The fierce German counter-attacks on the British lines in France have ended and the British troops are once more advancing. The fighting continues and the British are making good progress in the face of considerable opposition. before and not least of these that the fighting will shortly be resumed on a more terrific scale than ever and press to avert the menace of a general strike, throughout Germany.
