In the western sphere of hostilities important changes were made in the positions of the contending forces from those occupied at the close of the week preceding. The gains made by the Allies in that week were retained, for the most part, though between La Bassée canal and Hullich the Germans succeeded in regain-ing some of the trenches from which they had been driven.
