close up. Dominiques were a nice class all through. It seems, however, a pity that more are not shown. RED CAPS—Cocks—First, a fine bird, good head, nice color and shape; second, close up, lacks in comb. Hens-First the best shown for years, an easy winner; second not so good, lacks in color. Cockerels-First a nice bird but small, a little off in comb, good color; second. nice style and color but very small. Pullets—First a good one all over, well grown and in nice shape, nice color; second lacks in color of first. SILKIES—Class good, the winners being especially fine; first cock and first hen the best ever shown here. I would like to emphasize again the importance of the breeders of golden Wyandottes looking more to under-color in the males. There seems to be no reason why good under-color should not be obtained, and I trust that next year we shall see a decided improvement.

THOMAS H. SMELT.

I cannot say that there was any improvement in the quality of stock in my classes over former years, some were out of condition through moulting, yet all classes were fairly well represented. LEGHORNS, white-A fair class. Male birds in good condition; 1st cock a good all round bird; and crowding close for 1st place. 1st hen a good one. noticed several hens with light coloured legs, in fact almost white, while we know that age and soil on which fowls are kept has a great deal to do with the colour of the legs, we must have sufficient colour left to know that they have had yellow legs, otherwise the Standard disqualifies them. In chicks the prize winners were all good with rich coloured legs, also 1st prize breeding pen grand in plur age and rich in leg colour. Browns-A fair class. 1st and 2nd cocks with nice striped hackles and saddles, in good condition; hens of the exhibitors. not through their moult; 1st and 2nd cockerels grand birds; pullets hardly moulted enough for showing. Buff-A large class and the majority fair in colour of plumage. I see a tral Fair, a single bird show with nearly all new coops about decided improvement over last year. First cockerel not as six hundred entries, nearly all classes being well represented.

any white in wing, surface colour a little dark. I hope in a year or so to see all the birds shown in this class a uniform buff and free from black or white in plumage. DORKINGS, white -Only four pairs shown, all good birds. Silver grey, a very fine class; two old hens in the pink of condition, winners last winter at New York; 1st cockerel grand in colour, not as large as 2nd but very much better in colour; 1st and 2nd pullets large and perfectly free from any red tinge or as we term it, a "brick wing", 1st pen of silvers in fine shape, also and pen of cole .red; several birds were shown in this class that have been crossed with silvers, the winners are all good birds. Polands—A fine class. Chicks not as well matured as last year. Old birds in fine condition and fully up in quality to former years. HOUDANS -A good class, some not in as good condition as we would like to see. First cockerel good in colour but light in crest and beard; and very young with fine crest and beard, I hope to see this bird at the winter shows when he will be fully matured; 1st and 2nd pullets grand in colour, not fully matured, 3rd pullet large, but more pencilled than mottled. CREVE-CŒURS.—Only a few pairs shown, in quality good; 1st pullet the best I ever saw. Andalusians. -Several good birds, but only a few that had fully moulted. I would like to see more birds shown in this class, I consider them one of the best breeds of fowls for egg production that we have, laying eggs fully as large as the Minorca or Spanish. WATER FOWL-Ducks, fully as good as ever shown at the Industrial, especially Pekin, the winning birds great size, and good shape; 1st duck a grand one in age, but shows a little too much keel; and not so large but very round in body. Geese-A good class and all in good condition. Turkeys-Bronze, old birds in good shape and fully up in size to former years. White Holland, a good class with the exception of two or three, in nice show trim.

I would like to make a suggestion in reference to the work of the Superintendent of this Department, I think Mr. Daniels has too much work to do in handling and feeding the fowls. He should have a larger office, and after the fowls are cooped, he should remain in the office so that he may be found at any time by the judges and exhibitors who need information regarding the stock on exhibition and if he could be found at his office it would save a great deal of running and delay in the work of the judges and many wants

MONTREAL EXHIBITION.

VER sixteen hundred entries rewarded the manage ment of the Montreal Exposition Co. for their liberality in the prize list and their enterprise in securing the best available men for Superintendent and Judges. The best poultry exhibition ever held in this Province was the universal opinion of those qualified to speak. Fourteen the show. hundred entries in the poultry department and 200 in the pigeon stretched to the utmost the capacity of the Committee to find accommodation and notwithstanding the temporary addition that had been made to the building still the cry was more room. Game headed the list with the magnificent entry of over 150. Leghorns next with 125 with Wyandottes, Polands and Rocks getting close to the hundred.

C. C. Pine of South Royalston, Vermont, was the largest exhibitor this year, bringing with him a great many varieties and taking a large number of prizes. He, with Messrs.

all had over 100 entries, I understand that it is the intention of the management next year to probably give a gold medal to the largest exhibitor. Among the other exhibitors were W. M. Osborne and A. W. Garrett of Brockville, W. Grier of Ovebec and Messrs. Thos. Hall, T. Irving, V. Fortier, J. Ainslie, F. W. Molson of Montreal, A. Thompson of Allan's Corners and many others whose names will be found in the prize list. Exhibitors and the poultry press have done wonders this last few years in improving the quality of the stock in this country and no where has more rapid strides been made than in the Province of Quebec.

The most rapid advance has been made in chicks, such a grand lot of young birds never having been seen at a fall show in Montreal before. Many of the inexperienced visitors could not be persuaded that they were this year's birds. Over 100 turkeys in line gladdened the hearts of those who looked forward to Thanksgiving Day, and filled them with confidence that their favorite bird is improving in quality year after year.

Dark Brahmas which have been in the background or some time are picking up and showed mark improvement. Golden Wyandottes were in fine shape and birds were there the like of which had never been beaten even in a New York show. A. Thompson made the best exhibit of waterfowl he has ever done and that is saying a great deal. V. Fortier made a clean sweep with his fine lot of Polands. Among the many visitors to the show were A. G. Gilbert and Prof. Saunders of Ottawa, Mr. Gilbert who is expected to be in Montreal this winter to lecture at the time of the Montreal Poultry Show, expressed his pleasure at the excellence of the exhibits, being especially loud in his praise of the turkeys, geese and ducks. He suggested that a dressed poultry and egg department next year would be of great advantage to the commercial interests of this Province. The directors of the Quebec Exposition Co. with Secretary Campbell, expressed their pleasure at the completeness of

One of the greatest means of pleasure, to the children especially, was the duck pond in the centre of the building. A space 18 feet square had been railed off and a pond built with turf all round and in the centre a fountain playing and the ducks in their native element enjoying themselves. The Superintendent W. H. Ulley, with his staff of eight men kept the building in perfect order, and so successful were they that there was not the least odor or unpleasantness at any time in the building. A great drawback and one that ought to have been remedied was the clerical department. Loud complaints were made as to the cards not going up in Kent & Oldrieve of Kingston and C. J. Daniels of Toronto time and many were not up on Thursday evening. It is to be hoped that the Chairman of the Poultry Committee Mr. Hector Prevost, who is so desirous that everything should be done systematically and properly will take measures to avoid this unfortunate delay in the future. Already plans are being made to hold a large Colonial Exhibition in Montreal next year, and new buildings and large prizes are talked of as they expect to offer such inducements as to bring birds from all over Canada and the United States.

There were a good many sales made at prices satisfactory to the owners, but it was hard to get at exact figures.

Our old friend Sharp Butterfield judged the birds and the results show that he is still in the first ranks as a judge on this continent. It is a pity that he was so pressed for time that he could not have been with us the whole week. James Ainslie, one of the oldest in the fraternity judged the pigeons. Several incubators were there in running order, they do not seem to have taken the place of the old ladies in this Province at least. The practical result of the exhibition will be great as the visitors from the country are being educated year after year and many have come and more will come in the near future to realize that they are not making the most of their farms when they neglect their poultry and sell one dollar's worth where they could easily sell five by giving attention and breeding pure stock instead of any thing they can get hold of that is cheap.

THE WHITE POLISH.

THE white Polish Bantam has always suffered, in my estimation, because of its single comb, but when I was editor of the American Standard, the way was paved for true Polish Bantams, bearded whites with

Such are now breeding, the V comb or no comb at all. and I believe they will, as I think they ought to supersede the single combed, unbearded variety.

The trouble with the single comb has been that it split the crest and prevented that globular shape which is so desirable, and, to make things worse, the comb, especially in males, was often large and with a decided tendency to lop over, thus adding to the un-Polish look of the bird. With the V comb this difficulty will disappear and we may confidently look forward to the time when Polish Bantams will be bred having a natural absence of comb, and with large globular crests like those of the larger fowl. And when that time arrives there will be few Bantams that will be handsomer than the Polish.

A crested fowl requires rather more attention than one that has a clean head, for when the crest gets soaked with rain the birds are quite apt to get a cold in the head. Crested fowls, therefore, are not apt to be popular with practical poultrymen, but with fanciers, who will give them the necessary care, they are often very popular, and crested Bantams are especially designed for fanciers. Bantams are nearly always pets and pets are not allowed to be exposed to inclement weather. Breeders of Polish Bantams assure me that with a little special care in time of cold rains, their copy of it. I shall also be glad to receive the names of perbirds are quite as hardy as other varieties. They are hardy enough to do well with good care, and he who is unwilling to give them that ought not to own any Polish, or any other, Bantams.

TORONTO SHOW.

In Game Bantams no hotter show was seen outside of New York, crack birds from noted yards competing, but condition won in several instances. The first pen of B. B. red Game Bantams was sold to Mr. Van Zandt, of New York, for a goodly sum, but there are others too numerous to mention fully as creamy as those sold.—American Fancier.

SHIPMENTS OF POULTRY TO THE BRITISH MARKETS BY COLD STORAGE.

Central Experimental Farm, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Sept. 15, 1895.

IR.—The fact that the perishable food products of the country might be made a greater source of wealth to the agricultural community of the Dominion, received practical recognition from the Government during last Session of Parliament, when a sum of money was voted to promote the shipment of dairy products by cold storage. You are no doubt aware that as a result, the Dairy Commissioner was authorized to arrange a cold storage service, which includes :--

- 1. Cold storage transportation on railways.
- 2. Refrigerating chambers in Montreal.
- 3. Cold storage compartments on steamships.

These arrangements were intended for the shipment of choice creamery butter and other dairy products. I am happy to say that the shipments of butter by the cold storage service have been a great success, and have led to arrangements being made for trial shipments of fruit in a similar way.

It is thought that the shipments of fine poultry by similar cold storage conveniences would result in the development of a large and profitable trade; and my object in addressing you is to secure the lively co-operation of your Journal and vourself in an effort to inaugurate shipments of the choicest poultry from your district. You and the members of your Associations, know the capability of your districts for supplying quantity and the individuals in it who are best able to furnish good quality.

A circular was prepared for distribution from the Department of Finance, giving information on the best methods of preparing turkeys for export to Great Britain. I enclose a sons likely to assist in the enterprise, and to receive from you any suggestions which you may make.

You may depend upon my active co-operation in any action which may lead to the introduction of our best Canadian poultry, in an unimpaired condition, on the British markets.
