The Canadian Order of Foresters

This purely Canadian fraternal, benevolent and insurance society was organized in 1879 and now has a membership of upwards of 12,000, distributed in every province of the Dominion, to which its operations are confined. The society gives insurance to its members in policies of \$500, \$1,000, \$1,500 or \$2,000, the latter being the limit on any life. The premiums, payable monthly in advance, are as follows:

After paying upwards of one million and three quarters in death claims the Order had a surplus in the insurance department of \$1,882,000 at the end of August last, all of which is invested in gilt-edged securities in Canada, or is on deposit in the best monetary institutions of the country. Not a dollar of the moneys collected for the insurance fund is ever has been used for the expense of management. The death rate per 1,000 of membership in 1898 was 4.56, in 1899, 4.43, in 1900, 4.88, and since the organization of the society, the average death rate has been only 4.93.

The Sick and Funeral Benefit is a very popular department and upwards of 22,000 of the members of the society are participating in the feature of the policy. The benefits are \$3.00 per week for the first two weeks of illness, and \$5.00 per week for the following ten weeks, altogether \$56.00 during any one year, besides a funeral benefit of \$50.00. In case of continued illness \$56 is paid each year in sick benefits. The fees monthly in advance, are as follows:

Between 18 and 25 years.	25 cents
" 25 and 30 years.	30 cents
" 30 and 35 years.	35 cents
" 35 and 40 years.	40 cents
" 40 and 45 years.	45 cents

During the year 1901 over \$63,000 were paid out in sick and funeral benefits. All physically and morally qualified males between the ages of 18 and 45 years, who are not disqualified on account of occupation, are accepted for membership.

office has done more than corrupt every branch of the public service,—it has corrupted the constituencies, debased the standard of political rectitude, sapped and undermined the independence of the people, and gone far to establish in Nova Scotia an oligarchy differing only in degree from that of Kruger in the Transvaal. Is it not time in the interests of the country and of good government to call a halt? Is it not time that Kings County should be represented by men who have something more to say for themselves than that they have spent a lot of borrowed money?

NOMINATION DAY PROCEEDINGS

Wednesday was nomination day and the candidates for Kings are Messrs J. W. Ryan and P. Innes, Conservatives and Messrs. Dodge and Wickwire Liberals.

A joint public meeting was held at the Court House at two o'clock. Warden W. E. Roscoe took the chair and Mr. Wickwire was the first speaker. He spent a large part of the time in stating there was no serious opposition to the government here or in the other counties.

Mr. Innes stated that as a citizen he deemed it his duty to accept a nomination in the cause of good and economical government. He challenged the government men to show one thing they had done in the last 5 years for the benefit of the people. They had not done as much as representative as he had as a private citizen or as representing the Board of Trade for Kings Co.

Mr. Dodge followed defending the acts of himself and colleagues from the attacks of Mr. Innes.

Mr. Ryan made a fine impression by his calm yet logical and forcible exposure of the present government. He dealt particularly with the present railway contract to build the South Shore and what it would cost the people before it became self-sustaining even if it were built. The government as usual had brought this question forward only just before an election and after election the question had always been dropped. Mr. Ryan stated that he and Mr. Innes could not visit all sections of the county but they asked the support of the people and if elected they would use their best efforts to serve the public.

There were a number of points referred to in the speeches of Mr. Innes and Mr. Ryan on Nomination Day which deserve the serious consideration of the electors at this time. The attendance were comparatively small, which was to be regretted, because Mr. Ryan the new candidate for political honors, made a most successful and credible appearance, and we are mistaken if he is not a man to be reckoned with. We propose very briefly to indicate a few of the points raised by the Liberal Conservative speakers.

At 30th Sept. 1900, the public debt of the province was \$4,059,518. This debt has been created wholly by the Liberal administrations of Mr. Fielding and Mr. Murray, and as it is being continuously added to, we may say roundly that the province is mortgaged at the present to the extent of about \$10 per head for every man, woman and child of the population. Is this a satisfactory state of things to contemplate? Is it not high time the people stepped in and called an emphatic halt? The annual interest charge for the debentures amounted to \$147,194, to which falls to be added \$15,814 for interest on special loans and \$10,966 for sinking fund making an annual amount of \$173,974, or nearly one fifth of the entire provincial revenue which has been drafted away from the public service into the pockets of the money lenders. Is it any wonder that our road money grants are gradually and surely disappearing? In 1882 this country got \$9,000, last year it got \$3,000. How long will it be until we shall get nothing?

The Government appear to have entered into a contract for the construction of a railway from Halifax to Yarmouth involving a provincial guarantee of interest on \$2,000,000, or over, with a first mortgage on the line and plant as security. As this line will be every where open to competition by sea it is not much of a prophecy to say that when it is built or goes into operation it will be many a long year before it begins to earn or pay the interest on the guaranteed debentures. The chances are that the contractors will take all the money they can manage to secure and get out from under, and that the province will be forced to take over and operate the road at a loss for probably 20 years to come. This is certainly not a promising outlook, and yet this is one of the things upon which the Liberal government and party plume themselves.

With inexhaustible coal fields within our borders and a paternal government safe guarding our interests our fuel supplies should be plentiful and our coal bills moderate. But what has been our experience? For the past 2 years or thereby the cost of coal to the consumer has been advanced on the average \$1.50 a ton. The total home consumption for the year 1900 was 957,568 tons at \$1.50 would mean nearly \$1,500,000 increased cost of coal to our home consumers. To be absolutely within the mark let us assume only one half of the

actual increase it follows that the people of the province have been robbed of some \$750,000 because the government failed or neglected to exercise ordinary business precautions to protect the public.

A great deal is sought to be made of the increased provincial revenue arising from the 2 1/2 cents of extra royalty for which the government gave away a large part of the public domain for a term of 99 years. But if the government were to get 2 1/2 cents extra on the entire Nova Scotia output for 1900—3,357,251 tons—the amount which would have gone into the public treasury would have been \$83,931, while as already said the people—the coal consumers of the province are out of pocket at the very lowest estimation \$750,000.

But this is not all or even the worst phase of the indictment. Over 700,000 tons of Nova Scotia coal—or very nearly as much as the whole home consumption—was exported abroad. This export was to Massachusetts—and the fact is that the Whitney Syndicate Coal Company of Nova Scotia exported and sold our coal to the Whitney Syndicate Gas and other works of Massachusetts at \$1.80 a ton while our people, at the very door of production—were being charged double and more than double that price. To prate about additions to the revenue from coal royalties while our consumers are being fleeced and robbed in this way and to this extent is worse than folly, and betrays a callous indifference to the public welfare both cynical and criminal.

Mr. Murray and Mr. Longley are publicly on record as to the evils and dangers of long holding of office, the inevitable consequence of which is corruption and robbery in every branch of the public service. "This is true as gospel, the experience of all history proves it. We are led to believe that the devil himself to serve his purpose can appear as an angel of light and quote scripture like a divine. The same long office holders are now asking for a further extension of time presumably to enable them to complete and perfect the system of corruption and robbery in every branch of the public service. As nearly as we could gather the main appeal of the Liberal candidates was that the government should be supported because it was spending so much money. It is so easy to spend money which is got by the fatal facility of borrowing.

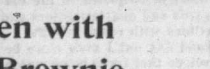

"Why, certainly, sir. I will bring you together, and at the earliest possible moment after dark. It won't do

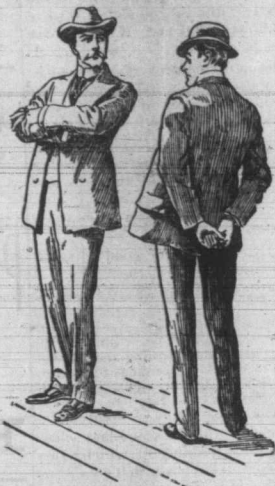
"All the fat is in the fire! The duchess has read your name on the dog's collar."

MR. EDITOR.—In looking over a recent number of your valuable paper I noticed a column of news from my native place, Black River—that beautiful although somewhat secluded spot, and reminiscences of those halcyon days of years ago comes back to me once more, when I wandered through its sylvan glades to clip the head of the ruffed grouse with the answering rifle, or lure the speckled beauties from their hiding places in the Forks River, and right here I would like to say to the tourist or lover of Nature who may be traveling through the Land of Evangeline don't fail to visit Black River in the Autumn season and if possible make an extended trip to the Forks river. Here one can see the beauties of Nature in some of its rarest forms. At Black River good guides can be secured at reasonable rates and the sportsman can if he chooses, visit Sylvan lake (formerly known as Sunken lake for want of a better name) Gem lake and Black river lake all in one day. On these lakes ducks and loons can most always be found which furnish most excellent rifle practice, while ruffed grouse foxes and some other, small game abound most everywhere and if one wants to hunt for moose or black bear, at the Forks river country is the place to go and if space will permit I would like to describe more fully the veritable sportsmans paradise and how to get there. On arriving at Black River lake which is at the end of the carriage road one can usually find a good boat which can be had for the asking. A trip of two miles up the lake and one arrived at an old log road but at first sees a light streak of water running out into the lake and wonders what causes it; well I have been told that it marks the place where a road had been on the ice last winter. Arriving at the log road we leave the boat and proceed due South and soon come to a high granite rock from beneath which flows a sparkling silvery fountain. Here we stoop down to imbibe the Liquid Inspiration and then go on our way rejoicing. Three quarters of a mile through the woods brings us in sight of Forks river, what a queer looking place, meadows, granite cliffs, bogs, dead trees killed by fire and bog woods beyond. A trip up the river several miles by boat to a driving dam and logging camp near and one can make himself at home and fish or hunt where he pleases as long as he likes. Nimrod.
