TO GO IN EXILE

Word was received here yesterday that the Rev. Henry T. Cousins Ph. D., F. R. G. S., a Baptist minister, well known in Newcastle, of which he was several years a resident, has been appointed by the United States government to a place on the staff of Federal hospital No. 26 in Louisiana, a state partly settled by Acadians exiled from these provinces, whose descendants form an important part of population there at the present time. The significance of the announcement of the appointment is that Rev. Dr. Cousins and his wife will voluntarily exile themselves by entering a leper colony, possibly never to return to the world. They will consecrate the remainder of their lives to the task of comforting the isolated lepers, whose fate is sometimes called a living death. Rev. Dr. Cousins will not be the only clergyman at the colony, however, as for some time there has been a Roman Catholic priest stationed there. The priest is also devoting his life to the comfort of the afflicted. The former New Brunswick man will be the Protestant chaplain at the hospital.

REGULATIONS FOR FISHING IN N. B.

Restrictions Which Should be Remembered

Official advice concerning fishery regulations for the province of New Brunswick have been received from Ottawa.

Gaspereau fishing by means of gill-nets and pound-trap nets is permitted from March 1 until June 25, both dates inclusive, except on the Miramichi River, where the season begins on May 25 and ends June 25, inclusive. Gaspereau fishing is prohibited from the time of low water nearest 6 p. m. Friday of each week until 6 a. m. of the following Monday, except in St. John harbor, where fishing is prohibited from Saturday until Monday, from the time of low water nearest 6 p. m. and 6 a. m., respectively, for the days given. The mesh nets for gaspereau fishing shall not exceed 3-1/2 inches, extension measure. When in the opinion of a fishery officer for any district, gaspereau fishing is harmful to any other fishing, he may prohibit gaspereau fishing during the fishing period.

In herring fishing, no nets shall be set for herring within 1,000 feet of any weir under license. Driving with torches or other artificial lights is prohibited. Except where a special permit is granted for fishing bait for use in deep sea operations, weirs, nets, etc. must be open for the free passage of fish from Saturday until Monday, from the low water time nearest 6 p. m. until the low water time nearest 6 a. m.

A closed season is fixed for striped bass from the last day of February until the 13th of November, inclusive, except that angling may be carried on at any time. Use of seines for bass fishing is prohibited, also use of nets having meshes of less than 5 inches extension measure. All bass less than 12 inches in length must be returned to the water immediately. A license fee of \$1 must be paid for net fishing, of bass. All bass nets must be kept open from Saturday afternoon until Monday morning, on the low tide nearest 6 p. m. and 6 a. m. respectively.

Fish shipped during a closed season must be accompanied by a certificate of a fishery officer.

Export of clams is forbidden from May 1st to June 30, inclusive, and in St. John and Charlotte counties no one shall dig clams without a permit.

Cod fishing by seines is prohibited within half a mile of fishermen operating from anchored boats, with hooks and lines.

During September, October and November, in water frequented by salmon or trout, no person shall use a spear or torch or other light in fishing eels.

Use of explosives is prohibited in fishing by gill-nets, drift nets, trap nets or by angling. The mesh shall not be less than five inches extension measure. After 1924 the mesh shall not be less than six inches.

Salmon net fishing is prohibited except by license.

The fee for a gill or drift net license is \$1 for the first ten fathoms and

three cents for each additional fathom. For a trap net the fee is \$5 for the first ten fathoms of leader and 10 cents for each additional fathom.

Salmon fishing by nets is prohibited from August 16 until the last day of February, both inclusive, except on the Petitcodiac below the Moncton highway bridge, where the season closes August 31. In each week the close period from Saturday until Monday dates from low water, except on the St. John river, where the closed period is from 6 p. m. Saturday until 6 a. m. Monday.

Salmon angling is permissible from May 24 to August 31, inclusive, except on the Restigouche, where the period is from April 1 to August 15. The number of salmon taken in any one day by an angler shall not exceed five, and curly artificial flies shall be used.

Shad may be fished for only by license, costing \$1, from May 16 until June 20. From Saturday afternoon until Monday morning fishing of shad in the harbor is prohibited.

The closed season for trout is from October 1 to March 31. In Loch Lomond the catch per day is restricted to 12 fish, brown trout less than 12 inches in length must be thrown back into the lake.

HARD FOUGHT BATTLE EXPECTED

Over the Freight Rates Question

OTTAWA, May 11—The contest over the scope of the investigation into freight rates by the parliamentary committee seems likely to be hard fought.

While among representatives of eastern ridings there is much feeling in favor of broadening out the inquiry the western members will fight vigorously to keep down to the Crow's Nest Pass agreement.

While those who want a revision of the agreement are arguing that it is out of date and therefore not as much value even to western farmers western members maintain that the advantages it contains are of paramount value.

Speech On Radio Features Ad Bureau Dinner

That the public "would never stand for direct advertising by radio" was the keynote of a highly interesting address by John W. Elwood, vice-president and secretary of the Radio Corporation of America, to the gathering of 850 assembled for the A. N. P. A. Bureau of Advertising dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria Thursday evening. Mr. Elwood predicted that the radio would mean increases in both circulation and advertising for newspapers.

Two other distinguished speakers addressed the assemblage, but the practical discussion of the radio's effect on newspapers by Mr. Elwood stood out as the feature.

Senator Gilbert M. Hitchcock, owner of the Omaha World-Herald, was as impressive as ever, and his presentation of the financial problems faced by the United States and the rest of the world was masterful. He described in detail his proposal to congress to take steps to establish an international banking corporation, capitalized at \$2,400,000,000. Of this, the Government of the United States would hold \$1,300,000,000; exporters interested in international trade, \$200,000,000; with the remaining \$900,000,000 to be offered to the other nations of the world. Senator Hitchcock said that he had never regretted giving up the law for journalism.

Seymour L. Cromwell, president of the New York Stock Exchange, dealt with the history of the exchange and American finance in general. He discussed the recent bucket shop fiasco in New York and other large cities, with the comment that it seemed to him that some of the large newspapers had taken the wrong slant in the publicity which followed the recent succession of failures.

William F. Rogers, chairman of the bureau of advertising, presided at the dinner, and introduced William A. Thomson, associate director of the bureau, who was toastmaster. Mr. Thomson presented Mr. Elwood as a man unusually well qualified to talk to newspaper men on a subject of first and immediate importance, because of the interest manifested in the radio during the sessions of the A. N. P. A. convention.

Mr. Elwood scouted the idea that the radio would take the place of newspapers in the advertising field, and said that the future of the radio will be along the lines of entertainment. The only effect it will have on newspapers in the advertising line will be to add more space buyers, he said.

In commenting on the present methods of broadcasting, Mr. Elwood said that it was difficult to tell just

what the future would bring, but he was certain that it would go on to greater things. He told how the realization of the radio's power was forced upon the manufacturers of the instruments when they were taken by surprise with the rapid growth of radio. The newspapers, in his opinion, will continue to have a part in it. Radio has already cut into the field of the transatlantic messages, Mr. Elwood told the assemblage, and about 20 per cent of the messages coming from Europe are now sent by the wireless.

A meeting of the Chatham Amateur Athletic Ass. was held in the G. W. V. A. Hall in Chatham last evening. Messrs G. E. McGrath and H. P. Zinck of the Newcastle Ass. as well as representatives from the other four teams of the league were also present. Mr. G. M. McDade, President occupied the chair with Mr. A. A. Leggatt as Secretary.

The reason of the meeting was to discuss the Covey affidavit which was fully explained by Mr. E. W. Watling, who represented Mr. Covey. \$500,000 FOR BRIDGES IN N. B.

Fredericton, N. B. May 10—Approximately \$500,000 will be expended in the construction of permanent bridges in New Brunswick this year, Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, who is here on departmental business, said today.

Between 20 and 25, new permanent bridges will be constructed but the season's complete programme has not been finally made up in respect to either bridges or permanent roads. There is a considerable reduction in costs of all kinds of construction work as compared with last year, and this it is stated, will be reflected in the contracts when awarded.

The first lot of contracts for new federal-aided highways work will be awarded next week, but it will be some time later before any new bridge contracts are prepared to complete some of last year's projects.

POLITICAL LETTER

Parliament has been in session two months, permitting of a fair test of the group system and of the sincerity and progressiveness of the new administration.

The new administration started badly in the indecision displayed by Hon. Mr. King in Cabinet construction. He proposed coalition with the Progressives at the expense of his Montreal following and then weakened at the crucial time, surrendering to Sir Lomer Gouin and left Mr. Crerar and his agrarian advisers in the lurch.

P.E.I. POPULATION IS FALLING OFF

Census returns from Prince Edward Island The population of Prince Edward Island has been steadily decreasing. In 1911 the population was 93,728, and in 1921 (at the taking of the last census) it was only 88,615—a decrease of 5,113.

'There is a little encouragement with respect to Charlottetown,' says the Patriot. 'In 1901 its population was 12,080; it was less in 1911, but in 1921 it was 12,347—an increase of 267 in twenty years, if such can be regarded as an encouraging sign of these progressive times.'

There remains the Hon. T. A. Crerar and the Progressives. Mr. Crerar is a staunch Liberal partisan and his course has been one of co-operation with the Government even to the sacrifice of his party's principles. His party is restless and factious under his leadership. They view with suspicion his support of the Government; and this has been intensified by his ill-concealed opposition to the Wheat Board. He has failed to accomplish anything so far; and it is possible when he is faced with the decision to choose between politics and the grain business he will choose the latter. He would join openly with Mr. King but fears the certain disruption with his following and the retaliation which the prairie farmer would inflict. There may be capacity and initiative in the agrarian group but they have not been displayed so far. So far Canada's administrative experiment has not been a success. This is due to the failure of the group system or inefficient government leadership. We have instability and stagnation where we should have decision and activity. There is no collective cabinet responsibility; there is an uncertainty in tenure of office; there is evasion, delay and repudiation; these are all here; and responsibility for these conditions must rest on the administration leadership, but primarily and specifically on leadership.

Eaton Co. Ltd. To Install Radio Broadcasting Station

Musical Concerts, to be Arranged by Company, to be Broadcasted.

It was announced in St. John last week that a license for a radio broadcasting station has been granted to the T. Eaton Co. Ltd. mail order house, Moncton. The secretary of the St. John Commercial club, Mr. Hedley V. MacKinnon, former editor of the "St. John Standard" made the announcement and further stated that it was understood that the Eaton Co. would call for tenders for the proposed broadcasting station.

It would appear as though the Eaton Co. will arrange musical concerts, etc., for the installation of the broadcasting station. These concerts may be heard all over the province by any in possession of a radio receiving set.

The Federal government are working towards expediting and simplifying the development of radio telephony by amateurs. On a recent evening at St. John some radio enthusiasts there picked up a message in the Morse Code sent out by an operator on the island of Mauritius in the Indian Ocean. Morse signals have also been picked up at St. John from Paris, Poldhu, Ireland and Key West. The Marconi Company has applied for a license to establish a sending station at St. John. This equipment it is announced will be installed in the course of a few weeks.

Regarding the development of radio telephony the St. John Standard states that the Federal government is taking a very keen interest in it and to this end has arranged for licenses to be issued to every amateur who wishes to establish a receiving station and these will be on sale at every post office in the next few weeks. All that will be necessary after that will be for any person who desires to set up a receiving station to go to the post office, pay \$1, and receive his license.

CHANGING COLOR OF CANADIAN STAMPS

Ottawa, May 8—A number of changes in the color of Canadian postage stamps are being made, to conform with the new international regulations. A straw colored one cent stamp is being issued to replace the old green cent stamp which has been in use for many years; and as the various offices exhaust their supplies of green stamps, they will be replaced with the new issue. The red two cent stamp is being replaced with a green stamp, and should a six cent stamp ever be issued it will take the red color hitherto distinguishing the two cent stamp. The five cent stamp is of a violet shade, while the ten cent stamp is blue.

FRASER'S LOSS IS COVERED BY INSURANCE

Definite announcement was made by the Fraser Company, Limited, that their loss in the destruction by fire of their plant at Baker Brook, Madawaska County, was covered by insurance.

It is understood the plant had a value of not less than \$150,000, while the manufactured lumber and other losses at the place will bring the total fire damage up to more than \$200,000. The mill was equipped for manufacturing from 120,000 to 130,000 cedar shingles daily, about 50,000 feet of long lumber and 30,000 laths.

Lusitania Will Be Salvaged By Party From Philadelphia

Other Ships Also on the List for Recovery, and Millions in Gold Expected To Be Brought Up.

Philadelphia, May 9—An expedition for the salvaging of the Lusitania and other ships that have gone to the bottom of the ocean in the last few years will start from this city May 25. The steamship Blakely has been chartered for the purpose by the Lusitania Salvaging Company.

No great difficulty is anticipated in salvaging the Lusitania, it was said today, because the exact position is known and the belief is that it is in an upright position. Estimates of gold that lies at the bottom of the sea run into the millions. A single passenger alone was said to have deposited \$75,000 with the purser of the Lusitania, while Mme. Antoine Depage, wife of the Medical Director of the Belgian Red Cross, was reported to have carried more than \$100,000.

Makes 200 Mile Journey To Obtain Music Lessons

London, May 8—Miss G. McCann, a student of music, residing at Ramsey, Isle of Man, makes a 200 mile journey once every fortnight to obtain lessons in pianoforte playing.

This young enthusiast's journey from Ramsey to Worsley, near Manchester, involves 140 miles sea voyage and some 60 odd miles by rail. Her tutor, Mr. R. Froude Coules, says he has had many pupils from a long distance, including North Wales, the Lake District, and the Midlands, but this is the only case of a pupil traveling from the Isle of Man. In the spring and summer Miss McCann intends to take weekly lessons.

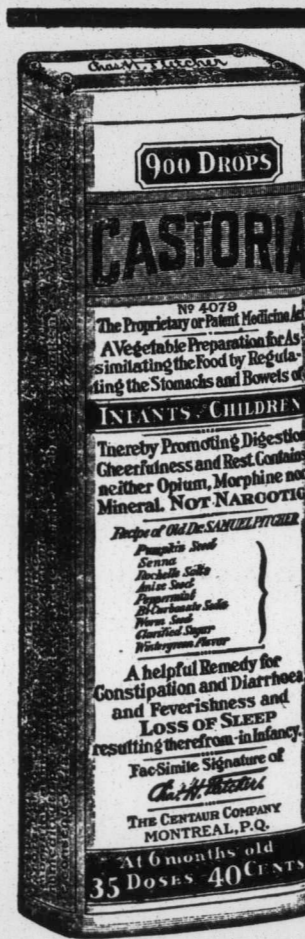
