S.U. Meets in Closed Session:

Displeasure About President's Letter to P.M.

The UNB Student Union went into closed session for the first time this year at last Wednesday's regular meeting. Council privately discussed what was termed an "internal matter" for over two hours.

According to S.U. Vice-President Luigi Rocca "the intent of the closed session was to hash out certain problems and conflicts that had been building up over the past 2-3 weeks."

The Brunswickan has learned that a major topic of discussion at this meeting was some correspondence sent by S.U. President Dean Frost. Apparently concern was raised about Frost's use of S.U. letterhead and his title S.U. President correspondence that was not official S.U. business. The most prominent example is a letter sent by Mr. Frost to Prime Minister Mulroney endorsing the free trade Student Union

This letter stated "I [Dean Frost] personally believe that free trade by any political party is what the citizens of New Brunswick need to prosper and grow." The Candidates did devote some time to other issues. Asked if he could explain why there were no women offering for the Liberal Party this election, and what he would do about the situation, Mr. Woodside said that he didn't know why more women did not run. He declared "We limit ourselves as individuals, not as men or women... I would encourage both men and women to run.

On this point Mr. Bird expressed his agreement with Mr. Woodside and noted that the Mulroney cabinet includes six women, more than any other government in history. Mr. Sharp said "It is important to realize that Canadian women work at a disadvantage with men." He said women find it more difficult to become involved in politics because of the burdens of homemaking, inadequate childcare and unequal pay. He noted that within the NDP, every committee must have an equal number of men and women.

Canadian Federation of Students President-elect, Jane Arnold questioned the candidates on student issues. All three expressed the opinion that differential fees for foreign students in Canada should be dumped.

Mr. Bird said that he would work to ensure that the government spends well on social programmes, science and technology research, and on the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency.

In their closing statements, the candidates stressed different things. Mr. Bird appealed to the voters to elect the best person to represent them in Parliament. Mr. Sharp said that both the Liberals and the Conservatives have had a chance to rule and failed, and that voters should give Ed Broadbent a chance. Mr. Woodside declared that "there is something very badly wrong

TOO BAD CANADIANS CAN'T VOTE IN U.S. PRESIDENTIAL **ELECTIONS:**

COMMENTARY ON MICHEAL DUKAKIS' RUN FOR THE ROSE GARDEN

Studying for Money

Technology education at all levels is changing. The new curriculum which is being developed for use in New Brunswick junior high schools will see compulsory modules entitled Technology 1 and 2. Optional modules will also be available. Among them will be Energy, Graphic Communications, Production and Enterprise.

Tech-Ed students at UNB, working towards their B.Ed., are being given a first-hand look at the Enterprise module. Through the course, Edvo 4979 - Canadian Industry Synthesis, education students are faced with the task of manufacturing and marketing a product. In doing so, they gain knowledge in all aspects of industry - such as raising ! capital, product design, market research, production, and sales to name a few.

The underlying goal of the course is to create conditions similar to which the student will encounter when they enter the teaching profession and are required to teach this module at the junior high level. By simulating these conditions, it is hoped that experiences encountered will create a capable

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and more knowledgeable teacher.

There were several possibilities for a product in this year's class. Among those proposed were an electricity conservation device, a folding chair, a Christmas novelty item, and a laundry bag. After prototypes were built and market surveys were completed, the laundry bag was

The laundry bag idea came from the group president, Greg Doucette, while the "Laundrorat" concept was an effort of Duane Arbeau, with artistic help from his wife, Ioanne.

The group hopes that they have created a useful and practical product. In addition to being practical, the class feels that this product may be a novelty item which is personalized and unique to this institutions and its students.

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People or Profit: Western Business Ethics

FACT: After the Dalkon Shield Intrauterine device killed at least seventeen women in the United States the manufacturer withdrew it from the market. Half a million of these IUDs were then sold overseas are still in use in some developing countries.

This process is called dumping and it happens when multinationals such as pharmaceutical companies have a load of banned, restricted or surplus items which they must

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Another example of dumping is the case of TRIS -treated children's nightwear in developing countries after TRIS was found to be carcinogenic and banned from the U.S.

Dumping leads to selling goods in an environment for which they are not designed and in conditions which make them unsafe. An example of this is convincing mothers to

stop breastfeeding their to print appropriate warnings children, and then selling them or instructions on labels. In baby food in areas where the water to dilute the powder is dirty, where instructions cannot be read because of illiteracy or a language barrier, or where formulas is prohibitively expensive causing families to dilute it into proportions which lead to severe malnutrition and death. In cases such as these the mother would have been better off continuing to breastfeed her child.

In addition, dumping leads to selling goods causually which are highly restricted elsewhere - such as selling prescription only drugs in an Indonesian marketplace to anyone who has the money to pay for them.

It is generally easy to dump in developing countries because there are usually few or no controls over testing or registration of imports As well there are few or no obligations

many developing countries dangerous drugs are available without a prescription. In addition to this there are usually no shelf-life restrictions on drugs therefore people may be taking an expired drug whose chemical compound has much money that people no changed.

The question which many people are asking themselves is "does profit making by pharmaceutical companies in developing countries come before people thus causing even greater deterioration of health?" Hopefully we would all answer "NO", but this is exactly what seems to be happen-

ing. "Pharmaceuticals are big business today. Lack of regulatory controls in poor countries mean that (Western) drug companies can virtually say - or omit - whatever they want about their product to increase sales." (The New Internationalist, 1983).

The single, most important cause of ill health is poverty, from which malnutrition stems. Zapping germs with modern medicine does nothing to change the alreading existing nutritional weakness. In developing countries the purchase of useless drugs costs so

longer have the means to take the necessary measures for REAL health improvements. What is needed is food, not drugs. Yet parents with sickly children spend their money on "miracle drugs from the west" which they have complete faith in, but which are generally useless.

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CAUSING EARTHQUAKES?

Here's another thing to add to the list of ways we're harming the only planet we have to live on.

Underground nuclear tests may be causing an increase in the number of earthquakes and volcanoes.

Dr. Gary Whiteford, a geography professor in UNB's Faculty of Education, has assembled data on the relationship between underground nuclear explosions and earthquakes over the past thirty-five years. He finds a "frighteningly high coincidence" but admits that so far, there is no causal theory explaining the

Since 1945, there have been an estimated 1754 nuclear tests, primarily by the U.S., U.S.S.R. and France. In 1987, 46 nuclear tests were conducted.

In many of these cases, earthquakes followed within days or even hours of these tests. Although it is to be expected that some earthquakes would follow nuclear tests, given that they both occur, other experiments indicate that triggering earthquakes is easier than we think.

Experiments conducted in the U.S. found that small earthquakes can be turned on and off by certain types of oil production.

The U.S. Geological Service and Chevron USA conducted further investigation and found that they could actually turn earthquakes on and off simply by pumping water into the ground and then stopping.

Dr. Whiteford is concerned not only with the immediate effects of nuclear tests, but with the cumulative effects as well: "We may be headed for an era of an killer megaearthquake," he commented. The recent earthquakes in China and the Himalayas closely followed nuclear tests.

Of the three major testers, only the U.S. announces their tests, primarily because the explosions at the Nevada test sites produce tremors in Las Vegas. The Soviet Union usually admits after the fact, while The U.S. Army Arsenal in France rarely acknowledges

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GIVING CANADA TO THE U.S.

The Free Trade Agreement will undoubtedly have an effect on the music industry. But how? Our boy Rod thinks he has the answer.

And I also assume that a good number of you have heard of the Free Trade Agreement (if you haven't, it has to do with giving Canada to the U.S.). Aside from all of the regular garbage our political leaders go on about is a side of the agreement that affects ENTERTAINMEAT; musicians are excluded from the Free Trade Agreement (FTA). A majority of nobodys got together and protested so loudly that they were finally cut from the FTA. Why you ask? To save our musical culture so they say)!

Now don't get me wrong - I'd be the first to tip my hat to Canadian musicians, but how can they continue to produce good quality material if they don't have access to the American market?! "Oh sure!" The true Canadian patriot stands up and mumbles, "But, the Canadians will still buy their stuff! Metallica, man! (Duh!)."

Being realistic, if our music does well south of the border, then our musicians can afford to continue production.


It has always been difficult for Canadians to enter the U.S. music market, and the FTA doesn't help a bit. Like others from the service industry (ie. engineers, cnsultants, journalists), musicians have to get a temporary work permit from the U.S. Immigration Department in order to work in the States. There is much timeconsuming paperwork which often ends in failure. Most professionals are permitted to cross the border in order to work temporarily - under the FTA musicians are denied this benefit. In order for an employer to bring in an

American band, a routine form must befilled out for the Ministry of Employment and Immigration. Conversely, Canadians trying to get a gig in the U.S. must do paperwork and wait at least 30 days for a decision.

One third of the performers at Canadian folk festivals are American, and yet Canadians can't work in America for fear of going to jail!

If the FTA allowed music into the deal, both sides would benefit from an open border. The two countries would learn from each other. I'm not saying that the FTA is good or bad (wishy-washy! - Ed.), I'm just pointing out a flaw in its working in case it is passed. (source: Small Business July/Aug 1988)



The abstract notion of freedom from restrictions in trade is certainly very appealing. And there will hardly be a Canadian who will not want more prosperity for himself or herself and for his or her family, or for that matter, the country as a whole. Also, little can be said against establishing rules of conduct and formal procedures for resolving any trade disputes. The question is whether there is a hidden cost for Canada in this Agreement in the long

CLAIMS OF SUPPORTERS

The national ad campaign under the heading: "Straight Talk on Free Trade" asserts that: "It does not affect our sovereignty. It does not harm our social programs. It does not menace our healthcare programs. It does not undermine our culture. It does not threaten our environment, our fresh water, our energy resources or our farmers. Any claims to the contrary are false. They are not based on the facts of the Agreement. They are based on fear. Canada is and will remain a free

vibrant and independent nation." If these assertions were to be taken as facts, then there is nothing to debate about. But these are at best hopes, projections and predictions, just as are the words of those who want to tear up the Agreement, and who at worst can be called the prophets of doom and gloom, but not liars. Since the Trade Agreement is a written document, it is really not impossible to ascertain facts. The difficulty is in defining or agreeing to what is meant by "sovereignty" or "Canadian culture", as distinct from

The ad goes on to say: "Never before has the United States of America agreed to limitations on its freedom of action in these areas. No other nation has this degree of security of access to the huge U.S. market, nor is likely to get." Obviously, the Agreement is not a gesture of pure generosity on the part of he United States towards Canada, because otherwise why will they get so upset if the Canadians were to refuse this Agreement? Therefore, one may ask, what does the United States lose if the Agreement is not ratified by Canada? An answer to this question may also give a clue as to what would Canada lose if the Agreement does

NO DISTINCTION BETWEEN CANADIAN & U.S. BUSINESSMEN

become a reality.

The Agreement certainly provides many freedoms to the businessmen in the United States and Canada. In the Introduction to Chapter 1, it says: treat each other's goods, services, investments, suppliers and investors as they treat their own insofar as matters covered by this Agreement are concerned." In other words, the business people will have a kind of dual citizenship. For them the national boundaries will be partially eliminated, as the following articles confirm.

ART. 1602: NATIONAL TREAT-MENT

-. ...each Party shall accord to investors of the other Party treatment no less favourable than accorded in like circumstances to its investors with respect to its measures affecting:

LOSS OF SOVEREIGNTY

The amendments required in The Investment Canada Act are certainly an example of loss of governmental authority in regulating takeover of Canadian business by the U.S. citizens. According to ANNEX

2. The Investment Canada Act and its regulations shall be amended as of the date of entry into force of this Agreement in accordance with the provisions that follow:

a) ...i) The threshold for the review of a direct acquisition of control of a Canadian business shall be:..

E) commencing on the fourth anniversary of the date of entry into force of this Agreement, Canadian \$150 million in constant thirdanniversary-year dollars.

That is, from the year 1993 on, the Government of Canada will have no control over the acquisition of the control of a Canadian business by an American individual or corporation, unless it is worth \$150 million or more in terms of 1992 Canadian dollars, which amount will increase through inflation in the future years.

Chapter 15 of the Agreement confers on businessmen the freedom of movement across the border. The Introduction says: "National laws and regulations governing their entry will be liberalized and entry procedures will be quick and simple." But not for

BUSINESS AND GOVERNMENT

GOVERNMENT CREATED TRADE DISTORTIONS"

It is therefore interesting to note that the following statement appears in the Preamble of the Agreement: Canada and U.S. governments have resolved "To reduce government-created trade distortions while preserving the Parties flexibility to safeguard the public welfare". Of course, the cryptic phrase "government created trade distortions" may include the effects of any government regulation that comes in the way

Chapter 16 and 17 of the Agreement on Investment and Financial Services, respectively, provide the examples of how "distortions" are to be removed by exempting U.S. investors from certain Acts of the Canadian Parliament.

ARTICLE 1703: COMMITMENTS OF CANADA

1. United States persons ordinarily resident in the United States of America shall not be subject to restrictions that limit foreign ownership of Canadiancontrolled financial institutions and, in accordance with this obligation, such United States persons shall not be sub-

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
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
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TIME TO SEE THE LIGHT

Christmas entertainment is traditionally family-oriented; and Theatre New Brunswick's pre-Christmas offering continues that tradition admirably. Scapinol, opening at the Playhouse on Friday, November 25, is an engaging, boisterous, merry combination of slapstick and intrigue to delight the child in everyone, and everyone's

Director Duncan McIntosh, who is assistant artistic director of the Shaw Festival, has imbued the script with contemporary relevance, in its least stuffy fashion; and New Brunswickers will recognize sly comic jibes at favorite local icons, throughout the

Written by Frank Dunlop and Jim Dale, Scapinol is a direct descendant of Mollere's Scapin, the title character in Les Fourberles De Scapin (The Rascalities of Scapin), which established Moliere as the greatest comic dramatist in French history. But its origin goes back beyond Moliere, who borrowed the characters and plot from the stock comedies of the Italian Com-

Moliere had brought Scapin and his

adventures to France from his original home in Italy; but English director Frank Dunlop decided to return him to Italy, with an Italian name. With actorwriter-lyricist JIM DALE, Scapino! was born as a lark by the Young Vic; and its London premiere was an instant, happy success.

Moving to New York in 1974, Scapinol played to sold-out houses and rave reviews. Now, New Brunswick audiences will get a taste of the show that prompted tough-sell critics like Clive Barnes of the New York Times to exclaim, "Bravo, bravissimo... this irreverent production opened with a bang, and it's brilliant and riotous... hilarious and extraordinarily stylish, it makes

Moliere live for today's audiences."

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



Last Friday on Remembrance Day, UNB hosted Mount Allison. In the women's


events, Mt.A was the dominant team. They defeated UNB 60 to 33. The men's team once again came through to defeat Mt.A 73 to 17.



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
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ST. MARY'S TO VANIER CUP!
