The little pink strings are reeled off and cut in given lengths and bunches, each bunch having 101 strings. These strings are given out by the 1, 010, together with a corresponding number of tags, to people coming to the office for them, and are paid for at the rate of twelve to seventeen cents a thousand. Young children tie with their mothers, and even old men, and it is the great source of pin money in the community."
