It can be instrumental in promoting and carrying through useful legislation in the town council, local legislature and the Dominion government, and opposing legislation which threatens our interests in any way.

It can be instrumental in obtaining railway extensions, increased warehouse accommodation, and other improved shipping facilities.

It can be instrumental in organizing and working up many local interests, such as exhibitions, and excursions.

It can and should consider the question of assessment in connection with manufacturing industries. These are only a few of the many subjects it could more effectively deal with.

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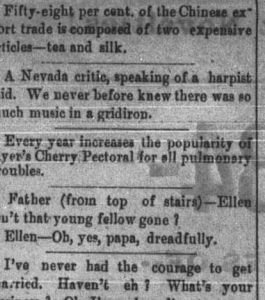
